
Washington, D.C., March 8 After about two years of study, the Joint Committee on the Organization of Congress made its report to the Congress this week. As usual, the meat of the report is contained in the recommendations. None of these recommendations become effective, however, unless bills or resolutions in pur-suance thereof are introduced

Among other things, the Joint Committee recommended that the Senate's 33 standing committees be reorganized into 16, and that the 48 standing committees of the further was recommended that House and Senate rules define clearly the jurisdiction of each reorganized committee so as to avoid overlapping and duplication and conflicts of jurisdiction. Committee chairmen would be required to report promptly all bills approved by the Committee, and seek a rule to bring them to the floor for consideration. Committees would be authorized to employ four staff experts in its special province, and such employees would not be dismissed for political reasons, under the recom-





From all we can hear about commodity shortages, price ceil-ings, are wholly responsible. Wagings, are wholly responsible. Wages have gone up, in many cases so high that the production cost actually exceeds the ceiling price. Naturally, no manufacturer wants to sell at a loss. Nobody can blame him if he elects to hold his goods until he can realize a profit. And now that profits are possible again we have homes of sees sible again we have hopes of see-ing fewer bare shelves.

One of the things this country needs is the exit of OPA. Not a sudden exit, because that might result in run-away prices followed by economic disaster. Just a gradual loosening of the bonds. Little by little, as manufacturers get back to legitimate profits more goods will be available until eventually the supply catches up with the demand.

Once that point is reached we need price controls any more. Competition, that old rehable factor of American trade will take care of prices without further trouble. In fact there may be some items today on which OPA could release its grip alto-gether. There's no need for price control on an item if the country is adequately stocked.
