## Five vie for NCTC Board seats

There are two seats up for election on the North Central Texas College Board of Trustees. Five people have filed in that election. Three for the Place #1 position and two for Place #2. Place #1 candidates are Linda Lutkenhaus Coursey, Kenneth King, and Ken Leach. Hoping to be seated in Place #2 are Ken Coolen and Dr. Robert R. McLeroy.

Ken Leach is retired. He said he has been a resident for a long, long time. Kenneth King is a resident of Cooke County. He is a retired attorney. Linda Lutkenhaus Coursey lives in Cooke County on small acreage along Hwy. 51. She has strong roots in the Muenster and Saint Jo area, since she was raised on a farm 2 1/2 miles southeast of Saint Jo and at-

tended both Sacred Heart School and Saint Jo ISD. She is retired and said that, if elected, she will devote full time to the Board meetings. Ken Coolen is also retired and lives in Gainesville. Dr. McLeroy lives in Cooke County and is a physician with a practice in Gainesville.

Each of the candidates was contacted and given written questions. The written replies of those who responded follow:

#### Qualifications for position?

**Coursey** - Honor graduate 1979 Cooke County College with an Associate of Arts degree, focusing on studies of the German language, philosophy, and cultural and classical history. Studies also included medical science. Also did free lance writing, tutored foreign students, did assis-

tant teaching for Gainesville and Lindsay ISDs, did design and layout for Gainesville Printing, is engaged in farm management, public service-officer and reporter for C.C. Arts Council and member of the North Central Texas Chorale since 1980, being its primary publicity writer.

**King** - BS, JD, plus 30 semester hours public school administration, mediator, practicing attorney 35 years, law school teacher.

**Leach** - My great-grandfather Joshua Hahn filed the 20th land deed in Cooke County. I am a graduate from UNT when it was NTSU and when there was It was NTSC, I was a civilian in the Planning and Research Division of the Dallas Police Department, Public Relations for Fine, and business manager in the Fort Worth

Water Department's Field Operations Division. While I am retired, I am currently enrolled in classes at NCTC and am enrolled for classes this summer and fall.

**Coolen** - I have a long-standing personal investment in NCTC. As an example, my wife teaches there, and I received my associate's degree from what was in the 1970s Cooke County Junior College. All three of my children attended the college, and one of my daughters went on to receive a degree from Mary Hardin Baylor University and is now teaching fourth grade in Marlin, Texas. Other family members have attended NCTC, and both my brother-in-law and father-in-law were teachers there.

## Costs escalate for road materials

Transportation is getting pricier. Cooke County Commissioners found that the cost of road materials increased with the new bids opened at Monday's meeting.

Asked after the meeting how this would impact road improvement plans for this year, Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess said, "I'll go as far as I can with what I've got." He noted that his budget had already been impacted by a bill unpaid last year from another precinct. Some of that cut into his road budget for this year.

Oil has gone up 40 to 45 cents per gallon. Chip material has increased by \$2.50 to \$3 per ton. Hot mix/cold lay is increasing about \$10 per ton.

Hess said that prices for most materials were increasing. Looking over the 2006 prices compared to last year, County Judge Bill Freeman noted that the cost of building a road has gone up about 25%. "That's all tied to fuel - delivery, crushed rock production, and the oil that is sprayed on black topped road surfaces."

Bids were sought for dust free red granite, crushed base rock, hot mix/cold lay, chip material, and MC-250, MC-800, and MC-300 priming oil. All bids submitted were accepted. This allows the Commissioner of each Precinct to purchase from the vendors whose price is best for that precinct. In many cases, the materials are cheaper because the vendor is located closer and shipping would be less.

Commissioners agreed to lease the plus or minus eight acres of pastureland in the Clark P Survey Abstract 0232 located on the north side of Rice Avenue in Gainesville to Jess Cason for 10 years. He was the sole bidder. In exchange Cason agreed to build, paint, and maintain a fence around the County's EMS building there as specified. There are several other bid specifics included, such as insurance and keeping the grass mowed according to the City's requirements.

Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell announced that the EMS sub station on

Rice Avenue should be ready next week. The other two are expected to be completed and open within a month. Several change orders in constructing the facilities were presented and approved.

Renovation work continues at the Courthouse. About 100 windows are expected to be installed this week.

Commissioner Al Smith re-

ported that the telephone system at the Justice Center is now operational. Prisoners were being transported from the old jail to the Justice Center Jail on Monday. An intercom system was approved for the visitors to communicate. This was an oversight.

A public hearing was held for the closing of County Road 289 in Precinct #2. Commis-

sioner Bill Cox said that the road is not used unless it rains. He said that 4-wheelers were used there when it's muddy, which makes ruts in the road. Cox said that he doesn't maintain the road any longer since it isn't traveled. He added that needles have been found there and it is

# Election

I have a personal interest in the future of this school. I would like to see it grow and prosper for the benefit of the students and of all the citizens of this county. I am an independent thinker, but I work well with people. Campaign goals: Cost efficiency; Realization; Public Awareness; Remove all excess spending; Improve the academic and technical departments (more courses there); To promote open communication with administration and teachers and Board members and public.

**King** - I want to make NCTC the best community college in the state and serve the students and community of Cooke County.

**Leach** - I want to offer my services to the community. NCTC is an excellent resource for this area; however, its roll in and responsibility for higher education in its three-county jurisdiction are greatly misunderstood. I would like to see the public informed more fully about the College. I want to represent the best interest of Cooke County taxpayers.

**Coolen** - I believe our college has been led in the wrong direction during the past few years. My only interest is the welfare of NCTC. The students' and taxpayers' money has been going for legal fees and other unnecessary expenses; meanwhile, we have lost our focus on some important courses and allowed the infrastructure to deteriorate. I hope to be able to right some of these wrongs.

**McLeroy** - I have decided to offer myself for this public service because of my respect for the College and its mission to this community.

**What do you see as one of the most pressing issues of the NCTC Board?**

**Coursey** - Harmony within! Remove all excess spending. Practice virtue and honesty at meetings. To focus of college PRIDE - to make for a "better college".

**King** - The need for pulling together and not constant bickering and arguments over past matters, including the settlement of all litigation.

**Leach** - We need to move past the rift and division currently being experienced by the present Board. I want to be the Sandra Day O'Connor of the Board and be not aligned with any side. I will cast my vote independent of any faction.

**Coolen** - I believe that our past is keeping us from moving forward. We should first settle the lawsuits and fire the Dallas lawyers. Then we will be able to concentrate on improving the college infrastructure such as building repairs and replacement. We also need to improve the college technology.

**McLeroy** - I expect the most pressing issue to be funding for capital expenditure needs, however I freely admit that I am at the bottom of the learning curve.

**What changes or improvements would you like to see implemented by NCTC?**

**Coursey** - To fix buildings which need attention for safety and environment. To focus on courses for the community to make a living and academic courses of highest esteem. Community should be able to get all their needed courses here and not be in transit. More communication from the College to the public.

**King** - Needs assessment for classes for various groups in the County including vocational tech classes.

**Leach** - The college has a long range plan. I would like to see it carried out. I am well aware a Board member is not there to manage the college, but to see policies for the College Administration to carry out. I have no plans, as a Board member, to micromanage.

**Coolen** - I would like to update some of the equipment and repair or replace some buildings on the Gainesville campus. I would like to see the College offer more vocational courses. I have personally toured the Corinth and Bowie campuses where I found excellent facilities. However, the growing student population in both areas is putting pressure on us to build additional facilities. Our local campus is badly in need of reliable technology for delivery of education as well as building improvements. The \$750,000 spent on Dallas lawyers in the last two years would have done a lot to fix these problems.

**McLeroy** - I would like to see a more harmonious and unified Board whose only agenda is to work for the College and the benefit of its students.

**Will you make yourself available to listen to concerns of citizens and how?**

**Coursey** - Any way possible: letter, phone, appearance, open forum meetings. As a Board member, I would represent the general public - keeping them always in mind.

**King** - Yes.

**Leach** - I will always welcome input from the voters of Cooke County.

**Coolen** - Since I am retired and I am not running a business, my answer is yes. My name and phone number are in the Gainesville directory, and I will be glad to hear from anyone.

**McLeroy** - Yes, at the Board meeting.

# CCRW to Water, water everywhere?

American author Henry David Thoreau once said, "Water is a pioneer which the settler follows, taking advantage of its improvements." In Thoreau's time, Americans could choose their homestead wherever they found natural resources, especially water.

Today, America and Texas are settled. The land has been claimed, and we can no longer follow water. We must instead capture and transport it - to our homes, our public buildings, our crops, and our power plants. And as population grows and droughts seem to last longer, we find ourselves increasingly at the mercy of the heavens to drop rain.

Though we remain largely at the mercy of the weather, there are ways we can work together to ensure Texas families, farmers, and industries have the water they need to survive the blistering summer heat.

In March, I sat down in Washington with water stakeholders from Texas whose work is the stewardship of this precious resource. The meeting was part of Texas Water Day, an annual

event that brings policy makers and water experts together. The goal is simple: maximizing availability of water in Texas.

Our state's professionals address matters of life and death. Their decisions must survive the briar patches of local and state politics, policies, and personalities. In short, their jobs are not easy, and are further complicated by the unpredictability of Texas weather.

The federal government does its part to help Texans meet their water needs. The feds can't make it rain, but can help provide information and technical assistance to support local water conservation and management efforts.

The federal Water Resources Development Act encourages creative partnership ideas between the federal government and local and state water-planning entities. The law was last updated in 2000, and Texas wa-

ter officials have told me it needs to be changed again.

This legislation helps govern water policy across the country, including flood control, navigable waterways maintenance, restoration of the environment, increased recreational use, and providing water supply.

These local-federal partnerships can help secure a dependable and safe water supply for Texas, but it's a challenging job. Our water needs are fast outstripping our rainfall and other water resource totals.

The U.S. Census Bureau projects that in coming decades, about half of our country's population increase will be in three states: Texas, California, and Florida. At the same time, Texas' Drought Preparedness Council reported last month that the March 2005 to February 2006 period was the driest in Texas since 1963-64, and the fourth driest year on record.

The trend is not good.

Our reservoir levels around the state are currently in decent shape. But preliminary predictions are for a hot, dry summer. Every year, we seem to have less margin for adverse weather conditions.

The state's 16 water-planning groups have prepared regional blueprints that have been folded into a statewide 'Water for Texas' plan. This comprehensive document addresses future water needs for human health and welfare, economic development, and environmental sustainability.

And while the plan certainly must pass muster as it is implemented locally, the federal government can help Texas now in this move.

Reliable data is critical to accurate water planning for the state. State and local governments have two excellent resources: the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which provides technical support

and analyzes water data, and the U.S. Geological Survey, which oversees stream gauges that provide a valuable water-management tool.

From our earliest days, Texans have been all too aware of both the blessings and curses that water can bring. But we have enjoyed the cool, invigorating flow of river water on a 100-degree day, and a horizon teeming with healthy crops. But we've also suffered with land fractured by drought or buried by flood.

We no longer have uninhabited stretches of streaming river banks or coastline where entire new communities of settlers can live. We do have Texans of national reputation committed to ensuring the state can rely on a water-supply infrastructure to meet our growing demands.

Texas may be the best place in the U.S. to live, but it's also hotter and drier than most places. We need our water.

used to dump trash and old tires. His County crews have to spend time cleaning it up.

Several property owners in the area signed an affidavit supporting the road's closure. Numbered among them was Glenna Leckinger. Her property is encircled on the south and west by CR 289.

Leckinger said that every time it rains, someone in a red 4x4 truck shows up at 1 or 2 a.m. to go "mudding". It is noisy and disturbing, she said. "The road goes nowhere. It is an unnecessary cost for the taxpayers to maintain it," said Leckinger. It is not used by anyone as the main entry to property.

Attorney Byron Berry spoke representing Delores Baxter and her family, who did not want the road closed. Their property abuts the road and they use it when checking cattle.

Berry said that the noted posting stated that this was

for discontinuance or closing of the road, but the agenda item was for closing, so they couldn't act on discontinuance at that time.

Berry explained that closing was actually closing off the road for use and to do so would open the County up to possible legal complications.

Commissioner Cox suggested gating the road, which seemed to suit all but one person present. He didn't want to have to open another gate when checking his cattle.

Commissioner Hollowell remarked that he didn't like the idea of closing the road to solve the criminal element. "That's like giving in to the criminal element," he said.

Commissioner Smith ex-

pressed empathy for both sides. He felt that the road could be of great economical benefit to the property owners in the future. "It's hard to open a road once you close it," he noted.

Commissioners voted to table the item until the County attorney could be consulted and advise them on the legalities.

## Be sure to watch your television in extreme weather conditions

Nortex Communications is always interested in the safety and well being of their customers. And one way they help the local community is by providing local weather information on their cable system. For day-to-day local weather, they provide a real time weather radar channel - Nortex WeatherWatch on channel 55. On channel 55, you will find maps with local, regional, and United States weather, as well as current temperatures, regional satellite with cloud formations, and Doppler radar information. Updated every five minutes, the local Doppler radar will keep Nortex Cable TV customers informed on current local weather conditions.

During an emergency situation, Nortex cable system is tied into the National Weather Service and with local area weather watchers. In the event of weather warnings that may affect Muenster, the National Weather Service can activate Nortex's Emergency Alert System. When activated, a message is displayed on every channel that alerts viewers to the specific weather condition, such

as a tornado warning. Also, local officials can provide an audio message that gives specific information about dangerous weather. This warning will be heard on every channel across the system.

Locally originated audio warnings are initiated by either the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department or Cooke County's Emergency Management Service. These two groups work in conjunction to monitor local conditions through volunteer spotters and specialized radar services. When necessary, these groups can notify local citizens through the cable system and the neighborhood sirens.

After this type of alert, you can then turn to a local channel such as ABC, CBS, or NBC to get weather updates or turn to channel 55 to hear from the National Weather Service.

"It's that time of year," said Alvin Fuhrman, president and CEO of Nortex Communications, "Time for tornadoes and thunderstorms to form and some could be in our area. We encourage everyone to turn on their television and tune to channel 55 to see the local weather conditions."

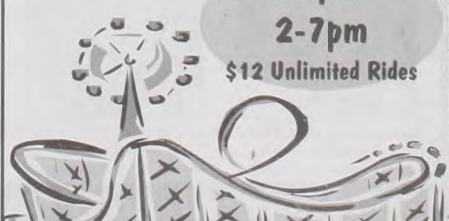

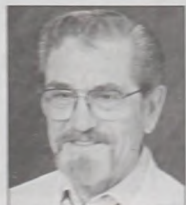

The students were chal-

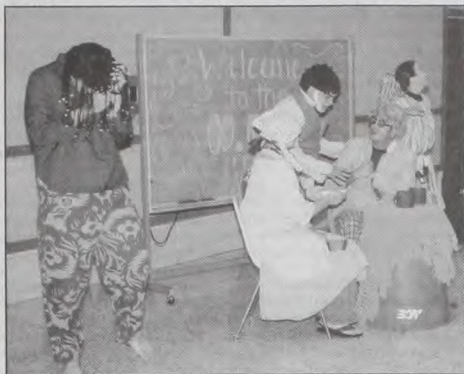
lenged to reconsider their perspective. They are exhorted to live their Catholic faith to the fullest!

## Howard Davies presented with T.V. Munson Award

Howard Davies, owner of Oak Creek Vineyards, received this year's T.V. Munson Award. The award is named after Thomas Volney Munson of Denison. The award recognizes exemplary contributions to Texas grape growing. Mr. Davies received this year's award during a ceremony at the 30th Annual Conference of the Texas Wine and Grape Growers Association (TWGGA) in Austin on Feb. 25. Nominations for the award are from the general voting membership of TWGGA, which are primarily commercial vineyard and winery owners in the state of Texas.

The Association executive committee, which is also elected by the general membership, then grants the award from the slate of nomi-

nees. Granting of the award to Mr. Davies was based on his dedication to establishing north central Texas as a premier wine growing region and his willingness to share his expertise with others wishing to grow grapes.

According to the website, <http://www.tvmunson.org/>: "Thomas Volney Munson (1843-1913), the internationally known horticulturist from Denison, developed over 300 new grape varieties specifically for the American South and Southwest. He is perhaps best known for his work in fighting the phylloxera epidemic of the late nineteenth century, which nearly wiped out the world's vineyards. His solution - grafting Vitis vinifera onto certain resistant native rootstocks from Texas - earned him the

Chevalier du Merite Agricole in the French Legion of Honor and numerous accolades from around the world. Munson belonged to and was honored by a number of viticultural and scientific associations and was considered a leader in the new scientific movement of the time for his cutting-edge work in breeding plant varieties, some of which are still important in modern viticulture and research."

Oak Creek Vineyards is located approximately six miles north of Saint Jo. The vineyard was purchased in 1999 and was previously planted in table grapes. In addition to the Venus table grape, Oak Creek grows primarily wine grapes, specifically Cabernet Sauvignon, Syrah, Merlot, Mourvedre, Chardonnay, and Roussanne.

## Addiction risk of underage drinking

The latest National Survey on Drug Use and Health reported that nearly 4.5 million teens between the ages of 12 and 17 are current alcohol users. In an effort to combat this statistic, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) held approximately 1,200 town hall meetings across the country as part of a campaign to prevent underage drinking.

Research has found that adults who first used alcohol before age 15 are five times more likely to report dependence on or abuse of alcohol than adults who first used at age 21 or older, according to SAMHSA. In addition to its negative impact on health, alcohol use among youth is strongly correlated with violence, risky sexual behavior, poor academic performance, alcohol-related driving incidents, and other harmful behaviors. In fact, alcohol is responsible for six times the number of youth deaths than can be attributed to all other drugs combined.

SAMHSA Administrator Charles Curie said, "For too long, underage drinking has been accepted as a rite of passage in this country. It's time to change attitudes toward teen drinking from acceptance to abstinence. It's time to get real, get focused, and push back. It's time for parents and teachers, clergy and

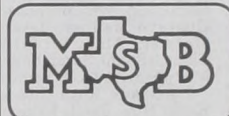

## TPWD GAME WARDEN FIELD NOTES

The following are excerpts from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

**Game wardens continue border lake cleanup ...** Wardens participating in the third wave of Operation Pescador seized 13,400 feet of illegal gill net on Falcon Lake. Wardens apprehended four violators and seized four boats and motors. Wardens have seized a total of 68,450 feet of gill net, 12 boats and motors, and have arrested 18 violators since the beginning of this operation.

**Young waterfowlers jump the gun ...** The Abilene office received a call about some young people hunting ducks illegally at Fort Phantom Lake March 15. A Taylor County game warden responded and located the suspects. One of them was almost 14 years old, and the other two were 11 and 12. The game warden educated the young men about places you can't hunt, open and closed seasons, hunting migratory birds with a pellet rifle, and hunting license requirements. The grandmother of one of the

young fellows offered to handle the situation, and the suspects were released to her.

**Fishing felons ...** A Harris County game warden checked three subjects fishing at Sheldon Reservoir March 12. Two of the subjects were found to be in possession of marijuana and a loaded .38-caliber pistol. A criminal history check on the two subjects came back that both had prior felony convictions. The third subject, who was driving, admitted he had more marijuana in his vehicle and gave consent to search.

Warden Spitzer's search revealed a bag of marijuana along with 5 grams of cocaine, speed pills, a loaded .25-caliber pistol, and an ASP baton. Felony cases are pending in county court.

**If they'd been better shots, they would have gotten bigger fines ...** On March 11 at approximately 10 a.m., a Pecos County game warden received a call from the sheriff's office in reference to a suspicious vehicle with blood running out of the bed of the truck.

The game warden located the vehicle and made contact with the driver. Suspects first told the game warden that the blood was from a coyote. Further investigation revealed the driver and passenger had killed one white-tailed doe and one mule deer doe from the public road at approximately 2 a.m. The suspects, one juvenile and one 17-year-old, admitted to shooting at approximately six deer during their excursion but had managed to kill only two. Several charges were filed as well as civil restitution.

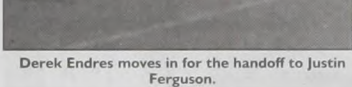

## Landowners reminded licenses needed to operate hunting leases

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners that a hunting lease license is required for certain hunting operations, and that such lease licenses must be renewed each year. The owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive pay or anything of value from hunters unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the Department. This law applies to all hunting leases.

There are three types of lease licenses: (1) hunting lease license; (2) hunting cooperative; and (3) wildlife management association. The license is required to be displayed on the hunting lease property.

"A person who violates any provision of the hunting lease license requirements or who fails to comply with any provision of the hunting lease license requirements commits an offense that is a Class C Parks and Wildlife Code misdemeanor, which carries a fine of between \$25-\$500," said David Sinclair, chief of Wildlife Enforcement at TPWD.

### Underwater tactics with Ken Cook

#### Try crappie for a change of pace

Already it's April and spring is here. Anglers from coast to coast are furiously in pursuit of spawning and post-spawning bass. Just the thought of reeling in one of those 10-plus pound monsters that everyone associates with springtime bass fishing will make anglers spend sunup 'til sundown throwing

everything but the kitchen sink at these bass. I'd be lying if I said it wasn't any fun, but sometimes a change of pace can do a lot of good.

Fishing is supposed to be fun, and crappie fishing in April can be one of the most fun fishing trips of the year. Crappie fishing is a great opportunity to take the spouse and the kids along, since there's a better chance of catching more fish than your typical day on the lake in pursuit of bass. Even if there isn't room enough for everyone on the boat, you and the family can have just as much fun fishing from the bank or a dock.

For those who will be fishing from the bank, reaching these fish is easier than you think. Crappie can be found in one to eight feet of water once the water temperatures rise above 55 degrees. Like bass, crappie will hold tight to structure, so concentrate your efforts around standing timber, brush piles, riprap, docks, and bridge pilings. Because they are holding tight to structure, I like to use a white with red dots, 1/32-oz. Berkley Beetle Spin. The lightweight lure has a slow fall and stays in the strike zone. When retrieved, this lure has a quick rise and plenty of flash from the blade to attract attention. Use a

stop-and-go method when fishing visible structures or a steady retrieve when fishing riprap to keep lure in the strike zone longer.

Small lakes and ponds with cattails or other vegetation near the shore will also hold crappie during the spawn. After the spawn, as the water temperature warms, crappie will seek vegetation that offers quick access to both shallow and deep water as well as a prime location to ambush prey.

During both of these times, I cast a chartreuse, 1/16-oz. Berkley Scent Vent Spinner. This is a small in-line spinner with a single blade and a feathered tail. The inside of the lure can be filled with something like PowerBait Crappie Nibbles that disperse scent through the water, enticing not only those fish that see the bait but those that smell it, as well. I cast the lure parallel to the weed line and retrieve it just fast enough to get it to spin. The Crappie Nibble are also great for tipping lightweight jigs when fishing around structure.

Undoubtedly, many of us will spend plenty of time this year searching for bass. But in the meantime, don't miss the opportunity to take a friend, the family, or yourself out for some exciting and relaxing crappie fishing.
