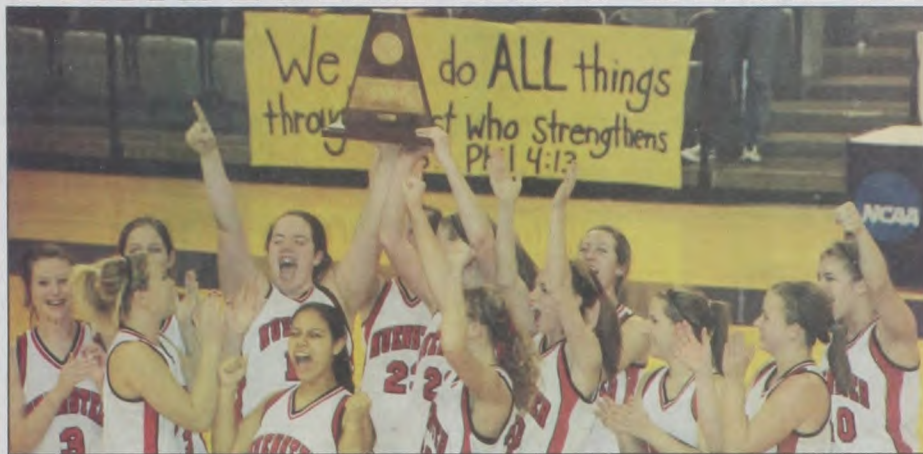

## Muenster carries Klement to victory

Very small numbers of Cooke County's 23,616 registered voters took time to cast their ballots in the March 2 Primary elections. In Cooke County, the Republican Party drew 5,181 voters and 372 Democrats cast votes for a voting total of 5,552.

On the County level, there were only three contested races. They were for County Clerk, Precinct #4 Commissioner, and Precinct #2 Commissioner.

Incumbent Leon Klement held on to his Commissioner Precinct #4 position with 56.80% of the votes. He received 743 votes and his challenger for the Republican nomination Jimmy Mosman received 565. With no Democratic opponent, Klement has a free ride in November.

Mosman led in the polls until the votes from Muenster's Precinct 18 were tallied in. Precinct 18 voters cast 504 or 77.54% for Klement and 146 for Mosman.

Votes from the other seven precincts that included the Precinct #4 Commissioner's race were as follows with Klement's votes first and Mosman's second: Pct. 2 - 24, 36; Pct. 21 - 158, 243; Pct. 33 - 24, 85; Pct. 34 - 13, 19; and Pct. 35 - 20, 36;

"I am glad it's over so I can focus my full attention to the business of Precinct 4 and our County," remarked Leon Klement after the election.

"We have a lot of work to do and I continue to dedicate myself to serve as Commissioner. The confidence my constituents have placed in me has given me firm resolve to help make Cooke County a great place to live. I appreciated every vote but it's very reassuring that my home town put me over the top."

Precinct #2 will have a new Commissioner in 2011. Commissioner Steve Key did not garner sufficient votes to keep his job. B.C. Lemons will be the next Precinct #2 Commissioner. Lemons received 912 votes (54.32%) to Key's 767 (45.68%).

Incumbent Rebecca Lawson will serve another term as Cooke County Clerk. She received 3,023 votes (67.42%) compared to her challenger Rheta Gilmer's 1,461 (32.58%).

"My reaction is one of excitement and gratefulness. I am truly grateful that the people of Cooke County re-elected me and believed in me so that I may continue the hard work of keeping the County Clerk's Office in the right direction of County Government," said Lawson of her victory.

Although Gov. Rick Perry carried the majority of voters in the State, he did not carry Cooke County for the Republican nomination for Governor. Cooke County Republicans cast 1,959

## City declares four mobile homes hazardous structures

Four mobile homes located in Sylvan's Trailer Park were declared hazardous structures by the Muenster City Council at its regular meeting on March 1. Only one of the four is currently occupied. Certified letters will be sent to the home owners of the homes at 424, 422, 504, and 517 Sylvan Lane.

If they do not respond, then the property owner, Sylvan Walterscheid, will be able to remove them from his land without any repercussions from the owners.

City Administrator Stan Endres noted that the City Council has the right through a City ordinance to declare a structure like the four in question as a dangerous, hazardous structure and to demand that its owner remove it. He said that the aluminum siding had been removed from one of the abandoned structures by a family member.

Endres said that he's been in contact with Walterscheid who expressed a desire to get his trailer park cleaned up, but didn't know how to go about getting the trailers removed.

Mayor John Pagel observed, "Not only are they an eyesore for the community, but they are a haven for skunks and rats, and that sort of thing."

The Council voted unanimously to declare them haz-

ardous structures and begin the process of having them removed.

Barbara and Tony Arterburn of Tony's Tavern requested that the City approve a late hour permit that would allow them to keep Tony's open until 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights. Currently they must close at midnight on Friday nights and at 1 a.m. on Saturday nights.

Tony's has been open for four years. Barbara said that in that time there have been three altercations and she feels that they were minor. She said that they pass TABC certification every year, they have no problems

with the State Comptroller's office or the TABC officers.

If the City gives approval, then the Arterburns will have to file with the County and take other steps before a new license is approved that allows the 2 a.m. closing. It would allow 2 a.m. closings every night of the week because that is the only option, but the Arterburns stressed that they would only stay open that late on Friday and Saturday nights.

"What we are actually looking at is the liability to our license that is happening to us," Barbara explained. "On a Friday night or a Saturday night, our younger group (25-35 year olds) start

loading up around 11:30 and drive to Gainesville where there is a 2 o'clock license in other establishments. They drink until they shut down and then they drive home. Most of them are from Muenster or the surrounding area. That puts them two-fold: one - DWI, two - a serious accident." She said it also puts her business in jeopardy for the liability of the bar when they decide to get on the highway and drive to the east part of the County if they were to cause an accident. Lindsay, Gainesville, and Oak Ridge all have 2 a.m. closing times.

## Rabid skunk reported

Muenster Police Chief Bob Stovall warns residents to be aware of skunks seen out during daylight hours. "Statistics show that 98% of skunks out in the daytime test positive for rabies," he noted.

According to Chief Stovall, he received a report on Feb. 19 that a family dog had killed a skunk that entered the family's backyard during the daytime. The skunk's head was sent off for testing at Texas Department of State Health Services (TDSHS). Meanwhile, the family dog was isolated from the family and other animals by being caged. It is being given the prescribed booster rabies vaccinations and will be kept isolated for 90 days, said Stovall.

The incident occurred at 229 South Pine Street and is the only confirmed rabies case thus far this year.

Chief Stovall urges anyone who sees a skunk out during the daytime to report it immediately and be sure that nobody makes contact with the animal. During business hours, call City Hall at 759-2236. After hours and on weekends, call 665-3471.

According to the TDSHS, you can be infected with the rabies virus if you are bitten by an animal that has the disease. You can also get rabies if the saliva from a rabid animal contacts your mucous membranes or any open wounds you might have. If you have such contact with a rabid animal, only a series of shots can keep you from

## Jones opens West Texas IT Services

David Jones has a long background with computers. It started as a hobby, but became the career path that he chose. In May, Jones will graduate from West Texas A&M with a Bachelor of Computer Science degree.

Two years ago, Jones took 3rd place, out of 1800 plus contestants in the U.S. and Canada, in a contest run by IBM called the Master the Mainframe Contest 2008. It is a contest designed to sharpen the skills of those who have an interest in the mainframe as a platform.

Jones opened West Texas IT this past January. He set up his business, West Texas IT, in Suite 210 of the Old Theatre Mall on Main Street. The Jones family moved to Muenster last May, but David didn't immediately open his business in Muenster. "I'm like a mobile IT staff," Jones said describing his business. "And I've earned the nickname The Computer Guy."

West Texas IT Services provides cost effective solutions for small business and residential computer owners all across the Texas Panhandle and North Texas. Services provided include Business

IT Help Desk, PC software and hardware support, networking setup and support, Internet and e-mail support, virus removal support, PC health checkup.

"We offer technical support for small to medium-sized

business as well as residential computer customers," Jones explained. "We service and repair networks, servers, and computer systems which include desktops and laptops. We also offer computer consulting on upgrad-

All of the testing equipment Jones uses is at his Muenster location, but he has the capability of going on site. "For my business clients, that is what I do," he noted. "My business customers that I had at Amarillo, I don't have to actually physically go there. I can remote to most of those locations unless it's a hardware issue." Besides Amarillo, Jones has customers in Abilene, Lubbock, Pampa, Dumas, and all over the Texas panhandle. He covers all 26 counties in the Texas panhandle.

that he'd rather see the rest of the County go the way Muenster is rather than Muenster joining them. "It's been my observation that very little good happens after midnight," said Pagel.

Asked his opinion, Chief Stovall said, "As far as I've seen, Tony's wife has run a pretty tight ship down there. Just lately, we've had a few fights." He added that when somebody gets ready to fight, it doesn't matter if it's before or after midnight, they're going to fight.

Nobody under the age of 21 is allowed in Tony's for any reason. The bartenders are trained on how to cut people off without causing problems or difficulties. Barbara said they give people rides home when necessary.

The Council voted unanimously to adopt the 2 a.m. ordinance.

The sale of portions of Willow and Fourth Streets finally got approval at the meeting. The Council approved an ordinance that vacated and closed portions of Wil-

low Street from Sixth Street to Second Street and Fourth Street to Hickory Street, reserving the rights of easements, and gave the mayor the authority to execute the sale of that property to adjoining landowners. The City is retaining 425 feet of Fourth Street.

MMH Administrator Lynn Heller reported that the Hospital plans to install a pipe fence around their part of Weinzapfel Lake to keep 4-wheelers and trucks out. There is a lot of damage being done with that type vehicle. They will provide a parking place for people who want to fish.

The three landowners are Henry Weinzapfel, Neal Bowie, and Muenster Hospital District. Each landowner will pay the cost of the property adjoining theirs plus the closing costs. Cost of the property is - Weinzapfel \$2,123.82; Hospital \$623.18; and Bowie \$85.

Artie Rox of National 1 Energy gave his proposal on a contract with Green Mountain Energy. The offer was for .067 cents per kilowatt hour and no meter fee. TXU offered .079 cents per kilowatt hour with a fee of \$5 per meter. The Council voted to contract with Green Mountain for a 24 month period beginning in mid May.

Darrell Charles and Maurus Hacker, Jr. are purchasing property on Hillside Drive, just outside the City limits. They requested that the City consider extending water service to Hillside Drive. They did not want to have to drill water wells.

Administrator Endres said that there would be no problem if they would be annexed into the City limits. This is not possible since they aren't contiguous with the City limits. The property owner between doesn't want to be annexed into the City.

Endres said that if they choose to tie on to the City water service, they would have to pay a double fee for the water. Mayor Pagel noted that some years ago that was changed to where each individual request would be considered on an individual basis.

The options on where to ex-

tend the line were discussed, as well as if there would be sufficient water pressure. The two parties requesting the service would have to provide the easement for the water lines. They are responsible for purchasing the water lines, but must dedicate them to the City.

Sale of the water was approved by the Council with the conditions that Charles and Hacker put in the line with an acceptable easement and dedicate the water line back to the City.

In his Administrator's report, Endres said that the City crews have been very busy for the past month repairing sewer line problems off of Eddy Street running down to the wastewater plant. "It's been so cold and so wet that we've just had every kind of problem go wrong." He said that outside help had to be brought in to get the job done. It's running to unexpected costs that may impact the budget for the sewer and water department.

Recycling was discussed. A suggestion by IESI was to recycle only paper and cardboard. Mayor Pagel doesn't like the idea of a partial program. After more discussion, it was decided that the ball is in Keep Muenster Beautiful's court and they will wait for the group to return with their suggestions.

MVFD Chief Herbie Knabe reported that the new fire engine is in service. The old 1985 model was sold for \$11,000 to a group who will donate it in March to a fire department in Kansas.

The Mesquite Street grant is moving forward.

In other business, the City Council:

- Approved Muenster ISD's request for a digital sign permit.
- Approved payment of bills totaling \$90,448.81.
- Approved renewal of lease with Muenster ISD for water well #3 at a cost of \$600 per year. Contract was made for two years.
- Heard racial profiling report by Chief Stovall. It included 116 whites, five blacks, 11 Hispanics, and one other.

## Harold Luke 1925 - 2010

Harold Joseph Luke of Arlington died Thursday, Feb. 25, 2010. Funeral Mass was held Tuesday, March 2 at St. Maria Goretti Catholic Church in Arlington. Visitation was held from 6 to 8 p.m. Monday in church.

Born in Muenster to Ben and Mary Luke, Harold worked on his family's farm growing up and graduated from Sacred Heart High School in 1943. He reported for naval training the day after graduating, serving as an enlisted radioman and gunner on a PBY Seaplane during World War II. Harold was awarded the Air Medal and the Distinguished Flying Cross for his service in the Pacific. He graduated from Texas Tech University in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering.

During the Korean War, Harold was recalled into the Navy and attended OCS and was promoted to ensign. After promotion to lieutenant junior grade, he finished his naval service in 1954.

Harold retired in 1989 after working 35 years at Vought Aerospace, holding significant design and managerial positions in the A7 aircraft program. After retirement, Harold particularly enjoyed golf and woodworking. He was a member of the Knights of the Holy Sepulchre.

Survivors include his wife of 56 years, Patricia; children Tina, Christopher, Margaret, and Kathryn; daughters-in-law Gayle and Melody; and six grandchildren.

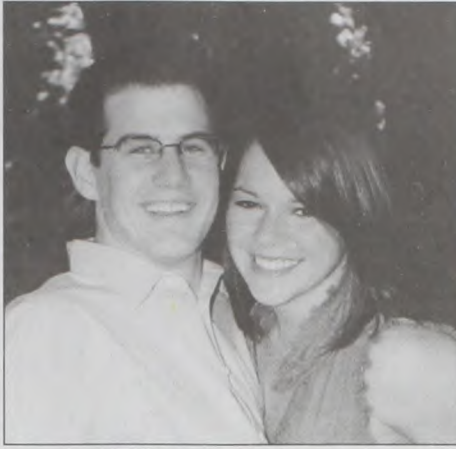

getting the disease. TDSHS reports that signs of rabies include:

- Animals that have a change in behavior.
- Wild animals which seem to be friendly or tame.
- Wild animals--coyotes, foxes, bats, skunks, and raccoons--which you do not usually see in the daytime.
- Animals that have a hard time walking, eating, or drinking.
- Excitement or meanness

in animals. • Animals that bite or scratch at an old wound until it bleeds.

If a pet is infected with the rabies virus, the way it acts may change. A friendly dog might want to be alone. A shy dog might want attention. Rabid dogs often become mean, roam, make strange noises, and attack people and other animals. Rabid animals may drool, and they sometimes swallow stones, sticks, or other things.

Later, as the rabid animal gets even sicker, it might have trouble chewing, swallowing, drinking, or walking. It may not be able to close its mouth, and may appear to be choking. Never try to clear the throat of an animal with these signs. If you see an animal acting this way, call the local animal control agency right away.

Be sure that your pets are up to date on their rabies shots. This could save a life.

## Increased retention of cattle breeding heifers may not translate into herd expansion

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service released its Cattle inventory report on Jan. 29. Changes in inventories of replacement heifers were mixed, but were net up only 1/10th of 1%. Both beef and dairy replacement heifers expected to calve in 2010 were up 1%, but total inventories of replacement heifers were down 2% for beef, while up just over 2% for dairy. A clearer picture is seen from the numbers: Beef cow numbers declined by 336,000 from Jan. 1, 2009 to Jan. 1, 2010, and only 18,000 more beef heifers are expected to calve this year than calved in 2009. Dairy cow inventories declined by 252,000 cows, while dairy replacement heifers expected to calve in 2010 increased by 32,000 head compared with the 2009 estimates. The slight increase in all replacement heifers expected to calve is not expected to significantly increase total cow inventories by Jan. 1, 2011.

The decrease in cow inventories and the relatively minor uptick in replacement heifer inventories were not as extensive as had been expected, and so were perceived by industry analysts as somewhat bearish for the longer term. This bearish tone implies negative pressure on future cow-calf profit margins, which also reduces the likelihood of an increase in Jan. 1, 2011 cow inventories. The 2009 calf crop was over 200,000 calves larger than previously expected. The upward revision in the Jan. 1, 2009 cow inventory means that the 2010 calf crop is also likely to be slightly higher than previously expected and will slightly mitigate the potential for reduced beef production in 2011.

Daily federally inspected cow slaughter continued heavy through January (ranging around 20% cows in the slaughter mix). However, the share of cows in the slaughter mix was lower as of Feb. 6, perhaps indicative of a beginning decline in cow slaughter. Normal culling during 2010, based on the reduced Jan. 1, 2010 cow in-

ventories and given the relatively high slaughter rates in 2008-09, imply reduced commercial cow slaughter for 2010 compared with last year.

However, it is difficult to see how beef cow slaughter could continue into 2010 at the same rate as in 2009, even if imports of Canadian cows for slaughter continue at or near year-earlier rates—weekly year-to-date imports of Canadian cows were 39% above comparable year-earlier levels through Feb. 6. In addition, feeder cattle prices and margins do not provide much incentive for beef cow-calf producers to expand, or perhaps even to maintain cow herd levels. Likewise, dairy producers will undoubtedly take a further look at culling marginal cows, given the increase in inventories of dairy heifers expected to calve in 2010 and the implied pressure on milk prices.

Jan. 1, 2010, supplies of feeder cattle outside feedlots—consisting of steers and heifers over 500 pounds and calves under 500 pounds, minus cattle on feed—are essentially unchanged from Jan. 1, 2009. Cattle on feed were down by 214,000 head, the steers-over-500-pounds inventory was down by 329,000 head, other heifers over 500 pounds were up by 79,000 head, and calves under 500 pounds were up by only 1,000 head. These changes amount to a net 463,000 fewer head either already on feed or available for feeding in 2010 compared with 2009, a further indication of beef production likely being reduced in 2010. However, there are some caveats.

With virtually no alternative other than beef production, steers over 500 pounds and the steer half of the calves under 500 pounds will eventually enter feedlots. Heifers, on the other hand, are a bit of a wild card. Some could be retained as replacement heifers, or some of the heifers reported as intended for replacements could still go to feedlots. The final heifer decisions will depend on pro-

ducer responses to feeding margins, feeder calf prices, summer pasture conditions, and some other factors. For example, increased feeding margins could pull some replacement heifers into feedlots as a means of increasing incomes in 2010.

Higher feeder calf prices, especially for heifers, could cause producers to respond in one of two ways: They could retain some heifers in the "other" category for breeding in anticipation of future profits, or they could place some heifers (currently categorized as replacements) on feed in anticipation of short-term profits. A dry year could also send more heifers to feedlots rather than retaining them for any purpose.

Inventories of cattle grazing on small grain pasture in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas on Jan. 1, 2010 were 16% above the Jan. 1, 2009 estimate. Because of recent precipitation in the Southern Plains, these cattle are more likely to remain on winter pasture until mid-March. To the extent that these cattle do actually remain on wheat pasture until at least mid-March, higher year-over-year net placements in mid-March 2010, when they finally are removed from winter pastures, are possible. This will increase the potential marketings from feedlots during late summer-early fall and ensuing beef production.

## Stocker cattle operators should be on lookout for wheat pasture bloat

Stocker operators with cattle grazing wheat pasture should be observing their animals closely for signs of wheat pasture bloat.

"Wheat pasture bloat—sometimes called Sudden Death Syndrome—is a frustrating problem, often killing the faster-growing calves that consume a greater amount of forage," said Greg Highfill, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension area livestock specialist.

Several factors related to plant growth and composition plus animal consumption play a role in this problem. As the wheat plants break winter dormancy, the proportion of forage components during this rapid growth phase can contribute to the rumen digestion producing a frothy foam. With rapid fermentation and conditions to produce a froth covering in the rumen, fermentation gas is trapped and bloat occurs.

Numerous factors can contribute to bloat conditions specific to each season," Highfill said. "In some years, the major culprit can often be cattle engorgement or simply eating too much wheat forage too fast."

Death usually trails engorgement within nine hours to 24 hours. In addition, weather fronts often disrupt normal cattle feeding patterns. Cattle often consume more forage when a weather change is about to occur.

The number of bloating cattle can increase rapidly in a few short days.

Producers often feel helpless as the death loss

number can be significant," Highfill said. "One logical management strategy that should help reduce frothy bloat would be to take steps to make wheat forage intake more uniform and prevent engorgement."

A useful option may be to provide cattle with a feed supplement that contains monensin. Monensin has proven to be effective in reducing the incidence of bloat and should reduce forage intake as well.

"Stocker cattle should receive 150 milligrams to 200 milligrams per head per day of monensin to effectively reduce bloat," Highfill said. "Purchasing a supplemental feed with the targeted monensin dose and getting it into the cattle are the primary management challenges."

Mineral mixes containing monensin also are available, although consumption typically will vary more from calf to calf.

Herd managers should assess the bloat risk in their operation to determine the level of protection needed, and possibly consult with their local veterinarian, if appropriate," Highfill said.

Poloxalene is the generally recommended treatment for significant bloat outbreaks, although it is an expensive feed additive. While poloxalene reduces rumen frothiness, it must be consumed daily as it has no residual effects in the rumen.

Highfill said the generally recommended rate of Poloxalene is one gram to two grams per 100 pounds of the animal's body weight. The most common form of polox-

alene is Bloat Guard®. "The preferred delivery would be to have poloxalene commercially mixed into a feed supplement; however, it could be top dressed onto processed feed in the feed bunk," he said. "Hand-feeding a supplement may not be possible, so providing poloxalene in a mineral may be the best option."

If mineral blocks are used, producers should encourage daily consumption of the proper poloxalene amount by removing all salt and other mineral sources.

What about the common practice of feeding hay to cattle on wheat pasture, in the belief that low consumption may provide limited bloat control?

"It's important to note that OSU studies have shown that feeding hay really has no significant effect on reducing bloat," Highfill said. "Some stocker cattle are just much more sensitive to bloat than others. If these animals survive the early part of an outbreak, they should be removed from wheat pasture as they will probably be susceptible to bloat the entire grazing period."
