Employers must begin using new I-9 form by Dec. 26

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) announced in a Federal Register notice Nov. 26, 2007, that employers must transition to the revised Employment Eligibility Verification Form (I-9) not later than Dec. 26, 2007. All employers are required to complete a Form I-9 for each employee hired in the United States.

On Nov. 7, USCIS announced the availability of the revised version of Form I-9 (with Rev. 06/05/07M) printed on the lower right corner of the form), saying it is now the only version valid for use.

the Federal Register notice was published, to transition to the revised form. Accordingly, effective Dec. 26, 2007, employers who fail to use the revised form will be subject to applicable penalties.

There are significant changes in the list of acceptable forms of proof of both identity and employment eligibility (List "A") which employers should note.

Authorization documents that are included as acceptable on the new List "A" are U.S. Passport (unexpired or expired); Permanent Resident Card or Alien Registration Receipt Card (Form 1-551); Unexpired foreign passport with a temporary 1-551 stamp; Unexpired Employ-

ment Authorization Document that contains a photograph (Form L-766, L-688, or I-688B); and Unexpired foreign passport with an unexpired Arrival-Departure Record (Form I-94) for nonimmigrant aliens authorized to work for a specific employer. Several documents that were acceptable under the "old" I-9 Form are no longer acceptable and cannot be used. These include Certificate of U.S. Citizenship (Form N-550 or N-570); Alien Registration Receipt Card (Form I-151); Unexpired Reentry Permit (Form I-327); and Unexpired Refugee Travel Document (Form I-571).

Texas cattle on feed numbers up slightly

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 3.0 million head on Nov. 1, up slightly from a year ago.

According to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office, the estimate was up 6% from the Oct. 1 level. Producers placed 700,000 head in commercial feedlots during October, up 19% from both a year ago and last month.

Pound-for-pound, beef produced with grains and growth hormones produces 40% less greenhouse gas emissions and saves two-thirds more land for nature compared to organic grass-fed beef.

To reach these startling conclusions, analysts at the Hudson Institute's Center for Global Food Issues used beef production models from Iowa State University's Leopold Center for Sustainable Agriculture and greenhouse gas emissions estimates from the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (UN IPCC).

More than 95% of beef produced in the United States is raised on grain-based diets in feedlots, using supplemental growth hormones, both natural and synthetic. The report details the extensive human and environmental safety requirements for the use of supplemental hormones on feedlots, as well as the growing body of environmental monitoring studies showing no significant negative impacts from their use. Instead, the data show major environmental benefits of this pro-
