ABBA Women's Center and resale store have new facility

ABBA Women's Center (All Babies Born Alive) is currently open and at their new location on the corner of 214 N. Taylor and E. Broadway in the former Broadway Church of Christ building. Second Chance Resale Store, which is owned and operated by ABBA, is currently under construction on the same campus and will be opening later in June. Second Chance Resale Store is currently open at 212 E. California St. and will be promoting a 50% off moving sale beginning June 16.

"We are very blessed by the community support we have

received. Our organization has grown extensively beyond our community borders and we are reaching clients needing assistance from Cooke, Denton, Grayson, and Montague counties, as well as clients from southern Oklahoma. Our statistics have increased from 2005 with 800 clients served to the 1,600 we served in 2006. In 2007 our clientele increased to 2,744, and at the close of May we have already served close to 1,700 area families in need. We have become a North Texas and Southern Oklahoma regional pregnancy resource and family crisis cen-

ter," said Executive Director Sandee Feveryesen.

"ABBA Women's Center has experienced such phenomenal growth, our 3,000 square foot facility could not support the traffic coming through our center. Our new location is a 10,000 square foot spacious facility which will house our offices, pro life pregnancy resource, and family crisis center, and our resale store with ample parking, land for projected growth, and is quickly access-

IESI seeks rate increase in City

Muenster city councilmen, who are also business owners, were not happy with the proposed rate increase being sought by IESI Tx. Corporation. IESI has a contract with the City to pick up its residential and commercial trash. The current one-year contract expires in October.

Bob Kneis, senior area manager for IESI, spoke to the City Council at the Monday, June 2 meeting. IESI had presented a written document with a proposed annual rate increase for solid waste services. The formula Kneis used to determine prices was different from other years and he spent some time explaining the differences.

Kneis said that currently they are only generating about \$80 an hour on commercial runs in Muenster. "We need to generate \$130 an hour to actually make a payback on the equipment that we have for just these operating hours," he said. "We're way below market prices on the commercial and that's why the significant increase on commercial."

Kneis conceded that commercial rates would go up dramatically. He said he would understand if they decided to seek bids from other companies, but feels his prices are competitive. "I can't operate these commercials routes for what I'm doing now," he stated. "It is just

a business decision that I have to make. I want to be here for a long time, but I have to do something to offset the loss that we have in this contract. It's a negative payback."

Some of the increases in expenses he pointed out were container costs, labor and fuel costs, repair and maintenance on units. Alderman Jack Flusche questioned the container cost factor since he didn't think that Muenster had gotten any new containers or had old ones repaired.

According to Kneis, the commercial customer has options that the residential customer does not. They can reduce to a smaller container, change from twice weekly pickups to once weekly, etc.

Using Lindsay as an example, Kneis said that commercial customers in Lindsay pay \$61.45 for a two yard container with once a week pickup, \$82.80 for a three yard, and \$111 for a four yard and once a week pickup. He said they were over and above what is proposed for Muenster.

Kneis said that IESI can do 10 lifts of dumpsters in an hour as compared to picking up trash at 40 residences an hour.

Mayor John Pagel commented, "Not only do I think that this proposal is bold, but I think it is useless. I think it is asking for more than what is necessary. I look at this as

being about a 90-10 ratio community. Ninety percent of the revenue being residential and 10% being commercial. You're asking for a 10% increase in residential and you're asking for a 100% increase in commercial." Pagel also questioned the new formula presented by Kneis.

Ken Robinson celebrated the Mass. Burial followed in Sacred Heart Cemetery under the direction of McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster. Calvin died Saturday, May 24, 2008 near Seattle, Washington.

Born Aug. 5, 1959, in Muenster, the third of the three children of Ray and Billie Otto, Calvin grew up in Muenster, attended elementary school at Sacred Heart, and then graduated from Muenster Public School in 1977. He attended North Texas State University in Denton where he received a Bachelors degree in Business in 1982.

Calvin's work career began with construction work with his stepfather Doc Reinart in the Fort Worth area. He stayed in the DFW area, working part-time until graduating from college. His first job then was in Corpus Christi, later returning to the DFW area to work.

Calvin, in 1995, took a job in Seattle, Washington, working for the Ellis Don Construction Company at the University of Washington and then for Lease Crutcher Lewis (LCL) as a project engineer in the Seattle-Tacoma area, where he completed numerous projects. Calvin was an employee of LCL at the time of his sudden death.

Calvin was an avid NASCAR fan, a true lover of the outdoors, and really enjoyed his many friends.

Survivors are his mother and stepfather Lillian "Billie" and Vincent "Doc" Reinart of Muenster; his sister Cheryl Otto Felderhoff and husband John of Garland; brother Doug Otto and wife Helen of Arlington; nieces Leslie Dominie and husband Dusty of Sachse, and Leslie Baggett and family of Arlington; nephews Ray Felderhoff and wife Elizabeth and their children of Everett, Washington and Rob Shoemaker and wife Christene and family of Arlington.

He was preceded in death by his father, Raymond Bernard Otto on Aug. 18, 1967.

You're going to hear me call him Calvin, even though to the rest of you he was CO. Lou Heers was over the other night and did CO's high school football cheer for us - Go CO go CO go CO go... Tom Flusche remembered Calvin from his football playing days... commented on what a good player Calvin was, always in the right spot."

"After high school, Calvin attended what was still North Texas State University where he graduated with a BBA. What you may not know is that Calvin also got his doctorate... from the Doc Reinart School of Construction. Calvin's first job in construction was with his stepdad, Doc, at the age of 17. He worked as a laborer and carpenter helper on the Tandy Center in Fort Worth... "Calvin continued to work part time with Doc until he graduated from college in 1982. His first job after receiving his degree was in Corpus Christi... He eventually worked his way back to the Metroplex where he worked for various construction companies until 1995. That's when CO decided he wanted to see the country. He moved to the Seattle area where... he fell in love with the climate in the Northwest, and about a year ago, bought a house... He was happy and content with his life."

Endres noted that it would take a lot of good management on the part of business owners to have room to get all of the solid waste into a smaller container. Kneis said that there is no commercial customer using a two yard container. Three is the smallest. Kneis asked, "Can they save one yard a week?"

Endres asked about the possibility of recycling being introduced into the City. Alderman Jewel Otto noted that there are local people who want a recycling program and that Keep Muenster Beautiful would support it. Kneis said that they could supply roll off bins, but there would be a cost involved. Items for recycle include newspapers, cardboard, junk mail, aluminum, metal cans, green and brown glass, and plastics 1-7.

In Decatur where a recycling program was recently initiated, Kneis said that Decatur raised the cost to each residential customer by \$3.68 a home. "They have a big support; people are willing to pay," Kneis noted. He said that the community would

have to be behind a recycling program.

Alderman Greg Bohl asked about increasing the residential in October, but giving the commercial customers six months to adjust to the increase. City Secretary Micallee Matson said that her billing program couldn't handle that and it would be a problem.

The Council did not come to a decision on the proposed rate increase. Flusche and Endres were appointed by the Mayor to meet with Kneis to study the situation and come up with suggestions to be presented at the July 7 meeting.

Pat Stelzer took the oath of office at the beginning of the meeting. He replaces Robert Dale Walterscheid who did not seek a second term.

Police Chief Bob Stovall presented two proposals for a new camera for a police car. It is needed to replace a unit that is no longer usable. Stovall said that the Senate Bill requires all vehicles used for traffic stops, etc. to have a camera recording the stop. The first two cameras were paid for by a grant in 2002.

The choice was between a VHS and a DVD. The current cameras are VHS and the pictures are not nearly as clear as the digital cameras. Cost of the VHS is \$2,800 and the DVD is \$5,000. The VHS has a box that is carried in the car trunk and the DVD is totally contained in a unit mounted on the rearview mirror.

Bohl noted that he felt that the digital unit made more sense and that the VHS would soon be outdated. The vote was for 4-0 to purchase the digital camera unit.

The Muenster Police Department also requested purchase of a portable breathalyzer. At this time, they have to call the highway patrol to come and perform the test when needed. The unit cost is \$399. This purchase was also approved 4-0 by the Council.

In other business, the City Council:

- Approved bills totaling \$81,362.52.
- Assigned commissioner places. All retained their place and Stelzer agreed to serve in the vacant place as Police and Fire Commissioner.

In other business, the Board:

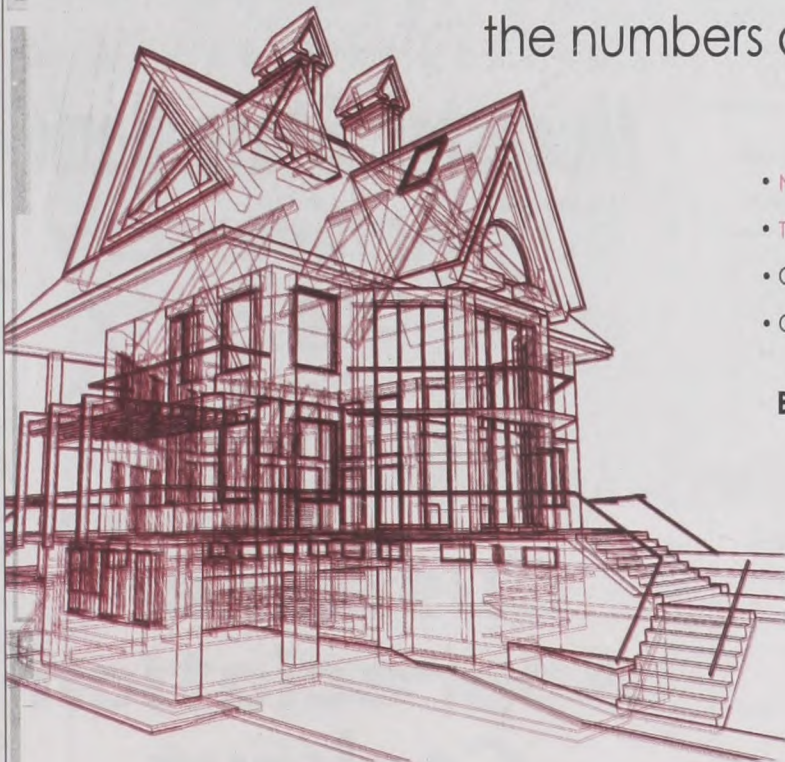
- Approved Bad Debt Write Offs in the amount of \$61,577.01.

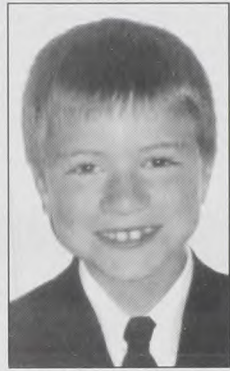

Study discusses farm impact of increased crude oil prices

According to a new University of Illinois study, between 2003 and 2007, the majority of corn and soybean production cost increases will be attributed to crude oil price increases.

"If crude oil prices continue to rise, production costs for corn and soybeans likely will continue to rise," said Gary Schnitkey, a U of I Extension farm financial management specialist. "Rising energy costs have brought into existence an era of high production costs for corn and soybeans. These higher costs necessitate higher corn and soybean prices for farmers to be profitable."

"Crude oil prices, corn production costs, and soybean production costs have tended to move together over time," Schnitkey explained. "Recently, for example, crude oil prices and production costs have increased dramatically. Between 2003 and 2007, crude oil prices increased by \$39 per barrel—a 138% increase, corn production costs in central Illinois on high-productivity farmland increased by \$100 per acre—a 42% increase, and soybean costs increased by \$45 per acre—a 28% increase."

Looking at the relationship among these prices since 1972, Schnitkey found that each \$1 increase in crude oil

price increases corn production costs by \$1.51 per acre and increases soybean production costs by 90 cents per acre.

"Between 2003 and 2007, crude oil price increases accounted for 58% of corn cost increases and 79% of soybean cost increases," said Schnitkey. "From 1972 through 2007, inflation accounted for an average yearly increase in production costs of \$3.78 per acre for corn and \$4.26 per acre for soybeans. Due to crude oil price increases, corn costs in 2008 are expected to be \$48 per acre higher than in 2007 and soybean costs are expected to increase by \$29 per acre. The report also notes that model results can be used to predict corn and soybean costs based on anticipated crude oil prices. "Fore-

casts of costs should be viewed with caution as oil prices are outside the range of prices used to estimate the model," Schnitkey said. "Often, poor forecasting experience occurs in these cases. Given this caution, our model suggests that large increases in crude oil prices could lead to significantly higher corn and soybean costs."

"For example, a \$120 crude oil price implies a \$78 increase in corn costs, a 23% increase over 2007 corn costs. Soybean costs would increase by \$47 per acre given the \$120 crude oil price, a 23% increase over the 2007 soybean costs. A \$150 crude oil price results in a \$124 corn cost increase per acre—36% over 2007—and a \$74 per acre soybean cost increase—36% over 2007 levels," adds Schnitkey.

USDA announces deadline for 2005-07 LCP and LIP sign up

John Fuston, State director of U. S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Texas, reminds Texas livestock producers they have until July 18, 2008, to enroll in the 2005-07 Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) and Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). Signup began on Sept. 10, 2007, for the two programs that provide aid to livestock producers who suffered eligible live-

stock or livestock feed losses between Jan. 1, 2005, and Dec. 31, 2007, because of a natural disaster.

"The deadline to enroll in the 2005-07 Livestock Compensation Program and Livestock Indemnity Program is rapidly approaching," said Fuston. "I encourage all eligible producers to enroll soon because sign-up ends on July 18, 2008."

LIP provides payments to

eligible livestock owners and contract growers who incurred the death of livestock because of a natural disaster. LCP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and cash lessees who suffered feed losses or increased feed costs because of a natural disaster.

Soil test indicators

Soil tests can be used to estimate the kinds and amounts of soil nutrients available to plants. They also can be used as aids in determining fertilizer needs. Properly conducted soil sampling and testing can be cost-effective indicators of the types and amounts of fertilizer and lime needed to improve crop yield.

The effects of adding a fertilizer often depend on the level of nutrients already present in the soil. If a soil is very low in a particular nutrient, yield will probably be increased if that nutrient is added. By comparison, if the soil has high initial nutrient

levels, fertilization will result in little, if any, increase in yield. This is true for ornamental purposes, vegetable gardens, or for agricultural crops. The difference is in the way we define yield, one may refer to measurable production, the other may simply refer to visual satisfaction. With either definition, plant health will be improved by meeting the fertility requirements of what is being grown.

There are three steps involved in obtaining a soil test: 1) obtain sample bags and instructions; 2) collect composite samples; and 3) select the proper test, and complete the information sheet and mail to the Soil, Water, and Forage Testing Laboratory at 345 Heep Center, College Station, TX 77843-2474.

Collect composite samples

The objective in sampling is to obtain small composited samples of soil that represent the entire area to be fertilized or limed. This composited sample is comprised of 10 to 15 cores or slices of soil from the sampling area.

Fields or tracts of land with differences in past cropping, fertilization, liming, soil types, or land use will require separate sampling. The identification of each tract should be done and records should be used each time samples are

collected in order to compare results over time.

Number of samples

In fields up to 40 acres, collect at least 10 to 15 cores or slices of soil per composite sample. Composite samples should represent the smallest acreage that can be fertilized or limed independently of the remaining field or acreage. In small gardens and lawns, five to six cores may be adequate. Because soils are variable, it is important to obtain enough sub-sample to ensure a representative composite sample. A greater number of cores make the sample more representative of the field. Unusual problem areas should be omitted or sampled separately. To properly diagnose the causes of poor crop production, collect separate composite samples from the good and poor growth areas.

Depth of sample

There are reasons to consider sampling at various depths, but traditionally soil samples are collected to a depth of six inches. This depth is measured from the soil surface after non-decomposed plant materials are pushed aside. This sampling depth can be significantly altered based on tillage or fertilization practices.

Several different soil tests are available at the Extension Soil, Water, and Forage Testing Laboratory. These

include tests for routine nutrients, micronutrients, boron, detailed salinity, lime requirement, texture, and organic matter. After taking the soil sample, select the appropriate test to obtain the desired information.

The routine test is the most common test. It determines the soil pH, salinity, nitrates (NO₃-N), and levels of the primary nutrients (P - phosphorus, K - potassium, Ca - calcium, Mg - magnesium, Na - sodium, and S - sulfur) available to plants. The routine test will provide the basic N-P-K fertilizer recommendation for selected crops. This test meets most application needs. Use the other tests when more specific information is required.
