Public probes for answers to Trans Texas Corridor

Before the event was half
over, more than 75 people
had come to see just what

Trans Texas Corridor (TTC35). The meeting, held
Tuesday, Nov. 9 in the
Gainesville Civic Center
was one of 44 public
information meetings
scheduled across Texas.
Texas Department of
Transportation (TxDOT) is
proposing to build a

about 800 miles from the
Texas-Oklahoma border to
Mexico and/or the Gulf
Coast.
It was the purpose of the

It was the purpose of the meeting to provide residents the opportunity to learn more about TTC-35 and the environmental study, ask questions and provide input to project planners, and TxDOT, review preliminary corridor alternatives, and to register comments.

Comments are being accepted verbally or in writing. To be included in the official record of the public meeting process, comments must be received by Friday, Dec. 3, 2004. These meetings are part of the Tier One Process of the project plan.

TTC-35 is one of four high priority elements of the proposed Trans-Texas Corridor system. Information provided by TxDOT stated, "As currently envisioned, TTC-35 would extend from the Texas/Oklahoma border, north of the Dallas/Fort Worth metropolitan area, south through central Texas, to the Texas/Mexico international border and/or the Texas Gulf Coast. It would be up to 1,200 feet wide and would include separate lanes for passenger

vehicles (three lanes in each direction) and trucks (two lanes in each direction). It would also include a total of six rail lines (one line in each direction for high speed rail, commuter rail, and freight rail) and a 200 flow with the purpose of the proposed TTC-35 is faster and safer transportation of people and commodities; relief for congested roadways; an alternative route for the transport of hazardous materials; and the creation of new job markets and new jobs that would support economic growth and development.

Transfers and honors highlight MISD School Board agenda

Representatives from
Sivells Bend ISD addressed
the Muenster ISD Board of
Trustees last Wednesday
night regarding the
consideration of a district to
district transfer agreement.
That, along with revisions
to the junior high/high
school honor roll program
headlined the meeting.
Rodney Howell spoke on
behalf of Sivells Bend ISD
regarding an agreement for

regarding an agreement for Muenster ISD to take all of their students as transfers after 8th grade. Bill McCourry and Edward Johnson also spoke in favor of the transfer agreement. "We're not here to gripe. We are very pleased," noted one representative, who thanked the Board for the education their children received at Muenster. "As parents and students, we consider Muenster as our home town." Sivells Bend has a student count of 63, six in the 8th grade. They presently have 13 enrolled in Muenster, averaging 15 to 20 total in the District, some choosing to go to Gainesville. "We need to know where our kids are going to go to high school. We're a little different from other transfers. Others have a district high school to go back to if there are discipline problems. It would be helpful if we have a written agreement. There's too much uncertainty right now."

Sivells Bend had three transfers refused with either discipline or attendance problems, that had to find another high school to attend. "We will take this into consideration, put it on the next agenda, get some answers to the questions on a written agreement." Board President Jim Endres concluded.

the junior high/high school honor roll program. After conducting a survey of area schools, reviewing honor roll records for the last four years, and taking a survey of the teaching staff, Mr. Newton recommended the following changes to honor roll requirements in grades 7-12:

* Continue to publish the "honor roll" in the newspaper.

* Count all classes for "honor roll" except PE and Athletics.

* Count only major disciplinary consequences such as placement in ISS or DAEP, suspension, or assignment to Saturday School as reasons to exclude a student from the honor roll.

* Continue the practice of adjusting grade points at the end of the year for AP classes rather than adding a certain number of points to a student's grade each six weeks.

* Begin the changes the third six weeks of 2004-05.

During the discussion Newton noted that 17 students were left off the second six weeks honor roll because of a "U" or "N" teacher discipline. "I believe you are taking control away from the teachers," said Board member, Leon Klement.

"U and Ns are subjective calls in the classroom," Superintendent Clyde Steelman said. "If this was a disciplinary honor roll, it would be different."

"The teachers agree," said Newton, who noted that the question about the honor roll started with a base-site committee and their concern about the low amount of students listed on the honor roll. "If an 'A' student has one bad thing, they are off the honor roll," Newton added.

• Technology: Over 70 obsolete computer systems were disposed of last month. There are still approximately 75 out-of-date and inoperable classroom machines that need to be removed and disposed of Muenster ISD is in the process of receiving price quotes for 60 new computer systems for placement in individual classrooms.

Muenster ISD is currently in contact with two companies on their telephone, intercom, and network renovation project.

• FIRST: The 2002-03 District status from the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) gave Muenster ISD a rating of Superior Achievement, with all 21 indicators answered yes.

A letter with a list of delinquent taxes that will be deleted from the Muenster ISD tax roll was received from the Cooke County Appraisal District. Nineteen accounts for a total of \$4,636.40 will be removed on Dec. 1.

Jim Robertson, attorney at law, reported that \$9,631.90 in delinquent taxes were paid to Muenster

ISD in October, including \$1,997.44 from IMAC and \$6,201.31 from Worldcom Network.

The District's investment update included that 78% of its investments are in CDs, 9% in pool, and 13% in checking.

The Board approved the Texas Education Agency Application for First Day of Instruction Waiver, to begin school before Aug. 21. The District must publish anotice in the newspaper and hold a public meeting. Muenster would like to begin the 2005-06 school year on Aug. 10, 2005.

The adoption of a policy to account for the revenues and expenses of such booster clubs and support organizations that do not generate sufficient revenues and expenses to justify the cost of establishing a separate nonprofit 501, to be incorporated in the District's campus activity fund was discussed. 

It is once again that time of year when hunters are "heading to the woods." For more than a decade now, Texas hunters have combined their skill, love of the outdoors, and their generosity to help Hunters for the Hungry (HFTH) feed hundreds of hungry Texans.

Here's something else a lot of Texans probably don't know. Texas currently ranks second out of 50

states in the highest percentage of hungry families.

Worse yet, an estimated 1.1 million, or 32%, of all children in Texas are hungry or at risk of hunger, despite various hunger relief efforts.

During the past hunting season, Texas hunters, meat processors, and other bighearted program supporters joined forces to donate almost 127,000 pounds of wild game (almost 508,000 servings) to help families struggling to make ends meet. Due to the generosity of hunters and participating meat processors in the Muenster area, food banks and other food assistance providers in the community received more than 2,300 pounds of meat this past year to share with those in need.

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How big is big for you?

another hunter. A lot of
hunters look for a good
mature buck and are
satisfied with a 15 inch 8
point buck. Others pursue a
buck with a 20 inch spread
and 10 points. Still others
pursue a Boone & Crockett
buck scoring 170 points or
more. Whatever the size you
go for, there will always be a
bigger one that someone
has.

Have you ever really considered "How big is big for you?" If you are hunting on 40 acres surrounded by other 40 acre tracts, then a big buck for you will be an 8 point buck. If you are hunting on 640 acres with discriminating hunters, then you might hold out for a big 8 or even a 10 point buck. If you are hunting on 1800 acres under high fence, then you might be looking for a 20 inch buck.

The question of how big is big enough can sometimes be answered by the question "How much are you willing to spend?" You might say "I would love to get a giant buck. But I sure won't spend \$3,500 to do it! My wife would kill me!"

The solution to the above might be to decide how much you can afford to spend. After that, you can strive to do the best that you can at that level. The average cost for a buck in Texas is \$1,000. This can get you a 16 inch 8 point buck on the average if you hunt hard. If your budget is \$1,800, then you can get on

a ranch where you can get an 18 inch 10 point. If you spend \$2,500, then you might get a 20 incher. We have all read about Boone & Crockett bucks going for between \$8,000 and \$20,000. Don't get mad at me. I am just telling you what I believe. These figures are guesswork based on being a guide for 30 years. Of course there are exceptions to the preceding.

There are a lot of super trophy ranches offering management 8 point bucks

at \$1,000 or less. There are more and more of these available all the time.

OK. Back to our question. How big is big for you? Do you have a good place to hunt this year? If you don't, then give me a call. My number is 1-830-234-4120. I can locate a good hunt for you at a reasonable price. A problem defined is a problem that is one half solved! Set your sights on a hunt that you can afford and take your trophy buck!



Game Warden Field Notes

A Grayson County Game Warden cited a Denison man for killing a timber rattlesnake after the man had his picture with the snake put in the local newspaper. The suspect was quoted in the paper as

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

Mandatory Price Reporting was delayed in the Senate, and although it eventually passed the Senate, it was too late to see action in the House before adjournment.

"We're very disappointed that Mandatory Price Reporting was not reauthorized before its sunset date of Oct. 22," says Bryan Dierlam, director of legislative affairs for the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. "But there is little opposition to reauthorization, and we're confident it will pass when the House reconvenes in November."

USDA sent a letter to packers on Oct. 15, asking them to voluntarily continue reporting prices they pay for livestock until the law can be reinstated.

"Disrupting the flow of information currently collected under the livestock mandatory price reporting program could seriously curtail the volume, price, and other extensive data on marketing transactions that are currently published," the letter said.

"Market information that is used by producers, packers, and customers to gauge market conditions and make informed purchase and sales decisions would not be representative of actual transactions or not available at all. This loss of information would likely lead to added uncertainty in

Exemptions approved for soybean rust in U.S.

While soybean rust has been confirmed in Louisiana, the TDA has already secured exemptions for products to control the disease. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency approved six products under Section 18 quarantine exemption in July. They expire March 1, 2007.

Soybean rust is caused by two fungal species, Phakopsora pachyrhizi and Phakopsora meibomiae, and is spread primarily by windborne spores that can travel long distances. For more information, visit the U.S. Department of Agriculture's soybean rust page, www.aphis.usda.gov/lpa/ass

France goat has been diagnosed with BSE

Although scientists have long known there was a possibility the disease could affect goats, this is the first known case of BSE jumping species. The goat came to the attention of veterinary experts two years ago. Its brains were injected into mice, which went on to contract BSE. The results are being validated by the Veterinary Laboratory Agency in England, but government scientific experts believe the tests will confirm the goat had a

version of BSE. They say the goat may have contracted the disease by eating bovine meat and bonemeal, a practice that was banned in Britain in 1996 but not in the rest of the EU until 2001. Tests on 300 goats in the same herd were negative.

Since 1995, the average expense rate for U.S. production inputs (seed, chemicals, fuel, fertilizer) has increased by 2.1% yearly.



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
