



In tests to determine the relative efficiency of appliances and lights when connected to adequate and inadequate wiring systems, the specialists found that electrical efficiency can be stepped up from 20 to 34 per cent.

Several precautions must be practiced by DDT users. When spraying vegetable and truck crops, such as cabbage or sugar beets, the crop residue should not be fed to livestock. For stored grain insects, a three percent dust may be used, if the grain is not to be used for food. In spite of extensive investigation, the use of DDT on fruits is not yet recommended. It should never be used on animals in an oil solution. With DDT, as with any other insecticide, the effect on the insect is only half the story. It can be poisonous and harmful to animals and human beings, and it does kill some useful insects, at the same time allowing other pests, such as the red spider, certain aphids, and mite to in-

The 1944 law authorizing the watershed flood control program in the Trinity provides that 1 percent of the purchase price shall be paid annually to the county in which land is acquired, and that no land shall be acquired by the government under

By acquiring 236,000 additional acres in the critical area, and by carrying out a comprehensive watershed treatment program on all purchased land, the control of erosion, run-off, and sedimenta-tion can be achieved. Furthermore, county governments will re-ceive financial support from lands which are now tax-delinq-uent, and farmers living near purchased areas can use the land to supplement their holdings.

LABOR UNIONS RUN A SUPER GOVERNMENT IN UNITED STATES

Labor unions have become "a super-government" in America, Robert R. Wason, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, declared before the annual session of the Chautauqua Institu-tion in Chautauqua, N. Y.

"None of us regrets labor's gains," Mr. Wason said, "but all of us are paying for concessions sold to labor in exchange for votes by a subservient government The costs are yet to be paid for

by all Americans, including labor. All wage increases granted labor unions without equivalent production of goods is inflation, the manufacturers' head said,

"The government's decision to take the OPA 'ceilings' off wages and leave them on the goods into which wages enter. is an obvious 'sell-out' to labor unions for votes, at the expense of all the people. The manufacturer is at mercy of wages in determining

Greatly increased accuracy in future bombing attacks is forecast in this remarkable, just-released photo of guided bombs at work. Taken from 10,000 ft. during a test raid on a Jap-held bridge late in the war, it shows three guided bombs, called Azon, bursting squarely on target. To left, standard bombs simultaneously released explode wide of bridge; and scores of craters testify to failure of previous standard bomb attacks. Developed by Gulf Oil research for the Air Forces, Azon bombs are steered by the bombardier through radios in their tails right onto the target.
