CC United Way raises \$316,193

It was indeed a day for celebration Friday, Nov. 5 as Cooke County United Way announced that the 2005 Campaign had exceeded its \$315,000 goal. The collected amount revealed was \$316,193. "Results You Can See" is the 2005 theme.

The organization is also celebrating its 50th anniversary. Muenster Division Leader and United Way Board Member John D. Bartush noted that what is now Cooke County United Way began in 1955 as the United Fund. Prior to 1955 it was the Community Chest. There were five people on the original 1955 board of directors. They were Frank Morris, Jr., Arley Daurity, J.M. Weinzapfel, Mrs. Peter Hyde, and Leroy Robinson. Descendants of those original board members were invited to take part in this year's celebration luncheon held at the Gainesville Civic Center. Muenster Mayor Henry Weinzapfel was there in honor of his father J.M. Weinzapfel.

Muenster's goal for 2005 was \$12,694. The Muenster division raised more than \$15,000. Bartush remarked, "What many people in

Jim Goldsworthy was the 2005 campaign chairman and president. He opened the celebration luncheon with a welcome. He also announced winners of the Pacesetter Awards. They are City of Gainesville, First

Mary Lou Leftwich announced recipients of the Arley Daurity Award as

County Analysis and Mitigation plans clarified

Since early spring, Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher has been working on a Hazard Analysis and Mitigation Plan for Cooke County. He's worked closely with representatives from the five communities in the County and the Cooke County Electric Co-op.

Fletcher had each community put together its community's hazard and mitigation concerns. These were presented to their community or city government to get some approval and to make it more official.

"The plan goes through and outlines what hazards we face, how often we face them, what the impact of them is, and kind of gives us an idea of where we need to focus our attention," explained Fletcher. "Most of that is going to come before the back half, where we find the specific community activities that they are going to do to try to improve the survivability of their communities, and to reduce the incidents of damage and

injury and the recovery cost for disasters in those areas."

The County approved the Plan. It will next be sent to the State for review and possible changes. Next it will be sent to FEMA for approval. Once approved by FEMA, it becomes the County's official plan.

Fletcher remarked, "The mitigation strategies that are in there for each community are ideas. Some are a little concerned that if they write this down, they've got to do it and that isn't necessarily the case. It's really a living document that as they go through next year, they may not have the money to do the one they thought they were going to do, so they move it to the end of the list. For whatever reason it may not be a priority any more and they can take it off the list and put a new one on. It's a living list." Strategy will be updated every year, said Fletcher.

Should there be a mass disaster anywhere in the County, having a Hazard Analysis and Mitigation Plan in place makes it much more likely that the County will be able to get financial assistance from FEMA.

"Without the plan it is questionable how much we will get back," said Fletcher. Cooke County Judge Bill

Freeman said to Fletcher, "You are on the cutting edge enough that we are going to be one of the few counties in the state that will have a mitigation plan in place so that if we do have a disaster we can go to FEMA. FEMA has pretty well said that, 'if you don't have a mitigation plan in place, don't come to us for money.' This was very important."

Barbara Roberson, Cooke County's representative on the Texoma Board of directors of MHMR, spoke to Commissioners Court on Jail Diversion. Legislation will soon change in a manner meant to keep mentally ill people out of jail and get them the assistance they need.

After spending six weeks looking at the situation, Roberson had the following recommendations: to have a jail diversion plan and to make jail diversion as accessible in Cooke County as possible, and to have at least one officer trained in crisis intervention. Officer being trained after January will have crisis intervention training. This training will also become available online to current officers.

Roberson remarked, "I do not agree with the statement that a person cannot benefit from help until he is willing to ask for

it. In that time a dependency can develop. I've seen many instances of intervention where a person's life was turned around because of a court ordered intervention. It is time we quit saying this isn't my giggle and address the issue forthright."

Roberson said she isn't happy about Gainesville getting a new jail because she feels that the mentally ill who can't afford food, clothing and shelter may be housed there. She dislikes that our police officers work for weeks or months to arrest criminals who are released on bond the next day.

"The procedure in place does not work," stressed Roberson. "Under normal circumstances, it takes five to six months to get mental health service. In that time many consumers will encounter the criminal justice system. The consumer and his family are definitely at risk under current practices."

Tony Maddox of MHMR was present. Speaking of the Jail Diversion he remarked, "We are moving along. I think it is going to be quite a rough road to travel with limited resources. The commitment is there."

said Marty Kobuck, director of the NCTC Jazz Band, "and we are really placing a heavy focus on building our scholarship resources in preparation for the opening of our new Performing Arts Center this spring.

"This wonderful new facility is going to enhance the scope and quality of our instructional programs in music tremendously, but building a quality program also involves attracting top students. Scholarships are absolutely essential to that effort."

Kobuck said that his student musicians are working hard to give concertgoers and donors something in return for their support - a great evening of entertaining music presented by the Monday Night and Tuesday Night Jazz Bands as well as

Judge Freeman and Precinct #3 Commissioner Jerry Lewis met last Thursday with the architects for the new Cooke County Justice Center and EMS facility. The news was better than anticipated, said the Judge. Escalating cost of steel and concrete are expected to cause an increase in the final cost of the new facility.

At Freeman's request, the architect re-studied the structural slab and the condition of the soil. "They're of the opinion that they can remove three to four feet of the existing soil, bring in some select fill, pack it and be able to come back with a slab on grade and peers, which is about a \$600,000 savings," said Judge Freeman. "It would still give us a guarantee of less than an inch of movement."

Judge Freeman said that he and Lewis had committed the commissioners to hauling the select fill with County trucks and employees. He asked if this would be a problem. The commissioners didn't voice any objection.

According to Judge

Freeman there were 62 prisoners being housed out of county on Friday. That is a cost of about \$40 per prisoner per day.

Commissioners approved the request of the family of Carl Walterscheid to adopt County Road 316 in his name. It is in Precinct #4.

In other business Commissioners Court:

- Approved EMS Director Bob Harbin to proceed with purchase of a new ambulance. The County's 1999 model is no longer reliable.
- Rescinded approval for Sicking Custom Digging to install a four-inch fresh water line in an eight-inch sleeve across CR 147, approximately 3/4 of a mile west of FM 678 in Precinct #1. This was due to a change in plans.
- Tabled decision on request to install a fresh water line across CR 147 at three different locations in Precinct #1.
- Approved final plat for Heaven's Ridge, lots 1-4, located off of FM 1201, located in Precinct #4.
- Took no action as a result of an Executive Session.

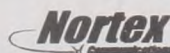
News of the Sick

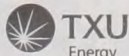

NCTC Planetarium to present "The Story of the Star" twice

One of the most enduring symbols of the Christmas season is the focus of a special program, "The Story of the Star," to be presented in the John Parker Planetarium on campus at North Central Texas College in December. Two shows, both open to the general public at no charge, are scheduled. They will be on consecutive Tuesdays, Nov. 30 and Dec. 7, beginning at 7 p.m. "Seating in the Planetarium is limited, so it will be necessary to make reservations," said Dr. Ron Bost, professor of chemistry who also teaches astronomy courses and is the facility director. "This has always been one of our most popular shows," Dr. Bost said. "In fact, it has become quite a tradition, and many viewers have seen the presentation numerous times over the years. It is a great way to get in to the spirit of the season."

A kindly grandfather who reminisces about the joy and beauty of the holidays, Dr. Bost explained, narrates the "Story of the Star." He explores a diversity of Christmas symbols, such as mistletoe, the Christmas tree and candles. "After exploring the winter night sky," he said, "the narrator introduces a re-telling of the Biblical Christmas story, in which the scenes appear as stained glass windows within a cathedral. Budding gardeners found at Muenster "Kindergarden"

Muenster Elementary Kindergarten students of Sharon Ledbetter and Danna Fredrick worked with their moms and teachers to do upkeep and fall planting in their "Kinder-GARDEN" on the north side of the elementary school. The project began last year when students worked with Muenster ISD's Agriculture Department to solve the problem of how to build and maintain a flowerbed. The steps of the project were recorded to be included in the *Keep Muenster Beautiful Program*.

Kindergarten students were asked to bring flowers to replace the ones that were dying out. Students discussed why certain flowers would come back each year and why others would not and then decided on what types of flowers would be included for the fall season. During the planting time, old flowers were pulled up and seeds were saved for planting again in the spring. Students took an active part in tilling up the soil, digging holes, and planting the new flowers they had brought. Moms, teachers from other classes, and even the principal, Ms. Heers, got in the action of getting a little

"dirt" under their nails and on their knees. Since it had rained the day before, it made the weed pulling easier and also a little more fun!

Students learned about plants that came from bulbs when digging up the old canna plants, as well as finding out that other plants can only come from seeds when planting their bluebonnets. Teachers outlined the lesson using the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) taught in each grade level.

The students are grateful to last year's Kindergarten students for starting the project, as well as Wal-Mart and its manager, Jack Steed, for donating a Burr Oak tree and \$500 toward the building of more flower gardens around the school. They are also anxiously waiting for their crepe myrtle, which has been donated by Stick and Angelika Lamar to be planted in November. Carol Klement, Amy Binder, Lisa McAden, and Lynne McGrew were the "Gardening Gurus" for this project.

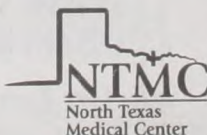
