



City seeks lower electric rates

By entering into a new agreement with TXU Energy for electrical service, the City of Muenster will garner substantial savings, about \$12,000 per year. Mayor John Pagel commented, "I think it would be in the best interest of the City to go ahead and do what they can to try to lower their rates as much as they can. What they are actually doing, if I understand it right, is if they can go out and make contract deals like this one with the City, they can go out and buy a block of electricity." By knowing that they will sell that much electricity in the next months or years, TXU can give a better deal because they can get it at a lower rate.

City Administrator Stan Endres said that the actual rate for the length of the contract would be determined by the rate that is in effect when the contract is signed.

Endres said that the annual cost of the electricity used on the City softball field is \$557 and the new rate would be \$3,000.

"Residential rates are based only on the kilowatt hour consumption," noted Mayor Pagel. "Business rates are based on a demand charge as well as an energy charge." He said that even though the lights aren't used but for an hour or two a month, they have got to have the investment of having the power available on demand. He wasn't sure why the projected charge for the ballpark would be so much higher.

The Council voted to enter into an 18 month contract.

Receiving strong support from the Council was Resolution 11-05-07 in support of an application to the Texas Historical Commission by Cooke County Commissioners for grant monies to restore the interior of the Cooke County Courthouse.

In his Administrative re-

port, Endres said that \$23,435.04 had been received from FEMA for street damage during the June flooding. An insurance check totaling just under \$15,000 was received from the insurance company for water well #6 that went down in July.

A new pickup was purchased and is in use by the City. The old pickup brought an \$800 trade-in value. Endres said that the City of Saint Jo purchased the old jet router. New maps of the City's water and sewer have arrived.

After getting the report back on the City water inspection, Endres said he sent letters to at least 10 businesses that need to show evidence of having installed backflow devices for their water systems. Endres said that the City has to show proof that it is enforcing its backflow prevention ordinance. Another problem is the fence around water well #4. The fence should be at least six feet four inches high to prevent terrorist attack. The fence is not high enough and this was listed as a minor infraction.

In other business conducted at the Nov. 5 regular meeting, the City Council:

- Unanimously agreed to cast all 32 of their votes for Bob Knauf for Cooke County Appraisal District Board of Directors.

- Voted for Paul Kirley for Greater Texoma Utility Authority Board of Directors representative.

- Proclaimed the week of Dec. 2-9 as Ben and Aggie Seyler Muenster Museum Week. Dec. 8 is celebrated as the anniversary of the founding of Muenster.

- Paid monthly bills totaling \$106,414.88. That total included the \$15,000 pickup, \$9,000 for half of the Library's annual payment, and \$5,000 for new water meters.

Muenster Lake gates swing open for limited access

After years of anticipation by many, the Muenster Lake opened to the public on Tuesday, Nov. 6. The public is now allowed to go to the Lake, but what they can actually do while there is very limited at this time.

"It's a slow process," said Bob Bauer president of the Muenster Water Board. "It takes time to work through the bureaucracy to protect ourselves. At least we can offer a little olive branch, and some can start enjoying it." He added that it took 33 years to get to this point. The Board asks continued patience on the part of the public while they take care in opening public access due to liability issues.

What is allowed are small people powered or wind powered craft, electric battery powered craft, and motor vehicles (only on the road or parking lot). All State boat-

ing regulations must be observed.

Fishing, overnight camping, and fires are not allowed at this time. The game warden has been made aware that the Lake is now open to

the public.

Not allowed at this time are horses, ATVs, dirt bikes, jet skis, hunting, water skiing, and motor boats. Fines up to \$2,000 may be imposed on those who disobey the rules.

On Sunday, Nov. 11, the east gate will be open to allow the public to participate in self-guided walking tours of the dam. The east entrance gate will be open from 1 to 3 p.m. only.

again, and 4,573 questions asked and repeated and asked again. Caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's is one of the most rewarding, frustrating, bittersweet tasks ever undertaken.

The Alzheimer's Association has a mission of being there for and with caregivers. Its Helpline (1-800-272-3900) insures a trained professional is available 24/7 to listen and respond. With the current high risk, many of us have or will experience the touch of Alzheimer's in our life and the lives of those we love. Participation in an Alzheimer's Association caregiver class is one important way to prepare for that reality or to cope better with being a caregiver currently.

During November, National Alzheimer's month, three caregiver classes are scheduled in Texoma. Saturday, Nov. 10, there will be a class at the Reba McEntire Rehabilitation Center in

Denison. A Fannin County caregiver class will be held in Bonham on Nov. 20 at the American Bank of Texas. North Texas Medical Center in Gainesville is providing classroom space for the Cooke County caregiver class on Nov. 28. Each class is from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., includes lunch, and is free for family and friends of persons with Alzheimer's or related dementias. Healthcare professionals are welcome, space permitting, for a \$25 fee. To register, call 1-800-272-3900. The classes cover actual physical care, dealing with problem behaviors, ways to communicate effectively, and how to help ensure the safety of a person with Alzheimer's. 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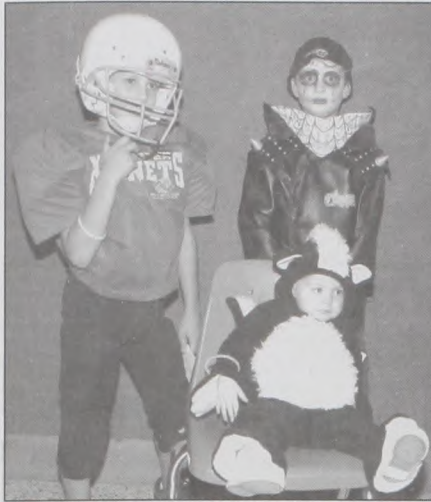

Deer present unique challenges to drivers

The high season for car crashes with deer is October through December. Each year, they account for more than 150 human and nearly one and a half million deer fatalities. Experts attribute the problem to the combination of deer mating and migration habits and shortened daylight hours.

"More drivers are on the road at dawn and dusk, the very time of day when deer are most active," cautioned Ray Palermo, director of public relations for Response Insurance, a national car insurer. "A car striking a 200-pound adult deer can not only result in the death of the deer, but also incur an average of \$2,000 in damage to the vehicle."

Palermo suggested a few basic cautions for drivers.

- Scan a wide swath of the roadside. Slow down when approaching a deer standing near the side of a road and be prepared. If startled, the deer can bolt onto the road and into your path. If necessary, honk your horn and flash your lights to try to scare it away.
- Be alert for more deer than you may see at that moment. Where there is one deer, there are often more

nearby. In many instances, it is best not to swerve around the deer, since the deer may move in the same direction. You may also inadvertently hit another vehicle, or go off onto a dangerous shoulder. Unless certain of those road factors, it is often best to simply brake and continue in your lane of traffic.

- Be particularly careful at dawn and dusk and when driving either over a hill or around a curve, where visibility is limited. Use your high beams to give you a greater area of visibility and allow you to see the deer's eyes sooner.
- Deer whistles or ultrasonic deer avoidance systems attached to vehicles have never been proven to work by independent studies and may give drivers a false sense of security.
- Take deer crossing signs seriously, particularly those installed specifically for this time of year. Be particularly cautious in wooded and agricultural areas where there is little distance between the road and the woods.

School nurses urge vaccination for teens to prevent meningitis

Do you have a child between the ages of 11 and 18? If so, they are at risk for a potentially deadly bacterial infection called meningococcal disease, also referred to as meningitis.

Now that school is back in session, the National Association of School Nurses (NASN) urges parents of teens and preteens to talk to their child's school nurse or health care provider about a vaccine that can help prevent meningococcal disease. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends all preteens and teenagers 11 through 18 years of age be vaccinated against meningitis.

"During the school year, teens spend several hours a day in close contact with other students during classes and after-school sports and activities, which can put them at risk for meningitis," said Donna Mazyck, RN, MS, NCSN, president, NASN.

Preteens and teens make up 30% of the estimated 3,000 meningococcal disease cases in the United States each year and are more likely to die from the disease than any other age group. Most of these cases can be prevented through vaccination.

"Only one vaccination is usually needed to help keep teens protected through their middle, high school, and college years," said Mazyck. "If your child wasn't immunized during their back-to-school physical, there's still time to have them vaccinated to help protect them this school year."

Meningococcal disease moves quickly and can lead to brain damage, amputation of arms and legs, hearing loss, organ failure, or even death in a matter of hours. Early symptoms of meningococcal disease may include headache, fever, stiff neck, exhaustion, vomiting, and sensitivity to light. A purple rash also may appear in later stages of the disease.

"Meningococcal disease is often mistaken for the flu because the symptoms are very similar," said Mazyck. "Even with quick treatment, many people who get meningococcal disease are disabled for life, so the best way to protect your child is through vaccination."

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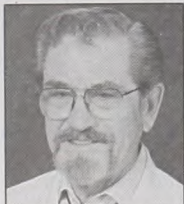
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Young saints march into S H Church

Covenant hands Tigers 34-21 loss

The Sacred Heart Tigers bit the road last Friday night for their second District game of the season. After sitting idle the past two weeks, the Tigers tangled with Colleyville Covenant. Sacred Heart took an early lead, then allowed the Cougars a 21-14 advantage at halftime. The first four possessions of the game ended with touchdowns. The 2nd half saw Colleyville score twice to the Tigers once, for a 34-21 final.

"It was a very hard fought game," noted Tiger Coach Charles Boles. "We had the opportunities to do good things, but didn't capitalize on them. Hopefully, this week we can."

Colt Spruill returned the opening kick 28 yards. From the 38, the Tigers mixed runs by Nolan Hartman and Josh Yosten, and passes to Spruill and Sam Sparkman to get to the 14 yard line. With 8:35 on the clock, Sparkman, on a reverse, scored the first 6 points. Hartman added the extra kick for a 7-0 score.

The Cougars moved 67 yards in eight plays to find the end zone. A fumbled snap on the PAT gave a 7-6 score with 6:37 remaining in the 1st period.

A good return by Spruill and a flag quickly moved the Tigers to midfield. A Hartman to Sparkman pass picked up 16 yards. Hartman ran twice and Yosten three times, including the final 5 yards for a touchdown. With 4 minutes still on the clock, Hartman's PAT gave Sacred Heart a 14-

6 lead.

Colleyville carried the ball into the 2nd quarter and scored 4 seconds into the period. The PAT tied the game 14-14.

The teams exchanged possessions, with the Cougars getting to the Tiger 3 yard line before running out of downs. Sacred Heart moved the ball on the ground with runs by Hartman and Yosten, getting to the 13 yard line and stopped. Covenant then moved back into Tiger territory and took the lead with no time on the clock, for a 21-14 lead at halftime.

The 3rd quarter began with the Cougars on their 7 yard line. Using half the clock time, Covenant marched down field, taking 17 plays to find paydirt. The PAT kick put the Cougars ahead 28-14.

The Tigers fought back. Runs by Hartman and Yosten, and Hartman passes to Spruill and Sparkman moved Sacred Heart to the Cougar 14. An interception stopped the drive and allowed Colleyville to carry the ball into the final quarter.

The teams again exchanged punts, with the Tigers' next drive starting on their 11 yard line. Six plays later, Hartman found Colby Richey for a 58 yard touchdown pass play. The PAT kick was good for a 28-21 score with 5:40 remaining in the game.

Colby Richey stopped a scoring threat with an interception. Seven plays later, the Tigers lost the ball when the

Cougars picked off a pass. From the 28, Covenant covered the area in five plays, scoring on a 16 yard pass with 1:14 on the clock to extend their lead to 34-21.

An onside kick was covered by Sacred Heart. After getting a 1st down, incomplete passes turned the ball over to the Cougars who killed out the last seconds of the game to take the win.

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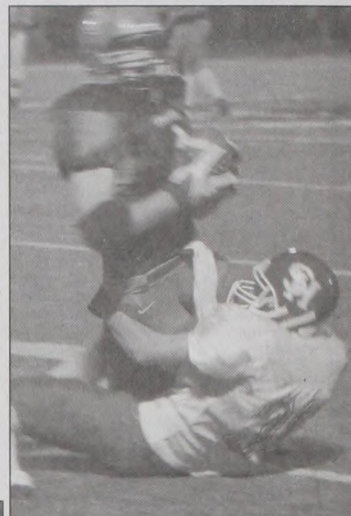
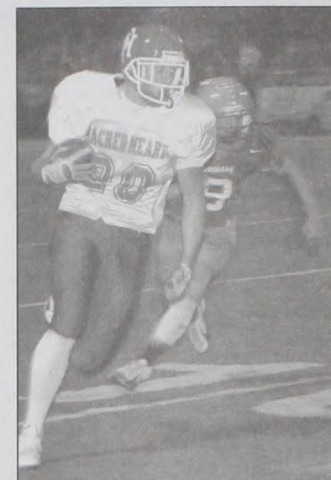
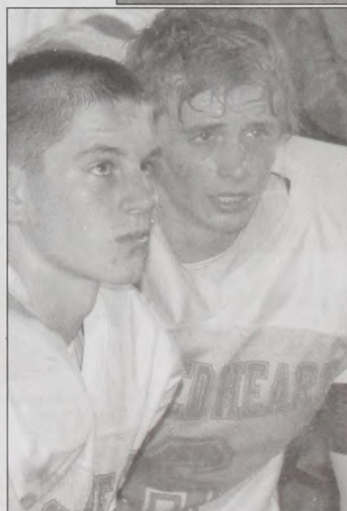

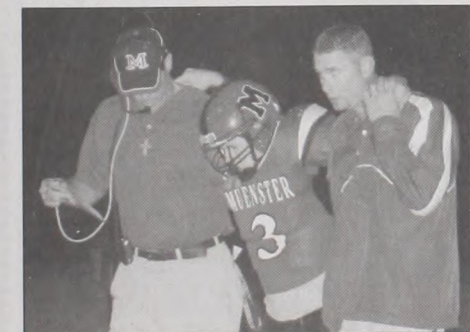
