## John Roane appointed interim county judge by Commissioners

On Tuesday, May 19, Cooke County Commissioners announced that they had selected John Roane to serve the remaining 18 months of County Judge Bill Freeman's term. Judge Freeman announced his retirement at the April 27 meeting of Commissioners Court to become effective May 29.

Roane currently serves as Justice of the Peace for Precinct 4. According to Judge Freeman, that office will become vacant at the time that Judge Roane is sworn into office as county judge. That is planned for Friday, May 29. It will be up to Judge Roane and the Commissioners to appoint a replacement to complete Roane's JP term.

Commissioners had been interviewing the 13 applicants for county judge

since May 11. According to Judge Freeman, Precinct #4 Commissioner Leon Klement made the motion to

appoint Roane and Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith made the second. The vote was 3-1-1. Judge Freeman abstained from voting. Precinct #2 Commissioner Steve Key was the other vote for Roane, and Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell voted no.

Commissioner Hollowell opposed the vote, but said he will support Roane as the new Cooke County Judge.

"First and foremost I want to congratulate John Roane," said Hollowell. "He's obviously a man with integrity and character. He's very popular in the County, but after reviewing the applications and conducting the interviews, I just didn't feel like he was the most qualified individual to serve the position in the new term. Having said that, he's also a friend and I look forward to working beside John and will support John in his efforts."

"The very first thing I'm going to do is spend as much time as I can learning how to be county judge," remarked Judge Roane. "We're going to jump right into the budget process immediately and, of course, we're right in the initial stages of the courthouse restoration. Those are the two main things that I'm going to have to get involved in right away in addition to learning how to be the county judge. I'll have my plate full for at least the first amount of time that will probably carry me through until December when I have to file for election."

As a regular at the twice a month Commissioners Court meetings, Roane has his pulse on what goes on in the County. He had already decided to run for the county judge position in the next election. "I had considered my options and I was thinking about it for quite a while," he explained.

Roane is a fourth generation Muenster resident. **See ROANE, pg. 7**

## School District welcomes new members and elects officers, hires teachers

Muenster ISD saw two long-standing Board of Trustee members step down and welcomed two new faces last week after the May 9 election.

Last Wednesday's meeting began with the Board recognizing Jim Endres for his 12 years of service to the Board. Ronnie Felderhoff presented him with a plaque, a gift certificate, and his desk name plate.

Board President Felderhoff and Superintendent John Kaufman then led in canvassing the election results, which included: Place 5 - Richard Dangelmayr 277 votes, Doug Hermes 208; Place 6 - Kim Walterscheid 317 votes, Ronnie Felderhoff 171; Place 7 - Steve Trubenbach 433 votes. There was a total of 494 voters. The Board approved the election results.

The oath of office for the elected Board members was conducted by 235th District Judge Janelle Haverkamp, who swore in Dangelmayr, Walterscheid, and Trubenbach, each with a three year term to the Board.

In re-organizing the School Board, Trubenbach was chosen president. His first duty as the new president was to open nominations for vice president. Mel Walterscheid is the new vice president and Neal Flusche the secretary.

Three new personnel were hired to the staff: Stephen Blasingame, coach; Joshua Underwood, band director; and Collin Cheaney - Pre-K teacher. They also accepted the resignation of teacher Deanna Miller.

In other action, the Board accepted and approved the transfer students at the discretion of the campus trans-

fer committee. A total of 56 students, plus 16 from Sivells Bend ISD were listed. Other counts were 14 from Era ISD, 10 from Saint Jo, 10 from Gainesville, five from Lindsay, five from Forestburg, and others from Bowie, Denton, Justin, Montague, and Nocona.

The Board continued to take no action on the Sivells Bend contract, letting the present contract run out after the 2009-10 school year. Sivells Bend students will still be able to apply for transfers individually beginning the 2010-11 year.

No action was taken on the leasing or purchasing of two new school buses. Mr. Kaufman noted the need of a new bus, and with prices raising to around \$10,000 more per bus with the 2010 models, buying two at this time would be feasible. He was looking at stock buses already on the lot, 71 passengers, at around \$76,000 each. They would be used as activity and in-town route buses to help extend the investment and not get torn up on rough country roads.

No action was taken on the purchase of a marquee for the District. The marquee was suggested by the PTO, who offered \$12,000 towards its purchase price, leaving an estimated \$9,000 balance.

Kim Walterscheid suggested that it wouldn't benefit the elementary, as it would be located between the high school and junior high buildings on Seventh Street. She added there are less costly ways to "dress-up" the campus. Ben Bindel noted other needs the District could spend the money on and maybe wait till some

## Yosten and Knabe attain certification

Muenster Volunteer Firefighters John Yosten and Herbie Knabe are now Certified Intermediate Trained Firefighters. Their fellow fireman Ben Bindel achieved that level of training in the past.

To become certified at the Intermediate level firefighter, you must have a minimum of 428 hours of training. Between Knabe, Bindel, and Yosten, the three have 114 years of firefighting experience and a total of 3,043 hours of training.

Knabe serves as fire chief for the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department. Yosten is the unit's secretary. Bindel serves as the training officer as well as the certification officer for the Department.

The Muenster VFD roster is 30 strong. There are more than 13,000 hours logged for training for the Department.

"Having the firefighters

well-trained helps prevent loss of life, property, and provides the ability to face most situations in a professional manner," stated Bindel.

Bindel added that seven firemen are "rookies" having less than two years of experience with the Department.

## Kay Bailey Hutchison

UNITED STATES SENATOR, TEXAS

The fabric of Texas' rich history is woven with legendary stories of sacrifice and remarkable acts of valor. From the battle of the Alamo, when Colonel William Barrett Travis and his men stood their ground, declaring "no retreat, no surrender" and sacrificed all for the freedom of their nation—to the young men and women who are laying down their lives on foreign battlefields today—generation after generation, our state's men and women

have exhibited the indomitable Texas spirit of service and patriotism. Stretching back to the American Indian Wars, 70 Texans have been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for their heroic service. And many of them died earning that distinction.

During World War II, a young B-24 pilot from Fort Worth named Horace Carswell was flying a single-engine mission to take out a convoy of Japanese ships in the South China Sea. After scoring direct hits on the target, Major Carswell's aircraft was badly damaged. Through skillful flying, he kept the staggering bomber in the air long enough to make it to land so his crew could safely parachute onto the Chinese shore. Major Carswell and his copilot were killed in the crash landing, but through his courageous actions, the rest of his crew survived. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor.

Denis Walterscheid of Muenster died at the age of 81 on Monday, May 18, 2009. The funeral Mass was held Thursday morning at 10 a.m. in Sacred Heart Church. The complete obituary will be in next week's *Muenster Enterprise*.

to enemy fire and carried gravely wounded soldiers in his arms to safety. He was so badly maimed that his commander nominated him for a Distinguished Service Cross award because the Army was afraid he wouldn't survive long enough for the extensive Medal of Honor process to be completed. But he did survive, and was awarded the Medal of Honor.

Preserving these legacies is critical, because, as President Ronald Reagan said, "Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction. We didn't pass it to our children in the bloodstream. It must be fought for, protected, and handed on for them to do the same, or one day we will spend our sunset years telling our children and our children's children what it was once like in the United States where men were free."

Today, a new generation of patriots is serving in Afghanistan and Iraq. Like many before them, some are paying for our freedom with their lives. In the early days of the war in Iraq, a 23-year-old Texan, James Kiehl, was killed when his convoy was ambushed near al Nasiriya. His remains were brought home to Comfort, Texas, and on the day of his funeral something remarkable happened. Hundreds of men, women, and children from across the community lined

the streets to honor their hometown hero and show support for his family as the funeral procession wound its way through the small town. He was one of the first Texans to lay down his life in combat. To date, more than 400 Texans have died in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Many of today's military heroes have not yet made it into the pages of history. But they are already solidifying a legacy of valorous service. Unlike many of the wars that were fought in previous generations, none of the men and women serving in Iraq and Afghanistan were drafted into service. Every single one of today's soldiers stood and volunteered to go. If you ask one of our troops or the family of one of our fallen heroes why they volunteered, their responses are almost always rooted in patriotism and the desire to be a part of something greater than themselves.

Every day, I think of those Texans who have made the ultimate sacrifice. I think about the loved ones who miss them. It is fitting for our nation to pause and remember them on Memorial Day. But to truly honor their service, we must always cherish liberty, work to keep America free and strong, espouse the values for which our troops have fought and died, and pass down their memory to future generations.

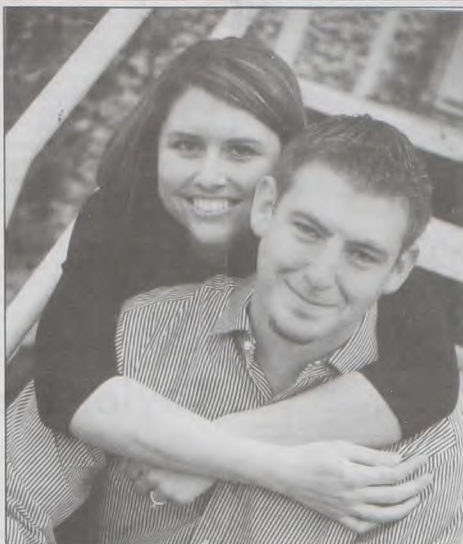

The Lady Knights climbed higher up the playoff ladder Tuesday with a 3-0 Regional Quarterfinal victory over the Lady Tigers of Bland.

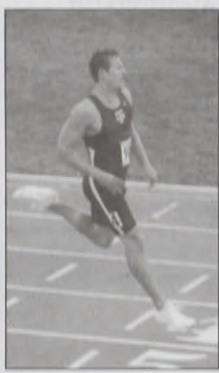

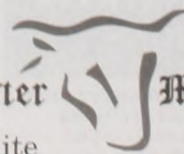

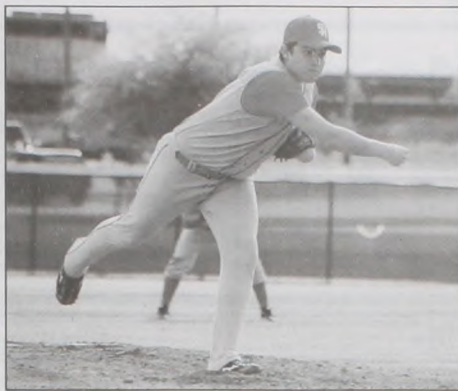

## COUNTY AGENT REPORT

### Wheat production down 20% from last year, hay up

Winter wheat production is forecast at 1.50 billion bushels, down 20% from 2008, reports the USDA's National Ag Statistics Service. Expected area for har-

vest as grain or seed totals 34.0 million acres, down 14% from last year. Based on May 1 conditions, the U.S. yield is forecast at 44.2 bushels per acre, down 3.0 bushels from

the previous year. Hard Red production is down 16% from a year ago to 871 million bushels. Soft Red production is down 31% and totals 422 million bushels. White production totals 208 million bushels, down 5% from a year ago. Of the White production total, 20.8 million bushels are Hard

White and 188 million bushels are Soft White. All hay stored on farms May 1 totaled 22.1 million tons, up 2% from a year ago. Disappearance from Dec. 1, 2008 - May 1, 2009 totaled 81.6 million tons, compared with 82.5 million tons for the same period a year ago.

### Drip Irrigation

Drip irrigation is the precise application of water, where and when the plant needs it. It is not a new concept, but the development of UV light resistant plastic pipes and fittings and awareness of the need to conserve water have increased this method of irrigation's popularity.

The most practical applications for drip irrigation in the home landscape are in gardens, hedge rows, shrub or flower beds, and combinations of these along with trees. Many homeowners could benefit greatly from adapting the practice of drip irrigation!

Dr Larry Stein, Extension horticulturist, tells us a plant's water requirements are the same regardless of how the water is applied. The real conservation features of drip irrigation come from the precise application of water and minimal runoff, less evaporation from an essentially closed system, and less water lost to weeds and undesirable plants, since the system is placed exactly where the desirable plants need it.

The basic component parts of a drip irrigation system are as follows: (1) water source (well or city), (2) filter, (3) delivery lines, and (4) emitters. The water source used will dictate the amount of filtration needed. If the water is sandy or dirty or from an open pond, there is a greater need for filtration as opposed to using city water. Although it is best to filter city water, it can often be used unfiltered without too much problem. However, the life of the lines and emitters can be prolonged using filtration.

A couple things to remember are (1) Regardless of how good the system is, it will eventually stop up. Drip systems must be maintained and cared for periodically. (2) The key to making drip irrigation work in home landscapes is in scheduling - knowing when and how long to water.

The best absorptive roots for most plants are in the top six to 12 inches of the soil, since this upper soil area contains a lot of oxygen. The deeper one goes into the soil, the less oxygen is present, and root growth is less. In order for water to be absorbed by the plant, oxygen must be present. If oxygen is not present, plants cannot take up water, and the roots will drown if the saturated conditions continue. An irrigation system should

never be operated for longer than eight to 12 hours a day. In no case should the system be turned on and forgotten.

### Cattle guard bill passes Texas Legislature

SB 1059, introduced by Senator Glenn Hegar (R-Katy) and Representative Larry Phillips (R-Sherman), was approved by the State Legislature on May 15.

The bill would require the commissioner's court of a county to notify affected landowners by certified mail 90 days in advance of removing a cattle guard, and allow the landowner to request a hearing at the county commissioner's court.

TSCRA worked closely with the bill authors to draft this bill in response to land owner concerns regarding the removal of cattle guards on county roads.

### Nearly 4,000 House Bills expire

Out of approximately 7,100 bills filed, 4,000 died. The Texas House adjourned shortly after a midnight deadline May 14, leaving thousands of bills to die in the last leg of the 81st Legislative Session. House bills had to be approved by midnight May 14 to survive. Unless these bills can be amended on other bills, they will most likely have to wait two more years for another chance to become law.

Amongst the casualties were several House bills dealing with animal cruelty, increased county zoning regulations, detrimental tax and water provisions, and immigration.

### Ag Briefs

Calves finished on grass need 235 pounds less feed than calves finished in confinement. One acre of good pasture has a feed cost savings of \$70.20.

Cattle in pastures add as much as 130 pounds of nitrogen per acre to the soil from manure.

The U.S. cattle herd is 14 million head smaller than 1970.

### TDA market recap

For the week ending May 16, feeder cattle price trends at Texas auctions were mixed, with most locations steady to \$4 higher per hundredweight, but a few steady to \$3 lower. Fed cattle prices were higher as beef prices increased.

Grain markets declined late in the week on expectations for good planting progress in the Midwest and lower crude oil prices.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, cotton, wheat, corn, and lumber ended the week lower.

Widespread rain showers fell late in the week with rainfall amounts varying from a trace to six inches. Topsoil moisture ratings ranged from surplus in areas of North Central and

East Texas to very short in parts of Plains, West, and South Texas.

Wheat harvest progressed to 3% complete, with 90% of the crop headed. Corn planting was 94% complete and 6% of the acreage was tasseling. Grain sorghum was 73% planted and 5% headed.

Pastures have improved with the recent rains and were rated in mostly good to fair condition.

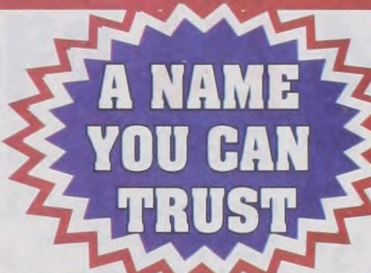
