County sets tax rate

After tangling with the proposed budget and tax rate for the better part of an afternoon and morning, Cooke County Commissioners Court came to a divided decision on the tax rate, but were unanimous on the budget.

The proposed tax rate remains the same as it was last year at 45. County Judge John Roane and Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith voted against that proposed rate. The tax rate does not become final until after two public hearings and a final vote. The tax rate for two years ago was .4768.

According to County Auditor Shelley Atteberry, this year's effective tax rate is 44.73.

Two public hearings were scheduled for the 2009-10 tax rate. They scheduled the first hearing for Monday, Aug. 17 at 10 a.m. It will be held on the second floor of the Prosperity Bank, suite 214, 100 East California Street in Gainesville. The second hearing is set for 9 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 24 at the same location.

Missing from this year's proposed budget is any across the board increase in salaries for County employees. This was a point of contention during budget considerations. Last year, employees received a 2% increase in salaries and the year before that there was a 3% increase in salaries and the year before that there was a 3% increase in salaries and the year before that there was a 3% increase and the year before that there was a 38 increase.

A public hearing on the proposed 2009-10 budget was scheduled for 10 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 17 at Prosperity Bank in the same location as the hearing on the proposed tax rate. A final budget will be voted on after the hearing.

Jessica Hess grasps for future with optimism

Jessica's knee jerked and
twitched as she applied the
brakes on her vehicle. She
had to hold her leg down
with her hand just to control
it. That's when she learned
that she would be having
surgery to get her started on
dialysis.

Not that going on dialysis was a totally unexpected turn of events. Jessica
had known since she was a
young girl that kidney failure loomed as a possibility
in her future. At age 10, she
was diagnosed with juvenile
diabetes.

Juvenile or type 1 diabetes
affects as many as 3 million
Americans. Type 1 diabetes
develops when the body's
immune system attacks and
destroys insulin-producing
beta cells found in the pancreas. Without insulin, glucose, or blocd sugar, cannot
get into the body cells and
instead builds up in the
bloodstream to dangerous
levels.

The diabetes was never

renal disease."
Dialysis was initiated on June 17. Preparation for that included surgeries to put in a port for hemodialysis, a fissula, and most recently a tube for peritoneal dialysis. She is under the care of nephrologist Dr. George Rojas at the Renal Center of North Denton.
Although Jessica started out doing hemodialysis (using a machine to take the body's impurities out through the bloody, she began peritoneal dialysis (fluid such as glucose introduced into the abdomen draws out water, salts, and waste products from the blood through osmosis) a little over a week ago.

Jessica chose peritoneal dialysis because she feels it will be easier at home. She creas. Without insulin, glucose, or blood sugar, cannot get into the body cells and instead builds up in the bloodstream to dangerous levels.

The diabetes was never under good control, noted Jessica. "Because of that, I actually have nerve damage to my feet and hands," she explained. "I have a diabetic retinopathy in my eyes. I've got the kidney problems now, and anemic on top of all that. They tell me I'm functioning with 5% of my kidneys and so I am in stage 5 end stage.

Lessica chose peritoneal dialysis because she feels it will be easier at home. She and her husband Darrin "Scoob" have a son Colby who is almost three years old. Also, she has a hard time sitting around for the length of time required for the hemodialysis and the trips to and from Denton three times a week. "Sitting down and doing the dialysis at the clinic is just sitting there and I can do absolutely nothing. Sittin' on my butt is just not me," she remarked. With the peritoneal, she is doing an overnight process while she sleeps.

Peritoneal dialysis re-

quires some changes in daily routine. Jessica had to prepare a somewhat sterile environment to do exchanges of the dialysis fluid itself must be stored where it does not get too hot or too cold. Jessica said that one box weights 40 pounds and there are 30 boxes in a month's supply. That takes up quite a bit of space.

Since she started dialysis, Jessica discovered a new zest for life. She said, "I can breath. I can move. I have more energy. It's a life-changing thing." It had gotten to the point where just walking outside got her out of breath. Just walking from another room in their home to the bedroom to check on her sleeping son exhausted Jessica.

A kidney and pancreas transplant offers hope a future with fewer health problems. Jessica recently learned that she had been approved at Methodist Hospital and is on the transplant list there. She has applied at another hospital and hopes to be added to its list.

Such a debilitating medical condition carries more than just medical problems into the lives of those affected by it. The financial burden is huge. "Everybody in the

Be aware of variables regarding hay bale combustion

Experienced agricultural producers in the southern Great Plains know that low wind speeds, high humidity, moist hay, and hot temperatures can be a recipe for disaster.

Under such a set of circumstances, tightly stacked hay bales have been known to combust. Without proper preventative measures, hay barns or any other structures close to the blazing bales portentially might be lost.

"When you go in and immediately harvest these forages, they have a high water content, which continues the process of respiration," said Daren Redfearn, O S U Cooperative Extension forage specialist.

Respiration is a normal process that plants use to produce food. Unfortunately, it also produces heat. The respiration process will continue to produce heat until

Texas drought losses reach \$3.6 billion

Lack of rainfall and record triple-digit temperatures have scorched crops and rangeland throughout parts of Texas causing drought losses to reach \$3.6 billion, Texas AgriLife Extension Service economists reported.

By the end of the year, losses could exceed \$4.1 billion, the loss estimated in Texas in 2006, if sufficient rainfall isn't received to revive crops and forage, economists said.

Total crop losses this year are estimated at \$2.6 billion, and livestock, another \$974 million since November 2008.

"Extreme or exceptional drought conditions for the second year in a row and prolonged weather with over 100 degree temperatures have devastated agricultural crops and livestock operations, especially in Central and South Texas," said Dr. Carl Anderson, AgriLife Extension economist.

It's the hottest, driest summer on record over a large portion of the state, but especially in the central, south, and southwest regions, said Jose Pena, AgriLife Extension economist in Uvalde.

"Range and pasture conditions conditions ever more than 85% of Texas. The water supply for livestock and wildlife is diminishing, with many stock ponds dry."

The statewide crop conditions roperate by U.S. Department of Agriculture rates one-third of Texas cotton acreage very poor or poor. Meanwhile, the state's livestock operations continue to suffer. Little or no hay has been baled this year or for 2008 in South, Central, or East Texas. Much of Texas continues to be short on moisture. The hay loss at mid-year is estimated at \$409 million, according to economists. Hay is being shipped into south Texas from northeast Texas and other states.

"Given the critical shortage of forage for grazing and hay, a soaking rain is needed soon to maintain the beef cow herd in Central and South Texas," said Dr. David Anderson, AgriLife Extension livestock marketing economist. "The high cost of buying hay and supplemental feed is resulting in liquidation of some herds."

Counties in extreme and exceptional drought account for 40% of Texas' cow herd and 6% of the U.S.'s beef cow herd, Anderson said. Ranchers have been forced to cull deeper into herds and to sell calves at lighter weights, earlier than normal.

"From November 2008 until March 2009, the loss was estimated at \$569 million," Anderson said. "Additional livestock costs since March 2009 are estimated to have totaled about \$300 million. The total now is \$869 million. Those include feed costs such as hay and other feed supplements, and do not include reduced future revenues due to losing breeding stock and lost revenue from selling calves earlier.

The drought will stress wildlife management programs are critical to maintaining the recreational value of land used for outdoor recreation during the intense drought, according to Anderson.

The early summer drought and high temperatures are damaging all dryland crops such as vegetables, horticulture plants, peaches, pecans, and other crops by at least \$214 million. Land-based recreation used for camping, hiking, birding, wildlife watchetog and hunting is expected to lose some \$100 million.

Volunteer firefighters sacrifice to protect Muenster community

How many people do you know who will, without hesitation or complaint, lay aside what they are doing at a second's notice to head off to help someone else

in their time of need?

Many such individuals live and work right here in our community. A volunteer fireman receives little or no pay for the time spent on the job or for the time training for it. The hours are irregular. Disaster pays no heed to schedules, holidays, time of day, or weather conditions, and the local volunteer fire-

men always respond immediately when called.

Volunteer firemen have a multifaceted job description. Once, their job was to protect people and property from fires. They still do that very important task, often risking their own lives in the process, but they are also first responders and storm supporters. As first responders they may be the first on the scene at accidents or medical calls. They have varying degrees of training in treating the victims.

As storm spotters, the firemen are called on to keep watch over the town to call an alert in case of tornado, hail, or damaging wind. While the local citizens are safe and dry in their homes, school, or work, the firemen are sitting

in trucks with eyes on the sky.

Weather conditions can be brutal for firefighters. For their protection, the firefighters wear heavy insulated fire suits. On days when the temperatures are in or near the triple digit mark, it doesn't take long to become overheated and worn out. Freezing cold brings its own set of problems. The water used to put out a fire can freeze causing slippery walking and other problems. Lightning strikes cause fires and when there is a lot of rain, it can be hazardous driving to the fire. More than one fire truck has bogged down in muddy fields and pastures, as firemen try to fight fires.

The equipment necessary for the volunteer firemen to safely and efficiently defend our community comes at a high price tag. The funding that is received from city, county, and grants doesn't cover all that is needed, and that is where the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department counts on the people of this community to assist them. Each year, they spend weeks preparing for their annual barbecue meal and auction to bring in some of that needed money. This year, the event is set for Saturday, Aug. 8. Come out, visit with your neighbors, have

a good meal, and support your local volunteer fire department!

Favorite dessert - Coconut cream pie.




