Management of St. Richards Villa returns to MMH District

St. Richards Villa, Muenster's local nursing home, has been owned by the Muenster Hospital District, but leased to a second party since July 1, 2004. The Hospital District purchased the facility in 1998 and operated it until the time it was leased.

It was first leased by Bruce Burgamy who had it from July 2004 until Jan. 31, 2005. On Feb. 1, 2005 Travis Heights Healthcare, Inc. took over the lease. They are terminating their lease on Jan. 1, 2010 when the Muenster Hospital District will again step in to operate the facility.

A bevy of misinformation has been passed around about the situation at St. Richards, said MMH Administrator Lynn Heller, who wants to get the correct information out to the public. "The Hospital Board is com-

mitted to do everything in its power to keep that home operational and going for the people of Muenster and this part of North Texas," Heller stated.

According to Heller, Travis Heights notified the Hospital Board in August that it wished to non-repewits lesses.

Heights notined the Hospital Board in August that it wished to non-renew its lease as of Dec. 31 rather than at the end of the lease Jan. 31. "We started work trying to find some other people to lease it to, and we had a succession of people interested and a succession of people that dropped out," he noted. Several people were interested in buying the facility. Since St. Richards is owned by the Hospital District and is a political subdivision, it is public property. In the State of Texas that means it has to be put up for sealed bids to sell it. "There is certain protocol that we have to go through to put public

"We had asked the previous operators to extend the lease an additional 30 days and they agreed to under certain conditions and we were not willing to meet those conditions. As of Jan. 1, the Hospital will be taking back over the operation of St. Richards Villa. At the same time, we will be going through the process of putting St. Richards for sale on a sealed bid process." It is their goal to get that going within a week or so.

The bid process will still enable the Board to take into consideration the reputation and history of any potential buyer. Heller explained that

Cooke County Clerk's office earns Exemplary Five Star State award

Cooke County Clerk Rebecca Lawson and Deputy
Clerk Cindy Walterscheid returned from the 55th Annual Texas Vital Statistics
Conference with a prestigious honor. At the Conference held Dec. 9-11, the Cooke County Clerk's Office was awarded the Exemplary Five Star Vital Registration
Award for 2009. In the years from 2001 through 2008, they received the Five Star Recognition Award all but one year. This is the first year they were awarded the Exemplary status.

The award was for outstanding accomplishments in their performance during January through October 2009. Lawson remarked that she's very proud of her staff and the efforts they made that helped achieve the Exemplary Award.

Conference along with re-cruiting physicians in their registration district to sign up and use the Texas Elec-tronic Death Registration

According to Walterscheid, Cooke County holds the distinction of being the first county within the State of Texas to be 100% in using the Texas Electronic Death Records System (TER) when filing death certificates in the county. Many more counties have achieved or are working to achieve the 100% goal.

According to Walterscheid, in September 2007, HB 1739 mandated that all Texas death certificates be filed electronically, and the State Registrars Office for the State of Texas put in force their system for all Texas death certificates to be filed online. Death certificates are no longer allowed to filed manually. She said, "We've had a huge problem getting the doctors to comply with this. It's something new and they didn't want to take the time to learn how to do it. We've devoted a lot of time and effort this year to get all of our doctors on." Funeral homes came on-line first.

With the doctors filing online, the County is able to reduce the time it takes to file

Stoddard selected Courthouse construction manager at risk

Cooke County Commissioners Court followed the recommendation of the Courthouse Restoration Committee and voted unanimously to select Stoddard and to award the contract to Stoddard to serve as the construction manager at risk for the County Courthouse restoration project. With the authorization of Stoddard, the County can begin contract negotiations.

With the awarding of the contract, Stoddard will begin applying for permits and seeking subcontractors for the project. Completion of the project is set at 412 working days. It is anticipated that the restoration should be completed within one and a half to two years.

Precinct #4 Commissioner Alson Klement added, "The people who looked through that Courthouse remarked how well built it was. I know Counties Health and Em-



Fr. Placidus Eckart, OSB 1925 - 2009

Father Placidus Eckart, OSB, monk of Subiaco Abbey, Subiaco, Arkansas, strengthened with the Sacraments and the prayers of his brother monks, died on Monday, Dec. 14, 2009. At the time of his death, he was 84 years old. Fr. Placidus served at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster from June 1968 through June 1978. He was a professed monk for 65 years and a priest for 60 years. Fr. Placidus died after a long illness resulting from kidney disease.

"Bennie was an avid hunter and fisherman. He was a legend in his own time, and the best turtle catcher in these parts... Bennie enjoyed cooking and spending time with his family..."

"Bennie was a good father, but was a cream puff when it came to discipline. Oh, he would threaten to get out the electric cord, but I don't remember anyone being too scared...

Anthony Joseph Eckart was born March 3, 1925, in Subiaco. The Eckart family home was located little more than a stone's throw from Subiaco Abbey. He was the seventh of eight children born to Joseph Eckart and Annie Adams Eckart. His four brothers and two of his three sisters preceded him in death. He is survived by Sister Christine Eckart, OSB, of St. Scholastica Monastery. For Smith, Arkansas and his sister-in-law Mrs. Louise Eckart of Subiaco. Anthony received his elementary education at St. Benedict Elementary School in Subiaco. In the fall of 1939, Anthony enrolled at Subiaco Academy, graduating with the Class of 1943.

Feeling drawn to the monastic way of life at Subiaco Abbey, he entered the monastery as a candidate on Oct. 30, 1943. He was received into the novitiate on Oct. 30, 1943. With a single classmate, who was soon dismissed when he was exposed as a fraud, the Great Imposter of later book and movie fame. Anthony professed his vows as a monk of the monastery on Oct. 31, 1944, receiving the name Placidus.

Frater Placidus then entered Subiaco Abbey Seminary to begin studies for the priesthood. During his years in the seminary, he was in charge of the Abbey greenhouse, while assisting in landscaping and tending the Abbey gardens and parks, services he performed gladly and with great care.

Frater Placidus was ordained to the priesthood on May 24, 1949, at Subiaco Abbey by Bishop Albert L. Fletcher, Diocese of Little Rock, Arkansas. Upon ordination, Fr. Placidus was assigned to teach in Subiaco Academy, beginning with the 1949-50 school year. During his 16 years as a teacher, Fr. Placidus taught classes in Religion, Mathematics, English, and Social Studies. Also between 1949 and 1965, Fr. Placidus served in Religion, Mathematics, English, and Social Studies. and Instructor of Brothers in the monastic community from 1954 to 1958.

His first assignment as a resident pastor came in 1965 at Sacred Heart Church in Charleston, Arkansas. In July 1968, Fr. Placidus began 15 years of ministry in the Abbey's parishes in Texas, first at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster and then at St. Mary's Church in Gainesville. He was recalled to the Abbey in August 1983 for one year to serve as retreatmaster of Coury House and assistant director of Monastic Formation. He returned to parish ministry in Arkansas, serving at St. Boniface Church in Fort Smith from 1984 to 1995.

In 1995, Fr. Placidus requested a year's sabbatical in observance of his 50th anniversary as a monk in order to spend time in spiritual reflection and local ministry at St. John Center in Little Rock. People of all ages were drawn to Fr. Placidus because of his warmth, compassion, and depth of understanding of the human condition. He was very dedicated in ministering to the sick and dying and directed numerous healing ministries and retreats, and was active in the Charismatic Movement. Fr. Placidus was often referred to as "the butterfly priest" because of the butterfly priest" because of the butterfly priest" because of the butterfly emblems he used in vestments and on clothing as a sign of the resurrection, most of them given to him by children and adults in his ministry. Father enjoyed golfing and fishing, and he always led blueberry picking expeditions at community retreat.

The later years of Fr. Placidus' active ministry included a second pastorate at St. Boniface Church, Fort Smith from 1996 to 1998. He began serving also as the celebrant of the diocesan sponsored televised Mass for shut-ins. His final parochial assignment was in Scranton and Prairie View, Arkansas, from 1999 to 2002. In 2002, Father asked permission to exchange his pastoral duties for full-time ministry to the sick, and was appointed Chaplain of St. Edward Mercy Medical Center in Fort Smith, an assignment he held uhble Heathed Chaplain of St. E

organized some of his meditations for private publication and could hardly keep up with the demand.

Fr. Placidus' transition from active ministry to retirement was difficult at first. He described candidly his experiences and difficulties in an article entitled "The Aging Process" in The Abbey Message, Spring 2009 edition. In his retirement, he enjoyed visits from monks and friends, and especially the relatives who came regularly to play cards with him in the Health Center. He was diagnosed with kidney failure in January 2009, and given less than two months to live. However, he seemed to rebound at this news, experiencing a new peacefulness. He continued to live several months more, participating in community Masses and meals as he could, and growing steadily weaker toward the end. His death came peacefully in his room in the Monastic Health Center at 4:45 p.m., Dec. 14, 2009.

and receive a death certificate. She said previously, it took an average of 29.5 days to get a death certificate. Now with TER, it takes less than nine days. This could prove to be very important to some families needing to probate wills or file life insurance claims. It also helps State agencies track things like deaths from illnesses such as HIN1, she noted. Walterscheid has been very instrumental in assisting the County with that accomplishment. 'It was a goal that I set out last January,' said Walterscheid. "I said that by the end of this year I'm going to have our county going on-line with the State. It is a law. We'd been using the TER System since 2007, but we didn't have the doctors and funeral homes, and the JPs complying. In order for the process to work, we needed the whole group to be working." She made presentations to the local physicians to explain the process and encourage their participation.

On what she feels the

On what she feels the Master Certification brings to her job, Walterscheid commented, "That I have in-depth knowledge of how vital statistics work in the State. I can be called upon to do teaching classes on the State level. Other counties will call upon me to help with different vital statistics questions they have. It's just a bigger knowledge."

To earn her Master Certification, Walterscheid took a week of classes that lasted nine hours a day and required two to four hours of homework each night. Each year, the State Registrars Office invites local registrars to apply for a spot in the certification class. Walterscheid was one of only 18 applicants selected to attend the weeklong school in Austin this past August.

She was tested at the end of the week. To pass, she had to give a presentation to the State, and also had to give a presentation of Friday during the Annual Conference. Only 13 of the 18 applicants met all the requirements necessary to earn their Master Certification.

Walterscheid was asked to be a panel member representing all local registrars during a segment of the conference on death registration. "Out of all the local registrars in the State, they

As the United Nations climate change summit continues in Copenhagen, the debate of global warming is being distorted by political hot air.

FAO: A hungry needs ag investments

Agricultural investment in developing countries will have to increase more than fivefold to ensure that by 2050 the world has enough to eat, according to the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO).

Poor countries will need a yearly \$44 billion of development assistance in agriculture compared with the current \$7.9 billion, FAO Director-General Jacques Diouf said at a summit in Rome recently.

By 2050, world population is expected to rise from 6.7 billion, people to 9.1 billion, and the world's food output will have to increase by 70%, according to FAO.

They also envision a harmonious model of fairness and cooperation among the world's industrialized powerhouses so that the burden of cap and trade implementation is shared equally across the board. But with developing nations continuing to the board. But with developing nations continuing to press for exemptions to regulation and huge financial payouts to mitigate the effects of global warming, the United States literally cannot afford to meet the goals the United Nations and EPA are pushing.

With the recent "Climategate" scandal showing science can be cooked, we must look at the facts surrounding climate change and CO2 regulation. Political agendas are driving the greenhouse gas regulations that will increase production costs, put gas regulations that will increase production costs, put sectors of our economy out of business, and cripple the ability of the farmers and ranchers of our state and nation to continue producing the most reliable and safest food supply in the world.

I strongly support environmental stewardship based on clearly defined scientific principles — not pie-in-the-sky political idealism that has no real world connection to the struggles of hardworking American families.

I'm proud that Texas leads the nation in the production of cettle cetter heavy because

wool, goats, mohair, and horses. Texas also is among the leading states in the production of citrus, vegetables, poultry products, sorghum, wheat, and rice. Tighter world stocks may help farm prices

With consumption rising as the global economy begins to recover and production stagnating (because of relatively low prices), global stocks are now forecast to take the biggest hit in seven years. Most of that drop will be in foreign markets. Tighter world stocks should help support world prices. The U.S. farm price is currently forecast to be up 10%.

The widening gap between world consumption and production means more import demand. However, U.S. exports are forecast to drop by 23%, in part, because overall U.S. supply is not the lowest level in 41 years, Also, higher early season prices and large carry-in foreign stocks, coupled with relatively tight U.S. carry-in stocks, will constrain early-season U.S. exports. As a result, the U.S. share of world trade will fall from the record set last year to the lowest level in decades.



Field tests planned for E. coli vaccines

Whether new vaccines against E. coli O157:H7 can work well enough to be economically viable could be decided by new large field trials that are just getting

trials that are just getting underway.

Two vaccines are in trial. Willmar, MN-based Epitopix gained approval about 10 months ago for sales of its vaccine against E. coli in the United States. Claiming to be first to gain approval, however, is Ontario-based Bioniche Life Sciences, with a vaccine approved for sale in Canada.

Neither company is promising their vaccine alone will eliminate E. coli. As Bioniche says, "Effective pathogen management consists of multiple interventions against a pathogen. The vaccine is part of a multiple hurdle approach, along with existing methods for the reduction of bacterial contaminants. These methods include hide washing, steam cabinets, etc. in the meat processing facility."

But cutting down on the number of cattle with E. coli O157:H7 by 65 to 75% would show progress toward the

beef industry's stated goal of eradicating the bacterium from the meat supply.

The tests getting underway should go a long way toward finding out if that's possible. Cargill, the largest producer of beef in the United States, is funding and coordinating one test with 100,000 cattle. Epitopix tests of the vaccine in the U.S. will involve about 300,000.

Because of the cost, the vaccine makers are expecting initial users will target where they are used.

"The decision to vaccinate will be made by the individual cattle producer," says Bioniche. "It is expected that processors and retailers will also have an interest in adoption. There are approximately 115 million cattle in North America, 25 million of which are conditioned on feedlots. Feedlot cattle producers are expected to be the primary adopters of vaccination, with other cattle segments, such as the dairy industry and cow/calf operations to follow."

Bioniche posts its charge for the vaccine on their website: \$3 per dose. However,

each animal will require two or three doses, raising the total cost per head to as high as \$9. Many cattlemen see that as a profit-eating

high as \$9. Many cattlemen see that as a profit-eating amount.

E. coli O157:H7 is blamed for 73,000 illnesses and 61 deaths in the United States annually. In the last two years, about 42 million pounds of beef have been recalled for E. coli O157:H7 contamination. E. coli in its cattle herd costs Canada \$63 million a year, according to one study.

Vaccines for E. coli have been in the research and development phase since 2001. Since the purpose of the vaccine is not to improve the animal's health—E. coli bacteria is harmless when attached to the hindgut of a cow—there was some regulatory confusion about jurisdiction.

Both the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety & Inspection Service (FSIS) were involved in this issue before jurisdiction was determined to be under the USDA.

Once the objectives are determined and a few basic principles understood, pruning primarily is a matter of common sense.

It also is advisable to limit the amount of pruning done late in summer as new growth may be encouraged on some plants. This growth may not have sufficient time to harden off before cold weather arrives, resulting in cold damage or winter kill. Prune plants damaged by storms or vandalism or ones with dead limbs as soon as possible to avoid additional insect and disease problems that may develop.
