

## Kaufman resigns midterm

In the summer of 2007, Muenster ISD was left without a superintendent after David Manley announced in May that he was taking a position in the De Kalb ISD. In July, the Board hired John Kaufman, then superintendent of Seymour ISD.

This week, the Muenster School Board again faces the challenge of finding a new administrator. Kaufman was notified that he has been hired by the Mount Vernon School Board. He informed the Muenster School Board of the change and broke the news to the teachers at a

staff meeting Monday. The Board met in a called, closed meeting Wednesday to discuss officially accepting his resignation and to consider what avenue to take in finding a new superintendent. Kaufman noted that he will help in any way he can to find a replacement.

In a phone interview with Kaufman, he stated that he has the opportunity to go to a 3A school with a major building project - a new elementary. "Mount Vernon would like to have me in place the first of December, or somewhere around there. But I told them I have to

talk to the Board in Muenster," Kaufman added that he did not want to leave the District (Muenster) high and dry, and his move will depend on what took place in Wednesday's meeting.

"I love it here. Muenster's been nothing but great to me and my family," Kaufman added, "God led us there (to Mount Vernon). He has plans for us, but that doesn't make it easy to leave Muenster. Our decision would have been so much easier if we didn't love it here. I have nothing but very positive things to say about the Muenster community."

## Muenster Hospital Board pleased with audit report

Members of the Muenster Hospital Board expressed pleasure over the audit report on fiscal year 2008-09 as presented by Tommy Davis

of Parrish, Moody & Fikes. "It was the best ever," they beamed.

The report was given at the October Board meeting which was delayed two weeks waiting for the audit report to be completed and held on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

MMH Administrator Lynn Heller reported to the Board that they are planning to move the location of the Hospital pharmacy. Its present location is too small, so it will be relocated to an area where it will be more than

doubled in size. The proposed location is to move it to the area now used as the nurses' break room. A door would be built between the nursery and the nurses' station. "There will be better access for everybody," he noted.

A move already completed is that of the Home Health office. It has relocated to 202 E. Division Street. This is in preparation for the expansion of the rehab facility in the Hospital. It will take up the area that was being used

Voter turnout for the Texas Constitutional Amendment Election last Tuesday was low. In Cooke County, only 11.46% or 2,703 of the 23,580 registered voters cast ballots. Of that number, 508 were early voters.

Votes are not official until they are canvassed. This will take place next week at a special called meeting of

**County pursues grant opportunities**

Cooke County Commissioners Court took action at the Monday, Nov. 9 regular meeting that will enable them to take advantage of two grant opportunities. The first will benefit the Cooke County Sheriff's Office.

According to County Auditor Shelley Atteberry, the County and City of Gainesville were awarded money in April from the Americans Free Investment and Stimulus Act with the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant. The County's portion of \$25,000 was approved to pay the salary of a crime victim's coordinator and would take over that position from Abigail's Arms. It was later discovered that it was not allowed since it was not creating a new position, just continuing a salary.

Atteberry recalled that the Sheriff's Office had only been able to purchase three vehicles with its budget rather than the four that it needed. She suggested using the grant money to purchase the fourth vehicle.

Commissioner Steve Key noted, "They certainly could use a vehicle when they go out of town to pick up people and bring them back, because they are using an old squad car now that the trans-

mission slips on. I'm afraid we're going to lose transport people and inmates one of these days."  
The Crown Victorias with equipment were around \$28,000. The Auditor noted that the grant money totaled \$25,000 and there is money left in the Sheriff's budget to cover the remaining amount.

Commissioners voted unanimously to change the scope of the grant to purchase the vehicle for the Sheriff's Office.

The second grant, the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant for \$75,000, is to be used for air conditioning or heating items. It was voted to use it to purchase a new chiller for the Courthouse. They ratified the County Judge's signature on the grant application. He signed it prior to the meeting because it had to be sent by Nov. 6. They also voted to apply for that grant.

An interlocal agreement with Muenster Public Library was approved.

At the request of the City of Muenster, a quit claim deed was approved to the City for all of Willow Street between Eddy Street and Hillside Drive in the Southtown Subdivision No. 2, as shown by the plat recorded. The street

is in the City's ETJ and was approved by the City Council to be closed and sold to adjoining property owners.

Also approved was an EMS agreement for ambulance internships between Cooke County and Training Division com. EMS Director Bob Harbin explained that it is an internet training program and some of the students would intern with Cooke County EMS. He noted that they were interested to see what type of training the students were getting.

AFLAC representative Mike Martin spoke to the Court on possibly approving flexible spending accounts (FSAs) for employees through AFLAC. After much discussion, it was determined that there was not sufficient time to get the information needed to make a decision. There was a very tight timetable set to offer the program for 2010. The matter will be discussed earlier next year.

The month of November was declared Home Care and Hospice Month in Cooke County in recognition of the services provided during end of life care by Home Hospice and the home care provided that allows people to live a quality life at home.

In other business, Com-

missioners Court:

- Approved a personal service agreement contract for Precincts #3 and #4 to use when contracting for certain jobs. This would cover liability, etc.

- Approved interlocal agreements with Myra VFD, Moss Lake VFD, and Lake Kowa VFD.

- Approved FY 2009 Chapter 59 Asset Forfeiture Report for the Cooke County Constable Pcts. 1 and 4, Cooke County Sheriff's Office, and District Attorney's Office.

- Approved donations to the Cooke County Library in memory of Mary Ellen Turbeville and Curt Henderson in the amount of \$25 each.

- Approved contract with Woodbine Water Supply for the installation of a road crossing on CR 297 located in Precinct #2.

- Approved bonds for Justin Armstrong, District Court Bailiff, and bonds for the Juvenile Probation Department.

- Approved maintenance agreements with Dustin's Office Machines for copy machines located in the District Attorney's and County Attorney's Offices.

- Took no action on maintenance agreement with Dustin's Office Machines for a copy machine located in the District Judge's Office.

- Approved specifications and advertising for bids for heavy haul trucks beginning Nov. 11 for Road & Bridges Precincts.

- Approved surplus and trade of 2004 Ford McCoy-Miller ambulance, Cooke County Unit #0492.

- Approved bid specifications and advertising for bids for a dozer for Precinct #4 Road & Bridge.

- Approved addendum for the Courthouse Restoration Construction Manager at Risk Proposal regarding subcontractor's bid form.

Net revenue for September was \$535,543. Operating expenses for the month totaled \$563,148, leaving at net operating revenue of a negative \$27,605. Additional revenues (SRV leases and ad valorem taxes) of \$3,375 brought the excess of revenues over expenses for September to a negative \$24,230.

There were 289 patient days logged during September, the best month since the fiscal year began in July. Emergency room visits totaled 94, outpatient visits to the hospital totaled 380, and Home Health made 768 visits.

In other business, the MMH Board:

- Approved Bad Debt Write Off for the month of October totaling \$8,929.95.

- Approved updated medical staff bylaws as submitted.

- Approved capitalization policy stating that anything that costs over a minimum of \$5,000 and having a useful life of three years or more will be capitalized.

- Agreed to engage Parrish, Moody, & Fikes for a Chargemaster Review and the Price Optimizer. Heller said, "The Price Optimizer is where they take your Chargemaster and look at

your contracts and try to see where it makes sense for your prices to go up relative to everybody else and where it doesn't make sense. They have access to data bases of regional hospitals' Chargemasters, Dallas-Fort Worth

Chargemasters, and other hospitals our size's Chargemasters. It also would get our coding in line with charging and help us with that." He added that he feels it is very expensive, but will be very productive.

**Thornberry comments on passage of the Pelosi Health Care Bill**

U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (TX-13) voted against the government takeover of health care and released the following statement after House Democrats passed their plan despite bipartisan opposition, "This year, we have seen an incredible growth of government, and the American people are paying the price. Speaker Pelosi's health care bill is the latest, and one of the biggest, examples. I voted against it."

"The people of the 13th District of Texas have been quite clear. The overwhelming majority of them want no part of this 2,000 page, trillion dollar bill that adds 111 new commissions, agencies, and programs. The Pelosi bill combines more government control and high taxes with fewer choices and wraps the whole package in a lot red tape. It is bad for Texas, and

it is bad for America.

"Most of us agree that improvements are needed in our health care system. Too many of us have a hard time getting insurance, and premiums have been going up faster than wages. We should focus on those two problems - and we can - without upending the whole system."

"Among other problems, the Pelosi bill:

1. Kills jobs with higher taxes and mountains of regulations on business. At a time when unemployment is the highest in 25 years, Congress should be making it easier to hire new workers and less expensive to provide them with health insurance. This bill does just the opposite, making it more expensive to hire and to insure workers.

2. Cuts over \$400 billion out of Medicare. Congress

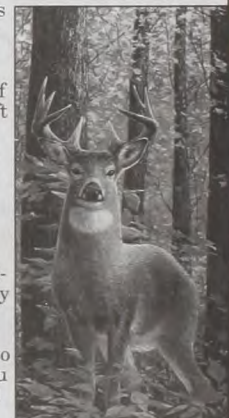

## CASA sets advocacy training academies

Each year, an average of 100 Cooke County children suffer abuse or neglect at such a level that it is necessary to take them from their homes and place them into the protective custody of the State (foster care). According to Vicki Robertson, the director of Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of North Texas, the children are taken from everything they've known into a system that can be (in spite of the best of intentions on the part of both State officials and the utmost in dedication of local workers) overwhelming to the child.

"I've found State workers to be contentious and totally dedicated to the work for the children, but truly overworked and sometimes unable to focus the attention needed to every single child because there are so many children with so many different needs on their watch," said Robertson. "But that's where CASA comes in... CASA volunteers are people who get involved with only one case. Because they have only one case, they can take the time to get to know the child and his or her family, they talk to teachers and neighbors, counselors, and foster parents, grandparents, and even law enforcement, anyone who has information that will help show what is really going on in that child's life."

"This knowledge allows the CASA volunteer to speak up for what is best for the child, particularly when CASA reports these findings back to the District Judge, who has the tremendous responsibility of making de-

terminations that affect the very lives of these vulnerable little ones. Every case is different and many things weigh in on Judges' decisions, but I do know that Judges listen to what CASA volunteers have to say because it is coming from someone who is only there because they care about what happens to that child."

CASA of North Texas has only four staff members. Staff alone cannot meet the needs of so many children. For that, CASA needs volunteers who have a little time to get involved and who truly care about what happens in these little lives. "Because they care, they are able to do amazing things to make very real differences for our most vulnerable children," commented Robertson.

CASA is conducting new advocate training this fall. The first training began in early November. Another will take place in late November or very early December.

In order to become a CASA volunteer, an individual must have an average

of 10 to 15 hours per month to dedicate for the children, must pass background checks including CPS and criminal history checks, have good references, and be over the age of 21. Individuals must then complete 33 hours of training provided by CASA and be approved to serve as advocates.

"I run into people all of the time who say 'someday I'm going to get involved for CASA's kids... I really hope that people who've said this (either to me or to themselves) will give us a call,'" said Robertson. "I can assure them, they won't regret getting involved to be the difference for an abused or neglected child."

should be taking steps to strengthen and improve Medicare for future generations. Instead, H.R. 3962 squeezes money out of programs that are already in financial trouble. Our seniors will end up with fewer choices and more money coming out of their pockets.

3. Increases the cost of insurance for the 85% of Americans who have it now. With more mandates and restrictions, the bill will increase

the cost of insurance for those who have it. Amendments to reduce premium costs, like the one I submitted, were rejected.

4. Does not include verification measures to ensure that only U.S. citizens and legal residents qualify for benefits.

"Although the bill has now passed the House, the fight is not over. As attention turns to the Senate, this bill must be resisted every step of the way."

## College and Career Corner - Life beyond high school

You are unique, with unique talents, passions, and skills. As you grow up, you'll begin thinking about independence, the future, and meaningful careers.

The path to a career will be different for everyone. But the early route is the same. You'll need to work hard in school up until the day you graduate. Rigorous classes will prepare you for college, career, and life.

After high school, there are limitless possibilities. Four-year universities are perfect for some students ([www.actstudent.org/college/index](http://www.actstudent.org/college/index)). Community colleges are ideal for others. Certification programs nicely fit the bill for some careers. Apprenticeships are another way to explore the world of work — and get paid for learning. Internships are great — whether you're in high school or college — if you want to get a taste for an occupation. Some high schools even offer career academies that provide courses for specific occupations.

Whether you become a radiological technician (two years of education) or a radiologist (eight plus years of education and training) is a matter of time and your individual skills and preferences.

It's never too early to begin thinking about life after high school. You may have chosen a career at age five and never wavered from that goal. Or perhaps more likely, you'll change your mind many times. Fortunately, you can find many resources that explore and examine careers.

Beginning in 8th grade, you can take ACT's EXPLORE® exam. This test contains a total of 128 questions that assess your readiness in English, math, science, and reading. Because you'll complete an interest inventory, score reports also provide valuable information to guide your educational and career plans.

In 10th grade, you may take the PLAN® test, a 145-question exam that builds upon the same topics as EXPLORE; the material is slightly more difficult. PLAN results show academic areas where you're strongest and also where you need to improve. Finally, in 11th or 12th grade, you can take the ACT® test. ACT scores, along with your grades, show your readiness for college and career. You can easily navigate the site to determine which college majors best fit your career goals. With 80 primary majors and links to more than 280 other majors, this site provides an in-depth look at topics of study, available degrees, and related occupations and majors. Even if you don't attend college, this site helps narrow down the occupational focus.

Education is the building block of a successful career. Stay on course in school. Take challenging classes. And accept help along the journey. Your reward will be preparation for all that life has to offer.

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# Muenster KC Centennial News

In continuing with this fourth edition of commemoration to the Muenster Knights of Columbus 100th birthday celebration Jan. 16, I will attempt to enlighten you with facts and figures of more recent times. With roots formed in the 19th century, the church and community leaders saw the need for a closer bond to bring the citizens of the area together to worship and fraternize. Hence, in 1910, a group of 50 or so men gathered and formed KC Council 1459 to start the first fraternal group in Muenster, Texas. You can bet there were prior groups that got together between 1888 and 1910, but this group stuck.

When Father Michael McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus, his intent was to provide Catholic men with the opportunity to strengthen their faith, to create a strong fraternal bond, to make charity a central part of their lives, and to protect their families from financial misfortune. Today, 127 years later, the local KCs remain faithful to every part of that vision.

After Herbert Meurer and Henry Hennigan completed their Grand Knight terms

(1934-1939) and fulfilled the dream of every Knight - to have the finest meeting hall in the area - the first and only priest to hold the position of Grand Knight of Council #1459 was Reverend Francis Zimmerer. Father Francis was very active, not only in the parish, but in the community. Back then, as you know, Muenster was over 90% Catholic, so his status was right there with the Mayor (maybe even higher!). He had seen what had transpired during the great depression and realized the insurance program sponsored by the Knights of Columbus played a major role in Muenster's survival.

From the pulpit, he successfully recruited many younger men into the Council. It was also during his leadership that saw the ladies of the parish band together more seriously. The Catholic Daughters of America and the Saint Anne's Society grew to the great service clubs that are still prominent today.

As I've mentioned before, our Centennial celebration day is planned for Saturday, Jan. 16. The Mass at 5 p.m. will host well over 1,000 people who will celebrate in the church and community center. From there, the festivities will continue at Winstar

Casino just across the Red River in Thackerville, Oklahoma. If you're wondering why 20 miles away, it's the closest place that can comfortably seat 1,000 guests. Transportation won't be a problem for you though. Buses will be provided to take you from church to Winstar and will have a published schedule for your return to Sacred Heart. The people at Winstar are dedicated to the communities of the area and are providing the bus service free of charge as well as to the KC Council.

If you are like me, not at all familiar with Winstar Casino, you are in for a treat. My last trip to Winstar, before our committee meeting held there last month, was over a year ago. In spite of the dense cigarette smoke, the food was very good and I lost my \$10 and went home -- a great evening for under \$50.

Upon arriving last month with Ben and a few others, I hardly believed my eyes as it was probably five times bigger and actually very beautiful from the outside. I realized even before entering one of the several entrances that this was not "Winstar" anymore, but "Winstar World Casino!" I'll expand more on the "World" concept in my next effort.

But I can tell you now, the "Global Event Center" where our Centennial event will be held is something you have to see for yourself. Seating for over 2,500, beautiful decor, non smoking, the promise of great food from all over the world, and a great Centennial event will make this an evening you'll remember a long time.
