



ELECTRONIC PROCESS USED FOR CHECKING WATCH PERFORMANCE

Electronics, the amazing scientific development that helped this country win the war is now working at the simple little job of testing the accuracy of your watch. It discovers in only a few seconds what you or your watch repair man used to discover by patient checking over periods of

patient checking over periods of days or weeks.
Such an instrument is the "Watch-Master" just installed at Huneycutt Jewelry, successor to Porter's Jewelry, in Gainesville.
By means of electronics it registers each tick of the watch on a whirling cylinder which runs at precisely the correct speed If the

precisely the correct speed. If the watch is correct it charts a hori-zontal graph, if fast or slow it charts a diagonal above or below the horizontal.

This instrument demonstrates This instrument demonstrates the fact, surprising to most people, that many watches run one speed in one position and another speed in another position. Face up or face down may cause a variation. The same is true of stem up or stem down. That is the reason a watch may be off time on a person's wrist after checking perfectly on a jeweler's rack

perfectly on a jeweler's rack.

After becoming familiar with it the watch repair man can diagnose just as a doctor does with a stethescope. Irregularities on the graph have characteristics which

can be interpreted.

The Watch-Master helps the jeweler in two distinct ways. It helps him discover trouble and it helps him check the watch after he has worked on it. (adv.)





Houston -. Humble Pipe Line Company's new 8-inch finished products 1 in e was formally opened Tuesday, October 15th, literally connecting Humble Oil "Because," he explained. & Refining Company's Baytown refinery, one of the world's largest and most modern, with the heavy consuming areas of North

Beginning 276 pipe line miles away on the Texas coast, the new underground artery ends at Irving, between Ft. Worth and Dallas on the northwest highway. Storage & terminal facilities have been provided for 150,000 barrels of products, and delivery has commenced from the North Texas terminal by rail and transport trucks to sales outlets over broad territory.

IT PAYS TO KEEP DAIRY PRODUCTION AND FEED RECORDS

Any kind of record that is kept in feeding dairy cows is better than none, say dairymen of the Texas A... and M. College Extension Service.

The dairyman that keeps no feeding and production records at all will usually feed all his cows the same amount, which means that the high producing cows are underfed and low-producing cows are over-fed. The Dairy Herd Improvement Association will furnish dairymen with the information necessary to do the right job of feeding cows according to production, the Extension dairymen say, and this method of feeding means more pounds of milk for each pound of grain fed.

If cows are on pasture and getting all the roughage they can clean up each day, grain can be used most economically by feeding one pound to Jerseys and Guernseys for each three pounds of milk they produce, and one pound to Holsteins for each four pounds of milk produced.






