# Two human cases confirmed by TDH in Cooke County

By Janet Felderhoff The Texas Department of Health (TDH) released information earlier this week reporting that two human cases of the West Nile virus (WNV) had definitely been confirmed in Cooke County. These are the first confirmed human cases in Cooke County. The only information that TDH would release on the two Cooke County residents is that both are recovering and neither is hospitalized. There is no specific tratement or cure for West Nile except for supportive therapy.






**From My Side** of the Fence Editor
