Heavy rains drench the Muenster area

Much needed rain fell in abundance last week. Western Cooke County received about twice the amount as did eastern Cooke County.

Some reports of rainfall west and northwest of Muenster was at eight inches for the week's total. The average was around five inches, and the eastern part of the County

reported as little as three inches. In northwestern Cooke County, some fields were under water. Creeks ran bank to bank. Roadways were cov-

ered by water, ponds and small lakes were over their spillways. Lake Muenster gained a lot of water.

Rushing water ravaged roads, some already marred with potholes from winter freezes. Roads with low water crossings had to be closed with barriers for the safety of those who travel them.

Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess reported that he had to close one road due to the rain. A culvert on County Road 448 washed out, making it impassable. An old railroad car was used as a culvert in that crossing. It was set on a solid rock bottom. Water had cut away some of it last fall and this rain finished the job. Commissioner Hess said he expected it to be repaired by Thursday. They are putting down a concrete bottom that should prevent that problem in the future.

Hess noted that ice storms during the winter caused branches and twigs from trees to fall in creeks and barditches. The debris clogged culverts, causing water to back up and flow over roadways. Recent high wind had blown dirt from fields into barditches. This added to the problem of water overflowing onto county roadways.

Happy Easter



New patrol officer still sought after

The search is on for a new police officer for the City of Muenster. Officer Mitch Westervelt worked his last shift for Muenster on March 15. He resigned to further pursue his career in law enforcement.

At the Monday, April 2 City Council meeting, Muenster Police Chief Bob Stovall updated the City Council on his search for a new patrol officer. He said that he's had several applicants and hopes to get more. Chief Stovall told the Council that he plans to hire an officer to fill the full-time position soon.

As requested by property owner Jerry Fleitman, the Council approved dedication of two strips of land in the subdivision east of Mesquite Street. The purpose is to establish two strips of land to be designated as a public City alley and a utility easement, giving the City the legal rights to manage, maintain, and add any utilities, water and/or sewer, and other public services as well as to maintain the area for access as it sees fit for those purposes.

Shirley Hess was hired as the 2007 manager of the City swimming pool. She was au-

thorized to hire lifeguards for the summer.

Pay increases were also approved. The pool manager's pay was set at \$7.50 an hour, an increase of 50 cents per hour. Lifeguard pay starts at \$5.25 an hour. For each year of experience, an additional 25 cents an hour is added to their pay. Previously pay started at \$5.15 an hour with a dime an hour increase per year of experience.

City Manager Stan Endres reported that the water well #1 located near Muenster State Bank went down and had to have motor and pump replaced. He said that the drainage project on Mesquite Street is progressing well. It will make a big difference in times of heavy rainfall.

In other business, the City Council:

- Approved closure of South Maple Street for Germanfest activities.
- Approved sale of alcohol in the City Park for Germanfest, April 27-29, 2007.
- Canceled May 12 election since there were no opposed candidates for any position.
- Reviewed and approved monthly bills totaling \$111,591.84.

MMH Board hears of updates to facility

Several improvements are planned for Muenster Memorial Hospital. At the March 20 regular meeting, Administrator Lynn Heller informed the Board that he planned to initiate work orders to have two patient shower areas renovated. Also, the kitchen is getting a new stove installed.

Plans are being discussed to install an outside security system for the Hospital and the Family Health Clinic. It is hoped that this expense might be covered by a grant.

The Medical Staff Report noted that Dr. Dunn, medical peer reviewer, would be coming to review the swing bed patient records. Dr. Popovich, a resident of Muenster, is applying for privileges at MMH. A report indicated five trauma cases that were transferred in February. One took two hours to transfer to a larger facility due to non availability of required specialist at a receiving hospital. This is a growing problem, the report indicated.

Net revenue for February was \$661,983 compared to last February's \$395,994. Year-to-date revenue this fiscal year was \$4,351,729 compared to the previous fiscal year-to-date in February 2006 of \$3,597,290.

Revenue over expense for this February was \$311,826 compared to last year's \$82,271. Year-to-date revenue over expense this fiscal year was \$994,608 compared to the 2006 year-to-date in February of \$462,676.

There were 25 acute inpatient admissions in February with 21 discharges for a total of 124 acute care inpatient days. Average length of stay was 3.14 days. Long term care inpatient admissions to-

taled nine in February with nine discharges. Inpatient days totaled 252 with an average daily census of nine and an average length of stay of 36.56 days. Combined daily census in February was 13.43 with an average length of stay of 13.17 days.

During February, there were 119 ER visits; 352 outpatients; four observation room days; 691 visits at the Family Health clinic; and 466 Home Health visits.

In other business, the Board:

- Certified unopposed candidates for the May 12 election.
- Ratified Board Chairman Kenney Klement's action taken to cancel the May 12 election since there were only three candidates for the three positions. All are three-year terms.
- After being satisfied with the midyear review of the self-funded health insurance plan for employees compared to the insurance of the previous two years, approved an extension contract with John

Clark as broker of record for the coming period.

• Following an executive session, presented Administrator Heller with a new three-year contract of employment.

• Approved Bad Debt Write Offs totaling \$1,685.

- Heard that the Spring Health Fair slated for Friday and Saturday April 20-21 will feature medical tests such as a Complete Health Panel (\$310 value) for \$30, EKG (\$127 value) for \$10, and TSH for thyroid (\$96.50 value) for \$10.

Unique jewelry making intrigues Jackie Bartush

By profession, Jackie Bartush works as a chemist for a cosmetic and herbal supply company. When she's on her own time, designing and creating pieces of jewelry occupies Jackie's time.

"I'm kind of a detail oriented person," explained Jackie. "I studied science, so it's very precise and some of that comes out in the jewelry, sometimes in the really detailed pieces. I can kind of be detail oriented and creative at the same time with jewelry

making, which is nice. And you get to see what you are doing as you do it. Sometimes with work, you don't really see the results of your effort immediately. With this, you are seeing it the whole time as it changes. Then finally when it is done, you can be really satisfied with it."

It was in 2001 during her freshman year in college that Jackie first took an interest in the art of jewelry making. She was at the World Trade Center with her mother, June Bartush, who owns Sisters in Muenster. There was a demonstration in one of the showrooms teaching how to tie off beads placed on a string to make jewelry pieces. Jackie went and was shown how to do it. She figured it out from there.

That spark ignited a passion for the art. "I started looking at jewelry and seeing how it was made and figured it out by trial and error," remarked Jackie. One summer, Jackie went to

Mexico where she took a two-week workshop on metals. She was taught how solder, saw, drill, and to use hammering techniques. "I do a little bit of that now," she said. Casting was also taught there.

Jackie said that she learned to carve models out of wax. The wax was surrounded with plaster and then melted and poured out. Liquid silver is then poured into the mold to create the silver jewelry piece. "I didn't

do too much of the actual pouring myself," Jackie said. "I did pour one of mine, but it didn't work. It hardened up inside before the whole mold got filled." The secret seems to be to pour a constant stream at the right speed.

Necklaces, bracelets, and earrings of various styles are what Jackie makes now in the line of jewelry. She selects gemstones for her pieces that are not real expensive. Amethysts, smoky quartz, and pearls are some of her preferred gemstones.

Jackie enjoys making jewelry so much that hours can pass before she realizes how late it has gotten. She admits to losing track of time, "You look at your watch and it's two in the morning and you've made five different pieces," Jackie said. "I enjoyed every minute of that. I didn't even realize that I'd spent five hours. I think it's nice to find something where the work doesn't really seem like work."

The jewelry designer describes some of her favorite design pieces, "I like the ones where you wrap a lot

DPS says: Don't pick the bluebonnets!

Each Texas springtime brings flowers to fields and roadsides and a question to the minds of nature lovers, is it really illegal to pick bluebonnets?

The answer is no, there is no law against picking our State Flower. However, there are laws against criminal trespass, so make sure you're not on private property when you stop to take your annual kids-in-the-bluebonnets photo.

There are laws against damaging or destroying rights-of-way and government property, so pick a few flowers, but don't dig up clumps of them and don't drive your vehicle into the midst of them. Remember, Mother Nature and in many cases, your fellow Texans, scattered wildflower seeds along medians and roadways so that everyone could enjoy spring flowers.

For the safety of yourself and others, as well as to limit your ticketability:

- There are laws against impeding traffic, so be careful about slowing down to enjoy the view. Pick areas with light traffic conditions for stopping.

- Signal before leaving or entering the roadway.

- Park off the roadway (off of improved shoulders), parallel to the road in the direction of traffic, on the same side of the roadway that the flowers are on. Don't walk or run across lanes of traffic to get to the flowers.

- Obey signs that prohibit parking on a particular stretch of roadway.

- And remember that in addition to a ticket, snakes and fire ants also could put more blue in your day than you bargained for.

of wire around making a frame, like a circle, with one drop where it has a pearl wrapped around the wire and then a big drop in the middle. Earrings are usually a lot of fun to make. You can make them really ornate."

Another of Jackie's creations is the piece that she displays her jewelry on. She makes the display from water color paper, then places her thumbprint and initials on it.

"It's a lot of fun," said Jackie as she expresses what she likes best about designing jewelry. "You've got no rules and you just make whatever you want. You can experiment a little bit. If you have something in mind, you can kind of work with it and see how it turns out. If you don't like it, you don't finish it. Just cut it apart and reuse the beads."

Eye strain seems to be the one drawback for Jackie. She said that the delicate work wrecks havoc on her eyes.

Currently, Sisters is the only place that Jackie has her jewelry pieces offered for sale. She sells pieces such as bracelets for around \$20. Necklaces vary quite a bit, with some being a little under \$20, to \$40 for the more ornate ones. Some pieces take up to two hours to complete. Earrings might take an hour. Jackie said that the first piece is the most time consuming since you are figuring out the design as you go. Once she has a piece to look at, she can count the links between beads and move more quickly.

Pieces made from metal take a long time. The metal is sawed out. A drill is used to create a hole for the saw to go into to start the cutting. Designs can be hammered into the metal.

Jackie lives in Dallas where she shares a place with her cousin Debra Dangelmayr. Jackie's parents are Chuck and June Bartush. She is the middle child sandwiched between brothers Stephen and Daniel.

What does her future hold? She is going to school in Paris - Paris, Texas that is. There is a community college in Paris that offers a two-year jewelry technology program, she said. One of Jackie's former teachers, Joe Caserta, was the one who gave information on the jewelry technology program.

Jackie hopes to learn to cast, how to do fabrication pieces by sawing and soldering, how to set gemstones, and to repair jewelry.

"After that, I might work for someone for a year or two to learn some new skills that they might have," reflected Jackie. "Eventually, I'd just like to set up a shop of my own, either on-line or a physical store." For now, Jackie is happy with her set up at Sisters.

Hess said that his crews were very busy this week, he had them blading roads, repairing the culvert so that CR 488 could be reopened, clearing out culverts, and pulling gravel back onto the roads.

Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith reported no damage to the southern part of his Precinct. County Road 300 west of Kountry Korner had a serious hole washed in it. Commissioner Smith said that he closed down several roads with low water crossings. Those included County Roads 308, 302 (Fisher Road), 303, and 388. Those roads are west of Muenster, south of Muenster, and near Myra. He said that all are now passable, but not yet repaired.

"If not for the Muenster Lake, it would have been very bad. It stopped a lot of the water coming from the north and I'm thankful for that," Smith remarked.

Muenster's official rainfall, which is kept by Bob and Janette Hess, was 3.86 for the week.

Burgess to address CCRW on April 12

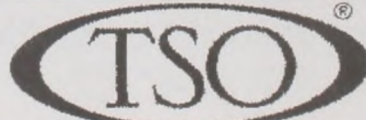

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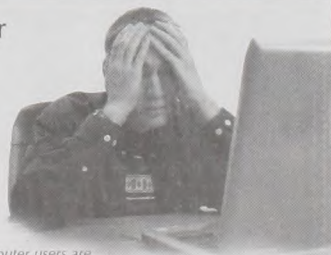

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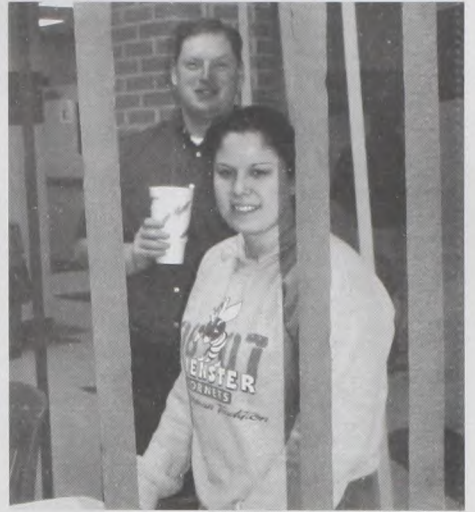
MISD teachers are in "jail" for CF fundraiser

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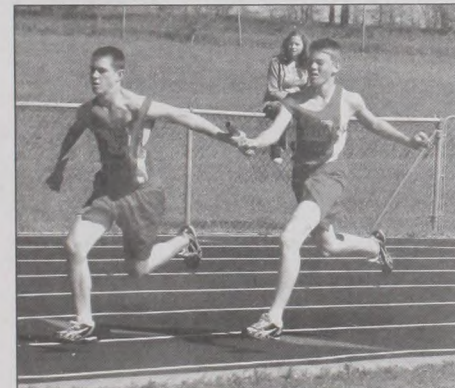
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Texas wheat crop strengthened by rain

The 2006 drought led to the smallest number of wheat acres harvested in Texas since 1925, but this year's crop is showing promise thanks to timely rains, a small grains expert said.

"(Rainfall) in the High Plains and other parts of the state over the past couple of weeks have increased yield expectations," said Dr. Gaylon Morgan, Texas Cooperative Extension small grains specialist. "Statewide, most of the wheat is considered to have good to excellent yield potential due to (available) soil moisture and relatively low disease pressure."

About 6 million winter wheat acres have been planted as part of the 2007 crop, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture-National Agricultural Statistics Service.

Texas producers have renewed optimism after the 2006 drought devastated wheat and other crops throughout the state, resulting in \$2.5 billion in losses, according to Extension economists.

The value of the 2006 Texas wheat crop was \$153 million compared to \$330 million in 2005 and \$362 million in 2004, according to USDA data. Last year's drought not only led to millions in losses in revenue for farmers, but sales proceeds from harvested wheat in 2006 led to just \$42,000 in Texas Wheat Board allocations for research initiatives. About \$211,000 was allotted in 2005 by comparison.

The only disappointments so far are the Southern Rolling Plains and the Concho Valley with late-planted wheat, Morgan said. Yield potential is expected to be low and much of the wheat "grazed-out or baled for hay, despite recent rains," he said.

Meanwhile, rain and warm weather is helping the crop to progress rapidly, Morgan said. In South Texas, the wheat crop is heading and

flowering. In the Blacklands region, wheat is beyond the boot stage (the seedhead enclosed within the sheath of the flag leaf) to early flowering.

"In these areas, the crop ranges from late-jointing to early heading," he said. "Most of the wheat on the High Plains is at the jointing stage."

Meanwhile, weed management is another issue that needs attention from growers, Morgan said. Mustards and broadleaf weeds become a problem for some producers as the growing season progresses, he said.

"Late-season broadleaf weed options exist. However, no herbicides should be applied after boot stage," Morgan said.

Examples of herbicides that may be applied up to the boot stage include MCPA, 2,4-D, Ally, Butril and Finesse.

"If your wheat crop is beyond the boot stage and heavy weed infestations will negatively affect harvest and grain quality, several harvest aids do exist," Morgan said. "However, the harvest aids can't be applied until after the wheat crop is in the hard-dough stage or beyond. If wheat for seed will be kept from a field receiving a harvest aid application, a seed germination test is strongly encouraged because harvest aids can negatively affect seed germination."

Wheat producers are also keeping a watchful eye on crop disease. South Texas wheat is heading with relatively low leaf rust pressure, Morgan said. In the Blacklands, leaf rust pressure is relatively low, "but powdery mildew is still present on susceptible hard wheat varieties."

"Leaf rust is being observed at concerning levels on very susceptible varieties, such as Cutler, Jagelene, and 2145," he said. "However, varieties with moderate resistance,

such as Coronado, only have low levels of leaf rust at this time."

Fannin County has maintained its resistance to leaf rust, he said, while stripe rust levels remain at very low levels throughout South Texas and the Blacklands regions.

"These low foliar disease levels may be the result of a very dry February and early March and fungal inoculum did not build up," Morgan said. "Nonetheless, as warm moist conditions have returned to much of the state, foliar diseases can increase quickly and warrant observation."

Producers with susceptible varieties to leaf rust and considering use of fungicide can review variety resistance ratings on the Web at <http://varietytesting.tamu.edu/wheat/index.htm#diseases>.

2007 Texas corn acreage to increase, declines in cotton forecasted

Fueled by ethanol demand and strong export sales, U.S. corn acreage is predicted to be the largest since 1944, with Texas plantings to increase by as much as a quarter of a million acres in 2007, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported recently.

Cotton, the state's number one cash crop, is predicted to drop in acreage by 11% or more than 600,000 acres, according to the report. Cotton producers across the state are expected to plant just over 5.73 million acres compared to 6.43 million acres in 2006.

Weather so far has not been

a determining factor for agriculture production in Texas, but lack of rain could alter the number of crop acres planted and yields. State agriculture producers are hoping there isn't a repeat of 2006 when crops across the state were ravaged by drought.

Prospective crop plantings statewide are predicted to be 2 million acres compared to 1.76 million acres in 2006, according to estimates.

Texas produced more than \$561 million worth of corn for grain in 2006, according to Agriculture department data. That figure could increase

dramatically in 2007, with the potential for larger yields and record-high corn prices.

U.S. corn growers intend to plant 90.5 million acres of corn in 2007, up 15% from 2006 and 11% higher than 2005, the Agriculture Department reports. By comparison, it would mark the highest number of acres since 1944 when 95.5 million acres were planted. Expected acreage is up in nearly all states, as high corn prices are encouraging farmers to plant more acres in corn.

Nationally, Illinois farmers are predicted to plant a record-high 12.9 million acres of corn this spring, up 1.6 million acres from a year ago, while North Dakota (increased 910,000 acres) and Minnesota (increased 600,000 acres) as growers are expected to plant a record number of corn acres.

The drop in Texas cotton acres is in response to the change in corn acreage and the trickle effect on other planted commodities including sorghum and soybeans.

Some Texas farmers are shifting cotton acreage to corn acreage in the Central Texas Blacklands, Wharton, and Lower Rio Grande Valley regions to take advantage of the prices.

U.S. cotton plantings for 2007 are expected to total 12.1 million acres, 20% below 2006 levels and the lowest since 1989, the Agriculture Department reports. Growers intend to decrease planted area in all states with the largest acreage declines in Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Carolina, Mississippi, and Texas.

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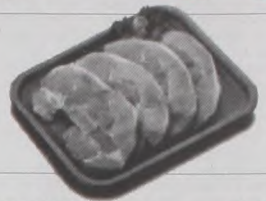
