

New treatment for congestive heart failure approved

Congestive heart failure is the commonest cause of hospitalization in patients over age 65 according to Medicare data. Two Lindsay students placed in Mathematics: Malcom Martin was 3rd and Michael Eckart was 6th.







So Representative Anna Mowery (R-Fort Worth) and Senator Tommy Williams (R-The Woodlands) teamed with NRA-ILA, Texas State Rifle Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Wildlife Association, and the Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association to draft legislation addressing the sportsmen's access issue in a manner that would truly

legislation addressing the sportsmen's access issue in a manner that would truly have a positive impact in the Lone Star State.

The result of these efforts was Senate Bill 734, which the Legislature gave final approval to this week and sent to Governor Rick Perry (R). When a municipality annexes nearby land, SB 734 would allow hunting with certain firearms to (R). When a municipality annexes nearby land, SB 734 would allow hunting with certain firearms to continue on minimum-sized property tracts (10 acres or more for shotgun; 50 acres or more for rifle and pistol) even if the municipality has an ordinance banning the discharge of firearms. The bill also added "wildlife management" to the list of activities, which would be grandfathered under Texas' "Right To Farm" Act when annexation occurs.

As Texas cities grow, opportunities for hunting or sport shooting diminish. Most municipalities have ordinances banning the discharge of firearms, with no exception for lawful hunting or safe recreational shooting. Existing state laws offer little protection to property owners who are annexed by a city, but who wish to continue hunting on their own land or leasing it out to sportsmen before

development occurs around them. SB 734 changes all that, and can serve as a model for other states that wish to address urban sprawl and its negative impact on hunting and sport shooting.

Senate Committee Approves Changes to Concealed Handgun License Laws Benefiting Military Personnel

This week, the Senate Veterans Affairs & Military Installations Committee reported on HB 322 by Representative Suzanna Hupp (R-Lampasas) and Senator Craig Estes (R-Wichita Falls) and HB 685 by Representative Patrick Rose (D-Dripping Springs) and Senator Letica Van de Putte (D-San Antonio). HB 322 lowers the minimum age requirement for a Concealed Handgun License (CHL) to 18 and reduces CHL application fees by 50% for active military personnel. The bill was amended in committee to delete its application to veterans, because of the significant fiscal impact it would have had on the state's coffers in a tight budget year. HB 685 deletes the range instruction portion of the CHL course for military personnel with recent handgun training.

Pecan Nut Casebearer
Dr. Allan Knutson,
Extension Entomologist,
says the pecan nut
casebearer is the most
common and damaging
insect pest of the pecan. The
small, dark-colored
caterpillar tunnels into the
pecan fruit just after
pollination in the spring,
destroying the nutlet and
others in the cluster. Larvae
leave a mass of black waste
webbed together on the
small nut. Tunneled nuts
shrivel and fall from the
tree. Because casebearer
larvae feed directly on the
pecan nut, their damage
directly reduces the number
of pecans at harvest.

Pecan nut casebearer is
most damaging in May and
early June in north Texas,
although a subsequent
generation in mid-summer
can sometimes be a
problem. In most years and
in most commercial
orchards, pecan nut
casebearer numbers are
sufficient to justify an
insecticide treatment.

of eggs is necessary to determine if treatment is needed. Some nut loss due to feeding by pecan nut casebearer may even be beneficial as thinning the fruit load on some varieties can result in better quality nuts at harvest.

A single, well timed application of a foliarapplied insecticide is usually effective for casebearer control. The optimum time for applying an insecticide for pecan nut casebearer is usually midto late May in north Texas. Based on date of trap captures this year, the anticipated optimum spray date for north Texas is about May 18-22. This is a few days later than normal and probably reflects the cooler weather in early May.

As the optimum time to treat can vary by location, pecan growers should inspect their orchards for pecan nut casebearer eggs to determine the optimum time to treat in their specific orchard. Pecan growers must also decide if an insecticide application is economical based upon the number of casebearer eggs present and the crop potential

For homeowners with one or more large trees, spraying for casebearer may be more trouble and cost than the savings in pecans. Letting nature provide what pecans she will harvest, and making up the difference by buying pecans in the fall can often be a better solution. In addition to the need for powerful sprayers and expense, spraying large trees can risk the threat of drift of insecticide onto nearby gardens, landscapes, and neighbor's property. Also, use of broad spectrum insecticides such as malathion and carbaryl can kill beneficial insects, leading to outbreaks of aphids and other pests.

Some new products, with the active ingredient, spinosad, are labeled for pecans. This ingredient is effective against pecan nut casebearer and is less toxic to many important beneficial insects than are

many other insecticides. In fact, spinosad is derived from a naturally occurring fact, spinosad is derived from a naturally occurring soil micro-organism. One product with spinosad is even approved for organic production by the USDA National Organic Standards Board. Because there is less risk to beneficial insects, spinosad is a good choice for use by homeowners for controlling pecan nut casebearer.

Mowing Your Lawn
Lawn know that

Did you know that improper mowing habits can place significant amounts of stress on your lawn? Do you know the optimum height and frequency that you need to be mowing for your specific turigrass variety?

Mowing is a very important part of proper lawn maintenance and plays a huge role in the overall quality of your turigrass. If your mowing height is lower than the optimum range for your variety, undue stress will occur which may cause a steady decline of your lawn. As a result, pests (i.e. weeds, diseases, insects) may invade your site. The same goes for your frequency of mowing. If you are leaving "windrows" of grass clippings when you mow, you are probably mowing too infrequently. A good rule of thumb is to never take off more than 1/3 of the leaf blade each time you mow. So, do your homework and find out what mowing height is appropriate for your lawn grass and always remember to keep your mower blades sharpened. You and your lawn will be pleased with the results!
