Co. Commissioners submit road reports

By Janet Felderhoff Commissioners from all four precincts submitted their annual Road Reports. All were approved. On the condition of each road, culvert, and bridge in Pre-cinct #4, Commissioner Leon Klement reported, "We had just recovered from the flood of 2006 when we experienced another flood in May of 2009. There was considerable road and bridge damage, some severe. Several bridge approaches and culverts were washed away. Some roads were severely damaged with loss of gravel, deep ditches, etc. To the best of my knowledge, all roads and bridges are in fairly good condition again, but there is still quite a lot of repair to be done."

condition again, but there is still quite a lot of repair to be done." Klement reported that about 60 to 70% of the traffic con-trol devices (signs) in Precinct #4 were defaced, torn down, or vandalized. He noted that he is still attempting right-of-way acquisition and re-routing of CR 413 and construction of new bridge. He said of the flood damage, "An accurate dollar amount is difficult to determine at this time, but re-pair costs will surely take a large portion of the road im-provement budget." The amount of money Klement feels is necessary for main-tenance of the precinct roads during the next fiscal year is \$1,371,292. He estimates that CR 413 will cost \$45,000, CR 403 \$48,000, and CR 404 \$54,000 to resurface. Availability of materials will limit the amount of work. Remaining budgeted dollars are for continual general improvements and maintenance of all Precinct 4 county roads and will be utilized as traffic, weather, haz-ards, or conditions dictate. Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith reported, "To the best of my knowledge each road, bridge, and culvert are in good condition."

of my knowledge each road, bridge, and culvert are in good condition." The amount of money necessary for maintenance of the precinct roads during the next fiscal year is \$1,348,500. Smith noted the number of traffic control devices in the pre-cinct defaced or torn down was 54 road number signs and 16 traffic control signs which have been replaced. No new roads are planned. According to Smith, "All major bridges and culverts have been inspected by TXDot Wichita Falls District and are in good condition. Remaining budgeted dollars will be utilized for continual improvements of Precinct 3 that are damaged and in need of repair as traffic, weather, and hazards dic-tate." Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell reported "We

Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell reported, "We were just recovering from the 2006 floods and beginning to see significant improvements throughout the precinct when we experienced another flood in May 2009. The roads were damaged considerably, mirroring the 2006 floods with bridge approaches and culverts washed away. Water cut the roads and created hazards. To the best of my knowl-edge the roads, bridges, culverts, and parts therein, are in reasonably good condition and we will once again work to make them better." He estimated the amount of money necessary for main-tenance of the precinct roads during the next fiscal year at \$1,336,529. Hollowell noted that the number of traffic control devices in the precinct defaced or torn down varies daily and re-placement is ongoing. "We continue to have a problem with theft and vandalism," he said. No new roads are planned. Hollowell said, "As a result of the recent flood, several culverts and bridge approaches were undermined. We are still identifying problems, weeks later, as sink holes appear. We will strive daily to keep the roads in good condition and address hazards; however, it would be difficult to place ac cost estimate on repairs or improvements at this time. Re-pair cost will certainly consume a large portion of any mon-eys budgeted toward improvements." Precinct #2's report was not available as of press time. Commissioner Klement was appointed to the Cooke, Fan-nin, and Grayson County Juvenile Detention Board. 





TDA market report

For the week ending June 20, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$3 lower per hun-dredweight, with a few areas \$2 higher. Recent declines in finished cattle prices and ongoing losses by cattle feeders continue to pressure the market. Fed cattle prices were near unchanged from a week ago. As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, and lumber were higher, while wheat, corn, and cotton were lower. Most areas of the state reported only scattared showers

were lower. Most areas of the state reported only scattered showers during the week, while parts of Central Texas recorded up to eight inches of rain. Topsoil moisture was rated mostly short to adequate statewide. Wheat harvest is up to 53% harvested. Cotton planting was 95% complete and 15% of the acreage is squaring. Grain sorghum planting was nearing completion on the High Plains, while the South Texas crop is nearing ma-turity.

turity. Pastures were reported to be in mostly fair to good con-dition and needing rain in many areas.

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However, some of the United State's largest export markets remain well below last year. Mexico and Cana-da, which accounted for 55% of U.S. exports in 2008, have been down 19% and 15%, re-spectively. Exports to South Korea have continued to decline from the beginning of the year. Retail sales of American beef in South Ko-rean supermarkets increased when several of the major retailers started stocking their shelves with U.S. beef in late 2008, but have fallen substantially since the be-ginning of the calendar year. Declining South Korean im-ports of beef from Australia and New Zealand, the larg-est foreign suppliers in 2008, suggest a general weakening demand for imported beef in the country. The U.S. dollar continues to weaken in the second quar-ter, after sharply strength-ening in late 2008 and into the first few months of 2009. While weak foreign demand for U.S. beef remains a ma-jor hurdle in many regions of the world, continuing weak-ness in the U.S. dollar would belp U.S. beef exports. In 2010, exports are expected to increase just over 9%, to 1.905 billion pounds, as for-eign demand will likely im-prove as the global economy recovers from the current recession.

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
