## Bans on burning and welding lifted

Clouds of smoke drifted across Texas skies during Saturday's beautiful Spring day. Winds were light, the sun shining, and temperatures warm. It was the first day since July 11, 2005 that residents of Cooke County could engage in outdoor burning without risking legal ramifications. The weather conditions favored those with months of accumulated trash. Rural residents without a means of disposing of their trash other than burning it, were anxious to have the eight month long burn ban rescinded.

Commissioners Court voted to lift the burn ban on Friday morning during a special meeting called to address the situation. Recent rains

and greening grass has anxious residents seeking the ban's lift so that they could burn trash and brush. The vote to allow burning was a unanimous 5-0.

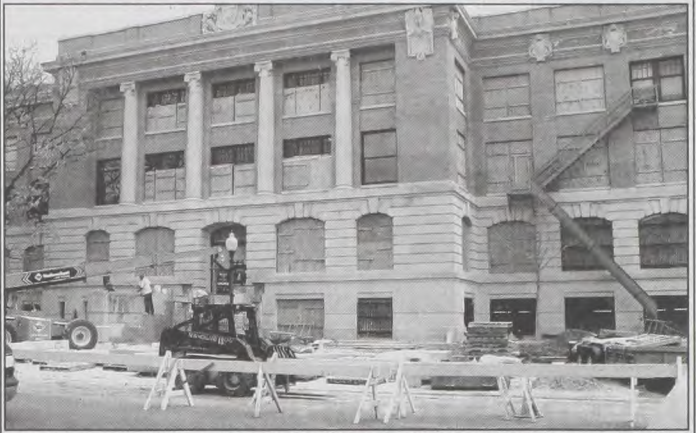
Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher reported on the weekend results at Monday's regular meeting of Commissioners Court. "We had maybe six out-of-control control burns and a couple of them, before they (fire department) even got there, they called them off. A couple of them, the first department cancelled everybody else because they got them out pretty quick. There was nothing that they stayed out there all day for."

Sunday brought strong winds that blew 30 to 35 mph and at times gusted up to 40

plus mph. Fletcher said he expected more activity, but there were only two or three fires in the County. "I think our people are pretty smart. They knew not to burn when winds were that high," commented County Judge Bill Freeman.

On Friday, the Court didn't address the emergency wildfire declaration that was put in place last December. All emergency orders and directives put in place due to the wildfires were rescinded Monday with a unanimous vote. That included no welding without at least 100 gallons of water on hand and any use or sale of fireworks.

## County takes possession of Cooke County Justice Center

Forget the steel bars. None are to be seen in the new Cooke County Justice Center Jail, but they are there encased in concrete. There are four pods in the jail. Each pod has a 53 prisoner housing capability. There are eight beds in each of the four housing units in a pod, plus some separation cells where individuals are kept apart from other prisoners.

The eight prisoners have their meals together, share "bathroom" facilities, and sleep on cots. Two locked doors keep them contained. The first door goes into a small room where one must wait for the outer door to lock before the door to the cell can be unlocked. Windows allow the jailers to check on inmates.

This method makes it possible for the jailers to have an inmate come out of the cell and go to another part of the jail without a jailer escorting him or her. Cameras are placed at all strategic areas of the facility. A central room is equipped with monitoring and communication devices.

On schedule and on or slightly under budget, the Cooke County Justice Center has been completed. The final touches are going in each day. Furnishings should be complete before April 17, which is the day slated for its Open House beginning at 10 a.m. when Cooke County citizens can see what their tax dollars have built.

It is anticipated that by April 19 or 20 the building will be mostly occupied. Cooke County Sheriff Mike Compton will make the decision as to when the prisoners should be moved. It depends on what point he feels that the jailers are sufficiently trained in use of the new facility.

Also in the Justice Center are offices for the Cooke County Sheriff and his deputies. The entire Sheriff's office will be moved, giving more room for files and evidence storage, as well as meeting space. The office and courtroom for the Precinct #1 Justice of the Peace have a much more roomy area at the Justice Center than what was of-

## County raises septic system inspection fees

Cooke County will have fees for inspection of septic systems that are more comparable to the surrounding counties. Cooke County Environmental Health Inspector Laura Blanton did a comparison study with the counties that surround Cooke County and brought her findings and proposed adjustments before Commissioners Court on Monday, March 27.

Currently Cooke County charges \$160 for application/inspection fee. This rate was set in 1989.

Blanton said that Grayson County charges \$250, Denton County \$310, Wise County \$585, and Montague \$160. "So we are currently the lowest fee for on-site inspection of facilities in the area," explained Blanton. "I propose that we go up \$50 from \$160 to \$210. With our population, I think that is kosher with the way the growth is going. As Cooke county grows, we'll ask that our rates go up just like all the other counties do."

Commissioner Al Smith asked why Cooke County's rates were below those of Grayson County. Commissioner Bill Cox said that he felt population entered into the formula.

Blanton said that \$10 of the fee for every new installation permitted goes to the State. She said that she does about 15 or 16 new installations a month. As the designated inspector, Blanton makes at least one trip to visit the site and sometimes two, processes the paperwork, and offers other assistance when needed.

"I'm not unhappy with the fee that we have for re-inspection or for repairs or upgrades, that's our existing population base," Smith said. "For the most part though, we have new population moving in and we have to do the perk tests, and we have to make sure it's going to work. I think that we need to be able to fund these areas sufficiently and it ought to be sort of self-standing to provide the pick-

up involved, the computers, the filing, and all that kind of thing. I think \$250 is a bargain. I think Grayson County is in line and that's only \$40 more than what we have here."

Auditor Kent Lashley remarked, "From an accountant's perspective, you're just trying to recover some of your cost. It's not going to deter a person building

a house. We have provided a service. Right now our fees do not cover the services that we provide, so in essence, the whole county is subsidizing somebody who is going to build a new home."

It was voted to charge new applications \$250, re-inspection \$100, application on file \$100, no application on file \$250, and certification \$100.

## Muenster ISD rehires 45 to staff

The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees rehired 45 teachers and staff at last Wednesday's monthly Board meeting. The elementary, junior high, and high school teachers, librarian, nurse, counselor, and coaches were rehired under various contracts. The Board also approved hiring Kathryn Lamar as a science and math teacher on the junior high level for the next school year, and accepted the resignation of Lee Ratliff and Mary McCourry.

The Sivells Bend Transfer Contract discussion was tabled, the land donation for an Ag Farm was finalized, and a \$23,069.10 was collected in back taxes.

The Board also received reports from the administration. Lou Heers, elementary principal, reported an enrollment of 301. Also, Grades 3, 4, and 5 had 100% participation taking their TAKS and SDAA tests. Kristen Yosten, who will graduate in May '06 from Midwestern University, is doing her student teaching at Muenster Kindergarten and 2nd Grade.

An enrollment of 251 was reported by Principal Curtis Eldridge, 76 in junior high

and 175 in high school. Eldridge noted that District UIL One Act Play is scheduled for March 31 at NCTC, and the National Honor Society will host an Easter egg hunt funded by the Jaycees on April 15 at the City Park.

Kristi Schneider reported that 77% of the senior class has been accepted and/or is planning to attend college. Forty percent of the 77% are currently accepted at a four-year college, 37% of the 77% plan to attend a two-year college. Of the class, 7% plan on entering the military, 7% plan on technical school, and 9% are undecided.

Technology Director Jeff Presnell reported that ESC Region XI Service Center has completely removed the Bess Filtering System and replaced it with Lightspeed internet filtering.

Five student work stations in the library have been overhauled and are up and running for catalog search usage and internet access.

The athletic director reported on powerlifting, track, tennis, and golf, noting the Booster Club Golf Tournament is scheduled for May 6 at Turtle Hill.

# LETTER TO THE EDITOR

## To the Editor,

Two years ago the majority of the people in Cooke County were wondering how to get the Regents at NCTC (North Central Texas College) to listen to the voters and taxpayers and stop ridiculous and unwise spending. Administrator Glasscock was still in charge of the college and had started legal action that would grow to cost almost \$1-million within two years (and costs continue to accumulate). He and his hand-picked Board of Regents had just initiated an unpopular building binge that would increase NCTC debt another \$6-million. The building project in question was all cost, with no appreciable earning power. (The income from the project does not even cover maintenance expenses, much less the debt service.) The cost of these two gigantic mistakes together will wind up costing the county taxpayers in excess of \$20-million over the life of the debt.

Well, the people realized that the only way to get the attention of the Regents was to vote as many out of office as quickly as possible. The only problem was that the election for Regents two years ago was limited to three of the seven positions - those three were voted out, and three new Regents of the people's choice took their seats on the Board at NCTC. For the past two years the "people's regents" have fought an uphill fight against the four remaining "Glasscock holdovers", but even then have accomplished a number of small miracles: Glasscock is gone, and at this coming Board of Regents election two more of his hand-

picked Regents will step down; the decline in Vo-tech segment has been successfully addressed; Cooke County students no longer have to drive to the Corinth Campus to obtain required classes; and the three "people's Regents" have been successful in holding Cooke County students' tuition increases to a bare minimum, while restraining property taxes paid to NCTC.

Now we, the voters (and taxpayers), need to give our three Regents the means to complete the task and mandate we gave them two years ago: Bring solvency back to the entire NCTC system. This will take a dedication from any newly elected candidate equal to that of the three we last elected. Any candidate expecting to be voted onto the Board of Regents must have the commitment to first learn the recent history and financial background at the college, and to attend all Board meetings held over the last few months. And of course must not represent the mistaken viewpoint held by the Glasscock hand-picked board.

Anyone not willing to bring the misguided, costly legal suit to a speedy conclusion, and not willing to work for a reduction of debt - while at the same time working to repair and rejuvenate the Gainesville Campus - should not be considered for election. And there must be a commitment to holding the line on taxes - or lowering them! It is possible to accomplish all this, but it is no job for someone merely seeking a position of prestige.

## Fees

Blanton also requested that Commissioners consider approving a revised order adopting rules for Cooke County for on-site sewage facilities. In 2001 the State informed Blanton that the County's order was out of date and she concurred. She noted that the County had already approved the updates in 1989. All approved the revised order.

Cooke County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser Doug Smithson was on hand to explain how taxing works on a type of low-income housing development proposed for

Gainesville. The United Housing Foundation, Inc./Bella Vista Apartment Development hopes to build such a facility near Wal-Mart. Smithson said that the government dictates that their taxes would be based on the assumption of what the rent would bring, take out for expenses, do an income approach divided by a cap rate, which is for apartment complexes, and that would determine the value. He said that it was estimated at about \$8 million. It would be taxed at half the rate of other apartment complexes.

There are low-income housing apartments in Gainesville that are taxed on value based on rental income, but Smithson noted that none have the 50% exemption that is being sought for Bella Vista.

County Judge Bill Freeman observed, "This is basically an unfounded mandate that says we're going to come in and build these, but we're not going to let you charge all the taxes that you're charging all the other citizens of the County." Judge Freeman questioned the need for additional affordable housing since Gainesville already has at least three low-income housing apartment complexes.

Commissioners Court was considering passing a resolution opposing the proposed apartments. The City of Gainesville passed a similar opposing resolution at its March meeting. "Just because we pass a resolution does not mean that they aren't going to build," continued the Judge. "They can simply ignore us and ignore the City and come right on in here and build it if the people from the State who allocate the money allow them to do it."

Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell remarked, "With that influx of people, we would provide the ambulance service, the law enforcement, and the County hospi-

ferred in the Courthouse. This will allow arraignments to take place without transporting the inmate from the jail to the courthouse.

Architect Steve Gill of Burns, Fletcher, Gill Architects appeared before Commissioners Court Monday. He confirmed that the Texas Jail Commission completed its inspection of the facility two weeks ago. He noted that the jail passed the Jail Commission and Texas Commission on Health Standards reviews with flying colors.

Cooke County now has possession of the facility. There is a punch list of items that the architect needs to make sure are done. There is a one-year warranty maintenance period that the architect will cover.

Commissioner Al Smith, who serves on the Jail Committee, noted that the antenna tower was on the building and they would be working to focus the antennas on it to get the building on-line for a radio and telephone standpoint.

A meeting was held Tuesday between the County, the builder Sedalco, and the architect firm. All were in agreement that the project went very smoothly. It is a

model of what such a project should be like, they agreed.

In showing some of the Justice Center's unique features, Commissioner Smith said that in the event of a fire, all the facility's doors would be locked. Air would be changed five times per minute. The air in the building is self-contained and changed regularly.

All the plumbing can be worked on without tearing into a wall. Water pipes for hot and cold water, and gas are in a large room that runs the length of the facility. Huge air ducts are also located in this area. "This is where it all happens," remarked Smith.

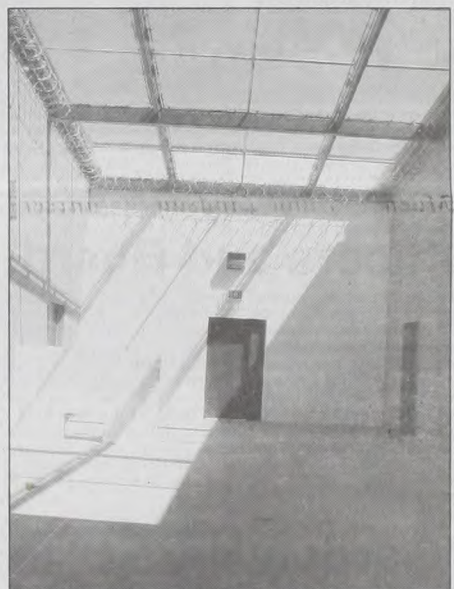
The building was built floor first, then the walls with all the wiring being done before concrete was poured into them, and then the concrete ceilings.

Commissioner Smith said that his work with the building of the Justice Center took up a good part of a year of his life. Judge Freeman who was the other Commissioners Court member on the Jail Committee, said it consumed a great deal of his time for the last two years. Both are happy with the final product and delighted to see their part in the project drawing to a close.

I can't see that there are any profits to be made there."

The resolution opposing the allocation of home funds through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to make the proposed apartments possible passed by a unanimous 5-0 vote by Commissioners Court.

Spirex had a tax abatement agreement with Cooke County, North Central Texas College, City of Gainesville, and North Texas Medical Center. The company left Cooke County before fulfilling its contract. Since it violated the agreement, Spirex could owe tax abated for the last five years.

Cooke County's total would be \$7,400. Spirex has offered to pay each entity half of the amount it would owe. Commissioners approved Judge Freeman to meet with the other entities and consider the offer.

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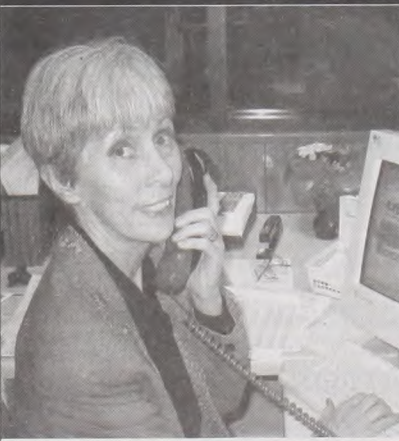

# Folic acid vital in preventing birth defects

For years, women have been encouraged to consume more folic acid before and during pregnancy to help prevent neural tube defects (NTDs) in their infants. Now research has shown a possible link between low levels of folic acid during pregnancy and Down's syndrome.

The U. S. Food and Drug Administration announced in September 1999 that women with a genetic abnormality that hinders folic acid metabolism are 2.6 times more likely to have a child with Down's syndrome than women who do not have that genetic defect. Down's syndrome occurs when there is a

chromosomal abnormality of the 21st chromosome, resulting in 47 chromosomes rather than the normal 46.

The research showed that millions of women appear to have the genetic abnormality that interferes with folic acid metabolism; however Down Syndrome only occurs in one in 600 births. A poor diet lacking folic acid can cause what researchers call "gene-nutrient interaction," increasing the chances that a child will be born with Down's syndrome.

It already has been shown that women who take 400 mcg (0.4mg) of the B vitamin, folic acid, daily before preg-

nancy and during the first two months of pregnancy as recommended by the U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) cut in half their chances of having babies with such NTDs as anencephaly (the partial or complete absence of the brain, resulting in miscarriage, stillbirth, or imminent death) or spina bifida (an opening of the baby's spine). In the case of spina bifida, surgery is required to close the spine, and a shunt or drain may be needed to prevent the build-up of spinal fluid in the brain. Approximately 40% of children with spina bifida die prior to their

16th birthdays; spina bifida also can cause mental retardation, problems in walking, and incontinence.

NTDs can occur in the first days of pregnancy, before a woman would know she is pregnant. For this reason, it is vital that women consume sufficient folic acid prior to pregnancy. Taking a multivitamin pill with folic acid every day is important, because it can be difficult to get a sufficient amount of folic acid from a daily diet. High concentrations of folic acid are found in green leafy vegetables (such as broccoli), liver, tuna, asparagus, beans, orange juice, eggs, bananas,

peas, corn, lean beef, and beef liver. Some pasta, cereals, and breads are enriched with folic acid.

NTDs and Down Syndrome are among the more than 200 known causes of mental retardation. It appears that the risk of these conditions can be reduced by maintaining a good diet and by taking a daily multivitamin pill containing folic acid.

March is Mental Retardation Awareness Month. Mental Health Mental Retardation Services of Texoma is the community center serving Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson Counties since 1974. For information, call 903-957-4795.

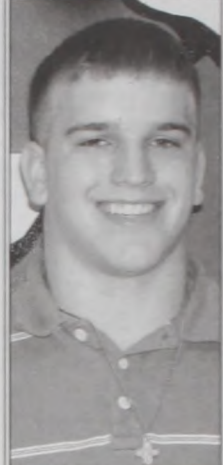

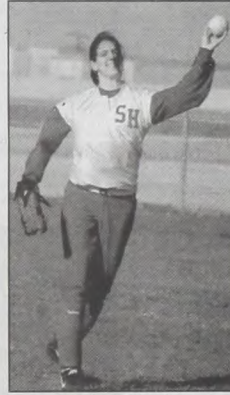
