Cooper hired as MISD's interim superintendent

The Muenster ISD meeting room had a full house in attendance on Wednesday, Nov. 18 when the Board recognized the cast, crew, and sponsors of the District Champions Junior High UIL One Act Play. Superintendent John Kaufman presented certificates to sponsors KaTina Bartel and Gynell Oppermann and 13 students.
A public hearing on Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) was given, noting that Muenster ISD has a Superior Rating. FIRST is a yearly report that evaluates the efficiency of the school district. The highest possible score is 85. Muenster ISD received an 82.
Beginning Nov. 30, Steve Cooper will fill the seat of John Kaufman as interim superintendent until the Board fills the position. Cooper will receive \$370 per day for four days a week (three

days on campus and one day off campus), \$30 per month for cell phone, and 40.5¢ per mile for travel expense. Cooper was superintendent of Muenster ISD from 1990-2000.
Muenster ISD Audit Report was presented by Judy Smith and Tom Schaulk and was approved by Board. A yearly audit is required by the Texas Education Association. No area in the Muenster system was found inefficient, receiving no "write-ups."
In action items, the Board stressed that Muenster students will dress "professionally" for all UIL competitions.
The transfer of \$14,068.75 was approved for the purchase of a 2009 Malibu program car from Luttrull-McNatt Chevrolet. No action was taken on the purchase of a school Suburban.
A top bid of \$4,250 and all bids for the District's old kitchen equipment were re-

Regina Wolf selected Christmas Parade's Grand Marshall

With her 99th birthday approaching, Regina Wolf of Muenster will kick off her 100th Christmas season in an exceptional manner. She was chosen by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce as the Grand Marshall of this year's Annual Christmas Parade.
Regina's son Mitchell Wolf and daughter Charlotte Wolf Jones will ride with her in the Parade which begins at 1 p.m. this Saturday. She has two other children, son Roger Wolf and daughter Lou Rena Wolf Hammond.
Family and friends agree that Regina is thrilled with the honor of serving as Grand Marshall this year. Daughter Charlotte noted, "We're very excited that she gets to be in the Parade. It's an honor."
Regina was born on Dec. 12, 1910 to I.A. "Notsy" and Dina Trachta Schoech. She grew up on a farm about two miles east of Muenster along with her six sisters and one brother. Her childhood memories include many farm chores, especially those required to concerning the milk cows, chopping cotton, and the harvest.
On the farm, the day began very early as the family rose by 5 a.m. to milk the cows before going to school. She said that they separated the cream from the milk so that it could be taken to Gainesville where it was sold.
"We went to school in a cart pulled by one horse," Regina recalled. "The cart held about four children. We were pressed all together in the cart because it wasn't big enough. Then when it rained, it was simply terrible." They attended Sacred Heart School.
Regina married Lou Wolf

on April 21, 1932. They made their home in Muenster where Lou made his living as a barber. In 1939, they built their home at 214 N. Oak where Regina still lives. She spent her time as a homemaker, raising the four children. Regina enjoyed keeping her home, yard, and flowers going. Her daughter Charlotte remembers that her parents loved to dance and they would go out dancing every Saturday night. Lou died at the age of 79.
Regina has done a lot of traveling. None of her children live in Muenster, so she spends time visiting them. She's been to Alaska and overseas.
"My husband was a barber and he'd take off about a month just to go on vacation," commented Regina. "After we had children, the children went with us."
After Charlotte, her youngest child, got married, Regina would go visit and help her. Charlotte taught dancing and Regina helped with Charlotte's children. She said at times they didn't get home until 10 at night.
These days she stays busy in her home and enjoys reading. Two years ago, Regina was recognized as being one of the Sacred Heart Tigers' oldest fans. She said she still occasionally gets to one of their football games.
Asked if she had a secret to living a long, healthy life, Regina replied, "You have to work hard for one thing and milk cows. I was never really sick." Charlotte attributed it to the genes and added, "She's very lucky. She's very healthy. She's very active and has no real health problems." Other than when she had her last two children in the Muenster Clinic, Regina

County Commissioners cast votes for CCAD Board seats

As the governing body for Cooke County, a taxing unit of Cooke County Appraisal District (CCAD), Commissioners Court is entitled to cast 1271 votes as it see fit to elect the five Board members of the CCAD Board of Directors. At the regular meeting held on Monday, Dec. 23, Commissioners voted to cast

their entitlement of votes among four nominees.
They gave 650 votes to David Clifton of Valley View, 350 to Robert "Bob" Knauf of Muenster, 100 to Dean Mendenhall of Callisburg, and 171 to David Eurich.
Appointing a designee for the I-35 Segment Committee was discussed. Commissioner Gary Hollowell currently

serves in that position. He was just notified by TxDOT that the meetings will be held on the second Monday of the month, conflicting with the regular Commissioners Court meeting. It was decided that the County needed a representative to attend the meetings. The next meeting is set for Jan. 11, so a decision was tabled

until the next meeting to allow more thought as to who might serve in that position.
Bids were opened in regard to elevator maintenance. Bids came from Otis Elevator of Dallas, United Elevator of Grand Prairie that currently maintains it, Texas Independent of Garland that is not a union

MMH holds first meeting with Phase 3 contractors

Progress continues as the Muenster Hospital District takes steps necessary to begin its Phase 3 addition. MMH Administrator Lynn Heller reported to the Board at the regular meeting held Tuesday, Nov. 17, that the first meeting of the contractors had been held. He said about 25 people were present. Of that number, five or six were strong general qualified contractors, and there were a number of sub contractors and roofers there.
Financing for the project is also being investigated, Heller said. Presently, there is some disagreement as far as how revenue bonds can be used.

On the recommendation of the auditor, the Board established a credit card policy. "This was loosely a template that they gave us, and what we did was plugged in what we currently have and how we are currently operating and added some of the stricter policies that they had recommended," explained Administrator Heller.
After some explanation and discussion of the proposed policy, Heller said his concern was that someone who used the MSB credit card could have written down the number and then use it sometime later. Board member Ronnie Weinzapfel suggested replacing that credit card every year to avoid

some of the chance of that happening. That suggestion was added as an amendment to the proposed policy, and the amended policy was unanimously approved.
For the month of October, the Hospital District saw net revenues totaling \$648,141 and operating expenses of \$595,339 for net operating revenues of \$52,802. Other revenue including ad valorem taxes totaled \$15,371, bringing the net revenue over expenses for October to \$68,173.
Heller reported to the Board that the MMH Auxiliary had purchased a vitalStim machine for around \$1300. It is used by the

Texas Farm Bureau releases Turkey Day price watch

Texas grocery shoppers getting ready for a traditional Turkey Day feast will need a bit over three \$10 bills to buy the fixings, according to the first ever Thanksgiving Day installment of the Texas Farm Bureau Grocery Price Watch.

The average price for the 16 basic items on the list, according to the informal survey of local grocery store prices, rang in at \$31.99. "This being our first year to launch the Grocery Price Watch surveys, we have no comparison to offer on how this year's prices might compare to those before," said Kenneth Dierschke, president of the state's largest farm organization. "These prices will, however, serve as benchmark for future Thanksgiving Day comparisons."

Twenty-four volunteer shoppers from across the Lone Star State participated in the Thanksgiving Day Grocery Price Watch survey, all searching their local grocery stores for staple items of a Texas-style Thanksgiving Day dinner.

The prices were based on purchases made during the week of Nov. 8-14.

Depending on where families did their shopping in Texas, prices were all over the board for these 16 basics, with price spreads ranging from \$1 to nearly \$6 depending on the items.

Ring in highest on the price sale, on a per pound basis, were packages of shelled pecan halves, which average \$5.35 in Texas. Shoppers paid as little as \$2.29 in some places, while others

forked over as much as \$8 a pound.

Turkey and ham, on most budgets, will be the costliest purchases for Thanksgiving. Per pound averages came in at \$1.10 for turkey and \$1.67 for ham, though price spreads between the highest price paid in Texas and the lowest were significant—\$1.77 for turkey and \$2.27 for ham.

"Carry those numbers over for how much a whole turkey or ham will actually weigh, and you will be looking at some major cost differences," Dierschke noted. "Still, the average Texas shopper is paying a lot less than shoppers in other parts of the country."

The American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) since 1986 has conducted a national price analysis of several Thanksgiving Day items. Although their list differs somewhat from the Texas items, shoppers in other parts of the country will be paying \$1.16 a pound for their turkey.

All of the items on AFBF's list will cost \$42.91, on average, this year, which represents a roughly \$2 savings from last year's numbers. The primary difference in the two surveys, Dierschke explained, is that many of the products on the Texas list include items produced by farmers and ranchers right here in the Lone Star State.

Other Texas list items, along with their price averages, include: sweet potatoes, 86 cents per pound; cream of mushroom soup, \$1.09 a can; French-fried on-

ions, \$2.08 per can; cranberry sauce, 96 cents per can; herb-seasoned cube stuffing, \$2.30 a box; light brown sugar, \$1.06 a bag; whipping cream, \$1.31 per half-pint container; whole milk, \$3.69 per gallon; large eggs, \$1.50 per dozen; unsalted butter, \$3.12 per four-stick package; brown and serve rolls, \$2.31 per 12-pack; frozen green beans, \$1.57 per one-pound bag; and frozen nine-inch pie shells, \$2.08 per package.

"It is our sincere hope that as your family gathers around the Thanksgiving Day table, you remember the many men and women in this fine state who work each day to make sure we all enjoy an abundance of safe and delicious food for our families," Dierschke said. "Their dedication and commitment makes such occasions possible, and we couldn't thank them enough for all they do."

FSA accepting emergency loan applications

Cooke County was declared eligible for Farm Service Agency (FSA) disaster emergency loans. Generally, that means that farmers who have lost at least 30% of their physical and production due to losses listed on these declarations during their time periods and continuing are eligible for FSA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility.

FSA Farm Loan Manager, Cynthia P. Kruger, is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications into FSA as soon as possible. Ms. Kruger said, "We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadlines. The longer they wait, the more chance there is for long delays. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process."

Some tax credits expire at the end of the year

Just a reminder that two tax credits will expire at the end of this year.

Producers can write off 50% of certain capital investments this year and set the remaining cost up in a normal depreciation schedule.

Also, under IRS Section 179, producers can still write off up to \$250,000 of the cost of new or used equipment this year. This benefit is part of the overall stimulus package, but the amount a farmer can write off will drop back down to \$130,000 for 2010.

Be sure to consult a tax advisor if you plan to take advantage of these tax credits.
