Tax planning begins now for producers

As 2005 comes to a close, agricultural producers still have time to implement tax savings strategies before the end of the year.

"These strategies may include such things as deciding whether to accelerate or defer income, or deductions into 2006," said Dr. Jose Pena, Texas Cooperative Extension economist.

Pena offers these options to consider when making tax planning decisions:

Income simulation: By simulating accelerated income or deductions, individuals will be able to evaluate the impact of adjusted gross income and maximize itemized deductions.

For example, if you expect your adjusted gross income to be higher in 2005 than in 2006, or if you anticipate being in the same or a higher

tax bracket in 2005, you may benefit by deferring income into 2006," he said.

Cattle ranchers may elect to hold off selling inventory until 2006 to avoid increasing gross income for the year, Pena said.

Farmers or ranchers who need to make purchases before the end of the year could use these purchases to help advantageous so long as the deferral does not bump your income into the next tax bracket."

Deduction planning: If itemized deductions are relatively constant and close to the standard deduction amount, Pena said itemizing deductions each year will bring little or no benefit.

Bill to extend 2002 farm bill is introduced in House

The bill was introduced by Rep. Collin Peterson (D-Minn.) and co-sponsored by several Democratic members of the Agriculture Committee. It would automatically extend the farm bill for one year, through 2008. It would extend it for an additional year, through 2009, if the president does not submit by Jan. 15, 2008, legislation to implement a WTO agreement.

Thatcher said that is something that Farm Bureau would have to seriously consider if the trade negotiations aren't wrapped up by about the middle of next year. It is important for the farm bill and the WTO talks to move on "parallel tracks," Thatcher said, or else the United States will lose negotiating leverage.

"While this legislation isn't something we can support right now, I strongly suspect if we don't make progress in the WTO negotiations in the first part of 2006, there will be a lot of folks in the House and the Senate, Republicans

A group of House Agriculture Committee members has introduced a bill to extend the 2002 farm bill's expiration date from 2007 to 2008. The goal of the extension is to ensure that any changes to U.S. farm policy coincide with World Trade Organization negotiations to cut agricultural subsidies. Those trade talks were supposed to have cleared significant milestones by the end of this year but are behind schedule.

Still, the American Farm Bureau Federation says it's too early to write off a WTO agreement and extend the farm bill.

their tariffs and export subsidies to achieve that goal, explained Thatcher. If farm supports are cut before the WTO agriculture negotiations conclude, "we don't have as much to use as leverage," she explained.

In an interview earlier this year, Farm Bureau News asked Sen. Saxby Chambliss (R-Ga.), Senate Agriculture Committee chairman, what he thought about rumors that the 2002 farm bill might be extended. He said that he was committed to writing a new 2007 farm bill on time. However, that was before the WTO negotiations went down to the wire. There is not as yet a Senate companion bill that would extend the 2002 farm bill.
