NRCS grant funds awarded to Cooke County Precinct 4 and 2

Darnell Williams of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Services spoke to Commissioners Court at its regular meeting on Monday, March 22 in regard to funding approved for Cooke County through the Emergency Watershed Protection Program. Williams explained that NRCS pays 75% of the cost to install protective measures to reduce the threat of future damages to roads, bridges, property, and other local infrastructure.

"This request was made after Cooke County received a tremendous amount of rain and heavy flooding in May of 2009," said Williams. "Our local NRCS staff made assessments of 30 of the sites. We only found eight sites that we thought would be eligible for this program. Hats off to the commissioners for doing a very good job of taking care of their own roads and using their own resources to get this done."

The total cost for the eight sites is \$341,000. NRCS's part is estimated at \$251,000 and the County's portion is about \$85,000. Williams noted that this program had not been used by commissioners in Cooke County in the past to get federal money to fund such projects.

In Precinct #4, Commissioner Leon Klement said that the biggest project is on Johnson Lake dam where the auxiliary spillway has mostly washed away. Another is on CR 411 where a portion of a about 1/3 of a concrete low water crossing broke away during recent flooding. The third is on CR 414 where debris is changing the course of the stream and slowly trying to take away the bridge.

It was noted that the County will not have to do any of the work, only have to pay the 25% match. The Court approved the grant.

Gilbert Hess received approval to be promoted from road hand in Precinct #3 to road foreman with corresponding pay. He was also approved a cellular phone allowance.

Precinct #2 Commissioner Steve Key reported that there were a number of projects in his precinct involving drainage issues in Woodbine where they will be cleaning drift and debris out of creeks that cause the water to come out of the creek channel and

across roads. It involves five of his roads.

Ronnie Young of the North Texas Ground Water Conservation District (NTGWCD) presented Commissioners Court with a proposed loan agreement between the Water District and Cooke, Grayson, and Denton counties. Commissioners agreed to the contract with an amendment recommended by their attorney. They added, "The District shall provide the County with a copy of the District's annual audit within 10 days of its approval. In addition, the District shall provide the County with the copy of the District's annual budget within 10 days of its approval. The District will provide the County with all financial reports presented to the District's Board within 10 days of such presentation."

Precinct #4 got approval to surplus and auction off the following vehicles and equipment: 1991 Ford F 250

pick up, 1980 Cat D5B dozer, 1987 Volvo N12 heavy haul truck, and a 1968 Army 6x6 wrecker.

Bob Matthews of All American Dogs in Pilot Point gave his proposal for emergency animal control services. He was called on by Commissioner Key when three injured pit bulls that had been dumped in a neighborhood posed a threat. A call to the Sheriff's Office got a response that they weren't responsible for stray animal calls. Key was called and contacted Matthews who shot the dogs that were threatening to attack.

Matthews would charge \$95 to \$110 plus materials. He said he normally attempts to catch the animals and find homes for them.

County Judge John Roane suggested and it was agreed to check with the Sheriff's Office as to what the policy is before considering any action.

Commissioners Court

honored the Muenster Lady Hornets Basketball team for making it to the State playoffs. The team and Coach Jason Atcheson attended the meeting to accept their plaque and congratulations March 22 was declared Muenster Hornets' Day.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Discussed pros and cons of an election administrator position for Cooke County. Decided that at this time the money it would cost is needed and would be more wisely spent elsewhere. No action was taken.

- Possible digital upgrades to Commissioners Court were discussed with IT Director Dana Sons presenting options and estimated costs. It will be discussed with the architect for the ongoing Courthouse restoration project so that necessary outlets, etc. will be installed. No action was taken.

- Approved surplus or

Muenster Fire truck headed to fires in Montezuma

On Tuesday morning, March 23, Muenster Volunteer Fire Department's old red Fire Engine #123 headed up the road to its new home in Montezuma, Kansas. Montezuma Volunteer Fire Department Fire Chief Oan Hogie and Assistant Chief Jonathan Goossen took possession of the vehicle after Muenster VFD sold it to NextEra Wind Energy who in turn donated it to the Montezuma VFD.

NextEra Wind Energy has wind farms in both Muenster and Montezuma. According to Lindsey Hunt, public relations representative from NextEra, his company received word of the Muenster fire truck being available from an employee at the Muenster site. Brandon Ferguson, who gave the information, is a wind tech at Wolf Ridge and serves as a volunteer firefighter for Muenster VFD.

NextEra and its employees are committed to the communities where their facilities are located. "One of the top things is our commitment to the communities, making sure that we do what we said we were going to do, and that is being a good corporate neighbor," explained Hunt on the fire truck donation that assisted two volunteer fire departments in two of the communities that NextEra calls home to one of its

many wind energy facilities. "We're going to be here with the wind facility, Wolf Ridge, for a good while, as well as the facility we are donating the truck to. We have been there for a good seven years. We plan to continue and expand, not only in Texas, but also in Kansas.

"It's a nice gesture, and it's the right thing to do, and it's part of the responsibility of being a good corporate neighbor.

"The connection with Brandon being a part of this, as well as working with us, we find these things and it's unique, it's good, and everybody wins. It's neat when it happens."

Hunt noted that this was the second time that the NextEra company has purchased a fire truck from one community and donated it to another.

Montezuma VFD will use the truck for its city pumper and will be kept for use inside the city limits. The town has a population of about 900. There are 20 volunteer firefighters with the Department. They also serve the rural areas of Gray County. Hogie described Montezuma as a nice, clean, small town. Goossen added, "It's not a dying town. It's got a bustle in it yet."

Gray County Wind Farm established by NextEra about seven years ago has 172 towers, they said. They

are the ones with the smaller generators.

"We are very grateful for this opportunity," said Goossen of the truck they were gifted. "Something like this

doesn't come along very often," said Chief Hogie.

Muenster VFD now has an additional \$11,000 in its treasury. That is the amount paid for the truck. Accord-

ing to Muenster Fire Chief Herbie Knabe, Engine #123 is a 25 year old vehicle that Muenster VFD purchased from Gainesville Fire Department nine years ago.

With the addition of Muenster's new truck which carries 2,000 more gallons of water, they no longer had a need for the older one in their fleet of fire vehicles.

What this Health Care Bill means for you

Health care reform has now passed. The path it took has really been extraordinary. It started with an issue that touches every single American and represents one-sixth of the U.S. economy. Then came 2,000 plus page bills to overhaul the system and give vast new powers to federal regulators. That led to public outrage and concern and to increased political interest and activism throughout the country. It all culminated in the use of unusual procedures to limit debate and prevent amendments. And now it has passed, despite the clear opposition of a majority of the American people.

It would be hard to find another example of legislation this significant which has become law in spite of the clear objection of the American people. No Member of Congress could have failed to hear the concerns that people had. Those who voted for the bill simply chose to ignore them.

My view is that we need reform. But Congress has a better chance of getting it right and of maintaining the trust of the American people if it takes reform in bite-sized chunks, starting with one or two reforms and building on them. That was not the path chosen by President Obama and the Democratic leadership of the Congress. They chose to do it all at once.

What does it all mean for you?

Some of the consequences are clear from the words of the bill. Every person in the country will be required to have health insurance. If you do not have it, you will be fined. Every employer who has at least 50 employees will have to provide health insurance to its employees or pay fines.

The government will create "health exchanges" from which people can buy insurance. There are tax credits and other subsidies to help some people buy insurance through the exchanges.

Medicare spending will be reduced by \$500 billion, much of it from the Medicare Advantage programs which serve about one-fourth of Medicare beneficiaries.

Tax increases of about \$569 billion will be imposed, making job creation even more difficult.

Other consequences are just as clear to those who have studied the bill. Those who currently have health insurance will pay more. One study estimated that premiums will be 10% to 15% more than they would have been without this bill because of the new mandates, regulations, and taxes on insurance companies.

The national debt will rise even higher. The new programs and benefits will cost more money, not less. The cost estimate provided by the Congressional Budget Office considers 10 years of tax increases and Medicare cuts but only six years of benefits. If we look at an equal amount of time for revenue and benefits, the bill will undoubtedly increase debt and put an even greater strain on Medicare, a program already in financial trouble.

The federal government will be more intimately involved in decisions that are made on your health. The bill creates a number of new offices and commissions with powers to affect and even regulate some part of your health care.

We are guaranteed to face constant political battles over health care. As the government gets more involved and controls more decisions about insurance and about care, it is inevitable that Congress will be drawn into disputes about coverage and payments.

I am often asked whether this law can be repealed or modified. Of course, it can. But doing so will require the consent of the President or an overwhelming number of votes in Congress to override the President's veto. That will be difficult to accomplish, at least for the next two years of President Obama's term. But, most of the provisions do not take effect right away. There is some time to modify them if a bill to do so is signed into law.

I know of no country that has ever gone down the path of government-run health care that has ever reversed course, but I know of no country on earth like the United States of America. Many of the people in our area are very disappointed that this bill has passed. I am too. But if people stay engaged to make their views known, it can be changed.

In 1988, Congress passed an expansion of Medicare that infuriated seniors across the country. They made sure that their elected representatives at every level knew their views. A year later, the law was repealed. It can be done. We should work to make sure that this bad health bill meets the same fate.

CCFA cooks up fundraiser for new facility

Those who want to enjoy a nice juicy hamburger with all the trimmings, cookie, chips, and a drink while supporting the community will want to mark Thursday, April 1 on their calendars. That is the date set by the Cooke County Fairgrounds Association (CCFA) to host its Hamburger Drive Thru fund raiser. The event will be from 11:30 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. at the Fairgrounds which are located on the road to the Cooke County Justice Center north off Hwy. 82. To be given away are a \$150 and a \$100 gift certificate to Osbornes in Gainesville.

CCFA is working to raise funds to complete a new arena on the fairgrounds. The old facility was destroyed by a storm on April 28, 2006. They raised more than \$166,794 and have constructed a covered arena on its 47 acres that is debt free. Muenster State Bank donated \$5,000 toward the building project recently and those funds are designated

for the arena floor which follows the electrical work being done now. Muenster Milling also gave \$1,000 in the late fall.

Donations of any amount are needed and welcomed. On the larger scale, a donation of \$250,000 or more would earn arena naming rights. There are several sponsorship levels including \$25,000 donation for Diamond; \$10,000 - \$24,999 for Gold; \$5,000 - \$9,999 for Silver; \$1,000 - \$4,999 for Bronze; and \$250 - \$999 for Benefactor. All donations greater than \$250 will be permanently recognized by an attractive plaque placed in a prominent location within the new facility.

After the electricity and floor are installed, the next several priorities are building materials for fencing, completing restroom facilities (at an estimated cost of \$70,000), 400 feet of underground run-off drainage (estimated \$5,000), and speaker system (estimated \$6,600).

Distractions help children overcome needle nervousness

Distractions can be a powerful ally for the guardian of a child about to get poked with a needle for school shots, flu vaccinations, and blood tests, said Dr. Deborah Wiebe, professor of psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

"Tell a child to count backward as fast as they can," she says. "Or have him or her blow soap bubbles."

Adults, however, have to be careful of one distraction in particular that could turn negative: displaying fear themselves.

"For children, having parents there for support and distraction usually helps," Dr. Wiebe said. "That holds true as long as the adults are not modeling fear."

Negative experiences with needles or shots can lead to needle phobia, which is a much less common and more severe problem. Needle phobia can require a more systematic intervention by a behavioral specialist.

"Luckily, most kids won't ever reach this phase of needle fear," Dr. Wiebe said.

Prior to their performance day, the students had a full day of site seeing, The Country Music Hall of Fame was the first stop. Multiple exhibits, films, instruments, costumes, and personal items

of legendary musicians were on display.

Some favorites included the Blue Suede shoes, and banjos and guitars of the Prairie Ramblers, Gene Autry, Merle Travis, and Hank Williams. A car belonging to Webb Pierce, and a gold plated piano of Elvis Presley were also on display.

The Schermerhorn Symphony Center was built in

memory of the late maestro Kenneth DeWitt Schermerhorn, who led the Nashville Orchestra for 22 years. "Music defined his life, and in each position he held, Maestro was relentless in his pursuit of excellence." Schermerhorn played trumpet as an elementary student, earned several scholarships and awards throughout his career including his ten-

ure in the West Point Band and 83rd Army Band prior to becoming a conductor. Muenster's Band members enjoyed the Symphony Center tour, especially an explanation of how the floor in the concert hall can be changed from seating 1,860 people to the most distinctive ballroom for weddings, galas, corporate dinners, and other special occasions. "The ultimate satisfaction is creating music." - Maestro Schermerhorn.

Next, they took a walk over the Shelby Street Bridge constructed in 1909 and renovated in 2003 as a pedestrian only bridge between 1st Avenue and the Cumberland River on the West Bank. Architecturally, the bridge was the first in North America utilizing concrete arched trusses.

After a well deserved lunch at the local Golden Corral and a 13th birthday celebration for Lora Walterscheid, the students traveled to the Hermitage, home of America's seventh president, Andrew Jackson, and one of Tennessee's most favorite sons. This beautiful estate has been carefully cared for and restored so visitors can view the formal gardens, slave quarters, the original 1804 cabin of the estate, and the site where President Jackson and his wife were

laid to rest. On this 1200-acre plantation were cotton fields, fruit tree orchards, and gardens to entertain numerous visitors from all over the world with classic elegance in a mansion of this era.

A replica of the original Parthenon in Athens, Greece, dating back to 438 BC, was built for Tennessee's 1897 Centennial Exposition. The monument is Nashville's foremost art museum and is considered the "pinnacle of classical architecture." It is the only full-scale replica in existence.

After a long day of seeing the sites, the students enjoyed some free time in the Opry Mills Mall before returning to the hotel for swimming and games.

Those travelling to Nashville agreed that the experience was a wonderful, memorable, and an unforgettable trip for all.
