Set up under the GI Bill of Rights, the program offers opportunities similar to those enjoyed by GI high school and college students. The government pays tuition charges and grants a monthly allowance to the students, \$65 if single and

The length of time a person is permitted to continue in class is determined by his length of service. For a minimum of three months up to a year of service he is entitled to a year of vocational training. If he served over a year he is entitled to a month of training for every month he spent in the service.

144 hours per month, 42 of which are spent in the classroom and 8 as on the job training under the supervision of the instructor. The remaining 94 hours are spent on the farm in pursuit of the student's normal farm duties and are credited as laboratory work. A set of reports and records will show how the farm time was

The course is a fine opportunity for men who wish to get valuable knowledge from it, but it will be short lived for anyone who enrolls merely to collect the allowance, the coordinator pointed out. Failure to attend classes or do satisfactory work subjects the student to suspension.

The desired number for a class is between 15 and 20 men. More than 20 would reduce the indiv-(Continued on Page 8)



If labor had produced since 0 the war the way it did during the 2 war, the law of supply and demand would already have many items under control, and others would be drifting toward a reasonable price range. If a commodity is plentiful, competition will make the price right. If it is not yet plentiful but known to be in steady production, buyers will refuse to pay outrageous prices.

Actually the explanation is that sincere labor leaders are not in favor of killing time. The trouble comes from a small percentage of out and out communists who are infesting organized labor, and dominating it. These men make up the element that demands exhorbitant wages for the least possible amount of work and also demands low ceiling prices on the products produced by their work. They are applying a squeeze on American industry in the hope of discrediting the system of free enterprise. Should that succeed, one business after another would be forced to lock its doors and the only alternative left is for the government to take over. That's what they want, the Russian

For many of us it's a little dif ficult to see how a minority can take over large organizations like the labor unions. The reason is that the majority are primarily workers. They pay their o abide by the policies of their organizaton. Of their small representation at meetings only a 11 handful are qualified to deter-19 mine policies. The red minority on the other hand are primarily schemers and secondarily workers. They attend meetings a hundred per cent strong equipped with all the parliamentary tricks for phenagling. They dominate the way most of us have seen a few dominate at any other kind

Hence it was gratifying indeed to see CIO-PAC candidates rejected in the Texas primary. It gives us reason to hope that before so many years we will be represented by men who will put the clamps on left wing democracy as imposed on us by com-munist labor dictators.
