MMH Board hears of updates to facility

Several improvements are planned for Muenster Memo-rial Hospital. At the March 20 regular meeting, Administra-tor Lynn Heller informed the Board that he planned to ini-tiate work orders to have two patient shower areas reno-vated. Also, the kitchen is get-ting a new stove installed. Plans are being discussed to install an outside security system for the Hospital and the Family Health Clinic. It is hoped that this expense might be covered by a grant. The Medical Staff Report noted that Dr. Dunn, medical peer reviewer, would be com-ing to review the swing bed patient records. Dr. Popovich, a resident of Muenster, is ap-plying for privileges at MMH. A report indicated five trauma cases that were transferred in February. it. Just cut it apart and reuse the beads. Eye strain seems to be the one drawback for Jackie. She said that the delicate work wreaks havoc on her eyes. Currently, Sisters is the only place that Jackie has her jewelry pieces offered for sale. She sells pieces such as bracelets for around \$20. Necklaces vary quite a bit, with some being a little un-der \$20, to \$40 for the more ornate ones. Some pieces take up to two hours to complete. Earrings might take an hour. Jackie said that the first piece is the most time consuming since you are figuring out the design as you go. Once she has a piece to look at, she can count the links between beads and move more quickly.



"In these areas, the crop ranges from late-jointing to early heading," he said. "Most of the wheat on the High Plains is at the jointing stape"

High Plains is at the jointing stage." Meanwhile, weed manage-ment is another issue that needs attention from grow-ers, Morgan said. Mustards and broadleaf weeds become a problem for some produc-ers as the growing season progresses, he said. "Late-season broadleaf weed options exist. However, no herbicides should be ap-plied after boot stage," Mor-gan said.

phed after foot stage gan said. Examples of herbicides that may be applied up to the boot stage include MCPA, 2,4-D, Ally, Buctril and Fi-

2,4-D, Ally, Buctril and Fi-nesse. "If your wheat crop is be-yond the boot stage and heavy weed infestations will negatively affect harvest and grain quality, several harvest aids do exist," Morgan said. "However, the harvest aids can't be applied until after the wheat crop is in the hard-dough stage or beyond. If wheat for seed will be kept from a field receiving a har-vest aid application, a seed germination test is strongly encouraged because harvest aids can negatively affect seed germination."

aids can negatively affect seed germination." Wheat producers are also keeping a watchful eye on crop disease. South Texas wheat is heading with rela-tively low leaf rust pressure, Morgan said. In the Black-lands, leaf rust pressure is relatively low, "but powdery mildew is still present on sus-ceptible hard wheat variet-ies."

"Leaf rust is being observed at concerning levels on very susceptible varieties, such as Cutter, Jagelene, and 2145," he said. "However, varieties with moderate resistance,

such as Coronado, only have low levels of leaf rust at this time." Fannin County has main-tained its resistance to leaf rust, he said, while stripe rust levels remain at very low levels throughout South Texas and the Blacklands re-gions. gions

gions. "These low foliar disease levels may be the result of a very dry February and early March and fungal inoculum did not build up." Morgan said. "Nonetheless, as warm moist conditions have re-turned to much of the state, foliar diseases can increase quickly and warrant observa-tion."
