## DPS warns of delays on I-35 in Gainesville

Beginning May 26, there will be a few lane closures in Gainesville that will affect commuter traffic. TXDOT will be closing the north bound lanes of IH-35 at the 495 mile marker to resurface the Elm Creek Bridge. The lanes will be closed one at a time so traffic will be allowed through but it will cause delays. The IH-35 service road does NOT cross Elm Creek and motorists should stay on the Interstate if they wish to cross. This area will be patrolled by the DPS to ensure safety for motorists during this project. The construction will begin Tuesday the 26th and is projected to continue for 45 days.

## Denis Walterscheid 1928 - 2009

Mass of Christian Burial for Denis Gilbert Walterscheid, age 81 of Muenster, was held at 10 a.m. on Thursday, May 21 at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster. Fr. Ken Robinson and nephew, Fr. Kyle Walterscheid con-celebrated the Mass. Bishop Kevin Vann of the Diocese of Fort Worth also attended. Services were directed by McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster. Denis died at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, May 18, 2009 at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth, after becoming suddenly ill on Sunday.

Born Jan. 30, 1928 in Muenster, the eldest son of Adolph Frank and Marie Catherine Schoech Walterscheid, Denis grew up on the family farm near Muenster. He attended Sacred Heart School through the eighth grade while working with his family on the farm. At 18, he enlisted in the Air Force. After serving a short time, he received an honorable medical discharge.

He married Della Rose Herr on April 15, 1952 in Sacred Heart Church. They lived for a short while in Muenster, then moved to "the old home place" where he continued to work with his dad. He later began working in the welding business with his brother Julian, until 1971 when he began his construction business. After 20 years, he returned to full-time farming and cattle raising.

Always active in his church and community, Denis gave tirelessly of his time. He served on the Sacred Heart School Board, the Diocesan Society, and he was an usher. He set a faithful example of stewardship to his children who learned the value of sacrifice and commitment through his examples.

Denis is survived by his wife and best friend of 57 years, Della Walterscheid of Muenster; three daughters and sons-in-law, Darlene and Bill Bartush of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Denise and Debby and Jack Schoppa of Saint Jo; three sons and daughters-in law, Phil Walterscheid of Muenster, Ted and Carrie Walterscheid of Paradise, Bret and Kimberly Walterscheid of Muenster; 19 grandchildren; nine great-grandchildren; two brothers and sisters-in-law Julian and Carrie Walterscheid of Muenster, and Sylvan and Theresa Mae Walterscheid of Muenster.

He was preceded in death by his oldest son, Kenneth Raymond Walterscheid, in 1971, and his parents.

He added, "Denis often said, 'if you can't enjoy life, what's it all good for?' His grandchildren brought him great enjoyment."

Danny continued, "His children learned the value of hard work... Denis never wavered in his belief that Sundays were for Church and for rest. Sunday fishing trips, picnics on Clear Creek, and an afternoon spent at the lake riding in the boat that Denis rebuilt, were sources of great family fun..."

"Denis was also an enthusiastic football fan whose encouragements could easily be heard over the crowd by his sons..."

"Home was a place of great comfort for Denis. It was a place for prayer, family, friends, laughter, fun, and even hard work. But most importantly, it was a place of great love, a love that was reflected in all that he did..."

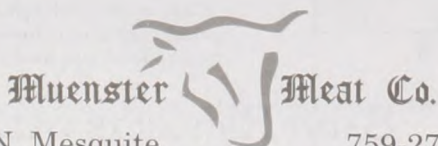

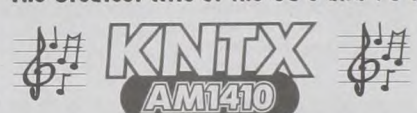
another hour and then headed back to school.

## Deer regulation changes made

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted a series of wildlife and hunting related regulations that expand special buck antler restrictions and liberalize antlerless harvest opportunities in dozens of counties. The new rules take effect during the 2009-10 hunting seasons.

One of the biggest changes involves further expansion of the Department's successful antler restriction regulations into 52 additional counties where biologists have identified a need to provide greater protection of younger buck deer.

According to Clayton Wolf, TPWD big game program director, the antler restrictions have significantly improved age structure while maintaining ample hunting opportunity, based on data to date in the 61 counties where the rule is currently in effect.

New counties under the antler restriction rule this fall include Cooke, Denton, Grayson, Montague, Wise, and 47 more.

The Department got overwhelming support to increase whitetail bag limits in several areas of the state with growing deer numbers or populations sufficient to support additional hunting opportunity.

The Department is increasing the bag limit in most Cross Timbers and Prairies and eastern Rolling Plains counties from three deer (no more than one buck, no more than two antlerless) or four deer (no more than two bucks and no more than two antlerless) to five deer (no more than two bucks).

The Department is also expanding the late antlerless and spike season into additional counties including Cooke, Denton, Montague, Wise, and 62 other counties.

Hunters are urged to check the Outdoor Annual of hunting and fishing regulations for county and species specific rules before going afield this fall. The annual will be available online and wherever hunting licenses are sold beginning Aug. 15.

## Commissioners Court debates Personnel Policy amendment

What does one do with one's children if schools close due to something such as threat of a pandemic flu outbreak? That question has been addressed by employers and employees in recent weeks.

Cooke County Commissioners Court was asked at its regular meeting held Monday, May 11 to consider an amendment to the Cooke County Personnel Policy that would assist parents with that choice.

Human Resource Director Jennifer Eberle explained that employees who have been with the County for less than a year have only sick day leave available. That can only be used if you are going to the doctor, are sick, or are caring for a dependent who is sick.

The proposed amendment would allow the employees to use sick leave time to take off to care for their dependent children who wouldn't have child care if the schools closed. If there were a flood, it would allow them to clean up their house, she said. This would only be an option if the County Judge declared a disaster.

County Judge Bill Freeman remarked that should the amendment be approved, employees would have to use all other available days such as vacation time, personal time, etc. before they could use sick days for another purpose.

Commissioner Gary Hollowell commented, "I typically would discourage an employee from using sick time for anything other than sick time."

Commissioner Al Smith urged walking slow to see what comes out before taking action. It could be rather expensive to the County. "It's an emergency act that we can always put in place," he noted.

After more discussion, the amendment failed by a vote of 3-2, with Commissioners Smith, Hollowell, and Leon Klement voting against the amendment and Judge Freeman and Commissioner Steve Key voting for it.

Judge Freeman noted that he had been approached by

an oil company wishing to lease the mineral interest on the "Poor Farm" on Rice Avenue and Old Denton Road. In order to lease anything, the County must put it out for bids. "The land all around the Poor Farm has been leased," said Judge Freeman.

Commissioners voted 5-0 to advertise for bids for lease of County owned mineral interests on the Poor Farm property.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Approved a resolution requesting that the Texas Legislature address the Comptroller's interpretation of the Texas Tax Code Sec. 23.175 (market condition factor) and its effect on the oil and gas values in counties in the State of Texas and make all efforts to change or repeal Texas Tax Code 23.175 to bring all Texas taxpayers into an equitable position.
- Approved cellular phone allowance for Dana Sons, information technology director.
- Appointed Todd Stevens to the Cooke County Child Welfare Board, Place 3.
- Approved mutual aid agreement between Cooke County and the Cooke County Fair Association Board. The County uses Fair Ground property for its hazardous waste collections on occasion and the Fair Association uses the County barricades at times.
- Awarded bid for emergency medical services billing and collection to SGS of Dallas. Bids were opened at a designated place and time outside of Court. SGS was the low bidder.
- Approved 1209-10 County Budget.
- Approved indigent burial of Henry B. Collins.
- Ratified Judge Freeman's signature on a request for federal assistance through the Emergency Watershed Protection Program offered by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.
- Approved auction proceeds from the sale of Commissioner Precinct #2's equipment in the amount of \$14,126.50.

## Morrison Milling Elevator torn down



The Morrison Milling Elevator, the old grain elevator "just south of and connected to the MK&T railroad tracks" was knocked down and hauled away last week by Paul Becker. Morrison Milling of Denton ran the mill in the 1940s. Ed Rohmer was the local operator. In 1951, Muenster Milling purchased the building. In their first year of ownership, the local wheat crop was completely wiped out and the elevator didn't open that year. The elevator operated as a wheat buying station in season and storage of grain for the feed mill the rest of the year until it was sold to Flusche Enterprises in 1982. Janie Hartman photos
