County residents complain about uncontrolled canines

Stray dogs in rural areas of
Cooke County were the topic
of the Public Comment section of the Cooke County
Commissioners Court agenda
on Tuesday, May 27. Two residents spoke out, but reportedly more have complained to edly more have complained to their commissioners about the problem of stray, dumped,

edly more have complained to their commissioners about the problem of stray, dumped, or roaming dogs.

Margie Baugh of Moss Lake and Levi Norwood of Gainesville expressed concerns over the dogs. Baugh brought a copy of the State laws on dogs. She asked that the County adopt laws regarding dogs.

Norwood spoke of the dangers and troubles being experienced in rural areas due to stray and roaming dogs that there is no place for in the County. "No person should be afraid to be out for fear of being bitten by an unfamiliar or roaming, stray dog," she remarked. "I urge you to look out for our County citizens by adopting leash laws...our County citizens desire as much right as our city citizens to feel safe."

Dumped dogs were also a concern of Norwood's. She said that a County animal control officer and a place to bring unwanted animals are needed in Cooke County. Norwood said she's heard tales from people all over the County who have trouble with stray dogs.

Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess commented, "I can't say that we will have an animal control officer, but I'm glad they brought it up now before we get into budget time. Maybe we can look at

getting some sort of solution to that problem. It is getting to be a real problem. Some more people have come talked to me about it."

Precinct #2 Commissioner Steve Key noted that his precinct has a problem also, as a people bring the animals from Denton County and dump them in Precinct #2 just across the County line. Commissioner Gary Hollowell suggested they have a discussion on possible options to help resolve the problem.

Fr. Andrew Wewer, OSB 1914 - 2008

Father Andrew Wewer, OSB, monk of Subiaco Abbey, Subiaco, Arkansas, strengthened with the Sacraments and the prayers of his brother monks, died on April 17, 2008. At the time of his death, Father Andrew was 94 years old. He had been a professed monk for 69 years and a priest for 64 years.

Father Andrew died peacefully in the early morning hours of April 17. He had resided in the Abbey Health Center the last 11 years. He was born Jan. 3, 1914 to Joe and Anna Schwierjohann Wewer in Morrison Bluff, Arkansas, and was baptized Emil John Paul.

Emil received his elementary education at Sts. Peter and Paul School in his home-

Emil received his elementary education at Sts. Peter and Paul School in his hometown. Two years of high school followed, one in Scranton and one in Van Buren, Arkansas. He later entered Subiaco Academy, graduating as valedictorian of the class of 1936.
Emil Wewer professed his vows as a monk of Subiaco Abbey on Sept. 15, 1938, receiving the name Andrew. He was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Albert L. Fletcher at the Cathedral of Saint Andrew in Little Rock on June 3, 1943.

Father Andrew taught
Latin, German, and mathematics at Subiaco Academy
from 1943-48. He then went
to Corpus Christi, Texas,
where he was a faculty member of Corpus Christi Academy until 1950. He then began his work in pastoral ministry. In Arkansas he was pastor of Sts. Peter & Paul
Church in his home parish at
Morrison Bluff from 1950-55.
He was chaplain at St.
Hildegard Hospital in
Clarksville, Arkansas, from
1955-58.
For the school year of 195859, Father Andrew was again
a faculty member of Subiaco
Academy, as well as commuting neater to St. Sublastice

os, rather Andrew was again a faculty member of Subiaco Academy, as well as commuting pastor to St. Scholastica Church in Shoal Creek, Arkansas. He then became pastor of St. Benedict Church in Subiaco until 1962. He was assistant pastor at St. Edward Church in Little Rock from 1962-63, and pastor of Holy Redeemer Church in Clarksville, Arkansas, from 1963-64. Father Andrew returned to pastoral ministry in Texas, serving as assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster from 1964-70, and as assistant pastor of St. Mary Church in Fort Worth from 1970-78.

He then returned to the ab-

bey where he continued his priestly ministry as a frequent weekend substitute, and for a year served as the retreatmaster at Coury House. He was also a regular confessor for many in the community.

Father Andrew was an artistic craftsman who enjoyed working in the carpenter

Father Andrew was an artistic craftsman who enjoyed working in the carpenter shop, tackling almost any job requiring technical ability. He was adept at woodcarving, furniture making, and had an innate sense of how to fix moving parts on everything from clocks to organ stops. No project seemed impossible for his multifaceted talent.

For a time he was a licensed ham radio operator and he enjoyed fishing excursions. But games that challenged the mind were his specialty: crossword puzzles and cryptograms were soon deciphered, and then he would spend his time patiently working on jigsaw puzzles ranging from 100 to 6000 pieces. The more complex the puzzle, the more determined effort Father Andrew put into the project.

He was an avid sports fan,

Miller asked the graduates

Miller asked the graduates to take two lessons with them. "Number one, trust in God and in yourself, and secondly, strive always to make those closest to you most proud, and in this order, God, your family, your parish, and your school. You now become a great part of our hope for the future."





TDA awards \$1 million to remove and control Tex. feral hogs

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) recently awarded Texas AgriLife Extension Service \$1 million for the agency's new Texas Feral Hog Control Program: Moving Towards A Long-Term Abatement Strategy.

Texas is home to more than two million feral hogs, the largest feral hog population in the U.S., and their numbers continue to increase due to high reproductive potential and the lack of natural predators.

Feral hogs wreak havoc on property, livestock, crops, and pastures across the state, and frustrate landowners because of their destructive nature. In fact the Extension Service estimates the statewide annual economic damage caused by fieral hogs is close to \$52 million.

The 80th Legislature directed this \$1,000,000 in funding following a \$500,000 pilot project funded by the 79th Legislature. The pilot program was administered by Texas AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Tech University through a TDA grant in 2006-07 and did provide technical assistance to landowners at three sites, and promote educational events for other landowners statewide. The pilot project succeeded in removing more than 3,000 feral hogs, saving landowners/agricultural producers nearly \$3 million in losses.
