Muenster citizens subscribed almost 20 per cent more than their quota in the current drive for United Service Organization funds. Chaircoming in. Muenster's quota had been set at \$175.

Starting a little over two weeks ago, Mrs. G. H. Hellman and Mrs. J. D. Cook, solicitors, met with wholehearted response from local people. Business houses as well as individuals subscribed generously, sending the fund "over the top". Chairman Weinzapfel pointed out that a "blitzkrieg" drive could have reached the goal in an hour, but he thought it best to give every individual an opportunity to help in this worthy cause.

Muenster's contribution sent the county's fund well above the halfway mark, the June 1 goal, according to tabulations made Monday by C. H. Leonard, County Chairman. The state director of the financial campaign had requested that half the county's quota or approximately \$1250 be raised by June 1 and Monday's total, \$1,417, was little more than a thousand dollars short of the county's full quota. The county chairman is hopeful of meeting the quota in full well in advance of the deadline, Saturday, July 4.

One hundred and seventy-five ersons were vaccinated against typhoid fever last week when annual clinic day was held at the Muenster Clinic. The serum was made available through the co-operation of the State Health Board. Dallas Fair Called Off For the Duration

DALLAS, TEXAS, June 3 .-There will be no 1942 State Fair of Texas.

Decision to forego the annual exposition, known as "The world's argest and most beautiful State Fair", was reached by the Board of Directors after Harry L. Seay, President of the institution, made a report of the survey of conditions brought about by the national mergency.

Lack of transportation for both exhibits and patrons decided the ssue. Tire shortage, possible gasline rationing and a scarcity of shipping facilities influenced the lecision. Many of the leading fairs of both the United States and Canada have been called off for the duration.

Grounds and buildings of the \$15,000,000 plant of the State Fair of Texas have been terdered the United States government for whatever use it may see fit to make of them, Mr. Seay said.
