## Muenster Lake ready to receive water

As members of the Muenster Water Board arrived at City Hall for their June 6 meeting, each was handed a souvenir: a core sample of the concrete drilled from the new dam to install the final three gates. Those gates have been installed, and the dam is now completed. The main item on the meeting's agenda was to sign a release of Tri-Dal Construction from further obligation under contract for construction of the dam for MP-19—the Muenster Lake Project. Tri-Dal completed the work ahead of schedule. The dam has passed inspection by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and is ready to collect water to fill the lake. Unfortunately, the gates were not delivered in time for installation before the rain event that preceded this year's Germanfest. That rain produced 20 feet of water at the main tower, and the level

would have been higher had water not been able to flow through the openings for the uninstalled gates. The water that was collected had to be released so that the soil could dry sufficiently to support the crane and man lift for gate installation, and to allow retrieval of the brush guards so that they could be installed in front of the gates.

The new dam did, however, save Germanfest from flooding. Water Board president Bob Bauer said there is no doubt that, without the dam, the park would have flooded as it has in the past when we've had that kind of down-pour. Margie Starke, of the Chamber of Commerce, agreed. She pointed out that the park had flooded once before after only about four inches of rain a few miles upstream, with none at all in Muenster itself, and the rain before Germanfest was more than six inches.

The next step in the lake

project is to achieve compliance with requirements for planting grasses and other plants specified by the government to keep the ecology of the area in tune with the natural habitat and to limit erosion in the areas that were disturbed by construction of the lake. The next step after that will be to provide an entrance and exit at East Picnic Ground Road for maintenance of the dam, fence, and property. The entrance will also provide access to the future water-treatment plant.

In the government's name for the project, "MP-19," the "MP" stands for "multiple purpose." The project was funded for three purposes: water supply, water retention to prevent flooding, and recreation. Once the Picnic Ground Road entrance is in place, the next step will be to address the park, picnic, and fishing areas on the west side of Picnic Ground Road (CR 316).

## City Council meets in regular June session

Inspections, water, energy, CERT, brakes, and a Cub Cadet were main topics of discussion at Monday's City Council meeting. Mayor Henry Weinzapfel welcomed all present, especially new councilman Bobby Dale Walterscheid.

Old business acted on included allowing Chris Yosten to do very basic fire marshal inspection duties. In compliance with retail food health inspections, Clint Marable asked the City for support in enforcing food safety rules in places where he had pointed out problem areas that weren't being fixed. "It's up to the individual stores to do what he requires," noted City Manager Stan Endres, who stated that each food business gets inspected yearly, and if they fail, they have 10 days to make corrections. If the business fails to comply, permits can be removed.

Marable noted that if the fees for the extra inspection were higher, maybe that would get their attention. At present, the first inspection cost is \$100 and is paid by the City from the \$250 annual license fee. The City also pays for the 2nd inspection, with the 3rd if needed, charged to the retailer. There is no 2nd inspection unless they score below 70.

"Once they fix things that have been wrong the past five or six years and never fixed, we shouldn't have any problems," Endres added. "We now have some (businesses) that are failing."

The Council agreed that

the retailer will be charged \$50 for the 2nd inspection, and \$100 for the 3rd. An amended ordinance will be voted on at the next meeting.

Mayor Weinzapfel reminded the Council of the policy approved last month to have a flat fee of \$100 for bulk water purchases, plus four times the regular fee. "Water is valuable. I feel we should limit (selling bulk) as much as possible," noted the City manager. "The raised fee should help. We don't get that many requests."

New business opened with Rick Hanning presenting a TXU Delivery agreement. The agreement extends the previous settlement to July 1, 2008. The City's franchise fee factor will increase, giving Muenster four payments of \$4,514.88. Also the City will receive two payments of \$2,925.21 to benefit the public with the money staying in the City, used as the City wishes.

Ray Fletcher, Cooke County emergency management coordinator, introduced David Gehr, volunteer coordinator of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). Gehr informed the Council that CERT prepares individuals in planning, survival skills, and mutual aid within neighborhoods and work sites during natural disasters and man-made events to assist in coping with the aftermath of a disaster.

"These are just folks trained in first aid, search and rescue, traffic control, running errands, or setting up shelters," Gehr commented. "We're not taking away from our first responders, but want to be available

throughout the County to assist in a major disaster."

People who go through CERT training will have a better understanding of the potential threats to their community and can take the right steps to lessen the effects of these hazards. CERT is funded by Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

In other business, the Council:

- Approved changing meeting dates to July 10 and Sept. 11.

- Kept the following commission appointments - Jewel Otto, park (library, museum); John Pagel, streets; Jack Flusche, sewer and sanitation; and Joey Anderson, water. Bob Walterscheid took over as police and fire commissioner.

- Approved Ordinance No. 291 to prohibit truck use of motor brakes within the City limits.

- Approved Ordinance No. 292 denying Atmos Energy Corp., Mid-Tex division's statement of intent to increase gas utility rates.

- Approved purchase of a 2003 Cub Cadet Big Country utility vehicle for \$5,000. "It would pay for itself," noted Endres. "It's cheaper than using the pickup and will cut down to one man." The Cub will be used mainly for reading water meters, light hauling, and spraying.

The City manager reported on City projects and problems, including:

- Water well #7, damaged by lightning, was pulled and fixed.

- Air conditioners at the li-

Tickets for the event are \$15 in advance and \$20 at the gate. They are currently available in Muenster at Ace Hardware and the Chamber of Commerce, or can be ordered by phone with either a Visa or MasterCard by calling (940) 759-2227. Gates open at 6 p.m. and the concert kicks off at 6:30 p.m.

The proceeds from the concert are earmarked for a basketball court to be built in the City Park. Local youth basketball leagues have started a fund for that purpose.

Those attending the concert are welcome to bring in their own lawn chairs. Coolers are not allowed.

## New study examines dropout challenge in Cooke County

As newspapers across the state publish graduation stories and showcase local students who are off to college, often overlooked are the Texas teens who have dropped out before earning their diplomas. A Texas KIDS COUNT special report, 'The High Cost of Dropping Out: How Many? How Come? How Much?', released today by the Center for Public Policy Priorities, examines this issue.

"The economic and societal effects of Texas dropouts to the state are too great to be ignored," said Frances Deviney, Texas KIDS COUNT Director. "Texas owes it to its children and its economy to address its dropout challenge."

**Texas Dropout Rate Too High**  
While the dropout rate has decreased since 1996, Texas still ranks among the 15 worst states in the country for kids leaving school without a high school diploma, regardless of how the dropout rate is measured.

In Cooke County, six teens in the class of 2004 (or 1.5%) dropped out before graduating, ranking Cooke County 55 out of 173 counties with dropout data from the Texas Education Agency.

**It Would Have Cost an Additional \$1.7 Billion to Educate the Entire Class of 2004**

Statewide, if every 9th grader in Fall 2000 graduated from the Texas public school system in Spring 2004, it would have cost Texas an additional \$1.7 billion over four years, just for the Class of 2004. (Texas spent about \$8.6 billion on the students in the Class of 2004 who stayed in the system from 9th to 12th grades.)

F. Scott McCown, CPPP Executive Director and the former judge in the Edgewood cases, noted: "In the special session that just ended, the legislature provided \$275 per high school student, supposedly to reduce dropouts. Every high school student we keep in school, however, would cost us over \$6,000 a year to educate. The legislature didn't provide that money."

**Dropouts Would Have Brought \$3 Billion to the Economy if They Had Graduated**

Statewide, if every 16-19 year old who is not in school and does not have a high school diploma simply graduated, the state's combined earnings would increase by about \$3 billion over four years.

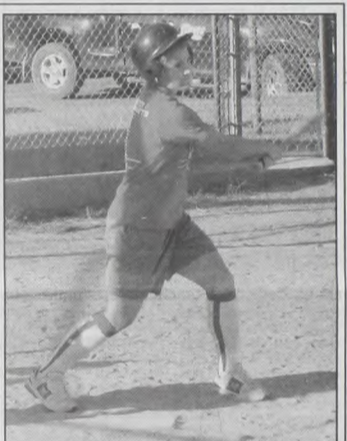

## 2005 Texas ag production valued at \$18.5 billion

Texas agriculture production for 2005 was valued at \$18.5 billion – up from \$18 billion in 2004, according to a Texas Cooperative Extension study. Dr. Carl Anderson, professor emeritus and Extension economist, said total value was calculated surveying production by each Texas county.

"Prices were mostly lower for crops from a year earlier and higher for livestock, but the production value has increased about 33% since 1995," Anderson said. Estimated value includes crop season values and some on-farm use of commodities, which is typically higher than cash receipts, he said. One example of on-farm use of a commodity is hay produced on the farm, then fed to livestock instead of selling for a cash price.

The largest growth in the last 10 years has come in aquaculture, horses used for recreation, and hunting and fishing leases, according to the study.

"For a longer period, since 1988, the value of these activities, along with outdoor recreation, timber and Christmas trees, have almost tripled and now account for nearly \$2 billion in gross value," Anderson said.

Rural land as an investment is increasing, he said. Uses include weekend retreats, recreation, and part-time agricultural operations, according to the study.

In the crop sector, the biggest gain since 1995 was in horticulture plants. Growth was also supported by cotton, ensilage, sunflowers, wheat, watermelons, grapefruit, oranges, and blueberries. Overall, the estimated value of these crops in 2005 was \$6 billion, according to the report.

Horticulture specialty crop sales in Texas have more than doubled to an estimated value of \$1.8 billion, Anderson said.

"Only cattle and cotton are greater," Anderson said. "Horticulture crop sales trend higher as production of bedding plants, foliage plants, sod and woody landscape plants increase. Plants are placed in office buildings, shopping malls, (and) public buildings as well as homes."

Livestock production value exceeded \$10 billion. Primary growth was in the production of broilers, eggs, milk, beef cattle, goats, hogs, and honey, according to the report.

Income to landowners from hunting leases exceeded \$525 million in 2005 – up 166% in the last decade. Fishing income, estimated at \$78 million, has tripled since 1995, Anderson said.

Wildlife management as an economic enterprise generates "substantial income," Anderson said, "especially in South Texas, the Edwards Plateau, Rolling Plains, and East Texas regions. And as urban population expands, the demand for rural areas with hunting and fishing activities continues to increase."

Land with quail, dove, turkey, pheasant, waterfowl, deer, wild hogs, and wildlife for watching is in strong

demand from non-farm owners, Anderson said.

"There's a growing interest in wildlife practices to improve the amount and quality of wildlife," he said. "Many ranchers have reduced or removed cows in favor of increasing the amount of wildlife. Besides, most wildlife survives drought periods much better than cattle."

Texas ranks second behind California in farm receipts. Livestock account for well over half of total sales, Anderson said.

"The large amount of pasture and rangeland provides forage for grazing cows, and producing feeder and stocker calves," he said. "A large area of productive soils and excellent export and transportation facilities favor farming and ranching operations."

Texas is first in the U.S. in sales of cattle and calves, sheep and wool, goats and

mohair, and cotton. It also leads in value of farm real estate and number of farms and ranches.

The value of farm assets, which includes land, buildings, livestock, machinery, crops, and livestock, is estimated to exceed \$115 billion in 2006.

"With total debt around \$13.3 billion, the debt-to-asset ratio remains low," Anderson noted.

Competition in producing main crops, such as cotton, wheat, corn, and rice, will intensify globally, Anderson said.

"The competition forces commercial agricultural operations to use new technology to become more productive and economically efficient," he said. "The result will assure a food and fiber system that provides consumers with an assortment of clothing, and food to eat for a reasonable price, and to feed a growing world population."

**U.S. farm equipment export sales booming**  
U.S. farm equipment export sales were up 15% in 2005, totaling \$6.6 billion, and the fourth straight year of increased sales.

The top four buyers were Canada, Australia, Mexico, and France.

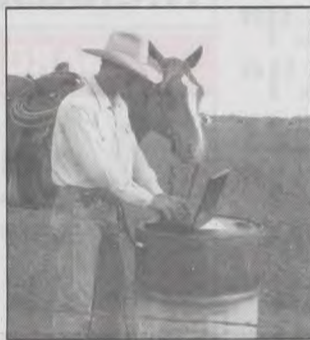

## COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT

### Grasshoppers

There are about 150 species of grasshoppers in Texas with 90% of the damage to crops and trees caused by just five species: differential grasshopper (Melanoplus differentialis), red-legged grasshopper (Melanoplus femurrubrum), migratory grasshopper (Melanoplus sanguinipes), two-striped grasshopper (Melanoplus bivittatus), and packard grasshopper (Melanoplus packardii).

The main factor affecting grasshopper populations is weather. High populations are usually preceded by several years of hot dry summers and warm autumns. Dry weather increases the survival of nymphs and adults while warm autumns allow grasshoppers more time to feed and lay eggs.

Female grasshoppers lay an average of 200 eggs per season but sometimes as many as 400. Eggs are laid in pods beneath the soil surface with each pod containing 20 - 120 eggs.

Eggs begin hatching in late April or early May and peaks around mid-June.

Nymphs go through five or six stages and become adults in 40 to 60 days.

Control options: There are several types of control options ranging from biological, mechanical, and cultural to insecticide use. Of

these, only insecticide treatments will provide a quick knock down if control is needed immediately.

Examples:  
- Mechanical control: grasshoppers prefer undisturbed areas for oviposition, so tilling in mid to late summer will reduce oviposition sites. In CRP acreage, tilling is not permitted but shredding can reduce the food supply.  
- Cultural control: control weeds in fallow fields to reduce available food; eliminate tall weeds and grass in and around crops you want to protect.

- Biological control: a naturally occurring fungus *Entomophthora grylli* can kill grasshoppers during warm humid conditions. The spores of the protozoan *Nosema locustae* have been incorporated with bran to make insecticide baits. Baits containing *Nosema* are more effective on early instar nymphs with little effect on adults.  
- Insecticides: There are many insecticides labeled for control of grasshoppers. If grasshoppers are a problem, read the label and be sure to treat the appropriate area with the proper chemical.

## Texas crop and weather

May 31 - Cotton, corn, sunflower, and soybean planting went into high gear for Texas farmers. Some are irrigating and others hoping for rain to germinate the seed, according to Texas Cooperative Extension reports.

But the state's pastures and ranges – at the whim of nature – are either bone dry or heading in that direction. "Pastures and ranges are in poor condition," said Jett Major in Lubbock. "A good general rainfall is needed for more range recovery."

"All counties are desperate for significant rainfall as the range and pasture conditions continue to decline," added

Galen Chandler in Vernon.

In the Dallas area, the normally wet month of May received very little rainfall, according to Tony Douglas.

"Early season hay yields are low, and pastures are suffering because of the dry weather," Douglas said. "Ranchers are baling hay at a frantic pace, trying to harvest forage while they have it."

Very little growth was seen on ranges and pastures in Texas' West Central region according to Scott Durham, San Angelo. Ranges and pastures in that area are "declining and continuing to dry up," he said.

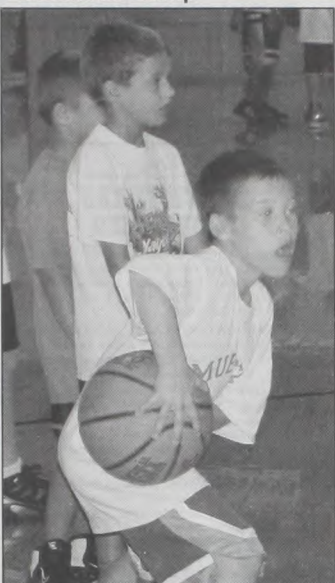

### Game warden reports

#### RAINTREE HUNTING TIPS

**Safety first**  
 Turkey hunting has become very popular and some turkey hunting locations have become very crowded. For this reason, as well as others, hunting safety is a top priority.

Don't wear "gobbler-head" colors — red, white, and blue. Even the top of the white T-shirt behind the open collar of a camo shirt stands out in the woods. Consider exposing fluorescent orange while you are moving through the woods.

Always sit with your back

protected by a tree or rock that's wider than you are. Pick set-up positions that give you a long view of the front and sides. Never carry a decoy fully exposed through the woods.

If you see another hunter approaching your camouflaged location, speak up in a loud and clearly human voice. Never try to signal with your call or wave your hand. Most important, always be absolutely sure of your target and what is behind it before you pull the trigger.

**Game warden helps transport heart attack victim ...** A Chambers County game warden was asked by the sheriff's office to assist in transporting EMS personnel to a camp house on the Trinity River that can be accessed by boat only. An individual had suffered a heart attack and needed assistance. The subject was transported to the hospital and was listed in stable condition.

**Shellfish violators keep wardens busy ...** Two Harris County game wardens caught an oyster boat captain

harvesting oysters in a prohibited area in Galveston Bay. Thirty-eight sacks of oysters were returned to the reef, and the captain was transported to the Chambers County Jail. Game wardens all along the coast have had a busy spring checking oyster boats and returning under-sized shellfish to local reefs.

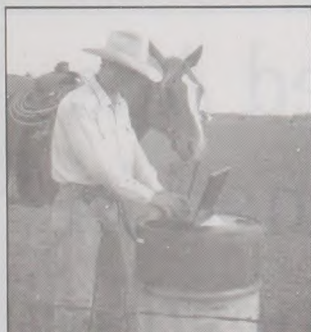

## Changes in mine land reclamation guidelines benefit quail

New alternatives for reclaiming mined lands in Texas means thousands of acres of new quail habitat could be realized each year, according to wildlife biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A cooperative effort between TPWD and the Railroad Commission of Texas has paved the way for mined lands to be reclaimed into habitat that would support quail and other upland grassland bird species. Texas currently has 13 operating mines and six mines going through the reclamation process. There are about 55,000 acres of mine land reclaimed annually in Texas.

Quail are considered by wildlife officials to be a keystone indicator species of the health of grassland ecosystems. When their numbers fall, other species that inhabit those ecosystems follow in a domino effect. A diverse cooperative, working under the umbrella of the TQCI, is making landscape level conservation progress to help ensure the dominos won't topple.

Throughout their range, bobwhite quail populations nationwide have declined from an estimated 59 million birds in 1980 to about 20 million in 1999.

## TPWD Game Warden Field Notes

The following are excerpts from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

**It's some kind of animal, and someone killed it** — On June 20, a Cherokee County game warden received information from his partner about a deer carcass that had been dumped on a county road. The game warden proceeded to contact a local county constable, who had the person in custody for illegal dumping of televisions and the deer carcass. The game warden interviewed the Jacksonville man, who said he found the deer on his property and just wanted it off his property. The game warden went to the subject's house and found where the deer had been cleaned and found quartered deer meat in the freezer. The subject told the game warden the meat was from a butchered cow. He later confessed that he did not shoot the deer but let his friend clean the deer at his house. The game warden and constable made contact with the friend. He confessed to shooting the deer, but said he thought the deer was a goat. Cases pending.

**The toughest call a game warden gets** — As marine safety enforcement officers, game wardens respond to all Texas boating accident calls and numerous drownings and near-drownings. The most difficult of those cases to work are the ones involving children. In

mid-June, central Texas game wardens responded to a call about a missing eight-year-old boy last seen on a sand bar in Lake Buchanan. Game wardens, LCRA rangers, and area dive teams searched the lake until dark with no success. The next day at daylight, the wardens were hampered by storms for a few hours, then hit the water with drags. A Department of Public Safety helicopter was called in to assist due to shallow and clear water conditions. The young boy surfaced during the search and was recovered by game wardens Saturday afternoon.

**Never was much good at math** — On June 16, Aransas County game wardens apprehended a commercial bait shrimp boat with 2,600 croaker over his legal limit of 1,500. When asked how many croaker he had, the captain stated that he had exactly 1,500. The game wardens asked him if he was sure, because they were about to count them. The captain allowed as how he might have a few over his limit. Cases pending.

**Crowded waterways call for extra care** — On June 4, game wardens from Clay and Wichita Counties responded to a boating accident on Lake Arrowhead involving a five-year-old boy who was swimming next to a boat while holding on to a ski rope. The rope, which was wrapped around the boy's leg, was caught by another

passing boat, causing partial amputation of the boy's leg just below the knee. The game wardens were within 1,000 yards of the accident and assisted the victim and his family off the lake and to the hospital within five minutes of the accident. The victim's prognosis for recovery was said to be good.

**Lunker citation for poacher** — In early June a Coryell County game warden received information about a subject who, although under a license suspension for killing a 200-class white-tailed deer at night, had been participating in fishing tournaments. The subject had fished in a tournament on Lake Belton and won first place, and the game warden found that he was going to fish in another tournament. The Coryell County game warden, along with a game warden from Bell County, both were in attendance at the 2 a.m. tournament weigh-in. The subject gave the wardens a written statement, and a Class A misdemeanor charge of fishing while license suspended is pending.

The unclassified receiving water uses are limited aquatic life uses for Brushy Elm Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 0824 are contact recreation, public water supply (only applies upstream of FM 373 in Cooke County), and high aquatic life use. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.  
The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility may operate.
