MISD proposes tax rate

The Muenster ISD Board met for their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, June 16. After a late "walk-through" called meeting, President Jim Endres called the meeting to order. Superintendent Clyde Steelman introduced and welcomed Vicki and Curtis Eldridge, new librarian and assistant principal.

The Board approved several items which included: the hiring of Lee Ratliff as the Vocational Agriculture teacher; setting the proposed M&O (maintenance and operation) tax rate at \$1.45; and approved the curb, gutter, and paving of Walnut Street from Eighth to Ninth Streets at an estimated cost of \$45,554.30.

The proposed M&O tax rate is combined with the interest and sinking fund rate to provide a combined proposal of \$1.635 (See Public Notice, Pg. 9).

Reports were given, including the following:

- Technology - MISD's Technology Academy is scheduled for June 21 - 23 and July 19 - 21. A Technology re-

fresh course was given the previous week for MISD employees. Also a list of summer projects and tasks to be completed were submitted.

- Athletic - A year-end summary of track was given. Also "the boys" have been competing in a 7 on 7 league and "we have been having a tremendous turn out for our summer conditioning program." August 2 is the first day of football practice.

- Elementary - Current enrollment for next year is 270; class schedules are complete; Technology refresher courses were held the first week in June, with teachers to take part in the June and July Technology Academies held at MISD.

- High School - 100% of MHS seniors graduated in May; summer school is underway for junior high students; next year's projected enrollment is 85 in junior high and 180 in high school (includes Life Skills and recommended transfers from Sivells Bend); the UIL spring meet district alignment put Muenster in District 14 and includes Alvord, Archer City, Collinsville, Era, Lindsay, Muenster, Petrolia, Saint Jo, Valley View, and Windthorst. These same 10 are also the cross-country district.

- Transfers - as of June 13, a total of 78 transfers are signed up to attend MISD. This includes 36 elementary,

nine junior high, and 33 high school students. Ten to 12 transfers were revoked due to discipline problems, and five to six have not yet been approved.

- Back taxes - Monthly collection for May totaled \$17,233.88 for MISD - of which \$17,106.48 was from IMAC (old cheese plant) for 2002.

- Steelman noted that the District is "in excellent shape again" with 72.6% revenue collected, expenditures at 62.89% and total amount invested at \$1,443,850.26.

- Lou Heers explained the Texas Preliminary Reading Inventory (TPRI) Screening results, noting that 95% of the K - 2 students are on level or above, and the other 5% are barely missing it.

- The TAKS (Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills) preliminary summary was presented, with Muenster's lowest scores in the Math testing. "This is a wake-up call to the teachers," said Steelman. "We can't continue to teach the same as five years ago." All Muenster ISD students scored above the average state level.

- Jeff Presnall presented the Technology Needs and Assessment Committee's future needs and areas of concern. He noted a need to increase the involvement of parents and the community in

Heavy rains result in road hazards

Ignoring road closed warning signs led to an accident Thursday, June 17 at about 2 a.m. It occurred when Chisam Cain, age 20, of Muenster and two companions decided to check out a bridge that they'd heard was out on CR 424. That was information given to Cpl. Mike Linnell who investigated for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Although the road was very clearly marked as being closed to traffic, the trio drove past two road closed signs posted on the east side of a washed out culvert. The second sign was in front of a load of gravel and boulders dumped there by the Cooke County Precinct #4 crew. By completely blocking the road

with the pile of rock, Billy Poyner, Precinct #4 road foreman, felt that people wouldn't try to drive on that road.

According to Cpl. Linnell, Cain in a 2001 Chevrolet extended cab Silverado pickup, drove through the ditch to get around the rock barricade. After about 3/10 of a mile he saw what he perceived to be a shadow on the road. He con-

tinued forward at a slow speed and drove off into a creek. It was about an eight-foot drop.

With Cain were Mary McCourry, age 21, of CR 402 in the front passenger seat and Adam Klement, age 20, of Muenster in the back seat. McCourry was the only one to be injured. They called a friend who took McCourry to the hospital and took the other two home. She was admitted to Muenster Memorial Hospital with neck injuries.

"They were very lucky that they didn't get hurt worse than they did," remarked Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess. "The second set of barricades and the rocks should have stopped them."

Hess also observed that it was a good thing that there weren't any serious injuries. The county road sign for 424 had been damaged and an ambulance could have had trouble finding them. Poyner said that the road sign was one of 110 stolen or damaged several weeks ago by youths. They are supposed to be replacing them as part of their punishment.

Hess noted that they haven't replaced the culvert, which was pushed out of the ditch by the pressure of the rushing water. They are going to put in a nine-foot train car to replace the seven-foot culvert. Also, another culvert will

MMH considers improvements to St. Richard's Villa

Recently the Texas Department of Human Services conducted a Life Safety Code Survey. A number of items were identified as needing attention at St. Richard's Villa (SRV). At the June 15 Board meeting, St. Richard's Administrator Zula Lawyer informed members of the MMH Board of Directors that a plan of corrections was being formulated and had to be post-marked by June 18.

MMH Administrator Richard Arnold said that one of the items of concern on the list was the concrete drive at SRV. He got the Dangelmayr Brothers check it out and give two estimates for fixing the

problem. One was to tear out and haul off all the old concrete and replace it. The other was to take out problem spots and replace those areas with new concrete. The first estimate was \$26,447.50 and the second was \$9,352.50. Arnold and CFO Lynn Heller presented a third option from the Internet using a concrete repair material. It is fast drying with fast set up, and can be put on in thin layers where concrete is peeled up a half inch, said Arnold. The cost for the patch job would be about \$500.

Arnold said that another area is that in 11 of the rooms, the 40-year-old tile has what appears to be dirt, but is actually a residue from the sec-

ond layer as the tile has worn down. The best way to replace this was discussed.

Wallpaper in some places was cited because a number of years ago the lights were lowered and the holes that remained were patched with wallpaper. Some of the doors have nicks and mars and were

cited. Board members Kenny Klement and James Walterscheid, along with Arnold, had visited SRV earlier to see what was cited so that they would have a better idea of what needed to be done.

Danny Walterscheid suggested talking with Bruce

Burgamy since he signed a lease/purchase agreement. "We can do just enough to get through what we need to get through, or do you want us to fix this thing? If you want us to fix this thing, how much are you willing to put up the difference?"

Dr. Walter Knight re-

marked, "Even if he says, 'I don't want to participate at all.' We're not going to fix it any cheaper. We're not going to not fix it because we'd have to close it down and that's not going to work."

be installed west of it to help alleviate the water problem. There is a fiber optic line in the area and it will have to be located before the work is done.

Danger

People have been moving the barricades placed by the County to protect people from dangers caused by recent heavy rains (over 12 inches and still coming). Commissioner Hess said that they check on them every day. He warns that moving them leaves the road wide open and that somebody could be hurt badly by this.

Poynor said that on CR 411 near Marysville a bridge washed out. The County cut down a tree 10 inches in diameter and placed it across the road to keep anyone from going that way. He said that someone drug the tree out of the road, leaving unsuspecting drivers in danger of trying to cross a bridge that wasn't there. He expressed concern for the safety of those who might travel the road after the warning signs and barriers are moved.

The county road signs are for the benefit of those who live on the road, Poynor

added. We know which road it is. Fire departments, ambulances, and police need the numbers to respond quickly in an emergency. Should someone not get timely care because of road signs, the person or persons who committed the act could be prosecuted.

Creek rescue

On Monday, June 21 another county resident found himself endangered by rushing waters on a county road. Cpl. Linnell reported that Michael Salsman attempted to cross CR 302 (Fisher Road) west of CR 445 between

Muenster and Myra in his vehicle, a Ford Ranger pickup.

The water carried his vehicle about 30 yards downstream into water that was over the hood of the pickup. Cpl. Linnell credited the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department with rescuing Salsman and probably saving his life.

Muenster Volunteer Fire Chief Herbie Knabe confirmed that the department was called at 7:28 p.m. to CR 302 for people in the water. They arrived at the scene to find Salsman standing in the back of his pickup.

Knabe said that the vehicle

had hung up on debris. They worried that the water that continued to rise would take Salsman and his vehicle further downstream. There were four fire trucks and 16 firemen at the scene from Muenster VFD. Ropes were used to pull Salsman through the rushing water to the safety of land.

"He was lucky that the truck didn't roll when it came off the road," said Knabe. "He would have really been in trouble then because he could have been trapped inside the overturned truck."

Knabe reminded people, "They always say, 'Don't ever drive through fast moving water.' Even if you've driven

through it before, you don't know when it might catch you just right and lift the vehicle." According to the National Weather Service in Fort Worth, six inches of fast moving water can knock you off your feet; a depth of two feet will cause most vehicles to float.

What if someone had attempted to cross CR 424 (where Cain's pickup went into the culvert) in the dark before the missing culvert was reported? These are some of the reasons that there are warnings about attempting to cross roads covered by water, especially rushing water or water that causes the road's condition to be unseen.

mented that they would be fixing it for the people of the community who use it.

The Board agreed to have Lawyer continue to develop a plan of action. The details will be worked out later.

Officers for the MMH Board of Directors will remain the same, by acclamation. They remain Kenny Klement president, Dan Hamric vice-president, and John Aytes secretary.

The Board unanimously approved staff privileges for Dr. Bonnie Carter. Her acceptance had been unanimously approved and recommended by the Medical Staff in the June 10 meeting. They are effective August 1, 2004.

During the financial report, Lynn Heller, CFO, told the Board members, "The Total Past Filing Deadline money written off so far this year to date is \$212,800. Let's say our collection rate is 70%. You can take 70% of that \$212,000 and we'd just stick it out in a burn barrel and burn it up

this last year." Asked what caused the problem Heller said, "It's a combination of things. Take the turnover we've had, not getting records done timely, not having internal controls set up, and again, I'd say the vast majority of this kind of problem that we're finding, is old stuff that we're correcting."

Heller explained that Medicare, Medicaid, and all insurance have different filing deadlines. If it is not filed within that timeframe there is no payment. He said that some of it is from 2002. Danny Walterscheid remarked, "That's still sweeping from under the filing cabinet in other words." Heller agreed that Betty Mize, current business office manager, and her staff are just digging out the information one account at a time.

"We had a recent change up there (business office) and we found that there were close to \$300,000 in claims that had not been coded and some of

those things were timely file stuff." He said the staff was right in the middle of addressing the problems and that the numbers would be going down dramatically, but that they would continue to see some of it in the coming year.

Klement asked if they'd been getting their money's worth from the companies that had been hired to find such problems. These included Financial Corporation of America collection group and the D Med group. Heller said no, it was Betty and her staff finding it. Since Mize accepted the position of office manager, the groups are no longer being used.

Heller said that problems with timely filing will never be completely eliminated. At times people will not get the information to the hospital in time, even with constant encouragement from the business office.

Danny Walterscheid inquired as to what was being done about the problem. Mize said that they are now running more and more reports and learning what they have to look for. "We've got a lot of 2002 accounts that we aren't going to get anything from them," she noted. "About 57 or 60 percent of those are Medicare, but there's a lot of money that we have written off for timely filing. Now we do today's business today and then we work on the other stuff because it is already old. We are working on this continually."

In other business the Board:

- Heard that the lease/purchase agreement for St. Richard's Villa between MMH and Bruce Burgamy is signed and transfer of operations will take place July 1.

Welly bought some 70 acres of the T.C.U. land, about four miles south of Muenster. He spends most of his free time building fences, and cleaning it up. 



the use of technology in education, "how to use technology in the real world, not just in the classroom." This would involve local businesses and field trips.

Consent items the Board approved included: the minutes from seven meetings held the last month (six were called); student accident insurance; teacher appraisal calendar, adding Curtis Eldridge as an appraiser; re-named Gwen Trubenbach as curriculum director; and added that all shop areas, the field house/weight room, and computer labs are facilities not available to rent for non-school use.

The Board then discussed the District's improvement program. Getting blinds in the junior high building was approved, as was the masonry wall in the coaches' office of the new field house. The remaining concerns will be addressed at the next meeting. Payment to Track Masters, Inc. for \$16,721.00 was approved for drainage improvement, but will not be paid until they complete clean-up.

Dissatisfaction with the construction of the field house continues to be discussed. "We still see light coming in at two corners," noted Board member Ronnie Felderhoff. "I'm not satisfied. It will cost more than the \$700 credit they offered to fix the problems." Steelman noted that Plyler Construction was waiting on electrical work to be completed, which should be finished at the end of the month. "Let's send Plyler a letter and get this thing done," added Felderhoff "it's been dragging on and on." Steelman concluded that he won't release the payment until everything on the punch list is settled.

The Board also discussed budget amendments and scheduled the July Board meeting for Monday, July 12.

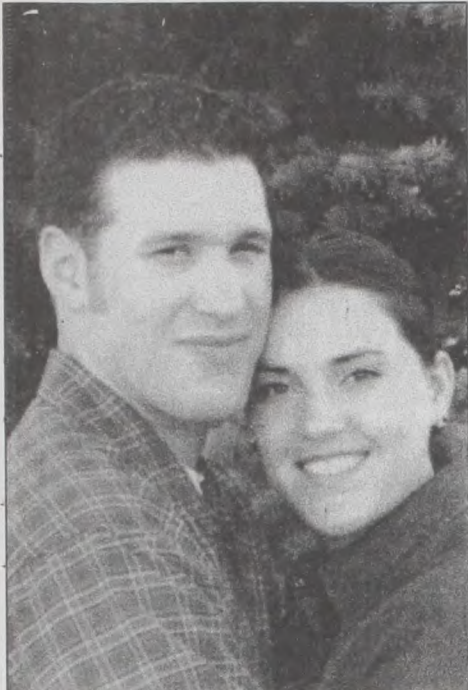

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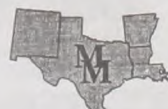

University professor awarded National Endowment for the Humanities grant

University of Dallas professor, Dr. Laura Flusche was recently awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). The grant will enable Flusche to participate in the NEH/American Academy in Rome seminar held in July.

These types of NEH awards are given to college and university teachers who are in need of research time and funds.

"The NEH seminar is a great opportunity for me," remarked Flusche. "It gives me the chance to learn and to research alongside 15 other scholars whose interests are similar to my own. I'm looking forward to a month-long conversation about a topic that I find fascinating."

The topic of the seminar is "Archaeology and Ideology." During the seminar Flusche will conduct research for her book called *Etruscomania: Etruscology and Ideology in Ancient Rome*. "I'll be asking why the Etruscan culture has been the object of so much fascination in the modern age, studying the development of archaeological methods in the 19th and 20th centuries and their application to the field of Etruscan studies, and making an examination of episodes from the modern history of Etruscology, both scholarly and popular, which exemplify the degree to which our interpretation of the Etruscan past has been shaped by the modern present," said Flusche.

Flusche teaches Art

History on the Rome campus of the University of Dallas. She received her undergraduate degree from Trinity University in San Antonio where she studied art history. She holds a Master's degree in Italian Renaissance art and a Ph.D. in Etruscan and Roman art and archaeology from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana. Since 1991, Dr. Flusche has been part of the Soprintendenza di Archaeologia di Roma / American Academy in Rome excavations on the Palatine Hill in Rome's ancient city center. She is also a founder and president of the Institute of Design and Culture in Rome www.urbaniconography.org,

a not-for-profit educational organization.

"In einem Boot mit Johnny Depp" was the headline of a full page feature article in the *Siegere Zeitung* German newspaper.

E.I. Wiesmann of Southlake, Texas has kept communication with Flusche relatives in Germany over the years and recently received an article on Andreas Flusche, from Flusche's aunt. Andreas appeared in the Disney-Hollywood Production, that was filmed in the Caribbean, *Pirates of the Caribbean*.

"I asked my nephew whether it is possible to see some scenes where he appears, but he answered that the scenes alter so rapidly and if one doesn't know the correct moment, it is hardly possible to find him in the pictures," noted the aunt.

Flusche is the first man from Dielfener (village) to

be in a Hollywood Disney production, the article notes. The 38 year old began sailing 10 years ago. When winter is coming and temperatures fall, Andreas leaves Germany to spend several months in "Katamaran in den kleinen Antillen, zwischen (between) Antigua und Grenada," where he has his own sailboat. "Andreas will return every year to the Caribbean," said his aunt. "Many people think he doesn't like to work... although many people would dream of such a life."

For the movie, the German sailor was turned into an English sailor. For four weeks he spent his mornings in a row boat, beginning at 5 a.m., transformed with blackened dirty nails, and painted teeth. Flusche's scene was an attack by the pirates on the English. "We filmed from morning until evening

in front of the town," Flusche is quoted in the article. A town was built in the bay in three months, which remained standing until the next hurricane.

"The stars came only for a few minutes and returned to their quarters. Johnny Depp lived on a yacht," Flusche's story continued. "Even though it got boring, we rowed ten times to the same place, our joy and meeting different kinds of people outweighed the boredom."

What angered Andreas Flusche was the fact that Disney used real gun powder for the canons and the next day there were only dead fish in the bay.

Pirates of the Caribbean, a 2003 production, has won numerous awards.

The art of growing things

Deadheading in June is Fun

Deadheading flowers serves two purposes. It keeps the plant looking attractive and it stops seed production. When the dead blossom is removed, energy from the plant to form seeds is redirected to produce another series of flowers. Be sure to remove the entire developing seed pod, don't just pull off the petals. You may choose to let the seeds fall to the ground for next year's flowers or you may choose to gather those developing seeds.

Rosarians are rather particular about their deadheading process - removing the spent blossom with an angled cut right above the first true leaf node. Deadheading can be accomplished by snipping, pruning, pinching, cutting, or any other method to remove the dead blooms. At the same time many gardeners take this opportunity to reshape and trim the plant to a more attractive shape.

Not all flowers will produce another series of blooms if they are deadheaded. Lilacs and flowering bulbs won't. Daylilies are in their prime now and will benefit from deadheading. Zinnias, marigolds, cosmos, roses, mums, and black-eyed Susans will bloom continually all summer if dead blooms are removed. If you're not sure if a flower will re-bloom after deadheading - try it. Your plant will at least look better.

Geraniums should be deadheaded down the stalk at the first true leaf node rather than just the flower head.

Many annuals are self-pruning and do not require that their flowers be manually removed. These include begonias, Impatiens, coleus, alyssum, ageratum, vinca, and salvia. Other annuals such as pansies, petunias, and snapdragons may need to be pinched back after planting or after the first set of blooms to encourage rebloom.

Planting of heat tolerant flowers continues with hardy hibiscus becoming available. Plants purchased now must be planted immediately and hand watered every few days to become established.

On another note, 2004 is turning out to be a spring and summer of bountiful harvest. Peaches, blackberries, plums, and apricots are abundant this year. Kitchens in Cooke County are abuzz with jelly and jam making, cobbler baking, and freezing these plentiful fruits.

ATM/Debit card users offered safety tips

ATM and debit card users need to observe some basic precautions when using these increasingly popular payment cards to make purchases or withdraw cash.

That was the message delivered by Texas Banking Commissioner Randall S. James and Stan Paur, CEO of PULSE EFT Association. "ATM and debit cards have transformed the way we handle money," Commissioner James said. "Recent studies show people prefer using debit cards because they are easier to use and more convenient than cash or checks. But unless proper caution is exercised, they also pose the same potential risks to their users, both physical and financial, as carrying cash. We're here to urge people to continue to use their ATM and debit cards, but to safeguard them by following some simple guidelines."

Paur listed a number of precautions from the PULSE guide:

- Treat your card like cash; always keep your card in a safe place.
- Keep your personal identification number (PIN) a secret.

- Do not disclose confidential information about your card over the telephone or Internet.
- Always observe the ATM surroundings before conducting a transaction.
- Block the view of others when using an ATM or point-of-sale (POS) terminal.
- Look for possible fraudulent devices attached to the ATM.
- Never allow the cashier or any other person to enter your PIN for you, even if they are assisting you with the transaction.

Commissioner James noted that these precautions are more timely than ever since ATMs have become so ubiquitous. The commissioner pointed out that the Texas Department of Banking urges ATM owners to conduct periodic safety assessments of ATMs and their surroundings. He also cautioned both ATM owners and cardholders to be on the lookout for seams such as "skimming," in which a device illegally attached to an ATM collects data from the card.

Summer camp open to youth with military parent

Through a partnership with Operation Purple of the National Military Family Association (NMFA), the Texas 4-H Center will conduct the Texas 4-H Stars and Stripes Camp August 4-8. This camp is specifically designed for youth ages 12-16 who have a parent deployed overseas. The camp is open to all youth whose family serves in any of the four branches of the armed services, to include National Guard, Reserves, and Ancillary Units.

The National Military Family Association is a non-profit, predominately volunteer organization with

membership from the seven uniformed services, active duty, National Guard, reserves and retired, their families and survivors, as well as interested civilians. NMFA is the only national organization whose sole focus is the military family and whose mission is to serve those families through education, information, and advocacy.

Through a partnership with Sears as part of the Sears American Dream Campaign, NMFA has created a program that allows children from all branches to interact with and learn from each other in an effort to help deal with

deployment-related stress. In an effort to do something special for military kids, Operation Purple is offering summer camps around the country. The Texas 4-H Center will host one of these camps.

Youth do not have to be members of 4-H to participate in the camp; however, camp participants will have an opportunity to learn about 4-H and how they can become involved in their home county. In addition to learning about 4-H, campers will enjoy traditional camping experiences such as canoeing, swimming, archery, dancing, new

games, etc.

All interested parties should complete registration form, available on the Texas 4-H Center website, <http://texas4h-ctr.tamu.edu/> or through NMFA's website, <http://nmfa.org/>. Additionally, youth are to complete the required release forms and bring them to the camp on Aug. 4.

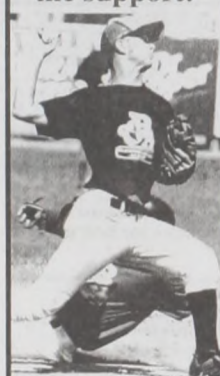
