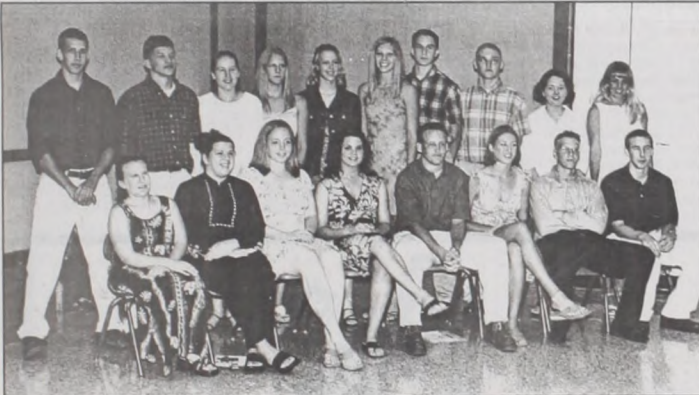

I-35 two car crash claims Tammie Sue Caldwell's life

Tammie Sue Caldwell, 34, of Myra and Sarah Strunk, 34, of Flower Mound were fatally injured in a two-vehicle collision that occurred at 8:15 a.m. Thursday, May 15. The accident occurred on I-35 about 1/2 mile north of U.S. 77.

According to Jim Bryan public information officer

for the Denton Police Department, the accident occurred when the 1977 Honda Accord driven by Strunk was northbound on I-35. Caldwell was southbound in a 2000 Dodge Stratus. The Honda was traveling in the inside lane when the driver perceived that the vehicle next to her was going to change lanes. According to Bryan, this

caused Strunk to lose control of her car and it went across the median into the southbound lane. Caldwell's car struck the Honda on its passenger side. Both women died at the scene. They were pronounced by the Tarrant County Examiners Office. There were no passengers.

Officer Lisa Martin of the Denton Police Department investigated the accident.

She was the beloved wife of Jeff Caldwell and the loving mother of one son, Kyle Caldwell and two daughters, Brooklyn Caldwell and Chelsey Caldwell all of Myra. She was the daughter of Allen and Shirley Reiter of Muenster, and the sister of Janet Sall of Tom Bean, Texas.

Preceding her in death were her grandparents, John and Olivia Wimmer and August and Hilda Reiter all of Muenster.

Tammie Sue was born on May 27, 1968 in Muenster to Allen James Reiter and Shirley Doreen Wimmer Reiter. A member of Sacred Heart Parish, she lived all her life in Muenster and Myra. She attended Sacred Heart School and graduated from Muenster High School, just missing being Valedictorian in a very close race. She became a Registered Nurse, and received her R.N. Degree from Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls graduating with honors.

On Nov. 19, 1988 she married Jeffrey Leon Caldwell in Tabernacle Baptist Church. She was first employed at Bethania Hospital in Wichita Falls, transferred to Denton Community Hospital where she worked for 12 years in several capacities, advancing in responsibilities, and was serving as Director of Nursing. She was active in Relay For Life in Denton; was a Cub Scout Den Mother, worked with Girl Scouts, and the 4-H Club. She loved sports, participating in volleyball and track in school, and was named Most Valuable Athlete in school, and was class president her senior year.

Tammie Sue loved her family dearly and was in return loved by them. In all things, her family always "came first." Her co-workers and hundreds of friends admired her work ethic and treasured her friendship.

A Rosary Service, led by Tammie's aunts, Mary Cain and Cindy Miller, was held Sunday at 4:00 p.m. in Sacred Heart Church. Vigil was held at 7:00 p.m. in church. A family Rosary Monday morning in the funeral home at 9:30 a.m. was led by Tammie's son Kyle Caldwell and her mother Shirley Reiter.

Participating in the Mass of Christian Burial with Father John Ohner OSA, pastor, and Father Kyle Walterscheid, a cousin, on Monday were altar servers, Sylvan Walterscheid, Alvin Hartman, and Joe Felderhoff.

The eulogy was given by Amy Heinen, a cousin of Tammie Sue, who stated in part... "Tammie was part of a loving and caring family... the love she experienced at home grew within her and she shared it joyfully... as a wife and mother... as an R.N. at the hospital... in positions of increasing responsibilities... Her children's strong values are a reflection of the lessons she taught them... She made the most of the time she was given... Someone reflected that her loss is everyone's."

A second eulogy, particularly special tributes, were given by Tim Charles, C.E.O. at Denton Community Hospital, who stated, in part... "Tammie had a special sympathy and understanding for co-workers, friends, people who were sick and needed her special qualities of understanding; and their response was noteworthy... She was a special asset to the hospital and staff and through them to both communities of Denton and Muenster." He added that her loss was not only to her family, but will be felt in so many areas, where the remarkable qualities she possessed will be greatly missed and sorely needed.

Burial in Sacred Heart Cemetery was directed by McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster. Pallbearers were Keith Williams, Steve Hennigan, Chris Creduer, Dale Reiter, Brian Miller, and Matthew Cain.

A Memorial Service was held at Denton Community Hospital on Tuesday afternoon for those who were unable to attend the funeral on Monday. The Caldwell and Reiter families also attended.

Henderson Broadcasting acquires KNTX-AM

Henderson Broadcasting, L.P. announces the acquisition of 500 watt KNTX-AM 1410, Bowie, from Buckalew Media, Austin. Buckalew Media has operated the local frequency for the past three years. The station license was granted to Henderson Broadcasting Company, L.P. by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. and ownership was recently transferred.

Henderson Broadcasting Company, L.P. is the former licensee of KXGM-FM, Hit 106.5, Muenster/Gainesville.

Charley and Pam Henderson sold the 106.5 FM frequency to First Broadcasting in September 2000 who later sold the frequency to Entravision Holding Corporation. The Hendersons owned and operated the station for 10 years, the last two years under a Local Marketing Agreement with both First Broadcasting and Entravision. Entravision won FCC approval to increase the power to 100,000 watts and change the dial position to 106.7. KXGM-FM went silent on Aug. 8, 2002. The new call letters are KKDL-FM.

Henderson Broadcasting plans to make several changes over the next few months to KNTX including a new antenna and ground system and an increase in power at night to improve signal and coverage to all of

Montague, Wise, Cooke, Clay, Jack, Wichita, Denton, and Archer counties, all of North Texas and Southern Oklahoma. Currently the offices and studios are undergoing a remodeling and facelift and the tower site is being improved.

State of the art digital studios are being installed and the station will broadcast 24 hours a day. KNTX will be a CBS and TSN affiliate and will provide full service with daily local news, sports, weather, music, daily contests and promotions. Pam Henderson said, "KNTX will have a 'professional sound' with a local flavor." Keeping KNTX's listeners informed and entertained will be KNTX's top priority. "We have always strived to provide our listeners with quality local programming as well as an effective venue for our advertisers," Charley Henderson said.

Changes to the station should be complete within the next 60 to 90 days.

Muenster ISD Board hires four new staff

The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees hired four new staff members, and renewed several with changes at their May meeting last week.

Joining the personnel of the school will be Debra Voth, Keisha Dill, Jackie Crisp, and Mandy Dulock. Voth will be replacing Becky Scott in Junior High Special Ed, with Dill assisting in girls athletics and Junior High English. Crisp will fill the High School Special Education position left open by the resignation of Rhonda Walterscheid, and Dulock will teach BCIS and computer, a place left vacant by Jerry Eckart.

Jeff Presnall will continue as the girls coach, but has been given the Technical Director job. Irene Hartman will teach a half a day, Scott Reed's contract was extended to 12 months, and Tommy Felderhoff was accepted after completing his TASP test.

Superintendent Clyde Steelman reported that the District is being visited by the DEC (District Effectiveness Compliance) Team this week. Also, the Texas Education Agency has approved an early start date for Muenster ISD to begin classes on Aug. 13, 2003. The school calendar is official and will be distributed with report cards.

Steelman also told the Board that overpayment of \$585,080 from the sale of WADA will be refunded to the TEA by Aug. 18. As of May 12 the District has approved 75 transfers. This count is down eight students from this time last year.

A report of delinquent tax collection noted that right at 96% of the Taxes have been collected. Normally 98% have been collected in the past. The Board also

approved the contract with Attorney Jim Robertson for the collection of delinquent taxes.

The Board also voted to keep the Pre-K tuition at \$6.00 per day.

In construction discussion, Investment Services (financial consultants) are preparing the District's financial portfolio to be used by other investment firms who are considering purchasing the bonds.

Muenster ISD's construction manager-at-risk met with six companies in a pre-bid meeting to discuss the Junior High renovation specs, building site, etc. Bids for Junior High renovation will be accepted until May 28 with construction beginning the first week of June.

The Board also met before this meeting for local Board training, as required by law. Reports given to the Board were:

- The Elementary report by Gwen Trubenbach included: a 98% attendance through April; 90% of the Pre-Kindergarten students mastered all of the Kindergarten objectives; and Gifted and Talented training was given to all staff members in the use of the Hawthorne Method.

- Mr. Newton's High School/Junior High report included a recounting of the UIL State Meet, 100% of the 31 seniors will graduate; the first year of TAKS tests are complete; the master schedule for next year is a work-in-progress due to changes in staff; and teachers have notified parents and Newton has met with students who are in danger of failing.

- Athletic Director Monte Endres reported on the track season finals and the booster club is sponsoring a golf tournament on Sunday, June 8 at Turtle Hill.

Officer investigates illegally dumped highway trash

Nasty diapers and empty beer boxes are a sad combination of the trash found at the intersection of highways 1630 and 373 when investigated by Cooke County environmental officer Deputy Laren Hudson. Throwing trash on the highway can result in fines of up to \$1,000 per day that the trash is on the highway. The fines can be even greater per day depending on the amount and weight of the trash. The fines are much greater than the cost of a dumpster or trash services. Sheriff Compton rightly expressed that teaching people about the laws and enforcing the laws are the only way to get people to stop dumping. Sometimes people have to spend time in jail before they realize that dumping isn't a good idea. Several country neighbors could save on trash services by sharing in the cost of a dumpster. It is important to legally dispose of your trash and to understand that the highways, creeks, and fields are not legal dumpsites. It is even illegal for you to dump your trash and debris on someone's property with their permission, for which you are still liable and can be fined and jailed. You own your trash until it is properly and legally disposed of.

Cooke County Sheriff Mike Compton praised environmental officer Deputy Laren Hudson to the Keep Texas Beautiful affiliates in Cooke County. "Laren works very hard and does a great job!" reported Sheriff Compton. Organizations in Cooke County that are Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB) affiliates are Keep Callisburg Beautiful, Keep Gainesville Beautiful, and Keep Muenster Beautiful. On behalf of all the KTB affiliates of Cooke County in appreciation for his environmental cleanup and enforcement work, Keep Muenster Beautiful nominated Deputy Laren Hudson for the Ed Davis Environmental Law Enforcement Award. The winner of the award will receive the award at a special recognition luncheon during the Keep Texas

Beautiful conference in Dallas July 8-11. Last year's conference was attended by more than 600 people from cities all over Texas and it is anticipated there will be a larger group this year.

Cooke County KTB affiliates are extremely proud of the passion Laren Hudson has for cleaning up the county and are extremely proud of the support he has from Sheriff Compton and the Commissioners. There is so much trash and illegally dumped waste in Cooke County that the county needs more than a full time environmental officer to manage the problem. Our law enforcement officials understand that, as the population of the county grows, the problem can get only worse if we don't get the illegal dumping under control and cleaned up. Additionally, trashy areas do not attract the quality of residents and businesses that tend to care about the local environment that has a direct impact on local business, jobs, and the economy. Environmentally conscious officials certainly have the support of Cooke County Keep Texas Beautiful organizations, especially the supportive Commissioners interested in cleaning up their jurisdictions.

Armed Services Committee approves 2004 Defense Authorization Act

The House Armed Services Committee recently approved the Defense Authorization Act for 2004, a bill that, among other things, would boost military pay and provide nearly \$40 million for Sheppard Air Force Base.

The funds for Sheppard were included at the request of U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TX-13), who serves on the Armed Services Committee.

"With our country at war," Thornberry stated, "it is important that we keep our military strong and vital facilities like Sheppard up-to-date and modernized. This bill will help do that speeding up the construction of a new airfield tower and by providing other critical funds that the Base can use. It will also provide our troops with a pay raise, which they have clearly earned."

"I am glad the bill was approved by the Armed Services Committee, and am

hopeful it will be passed by the full House of Representatives as well."

The Armed Services Committee approved the 2004 Defense Authorization Act by a vote of 58-2. According to Thornberry, the bill included a total of \$37.5 million for Sheppard Air Force Base. These funds included:

- \$28.5 million for a 300 room student dormitory.

- \$9 million for construction of a new airfield operations complex.

Thornberry noted that the 2004 Defense Authorization Act also includes an increase in basic pay for members of the Armed Forces averaging 4.1 percent, as well as targeted increases for mid-grade and senior noncommissioned officers and select warrant officers.

The bill must now be considered by the House of Representatives. A vote is expected to be held before Memorial Day.

The history of the VFW "Buddy" Poppy campaign

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States was the first organization to promote a nationwide sale of Poppies assembled by disabled and needy veterans.

To substantiate this claim, and to dispel any claims to the contrary, the following chronological and documentary information is briefly outlined.

In 1921, the Franco-American Children's League conducted a nationwide sale of Poppies made in France, for the benefit of children in the war-torn areas of France and Belgium. The inspiration came from Col. John McCrae's poem, "In Flanders Fields."

In October 1921, the American Legion, at its convention in Kansas City, repudiated its action of 1920 in choosing the Poppy as its official flower, and substituted the Daisy.

In May 1922, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States conducted a nationwide sale of Poppies made in France. This was after the dissolution of the Franco-American League, and in response to an appeal by Madame Guerin, "the Poppy lady from France."

In October 1922, following the first nationwide sale of Poppies by the VFW, the American Legion Convention repudiated the Daisy as its official flower and again adopted the Poppy.

In the spring of 1923, the American Legion conducted its first nationwide sale of Poppies made by a French manufacturer.

In 1923, the Veterans of Foreign Wars evolved the idea which resulted in the VFW "Buddy" Poppy fashioned by disabled and needy veterans, who were paid for their work in assembling "Buddy" Poppies.

In February 1924, the VFW registered the name "Buddy" Poppy with the U.S. Patent Office, and still holds all trademark rights in the name "Buddy" under the classification of artificial flowers.

Since May 1924 the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States has annually conducted a "Buddy" Poppy sale.

This year the "Buddy" Poppy sale will be held on Memorial weekend May 24 and 25. When a VFW volunteer offers you a poppy, please contribute generously and wear your poppy proudly. Your help will go a long way in soothing the pain of a deserving veteran.

Railroad Commission penalizes 16 companies

On Tuesday, May 13, the Railroad Commission issued penalties to 16 companies for violating Commission environmental and public safety rules. Penalties range from \$250 to \$18,000 and total over \$79,000.

Rule violations included seven violations of SWR 3 (identification of properties, well and tanks), six violations of SWR 8 (water protection), three violations of SWR 13 (casing, cementing, drilling and completion requirements), eleven violations of SWR 14 (well plugging), one violation of SWR 17 (pressure on Bradenhead), one violation of SWR 20 (notification of fires, breaks, leaks or blowouts) and one violation of SWR 91 (clean up of soil contaminated by a crude oil spill).

Parties to enforcement proceeding before the Commission have 20 days after the Commission denies their case to file a Motion for Rehearing with the Commission. They also have 30 days to appeal to the Travis County District Court if their Motion for rehearing is denied.

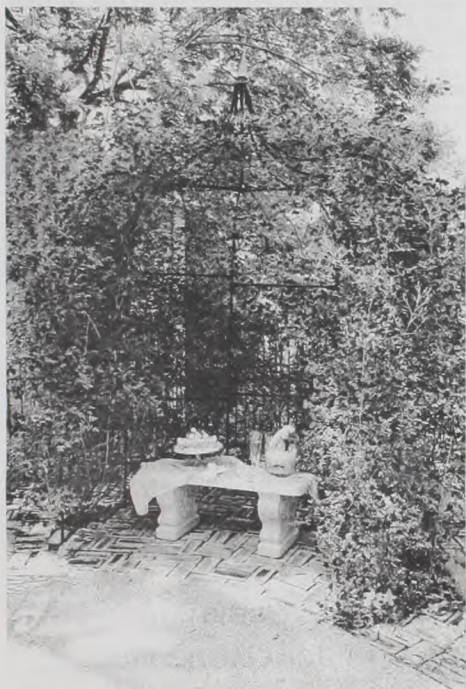

Regents make changes

Approval and adoption of the official catalog for 2003-04 topped an agenda of mostly routine action items at the regular May meeting of the North Central Texas College board of regents. A major difference from previous catalogs will be the inclusion in the new edition of the student handbook, previously published under separate cover.

"We believe this will be a much more cost-effective and efficient way of distributing this important information to students," said Toby Osburn, dean of student services. "Much of the content of the handbook refers to or repeats information from the catalog anyway."

Turning to personnel matters, the regents heard the first reading of a proposed change in policy related to employee vacations and holidays. Most directly affected by the change will be members of the college's maintenance staff whose vacations and holidays - like those of faculty, administrators and professional and clerical staff-have coincided with the academic calendar.

In addition, these employees, like the faculty and others, have usually stayed home when the campuses were closed due to bad weather.

"The problem with this is that the college's physical plant doesn't take off for spring break or similar holidays, and many of our systems and facilities continue to need attention even when the campus is shut down because of weather," said Dr. Ronnie Glasscock, president. "In fact, many maintenance tasks and repairs can be best performed when students are not here."

A vote on the new policy will take place after the regents hear a second reading at their next regular meeting in June.

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Program explains Leader Dogs for the Blind

Many attest to the saying "a man's best friend is his dog," but for the legally blind and/or deaf-blind, a specially trained dog also provides aid for increased mobility insuring safer and more independent travel.

Gainesville Lions Club guest speaker, Alan Cook, district chairman of Leader Dogs for the Blind and a member of Little Elm's Lakeside Lions Club, has met numerous blind people who say that Leader Dogs have dramatically changed their lives.

In fact, the Leader Dog movement has dramatically changed the lives of thousands of blind men and women (ages 18-90) who were previously homebound. Regardless of where they live, these dogs are trained for where they are going (whether it be a

city or a country environment), he said.

Supported by the Lions Club and other private donors, Lion Alan Cook said that Leader Dogs for the Blind was founded in 1939 by a group of Michigan Lions whose goal was to train dogs to lead the blind and to provide facilities and means whereby trained dogs could be matched to a blind master. Since its inception, more than 12,000 Leader Dogs have been trained.

Although there are other organizations (Guide Dogs and Seeing Eye Dogs) that train dogs for the blind, Cook singled out the Leader Dog organization as the only existing program for people who are both blind and deaf.

Located on 14 acres in Rochester, Michigan, Cook

said that the facilities can house 28 people, four instructors and a housemother. The kennels are staffed by experienced instructors, and a veterinary hospital is located in the center of the large kennel building.

In conclusion, Cook stated that visually impaired individuals who have made the decision to enhance their mobility and who are also prepared to care for and use the dog in the intended manner, may apply for admittance to the program's 25-day training session which is completely free of charge.

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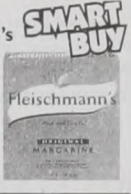

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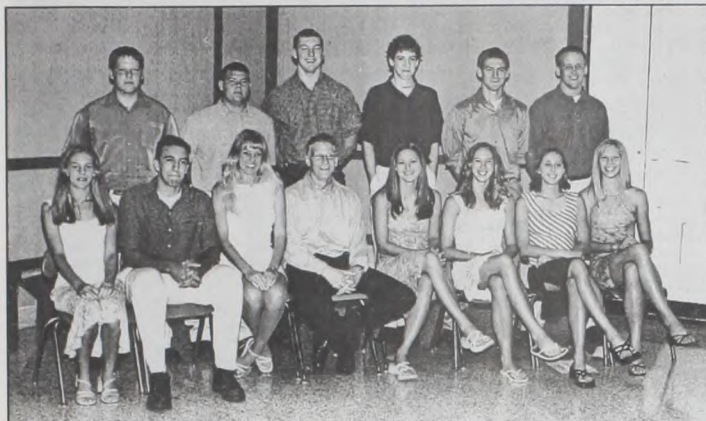

Lady Hornet 2003 track and field season is the best since 1991

The 2003 Muenster Lady Hornet Track & Field Team enjoyed their best season since 1991 by claiming the team championships at the District, Area, and Regional meets.

The Muenster girls, just three days out of the basketball playoffs, began their track season with a great showing at Bridgeport's Double B Relays and then went on to win the team titles at the Lindsay, Muenster, Sacred Heart, and Nocona invitational meets.

The Lady Hornets then set their sights on the District 16-A Championship in early April and succeeded by outscoring great teams from Lindsay, Era, Windthorst, and Archer City. The Area Championship was secured a week later as Muenster outscored second place Windthorst 148 to 88.

Success in the district and area meet was especially a testament to the importance of "team", as injuries to individual standouts Jacé Koelzer and Brooke Endres prevented the Lady Hornets from being at full strength.

The Region II-A Meet in Abilene glorified the importance of the team concept as individual accomplishments constantly came up short for qualifying for the state meet. Third place finishes were frustrating at the time, but at the end of the meet, the girls from Muenster were proud to be named Regional

Co-Champions with Albany. This was Muenster's first time to win the regional crown since 1991.

The Lady Hornets did, however, have two individuals qualify for the state meet. Brooke Endres clocked in a 16.43 to win the regional championship in the 100m Hurdles and Kallie Gerstberger placed second in the most exciting race of the meet as she edged out a runner from Dawson in the 1600m Run. Kallie's 5:26 time was the third fastest time in school history.

The UIL State Track & Field Meet in Austin was the final stop of the season for the Muenster Lady Hornets. Brooke Endres claimed fifth place in the state in the 100m Hurdles and set the school record with a time of 15.72 seconds! Kallie Gerstberger claimed the bronze medal in the 1600m Run and would be the first Muenster athlete on the medal stand in Austin since 1995!

In all, the 2003 Lady Hornets set seven school records in track & field.

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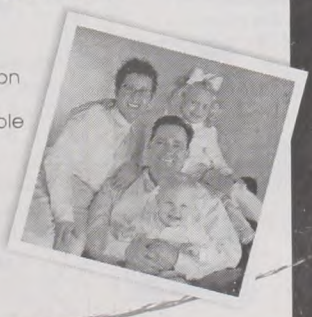

Texas Farm Bureau

Public School Finance

May 6, the Senate approved their version of HB 5 and passed SJR 1.

These pieces of legislation would change the public education finance system in Texas.

The Senate proposals reduce the local school property tax cap from \$1.50 to \$0.75 per hundred dollars valuation for maintenance and operation (M&O), and constitutionally converts the local school property tax to a state property tax.

To offset this reduction in property tax revenue, the bill increases the state sales tax rate to 7.5 percent and taxes many services not currently taxed.

A local option property tax by school districts for enrichment programs may be approved by local voters.

This enrichment property tax may be up to \$0.10 per hundred dollars of valuation.

Texas Farm Bureau policy supports the reduction of

property taxes and more equitably spreading the costs of schools across the population.

However, there are concerns regarding the taxation of services associated with the production of agricultural commodities.

TFB staff is working with Senator Todd Staples to exempt services associated with agricultural production. The amendment was postponed. All exemptions to SB 2 will be considered as a whole.

House Select Committee on School Finance

Speaker Tom Craddick created a twenty-seven member select committee to study the school finance issue. The select committee will review the Senate proposal, as well as others, during the interim, and is charged with finding a new public school finance plan that will be a permanent and equitable solution to Robin Hood.

Local clinic helps women prepare for new baby

Many people know about the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program and what it offers mothers and their young children. What they may not realize is that eligible participants can receive WIC services from the very beginning of their pregnancy.

WIC, which is administered in your area by Outreach Health Services, is a well respected, federally funded program that gives children a healthy start by encouraging optimal nutrition during the critical stages of development, including the prenatal period. WIC participants have access to vouchers for healthy foods, nutritional assessments, ongoing nutrition education classes, meal planning assistance, immunizations and breastfeeding instruction and support.

These free services are available to middle- to low-income women who are pregnant, breastfeeding, postpartum or have an infant and/or children

younger than five years of age. WIC staff work with their pregnant clients to make sure they are eating a nutritionally sound diet and help them prepare for their baby's arrival. Here are some of the issues the OHS WIC staff discusses with expectant mothers:

How will you feed your infant? The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends breast milk as the best source of nutrition for infants up to age 1, but even a few months of breastfeeding is better than none at all. Breastfeeding can decrease the incidence or severity of infant illnesses such as diarrhea, ear infections and bacterial meningitis. A benefit for the breastfeeding mom is the natural weight loss most experience.

What steps have you taken to baby-proof your home? Babies are naturally curious. Once they begin to crawl, look out world! Check your home for potential hazards and eliminate them. Long cords such as

those hanging from curtains or blinds should be kept out of baby's reach. Staircases should have properly-installed child safety gates at the top and bottom.

One hundred years ago, in May 1903, President Theodore Roosevelt visited the Grand Canyon for the first time. Upon seeing it he said, "Leave it as it is. You cannot improve on it. The ages have been at work on it, and only man can mar it-

--keep it for your children, your children's children, and for all who come after you." Five years later in 1908 he used the Antiquities Act of 1906 to designate the Grand Canyon National

Monument. In turn the monument became the core of Grand Canyon National Park. TR acted upon his own advice. His conservation vision and resulting actions remain an inspiration and gift to us all. Outdoor Wire
