The American Farm Bu-reau is appealing a Janu-ary 2009 ruling by the U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Ap-peals that overturns a Clean Water Act (CWA) exemption for pesticide applications into, over, or near 'waters of the United States," so long avith EPA-approved label re-acticions. Tor the past 30 years, pesticides have been tightly controlled under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and

Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) and applications of pesti-cides have been exempted from National Pollutant Dis-charge Elimination System (NPDES) permits under the CWA. Not only does this ruling reverse 30 years of EPA pro-codure, it will also increase costs on pesticide users, by bringing as many as 5.6 million annual pesticide ap-plications into a new permit program.
