#### Budding gardeners found at Muenster "Kindergarden"

Muenster Elementary Kindergarten students of Sharon Ledbetter and Danna Fredrick worked with their moms and teachers to do upkeep and fall planting in their "Kinder-GARDEN" on the north side of the elementary school. The project began last year when students worked with Muenster ISD's Agriculture Department to solve the problem of how to build and maintain a flowerbed. The steps of the project were recorded to be included in the Keep Muenster Beautiful Program.

Kindergarten students were asked to bring flowers to replace the ones that were dying out. Students discussed why certain flowers would come back each year and why others would be included for the fall season. During the planting time, old flowers were pulled up and seeds were saved for planting again in the spring. Students took an active part in tilling up the soil, digging holes, and planting the new flowers they had brought. Moms, teachers from other classes, and even the principal, Ms. Heers, got in the action of getting a little

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

#### TWDB schedules visits

The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) is the state agency charged with collecting and disseminating water-related data, assisting with regional planning and preparing the State Water Plan for the development of the state's water resources, and administering cost-effective financial programs for the construction of water supply, wastewater treatment, flood control and agricultural water conservation projects.

The TWDB's Groundwater Monitoring Section will be visiting Cooke, Montague, Wise, Denton, Parker, and Tarrant Counties to measure water levels from water wells completed in the aquifers within those counties. This information includes the occurrence, availability, quality, and quantity of groundwater present, and the current and projected demands on groundwater resources. This is done through the statewide groundwater level measurement program, groundwater quality sampling program, and groundwater studies. They will visit between Tuesday, Nov. 9, and Wednesday, Nov. 17.

"We're measuring water levels, we try to revisit wells we've measured in the past, but we are always losing wells so we do pick up wells," explained Janie Hopkins of the TWDB.

Hopkins said that people have to give them their permission to measure the depth to water in their wells. "We prefer to have them give us permission for visiting their wells annually without necessarily having

Many do this because they know they'll at least get notification," she added. "We leave a sticker on the well each year we visit with the date and the depth to water; without having to call in advance does help us measure more wells."

Fall Is a Great Time to Test Your Soil!

If your garden performed below expectations last year, or maybe things just didn't grow quite right, a few dollars invested in a soil test may be just the soil is the real key to successful gardening in most areas of Texas. The soil test report will tell you the level of nitrogen, phosphorus potassium, calcium, and magnesium available to your garden soil.
