For them, this season of thanksgiving often reminds each girl and boy of what they are missing. As we observe national Adoption Awareness Month, we need to remember that many Texas children, especially the older ones, still need a home.

Placed in state care as an infant, he remains hopeful at age 15 that the right family is out there for him. He loves socer and Chinese food, but like most children, he wants to belong. He wants a family.

Vanessa, Jonathan's case-worker at the Heart Gallery of Central Texas, will tell you that children in foster care are resilient, but they spend too long in a system that should be temporary.

Children without parents are the most vulnerable. While we may picture an infant when we think about adoption, there is a large population of older children who need a permanent home as well. causes wildfire concerns

Increased outdoor activity

with much of the state supporting heavy accumulations of grass and other vegetation thanks to early summer rains, firefighters across the state urge outdoor users to exercise caution with outdoor fire use. The probability of wildfires caused by carelessness has increased due to increased levels of outdoor activity across the state, according to a Texas Forest Service spokesman.

"The abundant vegetation could fuel dangerous wildfires if vegetation dries further," said Lacox. "More people in the outdoors mean more opportunities for carelessness with campfires, smoking materials, debris fires, and other potential wildfire ignition sources. We're already seeing wildfire activity picking up in areas missed by spotty rainfall."

The state fire prevention leader provided these fire safety suggestions for hunters and other outdoor users.

* Check with county officials to see if restrictions on outdoor burning are in effect. Cooke County is not currently under a burn ban, but stands ready to impose one should



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

Deer present unique challenges to drivers

challenges to drivers

The high season for car crashes with deer is October through December. Each year, they account for more than 150 human and nearly one and a half million deer fatalities. Experts attribute the problem to the combination of deer mating and migration habits and shortened daylight hours.

"More drivers are on the road at dawn and dusk, the very time of day when deer are most active," cautioned Ray Palermo, director of public relations for Response Insurance, a national car insurer. "A car striking a 200-pound adult deer can not only result in the death of the deer, but also incur an average of \$2,000 in damage to the vehicle."

Palermo suggested a few basic cautions for drivers.

Scan a wide swath of the roadside. Slow down when approaching a deer standing near the side of a road and be prepared. If startled, the deer can bolt onto the road and into your path. If necessary, honk your horn and flash your lights to try to scare it away.

Be alert for more deer than you may see at that moment. Where there is one deer, there are often more

School nurses urge vaccination for teens to prevent meningitis

Do you have a child between the ages of 11 and 18? If so, they are at risk for a potentially deadly bacterial infection called meningococcal disease, also referred to as meningitis.

Now that school is back in session, the National Association of School Nurses (NASN) urges parents of teens and preteens to talk to their child's school nurse or health care provider about a vaccine that can help prevent meningococcal disease. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends all preteens and teenagers 11 through 18 years of age be vaccinated against meningitis.

"During the school year, teens spend several hours aday in close contact with other students during classes and after-school sports and activities, which can put them at risk for meningitis," said Donna Mazyck, RN, MS, NCSN, president, NASN.

Preteens and teens make up 30% of the estimated 3,000 meningococcal disease cases in the United States each year and are more likely to die from the disease than any other age group. Most of these cases can be prevented through vaccination.

"Only one vaccination is usually needed to help keep teens protected through their middle, high school, and college years," said Mazyck. "If your child wasn't immunized during their back-to-school physical, there's still time to have them vaccinated to help protect them this school year."

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Meningococcal disease moves quickly and can lead to brain damage, amputation of arms and legs, hearing loss, organ failure, or even death in a matter of hours. Early symptoms of meningococcal disease may include headache, fever, stiff neck, exhaustion, vomiting, and sensitivity to light. A purple rash also may appear in later stages of the disease.

"Meningococcal disease is often mistaken for the flu because the symptoms are very similar," said Mazyck. "Even with quick treatment, many people who get meningococcal disease are disabled for life, so the best way to protect your child is through vaccination."

Giving thanks for pecans

Going without rich, sweet pecan pie this holiday may be unthinkable, so indulge.

But after the feast, keep pecans in the diet — minus a sugary coating — advises Dr. Leo Lombardini, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station pecan researcher.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that pecan should not be associated only with Thanksging or Christmas holidays.

Lombardini said. "We usually recommend just a couple of ounces per day. They are loaded with antioxidants. And they have vitamins, a lot of fiber and a lot of proteins. Oit is a very, very good food."

Pecans have gotten a bad rap, he said, because they mingle so well with ingredients of dubious health benefit and because of their fat content. But science now makes a distinction between good and bad fats. Pecans have jolly good fat, Lombardini noted.

Tis true that pecans, like many other nuts, are rich in fats. That makes a lot of people stay away from them. But this is the good category of fat. It's mainly monosaturated fatty acids. The said. For the week ending Nov. 3 the average cash feeder steer price declined from a week earlier with rising feed grain prices adding to the lower markets normally seen this time of year.

Price trends at individual auction markets were reported steady to \$8 per hundredweight lower, but with some feeders as much as \$5 higher. Fed cattle prices were also lower under pressure from declining beef values and tight packer margins.

Cash corn prices ended the week higher as rising crude oil prices increased the demand for renewable fuels and the commodities used to produce them. Cash wheat and grain sorghum prices were lower, and cotton was unchanged from a week ago. As for futures markets, corn and finished cattle futures closed the week higher, while feeder cattle, cotton, and wheat ended the week lower. Cool, dry weather persisted last
