in itself. I believe it was in '37 or '38, Dad broke down and bought a 10' cut Case combine. It was still one of the old style machines that looked like a thresher with

what we could. When the so-called bundles finally dried, we began threshing. It was a dirty job. The crops that were cut before the rains had good bundles that were set up in shocks, the butts had settled into the topsoil, and some of it clung to the straw. When these bundles were run through the thresher, one could see a cloud of dust high in the air, on a quiet day. The grit from the dirt wore the cylinder teeth so badly some were shaped like hooks, and the following summer we had to equip our thresher with a complete set of new cylinder teeth. Quite a job, in itself.

The summer of '35 was extremely wet and harvesting was a mess. We had a considerable amount of oats cut and bundled in "wads" as I had mentioned before, a field of barley that had turned black and was partially rotted, and acres and acres of oats we were never able to bundle or combine, spoiling in the fields. a cutter bar on one side, that delivered the crop into

helds. Well, the rains finally stopped sometime in late July, and we tried to save what we could.

It, too, was equipped with a spike toothed cylinder, and we had to be careful of spots of green Johnson grass, and raise the cutter bar quickly, so as to cut off little more than the heads of the wheat. My brother, Werner, drove the tractor that pulled the combine, and I ran the machine. It was a rather dry year and the wheat was easy to thresh. A 66 acre field on the home place was quickly finished, and we then moved to the north place. The wheat there was clean, very little grass, about 50 acres was soon finished. It did work wonderfully well, and Dad thought he had quite a machine, but a year or so later - I was no longer at home - he traded it off and bought a 6' Case, power take-off powered machine. Werner told me they operated it a couple of years. 

Pre-harvest Sprouting in Wheat Considering the current harvest stage in the Blacklands and Northeast Texas and the current moist weather patterns, there will likely be some pre-harvest sprouting (sprouting in the ead). Favorable weather conditions for pre-harvest sprouting are not uncommon in the Blacklands and Northeast Texas. Winter wheat has little to no seed-dormancy mechanism; therefore, only adequate moisture and temperature are required for the kernel germination to occur in the head. If the wheat is at a harvest ripe stage, then any extended we weather pattern can cause pre-harvest sprouting to occur. The extent of pre-harvest sprouting is

The extent of pre-harvest sprouting is dependent on the duration and severity of the moist conditions, the stage of ripening grain, and inherent dormancy level of the variety. Sprouting begins as the wheat kernel absorbs moisture and swells. Visual characteristics of sprouting include swelling of the kernel, discoloration of the germ, split seed coat, and emergence of the radicle (root) and coleoptile (shoot). Pre-harvest sprouting negatively affects grain quality (test weight), seed viability, seedling vigor, and milling qualities. Decreased test weight is caused by the conversion of starch to glucose (sugar) by the alpha-amylase enzyme. This starch to glucose conversion is one of the first indicators that sprouting the alpha-amylase enzyme. This starch to glucose conversion is one of the first indicators that sprouting has begun, despite minimal visual symptoms. More prolonged exposure to moisture allows the kernel germination to continue, resulting in the appearance of the root and shoot, which may give the upper canopy of fields a green appearance.

Extreme quality is demanded of wheat used by flourmills. Milling companies will not buy sprouted wheat, local elevators will be forced to buy this wheat as "feed grade" and it will be discounted significantly. Monday morning, Ronnie Felderhoff of Muenster Milling says he had inspected one field of soft wheat, which had between 29% and 37% of the kernels with noticeable sprouting. He had inspected some hard wheat also, which had no visible evidence of sprouting. However, milling companies use very sensitive devices to measure pre-harvest sprouting and are able to detect this visible to the eye.
