

County forbids outdoor burning, some fireworks

A looming Keetch-Byram Drought Index (KBDI) of 600 and above coupled with severe drought conditions spurred Cooke County Commissioners Court to pass a ban on outdoor burning and certain fireworks.

Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher explained that as of Monday morning the KBDI across the County showed a low of 433 and a high of 501. He predicted that it would be up another 15-20 points by Tuesday since it was rising at a rate of 10-15 daily. "Six hundred is the number we've thrown out before as a kind of decision point," he noted. "I think certainly by next Court (meeting) we will be over 600 and probably in a couple of days we will be over 600 in some areas."

County Judge Bill Freeman added, "I looked at the long range forecast this morning and it does not look good. There is no rain in the next seven days for sure."

Looking at the U.S. Drought Monitor Map Fletcher said, "We are in severe drought right now. Based on the other products the Weather Service puts out they don't expect anything better in the long range forecast."

In May, the KBDI was in the low digits between 30 and 40 and in about a month it has risen about 400 points on the scale, Fletcher said.

Nobody who Fletcher talked with objected to the Burn Ban being put in place. "A few fire departments are still strapped from last year," he added. "They are still in recovery mode." The eastern part of the county is experiencing an increase in fire calls already, he said.

Referring to Wise County that has a similar KBDI as Cooke County, Fletcher noted that they had a 140 feet per minute fire spread with a five mph wind, a 343 feet per minute fire spread with 10 mph wind, and a 580 feet per minute fire spread with a 15 mph wind. Most afternoons now have 15 mph winds.

Cooke County Fire Marshal Jody Henry added,

"Even with a 5 mph wind, that's faster than typical direct firefighting tactics will work."

What is Keetch - Byram Drought Index - KBDI

The Keetch-Byram Drought Index (KBDI) is basically a mathematical system for relating current and recent weather conditions to potential or expected fire behavior. This system was originally developed for the southeastern United States and is based primarily on recent rainfall patterns.

The KBDI is the most widely used drought index system by fire managers in the south. It is also one of the only drought index systems specifically developed to equate the effects of drought with potential fire activities.

The result of this system is a drought index number ranging from 0 to 800 that accurately describes the amount of moisture that is missing. A rating of zero defines the point where there is no moisture deficiency and 800 is the maximum drought possible.

These numbers correlate with potential fire behavior as follows:

0 - 200 Soil and fuel moisture are high.

Most fuels will not readily ignite or burn. However, with sufficient sunlight and wind, cured grasses and some light surface fuels will burn in spots and patches.

200 - 400 Fires more readily burn and will carry across an area with no gaps. Heavier fuels will still not readily ignite and burn. Also, expect smoldering and the resulting smoke to carry into and possibly through the night.

400 - 600 Fire intensity begins to significantly increase. Fires will readily burn in all directions exposing mineral soils in some locations. Larger fuels may burn or smolder for several days creating possible smoke and control problems.

600 - 800 Fires will burn to mineral soil. Stumps will burn to the end of underground roots and spotting will be a major problem. Fires will burn through the night and heavier fuels will actively burn and contribute to fire intensity.

\$10,000 reward offered by Watershed Authority

Water is possibly one of our most precious natural resources and someone is jeopardizing the water in the Clear Creek Watershed. Neil Bowie, director of the Clear Creek Watershed Authority, announced that the Authority

voted on May 19 to offer a \$10,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the perpetrator(s).

According to Bowie, there are at least five separate sites in Montague County where chloride contaminated oil and

fluid was dumped illegally sometime in April. This occurred along the shoulder of FM 1630 from south of Saint Jo to Hardy. He has the sites documented with photos.

"All vegetation in the path of the dumped fluid was killed, including all grass, shrubs, and trees," remarked Bowie. "The contaminated water is being washed by rain into the surface waters of the Clear Creek watershed, and ultimately into the Elm Fork of the Trinity River and Lake Lewisville (Dallas' primary drinking water supply)."

Sam Tipton, a landowner near Hardy, said that a load of the contaminate had been dumped near his son's property which is just across the road from his place. Rain runoff washed it from the shoulder of the road into Tipton's land. "It killed grass and trees, anything it touched," noted Sam. "They unloaded it on the highway right of way and into a draw where it got into the pasture." He said that there hadn't been another rain since so he didn't know if it would continue to wash further and kill more things.

Tipton was one of the landowners who contacted Bowie at the Clear Creek Watershed Authority. They had sought help from State regulatory authorities to no avail.

Bowie explained that in Texas, enforcement of environmental law is the responsibility of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TECQ). In Texas, the TECQ has transferred their responsibility, in the case of the oil and gas drilling and production industry, to the Texas Railroad Commission.

"This industry specific division of responsibility has

led to a fragmentation of enforcement where activity such as illegal dumping falls between the cracks," said Bowie. They spoke with Charles Morris at the Railroad Commission office in Wichita Falls. Morris said that they are only responsible for what happens on the mineral lease site. The road dumping is off the lease site and therefore not in their jurisdiction.

Bowie said Mike Burch of the TECQ office in Abilene told them that they might have jurisdiction, but there are no funds to investigate or regulate this activity.

There are numerous new drilling sites in eastern Montague County and southwestern Cooke County. As pipelines are extended into those areas, the drilling has increased and according to Bowie, so have the incidences of illegal dumping of contaminated fluids, with resultant poisoning of surface water expected to soar.

Bowie explained that enormous amounts of water are used when drilling wells. This water becomes contaminated with chloride and must be disposed of properly to avoid ruining existing water sources. This costs about 60 cents a barrel to dispose of. He said that an injection well disposal site was recently opened in the area between Saint Jo and Dye Mound. He hopes this will take care of some of the illegal dumping.

"Our concern is really for the future," commented Bowie. "We hope to enlist public support. Law enforcement does not have enough manpower to cover the whole area."

Teachers resign, more hired at Muenster School District

On June 7, the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of two more staff members, Mike Garrett, band director, and Vince Morgan, coach and teacher. They also approved hiring Brian Heidaker as an Ag/Woodshop teacher, and Mike Sissney as a coach and teacher.

The Board walked to and looked at a possible site of the future cafeteria, but no action was taken. Discussion included teacher salaries. At present, 22 junior high/high school teachers earn approximately \$600,000, and 20 el-

ementary teachers earn about \$675,000. The budget must be approved by June 30. No action was taken.

Another called meeting was held Monday morning, June 12 to hear proposals from three firms in relation to the cafeteria project. Architectural Concepts, Inc., Nay Company, and Callahan & Freeman Architects made their presentations. No action was taken.

The regular monthly Board meeting was held Wednesday and will be reported on in next week's Muenster Enterprise.

Lindsay ISD Board approves pay increase for teachers/staff

In March, the Lindsay ISD Board of Trustees approved local salary schedules which increased the salaries of the District's teachers and staff. House Bill 1 recently passed the State Legislature, increasing the Teacher Retirement System (TRS) health care supplement to \$1,000, required school districts to convert the TRS supplement to salary, and further mandated that school districts adjust the overall salary schedule by \$2,500.

Since Lindsay ISD has locally provided \$500 of the health care supplement to

replace the TRS supplement that was reduced by the State a couple of years ago, and now that the State is reinstating that amount to replace the local health care supplement, all Lindsay teachers will see a net increase of \$1,500 as a result of the state adopted HBI.

On Thursday, June 8, the Lindsay School Board voted to adopt a salary schedule that included both the average 5% local salary adjustment from the March meeting and the additional State requirements from HBI.

Dear Sisters,

We are happy to share some news with you. Several things happened during this last term...

On 11 February, Sr. Dancille Uwimana, who is an old pupil of St. Mary's College, made her first vows in Kibuye and it was a great feast for everybody. The liturgy had been prepared by the pupils, seven priests from different parishes celebrated at Mass. The next day, Sr. Dancille and her community went back

home to Nyarurema where she teaches Religion and French at the parish secondary school. The headmaster invited all the pupils to the annual Mass of Thanksgiving in union with Sr. Dancille; it was very ecumenical as the children belong to different religious confessions which also meant that the Sister belongs to them all, not only to the Catholics. It was also a good opportunity to talk about the call to the religious life today...

Now, what do the Sister do in Nyarurema? Sisters Valerie and Dancille teach religion and act as chaplains to the whole school - more than 500 pupils, nearly all boarders - and this brings about an awakening of spiritual life. Several ask for sacramental preparation and a few seem to be interested in the religious life!

Sr. Marguerite Marie works with a team at the "Maison de la Misericorde" (house of mercy) where they minister to AIDS patients...

Sr. Agnes Kayitesi is in charge of the "Youth Centre". This is for girls who didn't have the opportunity to go to secondary school...

We are in communion with you all and with our sick Sisters and we continue to pray in hope.

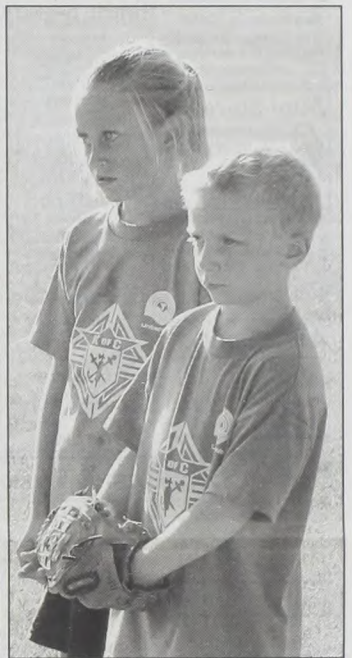
