

## County opts to rebid Precinct #4 maintenance barn

The great variance in bids for interior construction on the new Precinct #4 maintenance barn, led to Commissioners Court rejecting all bids. Bids ranged from a low of \$46,543.18 to a high of \$93,254, with several in between.

According to County Judge Bill Freeman, with such a range in prices, they decided to take the bids apart to find the differences. "We decided that the specs were not clear enough," he remarked. The specs will be restructured so that the parties bidding will know exactly what they are bidding on.

After discussing a County cell phone policy, Commissioners agreed to reword the policy and consider it at the Monday, July 28 meeting. Judge Freeman said it would allow for employees with cell phones to be paid a monthly fee and to use their personal cell phones thus cutting down on paperwork.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Voted to keep the Texas Department of Transportation registration fees the same, which is \$10 for Road and Bridge.
- Tabled decision on election workers pay increase.
- Accepted RFP from Patillo, Brown, & Hill for the current fiscal year audit.
- Tabled decision on contract for scanning of Commissioners Court minute books.

## MISD hires staff for upcoming year

The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees held four called meetings since their last regular monthly meeting held June 11. On June 18 and 25, Board members and Superintendent John Kaufman met for a total of three and one half hours in budget planning workshops for the 2008-09 school year.

The Board met again on June 30, opening with a public hearing on the 2008-09 Proposed Tax Rate and Proposed Adopted Budget. No audience was in attendance. In the adoption of the budget, the Board approved the budget as presented. They also approved the Maintenance and Operation Tax Rate at 1.04 cents per hundred dollar evaluation, and the Interest and Sinking Tax Rate at .12681 cents per hundred dollar evaluation for 2008-09.

The resignations of Coach Quentin Berend and elementary junior high teacher Cassie Freeman were accepted. After a short executive session, motions were made to hire Sharon Browning as junior high/high school assistant principal. "Daniel Waneck (former assistant principal) wanted to get back into Ag and with the kids," noted Kaufman. Also hired were J.B. Gray, III as elementary PE/teacher/coach, Carol Cross for junior high English, and Deanna Miller as junior high science teacher.

Twenty-four were in attendance along with six Board members at the July 3 called meeting. The gathering was called to order at 7:34 p.m., followed by a prayer and executive session at 7:36 p.m. No one in the audience spoke out. For two hours and 30 minutes, the Board, in private consultation with their attorney and the superintendent per phone conversation, discussed a settlement offer with ex-Head Football Coach/Athletic Director Monte Endres, then considered an offer from Endres.

A settlement agreement was approved with the authorization for the superintendent with counsel, to finalize the agreement immediately. In a phone conversation with John Kaufman, he noted that he did not want to violate any agreement with Endres. "A mutually agreed upon separation agreement was accepted by both parties," stated Kaufman.

## Commissioners submit annual road reports

As is done each year, Cooke County Commissioners submitted their annual road reports.

Roads in the Muenster and Lindsay areas are under the care of Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith and Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess.

Hess reported his roads to be in fair condition. His report stated, "County roads 417, 421, 450, and 457 buildup road bed with crushed rock. County roads 406, 403, 402, and 427 crushed rock." The amount of money Hess estimated would be required for maintenance of the Precinct #4 roads during the next fiscal year is \$1,347,471. There are four bridges scheduled to be put in place. They include rerouting and building bridge on CR 413 at a probable cost of

\$45,000; build County bridge on CR 406 at probable cost of \$35,000; Federal and State bridge on CR 416 at probable cost of \$415,612.91 to the State and \$41,561.29 to the County; and a Federal and State bridge on CR 454 with probable cost of \$482,110.42 to the State and \$48,211.04 to the County.

It was estimated that traffic control devices in Precinct #4 that were defaced or torn down and replaced were 70% due to flood damage and 30% due to vandalism.

Commissioner Smith reported, "To the best of my knowledge, roads, culverts, and bridges or parts thereof in Precinct #3 are in reasonably good condition. Seal coated roads experiencing heavy truck traffic have deteriorated and are requiring

## Joseph Wimmer 1909 - 2008

Mass of Christian Burial for Joseph John "Joe" Wimmer of Muenster was held at 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 19 at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster with Fr. Ken Robinson celebrating the Mass. Burial was in Sacred Heart Cemetery under the direction of McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster.

Joe died at the age of 99 at 7:20 a.m. on Thursday, July 17, 2008 in Muenster.

Joe was born June 26, 1909, in Tours, Texas, the second of the 11 children of Charles and Annie Seith Wimmer. The family moved to Calera, Oklahoma when he was five years old and then to Muenster in 1919 where he had lived the remainder of his life. He was a member of Sacred Heart Parish since moving to Muenster. He married La Verna Schmitz on May 23, 1933 in Sacred Heart Church. She preceded him in death on March 1, 1968. He later married Clytie Sampler in 1972. She died in 1980.

Joe was a member of the Knights of Columbus and was a long time member of the Muenster School Board. He was a farmer/rancher and had been partners with J.M. Weinzapfel in the farm and ranch business for 42 years. He raised sheep and cattle and farmed the land to harvest hay and feed for the animals. He was known as the best coyote trapper in the area. He trapped primarily to eliminate the predators that were after his sheep.

Joe enjoyed watching the Texas Rangers, playing cards and dominos, playing baseball with his grandchildren, and especially enjoyed dancing. After retiring at the age

of 65, Joe usually went to dance twice each week until his age and physical condition no longer permitted. He, family, and friends celebrated his 90th at a dance at the Gainesville V.F.W.

Survivors include daughters Carmen Lee Henkel and husband Gary of Yantis, Texas, and Kay Powel and husband Bob of Grapevine; son Larry Wimmer and wife Pat of Muenster; 14 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren; sisters Billie Reinart and husband "Doc" of Muenster, Lucille Zimmerer of Muenster, Gracie Luke and husband Paul of Farmers Branch, and Hattie Berend of Hereford; brother Charles "Doodle" Wimmer of Muenster.

Preceding him in death were his wife La Verna, and wife Clytie; daughters Marcie Klement Pagel and Frankie Jo Prescher; brothers Ernest, Tony, Johnny, Lawrence, and Andy Wimmer.

Assisting Fr. Ken at the funeral Mass were altar servers Sylvan Walterscheid and Alvin Hartman. The First Reading was given by Kate Powell and the Second Reading by Heather Henkel. Prayers of the Faithful were read by Payton Sanders. Michelle Cheaney and Connie Reiter brought up the Offertory Gifts. Eucharistic ministers were Annette Anderle, Ethel Bayer, Carolyn Bayer, Willie Fisher, and Theresa Mae Walterscheid.

Music ministers were Christy Hesse and Isaac Davis. Sacred songs included "Be Not Afraid," "Just A Closer Walk With Thee," "Softly and Tenderly," "Irish

Blessing," and "On Eagle's Wings."

Remarks of remembrance were given by grandson J. Shane Wimmer, who said, in part, "...I believe his philosophy for life, was likely formed by one incident that occurred at a very young age. His older brother Ernest, who was likely his hero, primary best friend, and certainly best friend, died of acute appendicitis... He learned at the tender age of five that life was not fair and that loss was something that was part of life..."

"La Vernawas the love of his life and they met at a barn dance and were married... They settled onto a place five miles south of town..."

"He was thrifty, shall we say, frugal - tight. I believe this financially conservative approach to life likely stemmed from his living through the Great Depression... One of his favorite quotes was, 'I never paid a dime of interest in my whole life...' He was a great American when it came to voting and he never missed an election - always voting Republican..."

"Joe was a faithful Catholic... and actually had his rosary in his hands at the time of his death... He was faithful to God and country..." Pallbearers were Curtis

Myra had three trucks and 10 personnel at the scene of a brush fire off CR 433 near the Montague County line on Saturday, July 12.

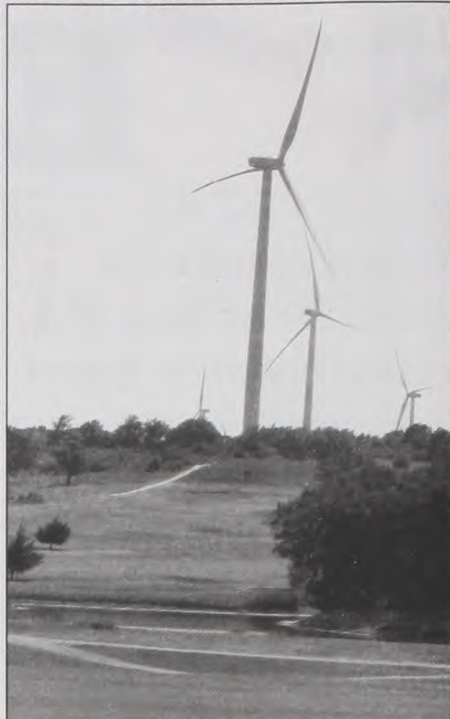

continued drivability repairs." He estimated the amount of money required to maintain Precinct #3 roads during the next fiscal year to be \$1,246,500.

Since his last report, 126 road number signs and 18 traffic control signs have been replaced. They replace road signs daily as needed.

Slated for improvements or repairs in the coming fiscal year include: culverts on CR 300 at a probable cost of \$15,000; seal coat on CR 300 at probable cost of \$45,000; seal coat on CR 348 at probable cost of \$40,000; repairs to CR 321 at probable cost of \$45,000; and seal coat to CR 350 at a probable cost of \$25,000.

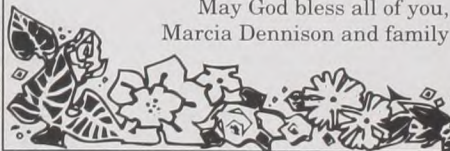

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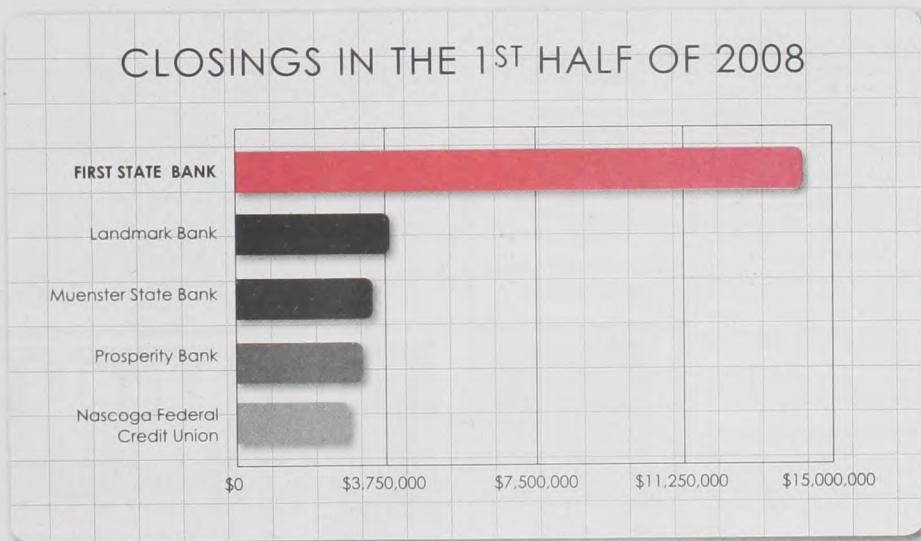

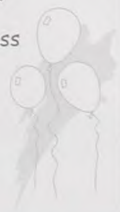

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# Agencies unite in Cooke Co. to form Abigail's Arms center

On June 29, Cooke County Friends of the Family merged with Abigail's Arms - Cooke County Family Crisis Center and will go by the name Abigail's Arms - Cooke County Family Crisis Center. The agency will continue to be located at 114 N. Dixon Street and offer the same services. But the new agency is also undertaking the building of an emergency shelter for victims of violence. The merger of the two agencies ensures that victims of violence can receive the most efficient and effective care and support available.

The Board of Directors for the newly merged project consists of 11 members from the Board of Cooke County Friends of the Family and 10 members from the Board of Abigail's Arms. Officers are Robin Brown, president; Karla Metzler, vice-president; Mitzi Lyons, secretary; and Diana Eichenberger, treasurer. The newly formed Board held its first meeting on Wednesday, July 1.

Outgoing Abigail's Arms Board members Cecil James, Tanyes James, Angie Hare, Cindy Rohmer, and Board President Derrell Comer were presented with certificates of appreciation for their service at an informal lunch meeting on July 11. These individuals and other concerned citizens began meeting as a prayer group, then an exploratory committee for a women's shelter in Cooke County. They incorporated in 2005 as a nonprofit and began the long planning process for shelter construction and operations.

Cooke County Friends of the Family began providing victims' services in 1983 and has been actively partnering with social service agencies in Cooke County to provide services to victims and has long acknowledged that the miss-

ing piece to adequate services was an emergency shelter. By joining the two agencies, this will soon be a reality for Cooke County.

As part of the move forward to merge Cooke County Friends of the Family and Abigail's Arms - Cooke County Family Crisis Center, a Shelter Project Manager has been hired. Betty Kay Schlesinger began in the new position on July 1. She is focusing on making the long-hoped-for emergency shelter a reality.

Mrs. Schlesinger comes to the Agency with more than 25 years experience in non-profit executive management, social service delivery, and program advancement. Her experience in both southern California and Texas has included shelters and transitional housing programs and focused on serving persons who were homeless, involved with the criminal justice system, women and children, the elderly, or individuals with mental illness. Mrs. Schlesinger holds two Bachelor degrees and a Master's, multiple licenses, certifications, and professional memberships.

"We are so pleased to have Betty Kay join our team. Her expertise and knowledge will help fast forward the shelter project and provide much needed support to our overall operations," said Aaron Davis, executive director of Cooke County Friends of the Family.

Plans for the shelter are moving forward. The Board of Directors is currently reviewing various sites and locations for new construction. They are looking at both short- and long-term development opportunities and funding initiatives. "We want to make sure that we explore all possibilities for the shelter, including making the facility energy and environmentally

friendly, while ensuring that we are able to deliver the best possible services to our clients," said Mrs. Schlesinger.

Mrs. Schlesinger and her husband will be making their home in Cooke County in the near future, but are already becoming involved in activi-

ties in and around Gainesville.

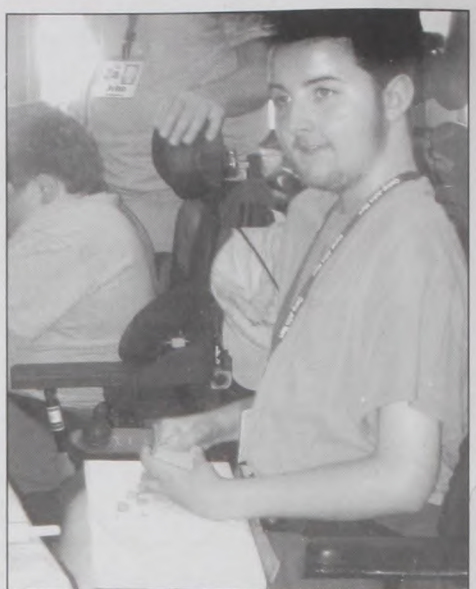

The Muscular Dystrophy Association's Dallas region concluded its 16th annual summer camp June 27. Nearly 100 children attended this year's summer camp held at Camp John Marc in Meridian, Texas, from June 22-27. Campers spent the week doing adaptive archery, fishing, horseback riding, special projects such as photography and astronomy, and a whole list of activities aimed at breaking down barriers the children face in the real world.

## Hunting licenses go on sale Aug. 15

New hunting and fishing licenses for 2008-09 will be available beginning Friday, Aug. 15, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is encouraging hunters to buy early and avoid the rush heading into the Sept. 1 dove season opener.

Sportsmen are reminded all current annual hunting and fishing licenses (except for the year-to-date fishing license) expire Aug. 31. Texas issues 2.1 million hunting and fishing licenses annually through 28 TPWD field offices, more than 65 state parks, and at over 1,500 retailers across Texas.

Because dove season in the North and Central Dove Zones opens on a Monday, there will be a weekend rush to buy licenses. The Department averaged less than 20,000 license transactions a day during the two weeks prior to the dove season opener as opposed to five or six times that number on the days around opening weekend.

A last-minute license purchase rush is probably inevitable in some areas of the state, TPWD officials say, particularly along the I-35 corridor where many dove hunters descend. Fortunately, there are other license buying avenues available.

Hunters can also purchase licenses online through the TPWD web site (<http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/>) or by calling (800) 895-4248. There is a \$5 convenience fee for either option and a major credit card is required.

License sales call center hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday - Friday. The online transaction system is available 24/7.

A license confirmation number is issued at the time of purchase for online and phone orders, and the physical license is mailed separately. Confirmation numbers will verify that a license has been purchased, which is sufficient for dove hunting, but will not allow hunters to take fish or wildlife that requires a tag.

In addition to a hunting license, all wing shooters will need to purchase a game bird stamp. To hunt doves or teal in September, a Migratory Game Bird Stamp (\$7) is required. Duck hunters also need to purchase a Federal Duck Stamp and receive HIP (Harvest Information Program) certification. HIP certification will be printed on the license at the time of sale only after the purchaser answers a few brief migratory bird questions. Lifetime license holders must also be HIP-certified and purchase the Federal Duck Stamp to hunt migratory birds. All other state stamp endorsements are included with a lifetime license.

There are other mandatory endorsements to consider at the time of purchase, too. An Upland Game Bird Stamp (\$7) is required to hunt all non-migratory game birds, including turkey, quail, pheasant, chachalaca, and lesser prairie chicken.

Of course, anyone who purchases the Super Combo li-

cense package, the best bang for the buck, automatically gets these needed stamps.

Hunter Education Certification is also required of any hunter born on or after Sept. 2, 1971 and who is at least 17 years old. For hunters who are unable to work in a hunter education class before hunting season for whatever reason, TPWD does offer a deferral option.

The deferral option allows people 17 years of age or older a one-time only extension to complete the state's hunter education requirements. The individual must first purchase a hunting license and then may purchase the deferral option.

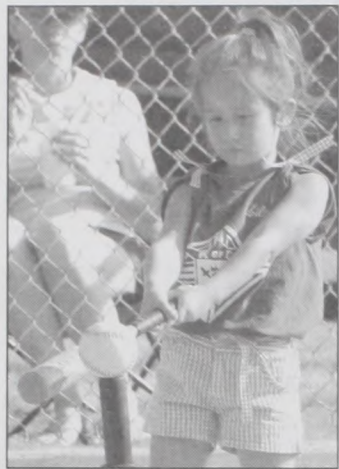
Hunters using the deferral must be accompanied by someone 17 years old or older who is also licensed to hunt in Texas. The accompanying individual must have completed hunter education or be exempt from the requirements (born before Sept. 2, 1971). The extension is good for one license year, by which time the person with the deferral option needs to complete a hunter education course.

This option is not available to those who have ever received a conviction or deferred adjudication for lack of hunter education certification. They still must take the course before going afield.

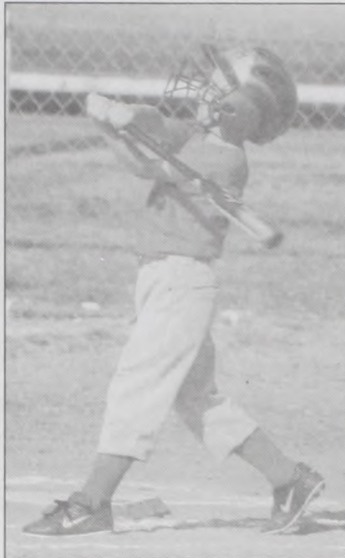

## Fishing the docks with Edwin Evers

Docks are great places to catch bass, but some docks are better than others. Docks in clear to moderately clear lakes are better than those in stained or algae-laden waters.

Those with constant foot traffic are less productive than those used less frequently. For example: resort docks and gas docks are usually poor prospects.

On docks with a lot of use, morning might be the only time the fish will be there. Windswept docks are never as good as those in calm water. Three or more warm days in a row tend to draw more fish to docks than post-cold front conditions and midday is usually better than morning or evening.

Docks with barking dogs or crabby owners are usually not worth the bother.

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## GAME WARDEN REPORTS

### Call it game warden's intuition

During the mule deer season, the warden received a call from a landowner saying a deer had been shot from the road.

Upon the warden's arrival, an adjoining landowner said there had been a misunderstanding and that his hunters had shot the deer, causing it to run across the road and die. Feeling uneasy about the story, the warden began an investigation that proved that the story had been concocted by the hunters who had tagged and reported the deer.

### Bragging about illegal activity proves unwise

In January, an Ellis County subject denied knowledge of the illegality of obtaining the free license until he was shown transcripts of his bragging on an Internet hunting forum about how easy it was to get away with.

After a thorough tutorial on the consequences of tampering with government documents, the subject wrote a statement of confession for illegally obtaining the free military license and for illegally killing five deer this past hunting season.

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## MORE REPORTS

**Never too late for a first fish:** A Camp County game warden held a fishing event for a Mt. Pleasant assisted living group. The game warden assisted one 93-year-old resident and a 78-year-old woman in catching their first fish. There were a total of about 15 elderly anglers who caught fish all day long.

**It was cheap for a reason:** Rockwall and Dallas County game wardens were working Lake Ray Hubbard when one of the wardens stopped a personal water craft. Immediately the wardens noticed that the registration displayed on the vessel was wrong, with a state designated "CF." One of the game wardens ran the Hull Identification Number through Austin Communications, and the vessel came back as stolen out of Plano. The vessel was taken back to the boat ramp where it was seized by the wardens. The operator said that he had purchased it the previous Saturday at a flea market for "a really good price."

## Texas hunter education classes enrollment up during summer

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is encouraging hunters in need of certification to enroll soon as hunter education courses are filling up fast. As hunting seasons draw closer, demand for hunter education classes is expected to increase.

Anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971 is required to take the Hunter Education Training Course in order to hunt in Texas, and the minimum age a hunter may be certified has been lowered this year to nine years of age.

Hunters who are at least 17 years of age and have not

completed the hunter education course can defer completion for one year. Hunters who opted for "deferral" last year must complete the hunter education course to hunt legally this year.

Hunter education courses are conducted by certified volunteers all year across the state of Texas. Courses cost \$15 and students have two options: take the FREE classroom study portion on-line plus a one day field component or take the traditional two-day course that averages 14 hours of instruction at a location near home.

More than 30,000 aspiring hunters become certified every year in Texas and since 1972, about 780,000 Texans have completed the hunter education course, which is mandatory in all 50 states and 10 Canadian Provinces.

As a result of hunter education courses, hunting accident rates have steadily decreased since 1966 when 12

accidents per 100,000 hunters were reported, and the last three years have seen the rate lowered to 2.9 accidents per 100,000 hunters.



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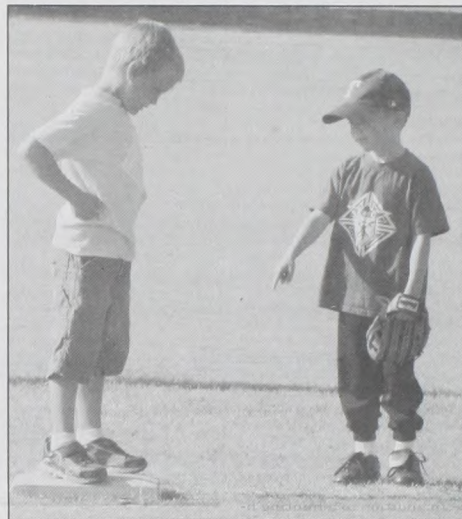

# As summer heats up, so do water toxicity issues

Early summer rains provided for an excess of water in the area this year, but as things start to heat up and dry up we may be facing new livestock problems. Blue-green algae in dirty and drying ponds and flood overflow areas can cause fatal toxicity in all domestic animals that drink from these ponds.

The culprit is not really an algae and may not even be blue-green. The problem is caused by a group of organisms known as cyanobacteria, or bacteria with photosynthesis capability. The colors range from blue to bright green but may also be red or purple.

Often these organisms will show up like a paint scum on the surface of the water.

When these organisms are present in small to moderate numbers, they don't present a problem. When the pond "blooms", however, they create toxins. Blooms occur when the right conditions are met, including warm water temperatures and the presence of large quantities of nutrients, especially nitrogen and phosphorus. Water temperature goes up as water volume goes down, due to consumption and dehydration. Water temperature also rises as air temperatures go up. Water temperature goes up much quicker and higher in shallow, stagnant sources.

Water temperature goes up higher in bodies of water that have bare ground around them than in ponds that have grass and weeds up to the water. Nutrient levels in ponds rise due to fertilizer or manure run-off. Cattle spend more time standing in ponds as the air temperature increases. When cattle are allowed into the water, their urination and defecation contribute as a major source of nitrogen and phosphorus.

Cattle grazing fescue pastures in the summer may also spend more time in the water because the endophyte on the fescue causes the cattle's body temperature to rise above normal. The result higher temperature and nutrient availability is that the pond blooms and the water goes from relatively clear to looking like green paint in just a few days due to the production of millions of bacterial bodies.

There are two toxins produced. The first is a neurotoxin that affects the central nervous system and causes very rapid death to the animal. Dead cattle are often found lying at or near the pond where they drank.

Deaths can occur in large numbers if the concentration of toxin is high. The second toxin is a hepatotoxin, or toxin that attacks the liver.

This results in slower death and signs include jaundice and severe sun-burning. It is not as common as the sudden death syndrome. Once the animals have consumed the toxic water, there is no treatment. Often the wind pushes the organisms and the resulting toxins across the pond where they become concentrated. An early warning sign is the presence of dead mice, snakes, or other small animals on the downwind side of the pond.

When you have a suspicious water source, you should collect a sample of water, preferably from the downwind side. If it looks clear, there is very little chance of a toxicity problem. Only a relatively few organisms found in water cause toxicity, so if your sample is colored or murky, it should be sent to a veterinary diagnostic laboratory for examination. Your veterinarian or county extension educator can help you submit the sample. If in doubt, keep livestock away from the pond until you have an answer.

In the past, ponds have been treated with copper sulfate to kill the organisms. This practice is, however, somewhat controversial. Livestock must be kept from treated ponds for two weeks because the chemical can also be toxic, and in this time usu-

ally the bloom is over and the water is safe anyway. Some toxicologists feel that when the bloom is killed by chemicals, more toxins are released. If sampling reveals that your pond is a potential danger, consider keeping all livestock off for two weeks and then retesting. The guidance of your local veterinarian is the best help in planning a course of action.

In summary, blue-green algae may be a problem when ponds bloom. There is no treatment for poisoned animals. The problem can be at least partially prevented by avoiding fertilizer run-off, keeping animals out of ponds, submitting samples of questionable water, and providing alternative water sources when ponds are blooming.

### The web helps track production agriculture issues

Texas AgriLife Extension strives to keep producers alert to developing agricultural and natural occurrences. There are a variety of websites designated to keep producers aware of developing situations - especially concerning crops with a timely need for information. Examples of these include: <http://pecankernel.tamu.edu> which helps producers track the pecan nut case bearer; <http://croptesting.tamu.edu> which provides growers with timely information about top producing varieties for an assortment of crops; and finally, <http://soybeanrust.tamu.edu> which helps producers track the spread of Asian soybean rust and the need for fungicide treatments.

A sample of information that may be found on these sites is this update on Asian soybean rust. This disease only has a couple of years' history in the United States. Soybean growers need to stay tuned to its progression during the growing season. Luckily, no rust has been found in any of the soybean production areas of Texas to date, including the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Rust is still confined to one kudzu patch in East Texas. Since one month ago, the

amount of rust in this patch has actually DECREASED.

How can this be? Severely infected leaves have defoliated, while much of the newer growth has not become infected. Hot, dry conditions have slowed disease progression in this patch. Additionally, other kudzu patches in the vicinity (40 feet to 2 mile distant) still do not have rust. Dry conditions throughout most of state will not favor establishment or increase of this disease. The risk of economically-damaging levels of rust is very low. Many fields in the southern part of the state have advanced sufficiently in maturity that if rust were introduced into them, there would be no economical impact.

There are no preventative fungicide spray recommendations at this time. Keep scouting. Send suspicious leaves to our lab for confirmation of rust.

### Borers on Soapberry Trees

A new insect pest of western soapberry has recently been detected in several counties in Texas. The soapberry borer, a native of Mexico, was first reported in Bastrop County in 2003. Since then, it has been detected in several additional counties, including the four counties immediately South and East of Cooke County.

As its populations expand

rapidly in Texas, this pest is killing soapberry trees of all ages. It may eventually threaten western soapberry populations throughout the tree's range, which extends from northern Mexico to Missouri, and west to Arizona.

Leaves of western soapberry, a medium-sized, drought-hardy tree, resemble those of the invasive Chinaberry, but are not double compound and the leaflets do not have serrated (toothed) margins.

Infested trees can be easily recognized by the exposed sawdood that results when birds and squirrels chip off the bark to feed on the larvae. Bark chips accumulate at the base of the tree. A heavily-infested tree will be completely girdled by white larvae feeding beneath the bark. The adult beetle is about one-half inch-long, shining black and distinctively marked with four small white spots on the wing covers. Larvae are flat-headed wood borers that may attain an inch or more in length as they mature. After feeding beneath the bark, the larvae bore into the wood to complete development and to pupate. The adult leaves a D-shaped exit hole as it emerges.
