

Muenster KCs recognize Laneta Martin as 2008 Good Neighbor

Laneta Martin received recognition from the Muenster Knights of Columbus on Sunday, Oct. 12 when they named her as the 2008 recipient of the Good Neighbor Award. Grand Knight Adam Schniederjan made the announcement after the

8 a.m. Mass in Sacred Heart Church. Many of her relatives were present to share the moment with her. It was a surprise for Laneta, since she was told that her husband Ernest was receiving an award.

Schniederjan told the congregation that almost 99

years ago back on Jan. 16, 1910, the 45 charter members who formed Muenster's Council began a local tradition of faithful service to God, Church, and to their community.

He said, "Guided by the four core principles of charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism, these founding members strove to overcome the hardships of their time. Today it is what we live by. Muenster has always been blessed with energetic and enthusiastic members who give generously of their time in promoting the Council's welfare by their untiring and faithful service."

In observance of Columbus Day, the Knights of Columbus hold their Good Neighbor and Awards Breakfast. Every year, they honor someone of another faith in the ecumenical spirit of encouraging greater harmony among creeds. According to Schniederjan, the award is presented to someone whose pursuit of excellence is exemplified by his or her love of God and the love of his or her fellow men, whose generous contributions and extensive services to the community are performed in a gentle, quiet manner, shunning all publicity.

After Mass, the KCs hosted a breakfast in the KC Hall and formally presented the award to Laneta. Schniederjan commented on Laneta, "Laneta Martin has been working with the children of our community and at Sacred Heart Catholic School for 23 years as a teacher's aid, helping to form young minds and hearts in ways of love and care. Laneta for the most part, has dedicated her life to the Catholic Church, even though she is not Catholic herself. She has raised

Keep Muenster Beautiful scores eleven areas for litter index

Members of Keep Muenster Beautiful conducted a litter index study of the town on Saturday, Oct. 11. The study is conducted annually to track litter trends in the area. The results of the study are sent to Keep Texas Beautiful and Keep America Beautiful to help these organizations assess the progress of their litter awareness/prevention programs, and to develop future litter prevention strategies.

The town is divided into 11 subdivisions, and the areas are scored individually by numerous scorers and then an average is taken. The scores are: 1 - No litter, 2 - Slightly littered, 3 - Littered, and 4 - Extremely littered. Scorers watch a video to train them on how to assess litter amounts according to this scale. For the third year in a row Muenster's scores are going down. In 2006, the City average was 1.89, 2007 was 1.48, and this year 1.47. Muenster has no areas that are in the 3 and 4 range.

Residents of Muenster do a wonderful job of caring for their yards and neighborhoods. The town is litter free, and there are no graffiti or dump sites. Many of the businesses have done a lot of property improvements. Overall, Muenster is a beautiful community in which to work and live.

The study did note 13 empty lots in town with weeds knee high that need to be mowed, and six houses that also had high grasses that needed mowing. Several businesses that have large items on their lots, could or-

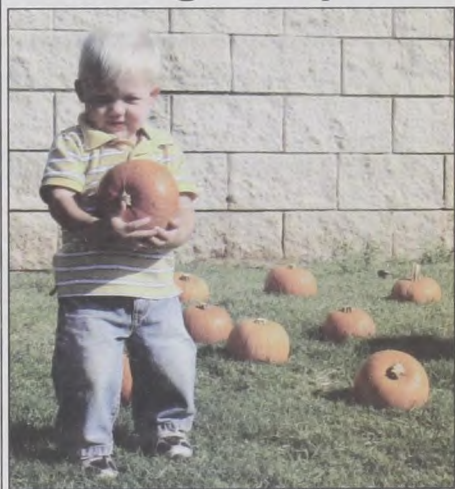
ganize these items in a way that looked less cluttered and get rid of unwanted items to improve the look of the town. A great improvement was noted on the Miller lot! One business in town has several broken windows that need to be replaced.

The most litter is found on the exit routes from the city: East and West bound Highway 82, and South bound 373. Most of this litter is fast food wraps from local restau-

rants and service stations.

Ideas are needed to help us to reduce this type of litter. It is Muenster teenagers who are having to clean up most of this litter since these areas are adopted by Sacred Heart, MISD, the Boy Scouts, and Fischer's Meat Market. Let's help them by properly disposing of trash, and coming up with ways to encourage and educate those who travel through Muenster to do the same.

Johnson and Klement vie for Precinct #4 Commissioner seat

The position of Precinct #4 Commissioner, left vacant after the death of Virgil Hess in July, will be filled with at the Nov. 4 General Election. The Republican Party selected Leon Klement as its candidate for that position and the Democratic Party approved Ed Johnson as its candidate. The person elected on Nov. 4 will be sworn in and begin serving as Precinct #4 commissioner as soon as the votes are canvassed by Commissioners Court in early November. He will serve out the remainder of the four-year term begun by Commissioner Hess in January 2007.

Klement is a resident of the Muenster area. He and his wife Christi have been married for 34 years. They have three children. Andrea is a prosecutor in Tarrant

County. Elliot is a dairy farmer with Ed Klement & Sons. Bridgette teaches elementary art in Mesquite and her fiancé R.J. Carroll is an aerospace engineer with Lockheed Martin.

Besides operating his dairy farm, the Klements own and operate Christi's Jewelry in Muenster. Johnson resides in Sivells Bend. He is the father of four sons. Three of them graduated from Muenster High School, and one is now attending Lindsay High School. All attended school at Sivells Bend.

Johnson works for Cooke County Precinct #4's road and bridge crew. Also, he is a rancher and does custom hay baling. Before signing on to work for the County, he served as a ranch manager and foreman, an occupation he began in 1989. Prior to his move to Cooke County,

Johnson worked for 15 years for the Knox County Illinois Highway Department as an operating engineer. He grew up on a farm in Illinois.

Each candidate was given a set of written questions. Those questions and their

responses follow. **What do you feel are the duties of commissioner, and which is the most important?**

Johnson - Adopt tax rate, set budget for all county departments, supervise county

facilities, economic development, road and bridge maintenance and construction, call and conduct elections, hire employees and benefit packages, ambulance service, acquire property for right of ways. The most important duty of commissioner to me is to control tax rate for the county's land owners.

Klement - There are many duties of the Commissioners Court. Some of these are: providing the rural ambulance service, subsidizing rural fire protection, construct, maintain, and improve county roads and bridges, adopt the county budget and determine the county tax rate. The Commissioners also establish long-range open space land use rules, law enforcement/jail needs and plans. They supervise and control the County Courthouse, buildings, and facilities. All of the duties are important since

they continually impact the daily lives of our citizens. Of course, roads and bridges, fire protection, law enforcement, and setting the budget and tax rate are on the short list of priorities. I've been listening to my constituents' needs and concerns, and if elected, I plan to take action as needed considering all options.

Do you feel it is important to pre-plan by saving money in the Precinct's Road & Bridge Fund for future projects or unexpected emergencies, or is it better to spend most available money to upgrade roads and bridges?

Johnson - It is important to keep some money available for emergency situations. The federal government through FEMA will help in these situations, but it is a slow process, and it's

Born in Muenster on Nov. 22, 1933, one of the four children of Bernard and Mamie Grewing Haverkamp, Marcy attended Sacred Heart School through the 8th grade. She spent her entire life in the Muenster area and was a member of Sacred Heart Parish all her life.

Marcy was an extremely hard worker throughout her life. She began picking cotton at the early age of six. Her first job after that was with the Linda Jo Shoe Factory in Gainesville. She and her husband started a meat packing business in Gainesville known as North Texas Meat Packers. Their business continued for

over 30 years. Marcy then began working at Fischer's Meat Market in Muenster, where she worked for a number of years.

Marcy loved cooking for all her family (children and grandchildren) and really enjoyed getting together with them on the holidays. She also really enjoyed visitors just dropping by to "chat." Her cats, chickens, guineas, dancing with her husband, and her weekly trip to Gainesville on Saturday were very important highlights in her life. Marcy was a very nice, friendly, and loving lady.

Survivors include her daughters and sons-in-law Lucille and Stephen Jeffries of Gainesville, Pauline and Phil Mullins, and Florentine "Babe" and Henry J. Knabe, all of Muenster, Norma and Alan Britain of Rosston, and Charlene "Peachy" and Scott Hilburn of Callisburg; sons and daughters-in-law Charles R. Muenster City Police Report

During the reporting period of July through September 2008, the Muenster Police Department logged a total of 255 calls for service and made a total of 13 arrests. Laneta is a shining example of how one should treat their fellow brothers and sisters in Christ with patience, selflessness, and humility."

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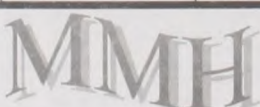

keep Muenster's library up to date and user friendly.

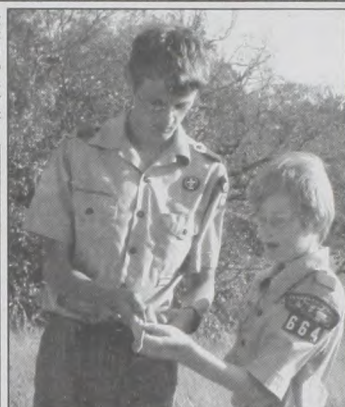

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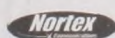
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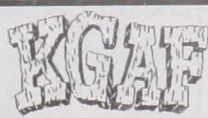

Lindsay plans farewell to their priests

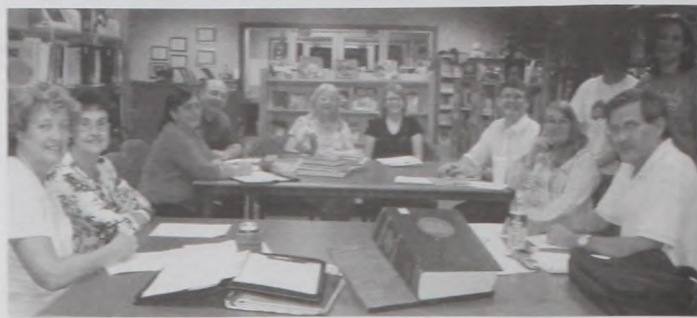
Parishioners of St. Peter's Parish in Lindsay and friends of Pastor Ron and Father Jerry are invited to gather to say their farewells to their priests.

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County progresses with office moves from Courthouse for renovation

Cooke County offices are slowly being moved from the Courthouse to temporary locations. This is to facilitate the renovation of the Courthouse's interior with grant money from the Texas Historic Commission's (THC) Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. It could be as long as three years before they move back into the Courthouse.

County Judge Bill Freeman reported that the County Attorney's office is now located at 106 West Main. Any office located in the basement, moved a few weeks ago to the old County Jail building on Chestnut Street. The County Judge's office, the County Auditor's office, and Human Resources are now located on the second floor of the Prosperity Bank building.

The next scheduled move is for the Commissioners office. It will be located next to the Fried Pie at 206 West Main Street. Scheduling with TxDOT is taking place for the move of the tag office. The

County Clerk's office will not be moved until after the November election. That office and the County Treasurer's office will move to 216 West Pecan. It was noted that Commissioners Court will continue to be held in the Courthouse as long as possible, perhaps through the end of December.

Commissioner Steve Key commended Ricky Kerr and the maintenance crew for their outstanding job they are doing in getting the offices relocated.

"All of us at some time or other has suffered through a move, but to suffer through a move from where you lived for 100 years is tough," remarked Judge Freeman.

In preparation for the moves, the County opened and acknowledged bids on asbestos abatement for the building it purchased recently at 112 South Dixon in Gainesville. The abatement must be done before it can be made ready for use as office space.

Bids were submitted by 11 companies and ranged from

a low of \$49,777 to a high of \$168,000. A special meeting was called for Tuesday to award the bid so that they could be studied before a decision was made. The County Clerk reported that the low bid of \$49,777 submitted by Total Abatement Systems Corp. was awarded the bid.

Advertising for sealed bids for the construction of the interior of the new Precinct #4 maintenance barn was approved. Precinct #4 Commissioner Judith Hess stated that she is ready to move forward with the plans.

Norman Minor of Gainesville spoke during Public Comments. He reminded the Court of the overflowing crowds, both in Cooke County and Austin, when meetings were held concerning the proposed Trans Texas Corridor (TTC).

Minor requested that Commissioners Court state publicly in detail why people should be for or against the TTC. He remarked, "If the answer is that you oppose it and there are good reasons to oppose it, I'd like to know

what we are really doing to stop it or to slow it or to modify it. I can think of half a dozen things that could be done to carry the message that our government, our people are against it as it's been proposed. What are we doing? The next step after the federal authority is the condemnation of land. The farms, the houses, the businesses, the ranches will be taken for this 1200 foot wide right-of-way coursing through the heart of Cooke County in order to provide funds for other transportation expansion in Texas resolving the traffic congestion problems of Dallas, Fort Worth, Arlington, Plano, etc."

At the request of Commissioner Smith, the speed limit on CR 336 to include the roadway from CR 321 to FM 2848, located in Precinct #3, was lowered to 35 m.p.h. Smith said that it is now a

major route of injection well trucks and is an area with young children.

The purchase of five vehicles for the Sheriff's Department utilizing the cooperative purchasing contract with Tarrant County exempt from bidding was considered. It was described as the best ever such offer to come across. The vehicles would take 30 days to arrive opposed to the usual three to four months and would come already equipped for use as police vehicles.

Judge Freeman said that he didn't like not giving local dealers the opportunity to bid. It was decided to approach local dealers to see if they would like to submit bids on the four police cars. The vehicle for the Sheriff was approved by Commissioners since the Sheriff is without a vehicle.

In other business, Com-

missioners Court:

- Declared October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month. On Oct. 24 at noon, displays will be set up on the west steps of the Courthouse for the public to view.
- Took no action on approving paying a salary supplement from the District Attorney's Hot Check Fund to a county employee.
- Approved transfer of money from the General Fund to the Justice of the Peace 1 salary line for 2008.
- Approved contract for services with the Oak Ridge Volunteer Fire Department and with the North Shore Volunteer Fire Department.

not fair to ask our vendors to wait on that money to come in. They are county taxpayers and have payrolls to meet every week.

Klement - I think it is wise to maintain a surplus of money while constantly maintaining ad building roads and bridges. Most people try to maintain a personal savings account for emergencies and such, and the County is well served by the same principle. If each precinct did not maintain a monetary surplus, they would have to borrow money or greatly increase taxes to repair bridges and roads after a flood or some other disaster. It is good business to plan and budget for the future and to have a surplus of money for unforeseen problems.

How do you feel about granting abatements to companies coming into the County such as the wind farms or new factories?

Johnson - In most cases, I don't like abatements. This county has a lot to offer, and like the wind farm, they will come if we work together for the improvement of the county.

Klement - Basically, I do not like tax abatements. But every tax abatement request has to stand or fail on its own merit. There are many variables involved, the size of the possible factory or business, the number of people to be employed, and the possible property value in the near future. Also, the financial and environmental impact on the surrounding area. I agree with the Commissioners Court's decision not to grant the wind farm an abatement, because their future value and longevity is very difficult to determine at this time.

Do you think Cooke County is in a position to support the growth and economic changes coming this way as far as having the infrastructure to support and take advantage of those changes?

Johnson - I think Cooke County will support the growth and economic changes coming our way. There

will be growing pains on our county's infrastructure, but we are Americans and we will adapt and conquer our problems just like other counties have done in our same situation.

Klement - We are well positioned to meet the possible challenges and changes that are coming. The ambulance service has been improved, the jail completed, and our rural firefighter associations are fantastic. Our roads and bridges, while continuing to need to need repair and upgrading, are in pretty good shape. An adequate long-term water supply will probably be our greatest challenge in the County as far as growth is concerned. The Commissioners Court has taken steps to form a committee to study the possibility of a water district to ensure Cooke County's needs are addressed. We are fortunate in Precinct #4 to have outstanding school systems staffed by knowledgeable and hardworking educators. This provides a solid well educated foundation to adapt and take advantage of all future opportunities.

Governmental agencies such as TCOG lend financial support to various people and groups in our County. Would you be willing to serve on any of those boards or lend your support in some way?

Johnson - I will try to work with governmental agencies that help the people of Cooke County. I would serve on boards and support them if I think it's best for the taxpayers of Cooke County.

Klement - Yes, as TCOG is vital in funding much needed programs throughout Cooke County such as Community Development, Agency on Aging and Disabilities, Criminal Justice, and Emergency Planning just to name a few. I would consider it my duty to serve in some capacity as necessary.

Why do you wish to serve as county commissioner?

Johnson - I wish to be commissioner because Cooke County is my home. I want it to be a great place to live and raise families. I believe I can

improve Precinct #4 roads and bridges. I will also do the best I can for the taxpayers of Cooke County.

Klement - I believe in public service and in giving back to community and humanity. My credentials and service to local and county government for the past 27 years make me the most qualified candidate. With a lifetime of conservative values, I have much experience in developing budgets, passing bonds, getting buildings constructed, purchasing property, and updating office systems. Over the years, I have traveled to the Capitol in Austin to lobby for the concerns of Cooke County citizens, finding it helpful in bringing our need to the forefront.

I've considered running for the commissioner's position for many years. I was influenced even as a young man by my grandfather John B. Klement, as he was the Precinct #4 commissioner. I want to give back to the great Cooke County area where my family and I were born and raised. Maintaining equipment and conserving the land is sort of my daily life. Making a business work with today's increasing expenses, along with my county and government experience has prepared me for the commissioner's seat. Fortunately, our 25 year old son joined us last year in the dairy business, allowing me time to pursue this ambition.

As a businessman, property owner, and taxpayer, I understand the difficulties we face. My commitment is this: to help my constituents of Precinct #4 and Cooke County by providing good roads and services with accountable conservative taxation. I will stand on a principle when it's right, but perhaps not the most popular thing to do.

As Precinct #4 Commissioner, I would dedicate my time to use all resources available to serve the great Cooke County area.

Early voting is now in progress at the Cooke County Courthouse. It continues through Friday, Oct. 31. The General Election is on Tuesday, Nov. 4.

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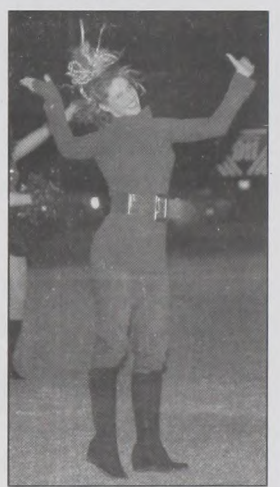


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Muenster 7th over Lindsay White 30-6
