Watering the lawn With the hottest and usu-ally the driest time of the lawn is a chore that many of us will be undertaking more frequently in the com-ing weeks. It is a fact that the majority of water use in the North Texas area dur-ing summer months goes to vatering the lawn. Eighty percent of the water used in Cooke County comes from underground aquifers, a source that will not recharge in our lifetime. Therefore, careful evalu-ation of water usage could save you money, ensure a

Therefore, careful evalu-ation of water usage could save you money, ensure a water supply for future gen-erations, and even help you maintain a healthier lawn. Generally we are either over-watering or under-wa-tering. The classic case of one that under-waters is a person who doesn't realize the time needed to adequately water an area; instead they apply light, daily sprinklings. This practice is actually harm-ful to the plant. Frequent light applications we the soil to a depth of less than one inch. Most plant roots go much deeper; therefore the watering does not alleviate drough stress completely. In contrast, there are those who water so often and heavily that they drown plants. Symptoms of too much water are the same as for too little. Leaves turn brown at the tips and edges, then brown all over and drop from the plant. These symptoms should be the same, since thy result from insufficient water in the plant tissue. Too much water in a soil causes oxygen deficiency, re-sulting in damage to the root system. When a soil remains soggy, litle oxygen is pres-ent in the soil, causing roots to die. Ideally, a lawn should be watered just before it begins to wilt. Most grasses take on a dull purplish cast and leaf blades begin to fold or roll. Grass under drought stress also shows evidence of tracks after someone walks across the lawn. These are the first signs of wilt. With careful observation and ex-perience, one can determine the correct number of days between waterings. Common between waterings without loss of quality. Early morning is consid-ered the best time to water. The wind is usually calm and the temperature is low so less water is lost to evapo-ration.

The worst time to water is late evening because the lawn stays wet all night, making it more susceptible to disease.

making it more susceptible to disease. When watering a lawn, we the soil to a depth of offects the amount of water needed to wet soil to the de-sired depth. It takes about the desired wetting depth if the soil is high in sand, and about 3/4 inch of water if the soil is a loam. For soils high in clay, an inch of water is usually necessary to wet the desired depth, it may be necessary to turn the water off, wait ½ hour for the water to soak in, and then re-sume watering. Remember,

you will be able to water less frequently, use less water overall, and minimize the possibility of disease from gaining a foothold if you fol-low these simple steps.
