# Flusche creates designs on CNC machine

With the push of a button, Neal Flusche puts in motion a CNC (computer numeri-

With the push of a button, Neal Flusche puts in motion a CNC (computer numerically controlled) plasma cutter capable of slicing designs from sheets of metal. The number of designs and what can be created from them seem unlimited.

"It's just limited to a person's imagination," Neal commented. "We can make almost any part for someone or we can do their art work. On a big thing, like several people's trailers, we don't actually build the trailer. We'll make a few parts on it, and them (customers) being able to have their name on it identifies it as their part and it customizes it."

As an example, he points out a fire truck for the Era Volunteer Fire Department. Neal said that there are several places where Era Volunteer Fire Department is written into it to customize it for them.

In May 2007, the CNC

written into it to customize it for them.

In May 2007, the CNC machine first became a part of Flusche Enterprises where Neal is co-owner with his uncles Tom and Jack Flusche. They bought the machine to make various parts needed in the machine shop and for a customer needing oil field parts. About a year ago, the oil business fell off and the parts were no longer being sought.

Needing some way to utilize the CNC machine. Neal

sought.

Needing some way to utilize the CNC machine, Neal took on the task of making some signs. He hung a sample along Hwy. 82, and soon people sitting at the red light saw it and called for signs. "We made a lot of ranch overhead signs, county road signs, 9-1-1 addressing, that type of stuff." he said. "The signs have been pretty popular. It's good for the Fire Department."

Neal, a Muenster volun-

partment."
Neal, a Muenster volunteer fireman, explained that the firemen know the county roads, but not the house numbers so much. It can be

confusing when there are several houses close together with no signs or very small signs. It is hard to know where to go when answering a call at night going down a dark road at 50 m.p.h.

People are even giving the address signs with a name as Christmas or birthday gifts.

Flusche Enterprises has always made branding irons for people. They had to heat the iron and bend it into the desired shape. Now Neal

said he just types it into the CNC's computer and tweaks it to the customer's satisfac-tion. It is then cut on the CNC machine in a very short

time. Neal said that he's pur-Neal said that he's purchased several programs with images. He has four to five thousand images on those programs plus some that either he or his son Micah have designed.

"If someone needs a part, if they can give us a few ba-

sic dimensions, the computer will tell us a lot of the oth-ers," Neal explained. "Or, if you have an idea, I can draw it."

Drawings brought in by customers can be used. They usually require more time to key into the computer and are therefore more expensive. Camera-ready art is best because those that aren't have jagged edges and take a lot of time to clean up enough to make a good prod-

uct.

After the design is cut from metal, it must be sanded to remove any rough areas. Then it is ready to be painted. This can be done in a number of ways. Often the customer chooses to paint it himself with a type of krylon paint. Neal has places that he takes the finished product to be painted. A powder coating can be applied at a Gainesville business and this, even though more expensive, should last a lifetime.

pensive, should last a lifetime.

Being able to get more uses out of a sheet of metal is another plus for the CNC machine. What would once have been unusable and sold for scrap iron can now be used several times over as many smaller pieces are cut from it for various uses. This might be something as simple as washers. All different thicknesses can be cut by the machine.

The metal sheet from which a design will be cut is set on metal grates with a water filled pan underneath to catch the hot sparks. It can hold a sheet of metal measuring 5 feet by 10 feet. Larger signs can and have been made. According to Neal, the largest he's made was two feet tall and 35 feet long.

Neal, and anyone watching, puts on dark glasses to prevent welder burn to the eyes. With the design set in the computer, he sits near the sheet of metal and push-

eyes. With the design set in the computer, he sits near the sheet of metal and pushes buttons that put the CNC plasma cutter into action. Sparks fly as it cuts designs from a sheet of metal. Within a short time, the design is complete and all that remains to be done is sanding and painting, and putting the product to use as a sign or if it is a part then to use it to finish that project.

They recommend that you plan for the worst and hope for the best. In Cooke County, we are most likely to be affected by wild-fires, tornados, or floods. Following are some suggested practices.

processed meat, brain tumors

Standing on a hill scanning his herd below, David Hopson wonders how it all happened. It's as if the cows just vanished. No clues are evident: No fences cut, no tracks on the parched land. And with two longtime employees living on-site, the boost continues to baffle him.

boost continues him.

"We came up 14 cows and two bulls short." Hopson said of one June morning.

"That's basically a big gooseneck load of cattle. I just don't know how someone got that gooseneck load of cattle loaded up and hauled out of there without somebody seeing them."

In his hometown of Mound, cattle are a way of life. Barely a blip on the map, the small Coryell County community receives little notice from those passing through. But the area is beginning to gain attention for all the wrong reasons. It's become a target for cattle thieves.

Since the middle of summer, 40 head of cattle have been stolen within a five-mile radius of Mound.

It is the first case of cattle rustling Hopson has fallen victim to since the mid-1990s. A towering man with a quiet monotone voice, he is known for his generosity and willingness to help others.

"It just goes against our grain to have someone take something from us," Hopson says. "Tve worked hard

to put together what I have. I've never done anything in my life but work. To have someone come in and just help themselves to \$30,000 worth of livestock...it kind of irritates me a little bit."

Beyond the money, Hopson says the worst part about the theffs is second guessing lifelong associates and knowing deep down "every one of them is fair and honest." He is not alone.

interiong associates and knowing deep down "every one of them is fair and honest." He is not alone.

"We're in a real upswing right now," Marvin Wills, a special ranger with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TS-CRA) said. "In the last six months, our theft has really gone through the roof. It has to do with the economy, just like any other theft. Right now I'm really overwhelmed. I've got actually more than I can handle."

Wills covers eight counties around Waco, an area that is averaging about one cow stolen per day for the past 90 days. Thieves usually take 10 head or less at a time. The calls are constant.

"When did you notice them missing and what kind of brand was on them?" Wills asks over his cell phone while scribbling the information down.

The special ranger works closely with local law enforcement in tracking down cattle thieves, working as the task force for sheriff's offices, and serving as the eyes and ears out in the field, forming good relationships with those who can help crack the case.

Truth be told, cattle are a quick cash crop for those out there with sticky fingers. A midnight theft can turn into a fat wallet at a sale the next day.

TDA market recap

For the week ending Nov. 14, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly \$2 to \$4 lower per hundredweight with a few locations steady and some \$6 lower. Declining fed cattle and higher grain prices pressured markets. Fed cattle prices fell by nearly \$3 on lower beef prices and lighter processor demand for the upcoming holiday week.

Soil moisture remains in mostly short to adequate supply statewide.

A study published in the September issue of the American Journal of Clinic Nutrition found no data to suggest that consumption of processed meats is related to the development in adults of a certain type of brain tumor, called glioma.

The study, by five researchers in London and at Harvard, notes that the risk of glioma has aneodotally been related to exposure to nitrosamine for decades. Ni-

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trosamine develops in the body in relationship to in-take of nitrite and nitrate, often used in the production of processed meats such as

of processed meats such as bacon, but also ubiquitously found in the environment.

The researchers examined data from three U.S.-based studies, which were combined for the analysis. They looked at 335 cases of glioma and compared it to the subjects' diet, based on self-reported information, and the corresponding levels of nitrate, nitrite, and nitrosamine.

The study found that the risk of glioma was not elevated among those who ate the most processed meats compared with those who ate the least. Furthermore, the consumption of vitamins.

ate the least. Furthermore, the consumption of vitamins C or E, or other antioxidants, did not have a measurable modification of the risk.

The study was supported by a grant from the National

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good brand is the best starting point. It works much like a car's license plate.

"Your first impression is the most important thing," TSCRA market inspector Ray Davis says while inspecting cattle at the auction barn in West. He moves through the barn, checking brands, earmarks, scratching them down only to enter them into a massive database moments later.

"A fresh brand is something that you're watching," he says pointing to a suspect bovine moving through the chute. "It may look funny, like somebody may have just taken that animal and put their brand on it. On your earmarks, if they chop an earmark off on the left or right side, that's a very conspicuous kind of a thing."

Davis constantly keeps an eye out for those red flags. In fact, a livestock sale cannot commence without a market inspector present. For Davis, it's a constant flow of on-the-job training as thieves become more creative.

He notes that cattle aren't the only thing disappearing these days. Equipment, saddles, and hay are also lifted.

TSCRA has the world's largest database on livestock which the special rangers can retrieve with a simple e-mail or phone call. If the cattle are marked, the recovery success rate is about 90%. Recovery is iffy without a brand.

"The majority of livestock producers in this area are small producers and they just don't mark their cattle," Wills says. They don't brand them, they don't keep good records. So all they have is a black-faced cow that was stolen from Waco, Texas. Here today at West, there are probably 400 cows that meet that description."

Wills will tell you that a good crook is hard to catch and very few good cattle. The rancher did everything that Wills says a good producer should do, starting with branding his herd. However, Hopson thinks his cattle weren't destined for the auction barn.

"I have wan idea that my 14 black was a down are some were raises."

raising 14 calves today," he says.

Punishment for such crimes increased in the 81st legislative session. In the past, it wasn't considered a felony if a person stole less than 10 head of cattle. That would put thieves right back on the street, free to steal again, and they did. Today, taking one or 100 head will stick you with a third-degree state jail felony.

That's good news to Hopson. But both he and Wills know cattle rustling will continue.

"I think punishment for most crimes is not harsh enough. I think more punishers treadd he active."

"I think punishment for most crimes is not harsh enough. I think more punishment would be a deterrent. There doesn't seem to be much consequence for misbehavior and for theft, specifically. Years ago when they found a cattle rustler, they strung him up in a tree. I think if that were true today it would solve some of this," Hopson says chuckling.

ling. But for Hopson, Wills, and cattlemen across the Lone Star State, cattle theft is no laughing matter.

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
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
