

Chamber reveals Germanfest results

According to Chamber Director John Broyles, the Muenster Chamber of Commerce has finally wrapped up the numbers on the 35th annual Germanfest and are happy to announce a record year. Over 30,000 in attendance to this year's Fest netted the Chamber approximately \$135,000.

Other organizations in Muenster benefitted from the Chamber's annual Germanfest as well. The Muenster Library received

\$12,653. The Muenster Kiwanis received \$13,400. Boy Scout Troop 664 earned \$1,054. The Muenster Jaycees made \$57,000 on beer sales. The KCs made \$3,100 on margaritas, plus the Fun Run made \$14,300, and the Gainesville Optimist received \$2,200. This would not have been possible without the contributions of all of the participants and supporters of Germanfest.

The Sacred Heart Alumni numbers were not available at this time.

According to the Texas Department of Transportation, 85% of child seats being used are not being properly used. This could pose a great safety hazard to your child.

"Making sure a car seat is installed properly takes more than putting it in the seat with a belt," remarked DPS Trooper Mark Tackett. "A certified car seat technician has gone through a 40 hour course along with written and practical tests. I have been installing car seats for almost two years and I have not found one that was installed correctly."

In an effort to educate the public on the proper installation and use of child safety seats, the Texas Highway Patrol in conjunction with TxDOT is holding a free Child Safety Seat Checkup on Saturday, May 22 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Gainesville Wal-Mart store parking lot. If you are one of those not properly using a child seat, you will receive instructions on the proper way to use it. NO TICKETS will be issued stressed Trooper Tackett.

"Some people see car seats as bulky and something that takes up too much room in

the car. It's a hassle to deal with and time consuming. The fact is, over 90% of children injured or killed in a car crash are not properly secured in a car safety seat. The few minutes it takes to buckle the seat will be worth it when you're involved in a crash. Even going a few blocks in town is dangerous when someone runs a stop sign and causes a crash. Children rely on adults to keep them safe because they can't do it themselves. The new laws that will be enforced on June 1 are in place for the safety of children. Statistics show that most children between the ages of four and eight involved in fatality crashes would have been safer in a booster. A booster seat makes it better for kids under 4'9" to fit in a seat designed for adults.

"The new law that has been in place for quite some time, has allowed parents to get the proper education and materials needed before any enforcement action is taken."

To participate, bring your child and know his or her weight. Some areas to be checked are snugness of har-

Precincts #4 and #2 acquire assistance to repair damages from the 2009 flood

Precinct #4 Commissioner Leon Klement delayed approval of an agreement with the United States Department of Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) at a previous Commissioners Court meeting in order to separate the flood detention structure from the road projects. Klement noted, "The way they had this written up, from our point of view, it was making the County solely responsible for this flood detention site - Dam Site 7-A. In the past when they built these things 50 years ago, the original contract had the Upper Elm Red Soil Conservation District as the operator as far as inspections and being responsible for upkeep. The County was the taxing entity that funded that. They had changed it to where the County was responsible for all of it."

Dam Site 7-A, also known as Johnson Lake, suffered damage to its auxiliary spillway. Costs of repairs is estimated at \$118,125. Before the requested contract

change, Precinct #4 would be held responsible for all inspection of the auxiliary spillway, while the dam would still be the responsibility of the Upper Elm Red, causing the responsibility to be split. He said that should a dam break down the road, it could be a nightmare to determine who did what inspection.

Commissioners were ready to approve the agreement with the NRCS for Road and Bridge Precinct #3 and Precinct #4. This will involve removing drift from some of the bridges and doing work to improve drainage in Precinct #2. Precinct #4's project involves repair to a low water crossing northeast of Marysville that was destroyed in 2009 flooding and some debris removal from another site. This is a 75/25 funding agreement with the County responsible for 25% of the cost.

County Judge John Roane commented, "There is actual demolition going on in the Courthouse today. Walls are coming down and the floors are coming out."

It is hoped that funding will be found for other dams in need of repairs. Klement said the one at the old Campbell Ranch headquarters (7-D) needs attention. Severe wave action has eaten away at portions of the dam. There is not a current cost estimate, but plans are to turn it in this year seeking funds.

Commissioners Court approved project agreements with the NRCS for Road and Bridge Precinct #3 and Precinct #4. This will involve removing drift from some of the bridges and doing work to improve drainage in Precinct #2. Precinct #4's project involves repair to a low water crossing northeast of Marysville that was destroyed in 2009 flooding and some debris removal from another site. This is a 75/25 funding agreement with the County responsible for 25% of the cost.

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Commissioner Klement added that the contractor's crews spent the last week in the Courthouse preparing for construction. People will not be allowed in the Courthouse during the restoration work.

Judge Roane said that on Wednesday a group would be visiting the Johnson County Courthouse to look at some of the things done there. It is a sister courthouse to Cooke County's.

There is a new speed limit of 35 mph on CR 343. Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit on county roads is 55 mph, said Commissioner Al Smith. He noted that CR 343 is a road in the Rosston area that runs from 922 to 1630 and is about eight miles long. He said, "It is a 20' wide drive lane road maximum with many turns and many hazardous conditions for large trucks and wide loads. It has experienced the brunt of the oil field development of thousands of semi-trucks on it running at various speeds. The citizens there are very concerned about safety and

the speed being traveled." Commissioners unanimously adopted the Cooke County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The 262 page plan was developed with the assistance of local jurisdictions and the Texoma Council of Governments (TCOG) and is in accordance with FEMA requirements.

May 16-22 was declared Emergency Medical Services Week in Cooke County in recognition of all those engaged in emergency medical service activities. Emergency care personnel include licensed paramedics, EMT-paramedics, emergency medical technicians, fire first responders, law enforcement first responders, emergency room physicians, and emergency room nurses, both volunteer and paid, who have

engaged in thousands of hours of specialized training and education to enhance their lifesaving skills. These people provide a vital public service to the people of Cooke County.

May 2010 was proclaimed National Motorcycle Awareness Month in Cooke County. The proclamation noted that motorcycle riding is a popular form of efficient transportation for many people in Cooke County. Drivers of all vehicles were urged to be aware of one another and learn to share the road and practice courtesy. The safety hazards created by automobile operators who have not been educated to watch for motorcyclists on the streets and highways are of prime concern to motorcyclists. All citizens were urged to ob-

serve the safe operation of motorcycles and increased motorist awareness of motorcycles.

Judge Roane proclaimed the week of May 22-28 as Safe Boating Week. He encouraged all residents to practice safe boating techniques while on area lakes and waterways. The proclamation stated that a significant number of boaters who lost their lives by drowning would have had a better chance of surviving had they worn their life jackets.

- Approved a contract with Woodbine Water Supply for the installation of a fresh water line located at 615 CR 187.
- Approved permitting the City of Callisburg to repair and install a fresh water line on CR 113.
- Approved lease/purchase of a 2010 Tiger boom mower, model TRB-50C-SS for Precinct #1, exempt from bidding due to lease/purchase agreement from the Buy Board Purchasing Cooperative.

ness straps, if the seat is tight in the vehicle, and if the retainer clip is in the right place.

If you are not financially able to purchase a car seat or booster seat, free seats will be available while supply lasts.

Tackett added, "The car seat check point on May 22 is a chance to get your seat looked over and installed correctly. There will be several installers on site to make sure the job is done right. Once the seat is installed, it is checked again by another technician. This event is 100% about the safety of your child. There will be no tickets written for anything, but we will have gifts for the kids. We will check your seat for expiration, recalls, broken parts, and other defects. We will have some seats on hand to give away if yours is not suitable or you cannot afford a new one. When you leave the check point, the appropriate seat will be installed correctly and you will have piece of mind with your child's safety."

Enforcement phase of new booster seat law begins June 1

Are you ready for the next phase of the new booster seat law? Starting June 1, law enforcement officers may issue citations for violations of the recent changes to the child passenger safety law.

The law requires all children younger than eight years old - unless already taller than 4'9" - to be in the appropriate child safety seat system anywhere the child rides in a passenger vehicle.

The law also requires that all safety seat systems (safety or booster seats and safety vests) be installed according to the manufacturers' instructions - including age, height, weight requirements, and the proper placement in the vehicle. (Some manufacturers prohibit using their products on the front seats of vehicles).

The law was passed last year during the legislative session and went into effect on Sept. 1, 2009. Officers could only issue verbal or written warnings for their first nine months - but now the enforcement phase is in effect.

Fines are \$25 to \$250 plus court costs...potentially much more than the cost of a safety or booster seat.

Safety seats and booster seats not only save lives; they save families. Consider the impact to your family if your child isn't buckled up properly and is injured or killed in a crash. Many times the injuries an improperly restrained child receives are life-long. Are you ready for the consequences of not securing a child?

He was rarely seen without his favorite team hat... He was passionate about fishing and the great outdoors. At the Red River you could find him wading the shore... He showed me how life can be seen through the eyes of simplicity and contentment just being alive..."

John Fuhrbach 1932 - 2010

John Reynold Fuhrbach of Las Cruces, New Mexico, died peacefully at his home at the age of 78 on May 4, 2010, with his wife Patricia at his side. He was born in Amarillo, Texas, the only child of Angela Hoening Fuhrbach and Johann "John" Fuhrbach on March 31, 1932. He attended school at Sacred Heart School in Muenster, but moved following his sophomore year in high school.

At a young age he was interested in science and how natural forces interacted with one another to create the world as he began to know it. This led him to study chemistry, geology, mineralogy, physics, and related disciplines in order to try to understand the natural world he so much enjoyed. This led to his university studies resulting in a degree in Chemistry and a lifelong passion for gems and minerals.

After graduating from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois and majoring in Chemistry, John served his country as a commissioned officer in the United States Naval Reserve at sea. His military enlistment and deployment gave him the opportunity to travel and explore the world, and instilled in him a desire to see as many of the continents and diverse global cultures as possible.

John was also an apprentice goldsmith to his father in their family jewelry store by the age of eight years, and continued studying goldsmithing, and jewelry fabrication and design throughout his life. John spent one year studying gemology and gemstones with the Gemological Association of Great Britain, and in 1958, garnered the title of "Fellow of the Gemological Association of Great Britain" and was cited as the only overseas student to receive its diploma "With Distinction in Gemology" that year. John also studied with the Gemological Institute of America, where in 1959, he was awarded their highly regarded Graduate Gemologist diploma, and was classified in the top 5% of all students in that program. In 1967, the prestigious Diamonds International Awards recognized John's designing talent and included one of his diamond ring designs in the Best 80 Collection which was selected from 2400 designs submitted to the competition from designers all around the world. Fuhrbach

worked in the family jewelry store for years advancing his skills as a jeweler and internationally credentialed gemologist. In 1967, he branched out on his own, designing and creating very unique, one-of-a-kind jewelry pieces for clients throughout the Texas panhandle.

John was an expert on the gemstone peridot. He traveled to a number of geologically interesting localities and explored for, and field collected gemological and mineralogical samples of peridot, which led to the publication of several major articles on the subject in the most important professional gemological journals.

John was an incredibly generous man who delighted in doing for others. After many years in Amarillo, John and his wife Patricia moved to a retirement home in Las Cruces in 2008. It was the beautiful mountains visible from their new home which allowed them to explore nature on long walks together right outside the back door, and the close proximity to an important New Mexican peridot deposit that John had explored and written about, that attracted them to settle in the area.

John was a modern day renaissance man and had many interests including advanced ballistics, big game hunting and photography, deep sea fishing, hiking, gem and mineral collecting and the earth sciences, faceting gemstones and the lapidary arts, storytelling and writing, and traveling the world. He loved being with his family and friends and sharing wonderful stories and jokes. He was romantic, innovative, optimistic, adventurous, and had a great sense of humor.

Survivors are his wife, Patricia of the home, daughters Kelley Fuhrbach of Lake Hills, Texas, and Joanna Fuhrbach of Taos, New Mexico; sons Christopher Fuhrbach of Taos, Honz R. Fuhrbach; and one grandson.

MHMRST helps people combat the voices of schizophrenia

Childhood abuse can be linked to persons who suffer with schizophrenia. Joanne (not her real name) was one who was physically, sexually, and emotionally abused throughout her childhood years. Her father was physically and emotionally abusive, but it was one of his friends who raped her when she was around the age of eight. She was fortunate that she had a supportive grandmother and grandfather who took her in when her father physically beat her. Her grandfather was her best friend who believed in her. He would listen to anything she had to say. He told her she was special and would one day find help. She also has a brother, an uncle, and two aunts who take special interest in her well-being since she has begun working hard to be compliant with her treatment for her mental illness through Mental Health Mental Retardation Services of Texoma (MHMRST).

Joanne states, "I had invisible friends and heard voices beginning at five years old. I told my grandmother about the voices, but she did not know how to help me. Finally at age 16, my grandmother took me to a counselor, but I was reluctant to tell him everything. I did not give him enough information, thus it was impossible for him to really help me. As I got older, I dropped out of school and began taking street drugs. Like many people with mental illness, I was self-medicating and thought the drugs were helping me. Of course, they were not helping, they were making things worse."

"I have been married four times to abusive husbands. I have one 16 year old son who has not lived with me since he was five. He lived with my grandmother until

she passed away. After my grandmother's death, one of my aunts was court-appointed as his caregiver. Recently he has been diagnosed with bi-polar disorder and is being seen by a professional. I will not let him experiment with street drugs the way I did. I want his life to be different than mine. When he turns 17, he plans to live with me. We want to be a family again," she continued.

"For years, I rejected help. I have been in jail twice. My last stay was three months in the county jail and eight months in a state facility. I tried to seek help with MHMRST earlier, but I was not compliant and did not get better. Then in 2007, I was in trouble with the law again, received help from MHMRST, became compliant, and now I am not the same person. I have tried to commit suicide several times in the past because the voices in my head were telling me to do it. Without MHMRST, I would be dead, strung out on drugs, or in a mental hospital," said Joanne.

"My caseworker, Sandy Haverkamp, has really made a difference in my life. I owe her and MHMRST everything. She helps me with my problems and has taught me how to deal with my morbid thoughts. I have also learned not to have relationships with abusive people. I have hope for the future. Sandy has taught me how to deal with my illness. I am trying to enroll in GED classes, and I want to work. The psychiatrist told me that I would always hear voices, but they will become less and less. I have an uncle who helps keep me in reality. I can tell him what is going on with the voices, and he assures me it is not really happening. One of my aunts is my

overseer and makes sure I keep my MHMRST appointments," ended Joanne.

MHMRST is the local MHMR community center and has served Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson counties since 1974. Mental health centers are located in Cooke County at 301 West Broadway, Gainesville, 940-665-3962; Fannin County, 1221 East 6th Street, Bonham, 903-583-8583; and Grayson County, 315 West McLain, Sherman, 903-957-4701.

Services available are: 24 hour toll free crisis line, 24 Hour Emergency Services, the Assertive Community Treatment Team (ACT), Case Management, Cognitive Behavior Therapy, Community Based Assessments, Crisis Intervention, Medicaid Eligibility, Medication-Related Services, Respite Services, Skills Training, Small Groups, Supported Employment, Supported Housing, and Transportation.
