Members of the Muenster
Volunteer Fire Department
spent a good part of their July
4th weekend responding to
various accidents and fires. At
times they hadn't wrapped up
one call before another came
in and some left one scene to
respond to another call.
The first call came on
Saturday when they were
called in as first responders
to a motor vehicle accident on
Hwy. 82 west of Muenster. It
involved an SUV and a truck.
There were two people in the
SUV and both had to be
extracted with special
equipment. CareFlite took
them to a Metroplex hospital.
Sixteen firemen worked the
accident scene for about an
hour and an half. Just as they
were completing their duties
there, another call came in.
A grass fire was reported on
CR 417, which is northeast of
Muenster. An estimated 10
acres were burned. Muenster
Fire Chief Herbie Knabe
reported that the fire started
in some hay that had fallen
along the roadside and had
been there for a few days. He
said that it's suspected that
this fire was set deliberately.

#### Man drowns in pond north of town

Man drowns in pond north of town

Jaime Olvera Alva, a 25-year old Hispanic man, drowned in a pond near 1203 CR 442 north of Muenster on Sunday, July 3. He was fishing with his brother-in-law, Luis Jasso of 13622 FM 1630 Muenster, when the disaster occurred. Alva had only been in the U.S. a short time. The pond was on property owned by Ron Trubenbach.

Jim Carter of the Cooke County Sheriff's Department said that there was nothing suspicious about the death. The two Hispanic men were fishing and decided to walk across a peninsula on the pond. It had a lot of debris and they got caught up in it. The one got to shore, but the other was still under water and his brother-in-law was unable to rescue him. The surviving fisherman ran to their vehicle and went to a home nearby to get help.

Cooke County District Attorney Cindy Stormer learned of the situation and being fluent in Spanish, she came to interpret for the rescuers. Stormer's residence is in the neighborhood of the drowning incident.

According to Muenster Fire Chief Herbie Knabe, the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department was called in as first responders at 11:53 a.m. They arrived at the scene at 12:05 p.m. and immediately began rescue efforts. They fashioned hooks out all sorts of items in an effort to find the victim. The Muenster Vpl is not presently equipped to drag bodies of water for drowning victims.

Knabe said that from what he understood, the man who drowned could not swim, but the one who survived could swim. "It appeared that they were using a throw net when it was tangled on debris in the water." Knabe said "Thinking the water was shallow, they both went in to retrieve the net not knowing the depth. They were soon into water over their heads (10-12 feet)."

The recovery effort took about an hour. Alva's body was found at 1:05 p.m. Game Warden Jim Lundberg arrived at the scene after the body was found. He was an hour and a half's drive away when he got the report and headed to Muenster with boats and equipment that could be use

#### CareFlite transports two from accident

Traffic was backed up for over a mile in the westbound lane of Hwy. 82 Saturday, July 2 as a result of a two-vehicle accident. The accident occurred about 2:11 p.m. near CR 351 (milepost 494), which is 2.1 miles west of Muenster.

Involved was a 2003 green Ford Explorer (SUV) driven by Quentin Luther Brown, Jr., age 44, of Clover, South Carolina, and a 1963 blue Ford flatbed truck driven by Jack Dangelmayr, age 48, of Muenster. Brown's wife Donna, age 41, was a front seat passenger, as was Dangelmayr's brother James. Dangelmayrs were hauling a load of sand.

According to a witness report given to Cpl. Mike Linnell of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the truck had traveled onto U.S. Hwy. 82 westbound from a crossover and was traveling in the outside (right) lane at about 40 mph trying to gain speed going down a grade. The Ford Explorer was traveling west at about 70 mph approaching the truck's rear. Brown swerved left to avoid a collision, but his vehicle's right front collided with the back left of the truck. According to Cpl Linnell, the SUV's passenger side took the brunt of the impact. Neither airbag was deployed.

After impact, the SUV spun 180 degrees onto the center median and came to rest facing southeast. The truck came to rest on the westbound grass shoulder facing west. The Browns were trapped in the SUV. Both Dangelmayrs were uninjured.

Muenster Volunteer Fire Department acted as first responders to the accident. Muenster Fire Chief Herbie Knabe reported that there were 16 firemen at the scene. The couple in the SUV had to be extracted. Linnell said that the Muenster firemen and Cooke County EMS worked to cut the posts of the vehicle to get them out safely.

"The Muenster guys and EMS did an outstanding job keeping them stable while working with the tools and fighting off the heat," commended Cpl. Linnell. "They kept them stable and got them out and on CareFlite." He noted that the firemen's clothing is heavy and it was a hot afterno

# Crime addressed at County budget hearings You can have a 1000 bed jail facility and a police officer behind every tree, but until you expend some resources to allow the District Attorney's office to do our job appropriately, to get those criminals to Huntsville where they belong, we'll still be in the same situation." Sheriff Compton's budget presentation confirmed the statistics that District Attorney Stormer presented. He further presented statistics showing that Cooke County leads other counties of comparable size in the area of drug offenses (286 in Cooke to a 162 average in other counties); weapons violations (50 in Cooke County to a 16 average in other counties); driving while intoxicated offenses (326 in Cooke to a 251 average in other counties); and offenses involving drunkenness (648 in Cooke County to 295 in other counties). Compton stated "The District Attorney's Office is doing an excellent job in getting these criminals to Huntsville." The statistics that Compton stated "The Statistics that Compton presented further showed that Cooke spent \$2,183,402 in road maintenance, while counties of comparable sizes spent an average of \$1,003,169 on road maintenance. Counties of comparable size have an average of two narcotics officers in their county, while Cooke County has none working for the Sheriff's Office. Spectator Sharon McCormick addressed the Commissioner's Court after Sheriff Compton's presentation and requested that the Court give strong consideration to the requests being made in the area of law enforcement, especially in light of the very serious drup problem in Cooke County and the resulting burglaries, and concluded saying, "Roads are nothing if we are dead." 

When my dad was in the business of selling and delivering Texoma Oil products, gasoline was shipped to Muenster in a railroad tank car. It was up to the agent to get it in his storage tanks.

Dad had one of the old style pumps that was activated by a push and pull wooden handle about five feet long. He would hire two men to transfer the products into his storage tanks. They usually spent a day pumping off a car, taking turns on the pump.

When Dad took an order, he would back his old Model-T truck to the loading dock, and the gasoline and kerosene was run into ten gallon cans that he had to haul to the farms, etc., and carry to the customer's storage usually 55 gallon barrels.

This was hard work when compared to more modern methods. Now-adays the fuel is delivered to the agent's storage by truck.

When these guys get an order, the fuel is pumped or run into a tank truck, which then pumps it into the customer's storage, while the driver and the customer have a little chat.

Too, the trucks now are air-conditioned and heated. The driver can listen to a radio in comfort, with the windows closed—less noise and wind. Well, that's progress.

Hay is now put up in large round bales, that can be stored outside, untouched by human hands — now that's really progress.

# **Changes in deer regulations** could affect hunting plans

Although the season is still months away, many Texas hunters are starting to make deer hunting plans. Changes to hunting regulations this year could affect those preparations, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

State wildlife biologists have been working to simplify and restructure regulations governing deer seasons to manage resources more effectively and to enhance hunter opportunity without adversely impacting deer populations. Following is an overview of those changes and the counties affected. For additional information, hunters are urged to review regulations in TPWD's Outdoor Annual available in August.

Elimination of

available in August.

Elimination of Aggregate Bag Limits—
The Department in 1989 implemented what is popularly referred to as the 'aggregate bag limit' rule, which designated a number of one-buck counties, primarily in the eastern third of the state, from which, in the aggregate a hunter could take no more than one buck. For example, if a hunter took a buck in Nacogdoches County (one-buck bag limit), that hunter could not take another buck in any other county affected by the aggregate bag limit rule.

At the time, the Department's intent was to prevent the over harvest of buck deer in regions of the state where populations were low or hunting pressure was high with respect to abundance. In 1999, to increase hunter opportunity, the Department separated the aggregate one-buck counties into two zones divided by Interstate Highway 35, allowing a hunter to harvest a buck from each zone. Harvest and population data from counties on either side of the I-35 dividing line, counties that by their proximity to each other were the likeliest to incur greater buck harvest, indicates no significant deviation from historical trends over the period from 1999 to the present.

The Department is therefore eliminating the aggregate bag limit, meaning that a hunter could take the statewide personal bag limit of three bucks by taking one buck in each of three one-buck counties. A similar provision applied to counties with a two-buck bag limit (i.e., a hunter could take one buck in two, two-buck county). The Department's concern in this case was that hunters would focus on taking a third buck, which could lead to an unwanted decline in doe harvest. Analysis of harvest data indicates that this concern may not be as pressing as originally thought; therefore, the aggregate two-buck agglimit is being eliminated as well. Department data indicate that prior to 2002, 80% of the buck harvest in these counties was comprised of bucks younger than 3.5 years of age.

TFB urges Perry to consider **Property Rights Amendment** 

The state's largest farm organization is calling for an amendment to the Texas constitution that would clearly define "public use," as it pertains to the taking of private property.

A recent decision handed down by the U.S. Supreme Court hammering private property rights spurred Texas Farm Bureau to action on behalf of Texas landowners. In a June 29 letter to Texas Governor Rick Perry, Texas Farm Bureau President Kenneth Dierschke requested that Perry add the proposed amendment to the agenda during the first-called special session of the 79th Texas Legislature.

"Private property rights were dealt a devastating blow by the United States Supreme Court on June 23rd," the letter said. The court ruled that eminent domain used for private business development is a legal use of condemnation authority.

"The Texas Farm Bureau completely disagrees with the court's opinion. Under their definition of public use, land can now be condemned any time a governmental entity can show that a positive economic benefit will result from the condemnation. We believe this is a gross misinterpretation of the intent of our founding fathers.

"The entire purpose of allowing eminent domain for only a 'public use,' was to place limitations on this power. The decision of the U.S. Supreme Court on Kelo v. New London has now removed any meaningful limit on this awesome property."

The agenda of the special session is under the sole control of the Governor. Only items placed on the call of the special session by the Governor of Texas can be considered by the Legislature.

Dierschke said that the constitutional amendment should be on the Nov. 8, 2005 general election ballot.

Dr. Jason Cleere, Texas
Cooperative Extension beef cattle specialist, is telling producers a lifetime number assigned to the tag will help trace an animal's path throughout the supply chain. "It's like a Social Security number for that cow," he explains. In the event of a foreign animal disease, it will make tracking the animal's movement easier and could be accomplished as quickly as 48 hours.

A small, read-only tag, which has copper wire and a computer chip bound inside, will help accomplish this task. The tag will feature a visual set of numbers on the outside and will also be encoded with the same numbers to be read electronically. Ranchers will not need to worry about purchasing additional equipment to read the tags. Those with just a few head can accomplish record keeping by writing the number on a transfer paper. The National Animal ID program was officially announced in January 2003 and it was in response to the Homeland Security Act. Another aspect of the program involves premises ID. Though currently voluntary, agriculture officials are encouraging producers to register for premises identification numbers through the Texas Animal Health Commission. This "premises ID number" is a unique number will help trace an animal back to itts origin, and will allow producers in the future to purchase electronic ear tags for their cattle as part of the national identification system


