While featuring livestock, the auction will also handle other commodities, Felker said. Farm machinery, tools, household items or anything else, will be sold before 1:30, when the livestock auction is scheduled to begin.





Austin, Texas, —. The State Department of Health has just issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, as the number of cases usually increases during the fall months. The majority of deaths from this disease occur from October through February.

Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may contract it, but children under 15 years are especially apt to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under 5 years, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, warns mothers to "not let your children take any chances with scarlet fever. Call the doctor as soon as the first symptoms appear."
