It was decision day for members of the Cooke County Groundwater Conservation Committee appointed by Cooke County Commissioners Court. It is a 12 member committee with a representative from each of the 11 water purveyors (municipal and private) in the County and one representative for the rural landowners. They met Tuesday, Feb. 17 and were asked to rank four choices as to the type

of district they felt Cooke County should seek as its PGMA (Priority Groundwater Management Area).

AgriLife Extension Agent Wayne Becker chaired the committee. Greg Bohl was Muenster's voting member and Kenny Klement represented rural landowners. Public comments were accepted at the start of the meeting. Board members were allowed to make their views known.

After ballots with comments were collected, Becker remarked, "Our purpose as a committee is fulfilled." Their purpose was to study the situation and make recommendations to Commissioners Court.

Becker said that he will have a full report ready for the Court meeting on Monday, Feb. 23 at 10 a.m.

"The meeting was very contentious," Becker remarked. "Words were exchanged among Board members and the crowd."



Vietnam veterans remember Fleitman



Three veterans of the Vietnam War recently decided to visit the grave of a fallen friend and comrade. From left, Weldon Vogel, David Fisher, and Walter Lutkenhaus visited the Shiloh Cemetery north of Muenster where Glenn Fleitman is buried. Fleitman served in Vietnam beginning in January 1969. On Feb. 23, 1969, he suffered an injury to his left leg from a metal fragment. This occurred while his unit engaged a hostile force in combat. According to an article in the Muenster Enterprise, in May, Fleitman was promoted to staff sergeant with Company. D, 1st Battalion, 28th infantry, 1st division. Another article in the Enterprise reported, "Staff Sgt. Glenn Ray Fleitman died Jume 8, 1969, as the result of wounds received in action on the same date. He was wounded while in combat operation when a hostile force was encountered. He was admitted to a military facility in Vietnam and expired shortly thereafter." Fleitman, Vogel, Fisher, and Lutkenhaus were all in Vietnam during the same period and all grew up in Muenster. According to Lutkenhaus, Cooke County lost a total of six residents in Vietnam. 

The Glance n' Go method of greenbug scouting was developed to address the decision to spray. When using this method, the person scouting the crop stops in five locations as they walk across the field. In each location they check for the presence of aphids on three tillers of wheat.

If a single aphid is found on a tiller, it is considered infected. The producer must mark the results of each check on a sample form that is specially designed to consider the price of wheat and chemical treatment (there is a separate form for spring and for fall due to the difference in the way aphids are normally distributed in the field in the various seasons). After the first five checks, the producer adds up the results of their scouting. The form will then advise one Glance n' Go greenbug detection
Greenbugs have once again begun to make their presence known here in Cooke County. As the small grains crop starts actively growing, the presence of these unwanted aphids can stress the crop and signal economic losses.

It is not difficult to detect the presence of greenbugs, but it is difficult to know when chemical control measures are warranted.
Researchers have established that it takes three greenbugs per tiller to cause this economic loss, but how does one correctly estimate the presence of three greenbugs per tiller? Aphids are

of three options: No action, keep scouting, or spray.
Often, in heavy infestations, a seasoned farmer will not need the use of a scouting technique to help determine the economic threshold for chemical treatment. However, in tough economic times, with increased environmental concerns and limitations on both time and money for the producer, the use of the Glance n' Go scouting procedure may be something farmers want to try. Forms can be obtained from the Extension office or can be faxed or emailed to producers on their request.

Meat Export Federation (USMEF). "We're exporting 25% of the pork that's produced in this country right now, and about 12% of the beef that's produced in this country." Seng says. "We're going to have to escalate those numbers, because if we're not consuming it to that degree at home, people need to be consuming it internationally. That's the outlet."
