FPL Energy, the nation's largest producer of wind and solar energy, announced on Dec. 15 that it has donated \$36,648.43 to the Muenster Independent School District for the construction and supplies for a new computer lab. Muenster's junior high and high schools will receive funds from FPL Energy to build an extension to the campus to be used for the new lab. FPL Energy will provide outlets and electrical supplies, 17 computers with printers, and a ceiling mounted projector.

Rabid skunk found Muenster; caution urged

A sick skunk reported to
the Muenster Police Department on Thursday, Dec. 11
tested positive for rabies,
Muenster Police Chief Bob

He urges all residents to use
caution and report any animal seen acting strangely.
The rabid skunk was discovered with a report to City
Hall of a sick skunk on East
Eddy Street. Chief Stovall
said that the wobbly skunk
made it all the way from
Eddy Street to 334 South
Walnut Street before he
found and shot it. The animal was taken to local veterinarian Dr. Larry Tisdale
who sent it to the Texas Department of Health for testing. The only way to tell if an
animal has rabies is to kill it
and test its brains for the rabies virus.
Chief Stovall said that

Chief Stovall said that the animal crossed several yards. It jumped and possibly bit a dog in one yard. People with animals such as dogs and cats in that area should watch them for at least 45 days and report any strange behavior or symptoms of rabies.

Another case of a rabid skunk found five miles south of Muenster was confirmed about two weeks ago, according to Stovall.

The Muenster Police Department advises pet owners to have their dogs' and cats' rabies shots updated.

If you see an animal such as a skunk out in daylight, it is likely that it is rabid, said Chief Stovall. Nocturnal animals sick with rabies venture out during daylight hours. If seen in the city limits, report the animal to the Muenster Police Department

MISD Board approves improvements

The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, Dec. 10 for their regular meeting. The Board approved several items. On the budget amendments, Ag travel to pay for meals was increased by \$1,000, and a bid to Hoenig Electric for \$1,675 was awarded to do the electrical update to the concession stand at the football field.

The Board also approved replacing the decorative landscape rock walls to pour cement for retaining walls on the east and west sides of the new cafetorium, and authorized the building committee to seek quotes and approve the work to be done. Also, in the new lunch room the Board approved the purchase of a roll door at a cost of \$2,350 for the pass through window in the dish washing area.

Completion date for the cafetorium is expected by the end of January. The ordering of tables, desks, and other furniture is needed along with new Ag building and cafetorium plaques for upcoming dedication ceremonies.



Animals in the early stages of rabies may not exhibit any signs, but they can still infect with their bite. The incubation period is the time from the animal bite to when signs appear. In rabies, it is usually one to three months, but it can last as long as several years. When the rabies virus reaches the brain or spinal cord, signs of the disease appear.

The CDC information notes that an animal can spread rabies up to 10 days before they become ill, and during their illness. Only mammals are infected with rabies. Some animals are more likely to be infected. These include skunks, raccoons, bats, foxes, coyotes,

and bobcats. All domestic animals such as dogs, cats, horses, and cattle can be infected. Rodents, rabbits, and hares almost never get rabies and have not been known to cause rabies.

There are two ways to be exposed to rabies - bite and non bite. Ab ite is described as any puncture of the skin by teeth. A non bite exposure occurs when saliva, brain tissue, or spinal fluid from an animal with rabies enters any scratch, abrasion, open wound, eyes, or the mouth. Just petting the animal is not considered rabies exposure.

Should you be exposed to rabies, wash the bite wounds and scratches thoroughly with soap and water. See a doctor as soon as possible. If it is proven or suspected that you were exposed to rabies, rabies shots should be given. They should include human rabies immune globulin with the Human Diploid Cell rabies vaccine.

When was your pet's last rabies vaccination? These need to be given yearly.

DPS wishes for safe holiday travel

DPS troopers will increase patrols during the Christmas and New Year's holidays in an effort to make travel safer on Texas roads.

Of special concern, is drinking and driving during the holidays. Troopers also will focus on speeders and seat belt violators. All available troopers will be on patrol from Wednesday, Dec. 24 through Sunday, Dec. 28, and again on Wednesday, Jan. 1.

During the Christmas and New Year's holidays last year, DPS troopers issued a total of 28,000 citations and 14,000 warnings, including 919 DWI arrests, 19,612 speeding tickets, and 3,379 safety restraint violations. DPS statistics suggest tickets and drunken driving arrests by troopers double during holiday enforcement periods.

"The best present you can give to yourself and your loved ones is to make sure you arrive safely at your holiday destination—most traffic deaths are preventable," said interim DPS Director Stanley E. Clark. "We feel our efforts, in conjunction with increased enforcement from other agencies, will make the holidays just a little bit safer. DPS prefers voluntary compliance, but we write citations and arrest drunk drivers to save lives."

DPS offers the following advice as gifts to the traveling public:

Drive with courtesy; it's contagious. Remember, it's the holidays!!!

Slow down - especially in bad weather, construction areas, and heavy traffic.

Don't drink and drive; et a designated driver.

Buckle up everyone in the vehicle.

Texas Forest Service urges Texans to use caution with fireworks

the holiday season with fireworks.

Fireworks are commonly linked to Christmas and New Year festivities, but Texas Forest Service (TFS) warns the outcome can be disastrous if proper safety precautions are not taken.

"Many Texans will be using fireworks to celebrate Christmas and the New Year," Texas Forest Service Fire Operations Chief Mark Stanford said. "TFS wants Texans to use fireworks safely in order to protect themselves and to avoid accidentally starting wildfires."

The New Year will be upon us before we know it, and although there are a lot of uncertainties for 2009, producers can take steps to be prepared for what's to come in the livestock industry. Whether you manage a cowcalf operation or feedlot, now is the time to consider what changes you'd like to see in your organization to ensure 2009 brings higher profits and fewer challenges.

1. Identify improvements that will have the most impact on your organization. Although a lot can be accomplished in a year, it's important to keep your resolutions focused and identify where your organization needs the most improvement and which steps will have the greatest impact on your organization and its profit. If you're managing a feedlot, take a moment to evaluate it using IBC's Feedlot Cost Management Assessment Worksheet (http://www.iowabeefcenter.org/content/Feedlot_Cost_Mgt_Assessmnt_Wkst.pdf).

2. Build more flexibility into your organization. What are you doing differently to survive in this time of tight margins and high inputs? With the cost of feed and fuel ever in flux, and a host of other uncertainties plaguing livestock producers, it's important that you have the ability to change how your organization operates so rapid changes in the industry don't leave you behind. The Iowa Beef Center has an entire section devoted to handling this time of high feed costs: http://www.iowabeefcenter.org/managingfeedcosts.html

3. Better understand how to market your cattle timely and wisely. A rapid climb in livestock production costs, including a dramatic increase in feed, has changed the name of the game for those marketing cattle. Considering these changes, it

may no longer be profitable to market your livestock in the same manner as years before. To learn more about figuring out your cattles' optimal marketing weight, go to http://www.iowabeefcenter.org/content/feedlot/optimalweight.pdf.

4. Improve your record keeping skills and organize documentation. With the implementation of mandatory Country of Origin Labeling (COOL) in September 2008, documentation has become increasingly important for all livestock producers, regardless of organization. Winter gardening activi-

From a gardening perspective, the end of the year is usually a time to relax and think about other things. November and December are good months for planting bulbs, soil preparation, and a few other garden chores. Two very useful gardening activities for the holiday season are planning the landscape and planting trees.

One activity complements the other. It is always wise to have done your homework when deciding to plant trees. These plants will become long term valuable assets or a permanent problem. Therefore, I would like to remind Cooke County residents about the wonderful resource they have with Texas SmartScape. You can access this resource on the web at: http://www.txsmartscape.com/. This site contains a plant search that allows users to select well adapted plants given selected parameters. An example is if you want to find a good tree to plant in a location on the West side of your house, to block the sun, but cannot plant a tree that will spread too wide because of constraints caused by power lines or other obstacle; you can select the size tree you want, and the computer will make some good recommendations!

er-grown tree, there is often transplant stress as the tree acclimates to a different environment. Some species react more negatively than others to this change, but almost all trees suffer aesthetically and stop growth. Winter is a wonderful time to plant trees and shrubs because cooler temperatures, though not ideal for growth, provide a much-needed time for root development and acclimation for the new tree, thus reducing transplant stress. Winter is also often a time of ample rainfall, resulting in even less tree stress.

Local nurseries should have a good selection of trees during winter. When deciding which tree(s) to plant, you should take into account the characteristics of the proposed planting site, such as the amount of sun the site receives, the soil drainage, and the amount of room the tree will have to spread.

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

But they won't come out far. Remember, these are the survivors, the ones that took your best shot about a month ago and won.

Secondary rut sign is subtle. Suddenly, a few old scrapes are freshened up or a few new ones are made. Just as suddenly, a few fresh rubs show up where you haven't noticed them before. The bucks are on the prowl but are keeping a low profile.

The usual rut strategies, involving grunting, rattling

The usual rut strategies, involving grunting, rattling and sex scents, are useful but should be used with equal subtlety. Keep your strategy low-key in the second half of the secondary rut.

Getting around in the woods

The ability to judge both time and distance while hunting is very important. If you know how far something (say your stand site) is and/or how long it will take you to cover some distance denoted on a map, you can plan your travel time well.

Judging distance either by sight or how far you've traveled is not easy and takes some practice. It also takes a watch. Elapsed time of travel can be a rough guide to the actual mileage.

A healthy adult, moving at a normal pace, can walk about three miles per hour on level ground — that's 20 minutes to the mile. Strap on a day pack and a deer stand and allow 40 minutes for the mile. Rough terrain, either mountainous or thickly vegetated, can double travel time.

A GPS unit can give you the most direct route to a preprogrammed point. It also can help you detour around obstacles, even in the dark, so long as you have already programmed your route.

Underwear for your feet

Wet feet are soon cold feet. Worse yet, wet socks, particularly cotton, promote blisters. Nothing can wreck a happy, long-awaited hunting trip faster than blistered feet. Worse yet, severely blistered feet can actually cost you the success you had hoped for on a hunting trip. The basic step is to always wear well-fitted and well broken-in boots and change socks regularly. Wool socks wick moisture better than cotton ones and retain 75 percent of their insulating ability even when wet. Some of the new synthetic-blend boot socks handle moisture almost as well as wool.

If you wear rubber boots or pac boots (leather uppers, rubber bottoms), you should wear liner socks. An active foot can sweat a cup of perspiration a day! That water is trapped in a rubber boot. The quick-wicking liner sock pulls it away from your foot and keeps it relatively dry. Add wool outer socks (remember 75% insulation even when wet) to complete the recipe for warm feet.

Log it first

After the season, as you put your gear in order, consider catching up on what I consider a very important piece of hunting equipment—your hunting journal. It is the key to future success.

Throughout the season, I keep notes on what I see while hunting. I jot down what deer are browsing on and when; what trails and terrain see the most use and when; and what the weather was like when I observed unusually high activity. I also note or map spots that I frequently jump or encounter deer. Almost all journal entries note the time of day, day of month, weather and wind conditions and moon rease.

phase.

At season's end I "clean up" these rather random notes (while they're fresh in my mind) and enter them into a more permanent logbook or master journal. After a few seasons, this has become a great database of information on deer move. information on deer move-ment -- both in general and on specific areas where I hunt regularly.

Most people are found within 24 hours; so you don't have to survive for a long time. Resist the urge to blindly strike out, and never run. Don't even walk at night or in a fog. Doing these things usually makes a bad

situation worse and greatly increases your chance of in-

increases your chance of injury.

Stay where you are unless you are in real and imminent danger (flood, lightning strike, etc.). Go no farther than you must to be safe. Use your energy to make a shelter and fire. A good survival kit should include items that assist with both.

assist with both.

Always telling someone where you are going and when you will be back will hasten help should you ever need it.

need it.

Late winter scouting

Late winter deer scouting can be the most productive scouting of the year. First, vegetation is at a minimum, making any deer sign easily seen. Second, you can locate and really investigate potential hotspots without having to hold back for fear that you will spook a trophy buck out of the area just before season.

Major deer trails stand out Major deer transstant out-like interstate highways and even well-hidden buck trails are easier to pick up. With most foliage gone, you can get a good look at buck core/

sanctuary areas, which are usually found in the most forbidding, brush-choked areas available. While there, try to get a handle on the buck's entrance and exit areas. If the sanctuary is too tough to hunt, stake out the "bedroom door" next season. With luck, you can find shed antlers. These tell you that that particular buck survived the season and will likely still be around next year. This knowledge will make you more confident when the next deer season starts.




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

TFB president calls for united front of farmers and ranchers

Uncertain financial times for Texas farmers and ranch-ers make unity more impor-tant than ever before, the president of Texas Farm Bu-reau said during his annual address at the organization's 75th annual convention. But the magnitude of the

Toth annual convention.

But the magnitude of the event, the diamond anniversary of the state's largest farm organization, should certainly not be overlooked, TFB President Kenneth Dierschke said.

"Seventy-five years is a long time," Dierschke said.

"Whether you're talking about a marriage or an organization, the anniversary that is called diamond is something very, very special." Even those special

"It was a time of turmoil in agriculture that the founding fathers of Texas Farm Bureau laid the foundation of this organization," he said. Farmers and ranchers fought soaring prices—\$4 a gallon diesel and tripled fertilizer costs—all the while battling politicians and editorial writers as the future of the nation's farm policy fell under fire. Producers were even painted the villain when the price of food—much like everything else in 2008—began to increase.

As prices have begun to level back, some demanded apologies for such smears to the nation's farmers and ranchers.

Be it eminent domain reforms and transportation issues in Tayas or hildsteal.

Be it eminent domain re-forms and transportation issues in Texas or bilateral trade agreements at the na-tional level, Farm Bureau has much work ahead in educating our leadership on the issues before us, Dier-schke said.

Economy is the wild card in beef cattle price forecasts

Most sectors of the nation's beef industry are losing money, which has caused production forecasts for next year to be reduced. Usually a decrease in production would provide a boost of cattle prices for producers and feedlot operators, but USDA livestock analyst Shayle Shagam says while that might happen, it might not due to offsetting factors including the economy.

"You do have expectations of declining production in 2009 which would tend to be price supportive," Shagam says. "But the economic situation, the macro economy in the coming year.

Observe bulls closely during breeding season

the emerged crop reported to be in mostly fair to good condition. Cotton harvest advanced to 81% complete, slightly behind the normal pace. Grain sorghum and peanut harvests are almost finished. Pastures were re-ported to be in mostly poor to fair condition and needing rain in most areas. The fall-breeding season is upon us, and that means herd managers need to keep an eye on bulls to make certain cover are horizoned.

herd managers need to keep an eye on bulls to make certain cows are being bred.

Occasionally, a bull that has passed a breeding soundness exam may have difficulty serving cows in heat, especially after heavy service, cautions Glenn Selk, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension cattle specialist.

"In terms of calf-crop percent, the inability of a bull to complete normal service and low fertility are more detrimental than failure to detect cows in heat," he said.

"Such problems can best be detected by observing bulls while they work."

In other words, cattle producers should protect their investment by watching bulls actually mate with cows during the first part of each breeding season.

"If problems are apparent, there is time to replace the

bull and salvage the remainder of the breeding season and next year's calf crop," Selk said.

and next year's calf crop, Selk said.

Also, some bulls can wear out from heavy service and lose interest in mating. These animals must be replaced as soon as possible.

"The greater the number of cows allotted to each bull in the breeding pasture, the more critical it is that every bull be ready to work every day of the breeding season, Selk said.

In addition, injuries to bulls during the breeding season are not uncommon.

"When a bull becomes lame or incapable of breeding because of injury to his reproductive tract, the animal needs to be removed from the breeding pasture and replaced with another herd sire, Selk said.

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
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
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




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Tigers work towards playoffs under Schilling

Senior leadership, with 11 seniors




According to Porter, seniors Paul Millman and Dustin Ham will Carney's two main targets when he does take to the air seeking out wide receivers.





Baillio, the big man at strong tackle, is 6' and weighs 283 pounds. He was a First Team All- District lineman as a junior.


"Hayden is a big kid and a great player. We are expecting big things out of him as a senior." Gill said.

TFB president calls for united front of farmers and ranchers

Uncertain financial times for Texas farmers and ranch-ers make unity more impor-tant than ever before, the president of Texas Farm Bu-reau said during his annual address at the organization's 75th annual convention. But the magnitude of the

Toth annual convention.

But the magnitude of the event, the diamond anniversary of the state's largest farm organization, should certainly not be overlooked, TFB President Kenneth Dierschke said.

"Seventy-five years is a long time," Dierschke said.

"Whether you're talking about a marriage or an organization, the anniversary that is called diamond is something very, very special." Even those special

ficulty, Dierschke said.

"It was a time of turmoil in agriculture that the founding fathers of Texas Farm Bureau laid the foundation of this organization," he said. "In the seven and a half decades that have followed, we've seen good times and bad. We've been victimized by short-sighted policies. We've faced an urban America that understands less and less about the source of their food and fiber."

Add to those difficulties the economic realities that have occurred over the last 12 months, and the future could look downright grim for those scratching out a living on the land, Dierschke said.

"Our country has been

"Our country has been through the wringer this year—and Texas agriculture right along with it." he said. "The stock market, the price of oil, home values in free fall, crashing financial and commodity markets.... There were high points that bordered on the ridiculous and lows low enough to devastate many families in urban and rural America alike."

in urban and rural America alike."

Farmers and ranchers fought soaring prices—\$4 a gallon diesel and tripled fertilizer costs—all the while battling politicians and editorial writers as the future of the nation's farm policy fell under fire. Producers were even painted the villain when the price of food—much like everything else in 2008—began to increase.

As prices have begun to level back, some demanded apologies for such smears to the nation's farmers and ranchers.

Be it eminent domain reforms and transportation issues in Tayas or hildsteal.

Be it eminent domain re-forms and transportation issues in Texas or bilateral trade agreements at the na-tional level, Farm Bureau has much work ahead in educating our leadership on the issues before us, Dier-schke said.

"That's why we're here today," he added, "to continue building this organization for battles present and future. This is our challenge—a trust placed in us by the leaders of another generation—to ensure that no member of Texas Farm Bureau faces the future alone."

Brucellosis free

Brucellosis free
Texas has officially had
brucellosis-free status since
February of this year. But
that doesn't mean we're
free from monitoring. Sexually intact cattle 18 months

Animal ID outside the United States

Since Country of Origin Labeling (COOL) is upon us, it may be of interest to investigate the rest of the world. The United States is not nearly the only country that has implemented some type of animal ID system. Colorado State University researchers compared the current federal voluntary U. S. National Animal Identification System (NAIS) to systems outside the U.S. Represented the comments of the country of the current federal voluntary U.

sented were 12 countries or groups of countries (the Eu-ropean Union has a unified program and will be considered a "country" in the

considered a "country" in the following summary) in Africa, Asia, Australia (and New Zealand), Europe, North America (Canada and Mexico), and South America.

Premises ID is mandatory in seven of those countries, Individual ID of cattle is mandatory in nine countries and voluntary in three. Group or lot ID, in place of individual ID, is allowed in 10 countries but not in two. Electronic ID is mandatory

in four countries and vol-untary in eight. Recording of movement of animals is mandatory in eight counof movement of animals is mandatory in eight countries and voluntary in four. It is mandatory to retire individual animal ID numbers in eight countries and voluntary in four. Australia is the only country requiring mandatory compliance with all of these features, except for allowing group or lot ID. All of these features are voluntary in the current U.S. NAIS. It will be interesting to see which features, if any, evolve over time in NAIS.

Economy is the wild card in beef cattle price forecasts

Most sectors of the nation's beef industry are losing money, which has caused production forecasts for next year to be reduced. Usually a decrease in production would provide a boost of cattle prices for producers and feedlot operators, but USDA livestock analyst Shayle Shagam says while that might happen, it might not due to offsetting factors including the economy.

"You do have expectations of declining production in 2009 which would tend to be price supportive," Shagam says. "But the economic situation, the macro economy in the coming year.

Observe bulls closely during breeding season

The fall-breeding season is upon us, and that means herd managers need to keep an eye on bulls to make certain cover are horizoned.

herd managers need to keep an eye on bulls to make certain cows are being bred.

Occasionally, a bull that has passed a breeding soundness exam may have difficulty serving cows in heat, especially after heavy service, cautions Glenn Selk, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension cattle specialist.

"In terms of calf-crop percent, the inability of a bull to complete normal service and low fertility are more detrimental than failure to detect cows in heat," he said.

"Such problems can best be detected by observing bulls while they work."

In other words, cattle producers should protect their investment by watching bulls actually mate with cows during the first part of each breeding season.

"If problems are apparent, there is time to replace the

bull and salvage the remainder of the breeding season and next year's calf crop," Selk said.

and next year's calf crop, Selk said.

Also, some bulls can wear out from heavy service and lose interest in mating. These animals must be replaced as soon as possible.

"The greater the number of cows allotted to each bull in the breeding pasture, the more critical it is that every bull be ready to work every day of the breeding season, Selk said.

In addition, injuries to bulls during the breeding season are not uncommon.

"When a bull becomes lame or incapable of breeding because of injury to his reproductive tract, the animal needs to be removed from the breeding pasture and replaced with another herd sire, Selk said.


Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 11.0 mil-lion head on Nov. 1, 2008. The inventory was 7% below Nov. 1, 2007 and 8% below Nov. 1, 2006.

Marketings of fed cattle during October totaled 1.81 million, 3% below 2007 but 3% above 2006.

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TDA market recap

For the week ending Dec. 6, feeder cattle price trends at Texas auctions were mixed, with sales early in the week steady to \$6 lower per hundredweight (cwt) and later sales steady to \$\$6 higher. Fed cattle prices declined by \$3 per cwt in response to lower beef prices and concerns that demand will decline in a weaker economy.

Cotton and grain markets closed the week at their lowest levels in more than two years as a strong U.S. dollar, slumping export demand, and concerns about the economy continue to push commodity markets lower.

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
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
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




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Tigers work towards playoffs under Schilling


According to Porter, seniors Paul Millman and Dustin Ham will Carney's two main targets when he does take to the air seeking out wide receivers.

Whitesboro Bearcats seek success in tough district

Coach Eddie Gill has probably been more successful in his first two years at Whitesboro than any other coach in Bearcat history. Coming off a 7-3 season last year, Gill hopes to remain consistent and proceed to post-district play in November.

Whitesboro is ranked fourth in district 9- 3A by Dave Campbell's Texas Football. Celina is in the top seed.

Area favorite Prosper comes in at number two below the Bobcats and the Argyle Eagles are ranked third in district play.

Campbell picks Gainesville fifth in the district and Sanger rounds it out at number six.

"We are in a the hunt," Gill said, "Once you take Celina out of the mix, you can throw a blanket over all the rest of the teams in the district."

"He is a smart kid and a great player, Gill said." He is able to control the entire field and still hold the pocket."

Seniors Voyles, Gillum and Brady Warren will be comprising the Bearcat backfield and taking hand-offs from Labhart.

Several players on the roster weigh in at over 200 pounds and the core four of them tip the scale at over 250 pounds. Seinors David Schares and Hayden Baillio bring size and experience to the gridiron and promise to be two leaders on this, one of the biggest offensive lines in the

Baillio, the big man at strong tackle, is 6' and weighs 283 pounds. He was a First Team All- District lineman as a junior.


"Hayden is a big kid and a great player. We are expecting big things out of him as a senior," Gill said.


