He said that his office had been working with Sheriff Carl Bledsoe Mills county since the day of the robbery and through information furnished by both police department and sheriff's office here the arrest of the two was brought about.

Thirty days will be required to repair the locks and doors broken by the mutineers, according to Coloney Robert Haubrich, commander of Ohio National Guardsmen, who put down the mutiny after two conwhen prison guards fired on them last Wednesday.

While the work of repairing the idle house is going on, the unruly prisoners will be kept in temporary quarters.
