



Mass of Christian Burial for Carl Justin "Boobie" Schilling, age 91 of Muen-ster, was held at 10 a.m. Monday, July 6 at Sacred Heart Church in Muenster with Fr. Kyle Walterscheid and Fr. Ken Robinson, cel-ebrants. Burial followed in Sacred Heart Cemetery. Ser-vices were directed by Mc-Coy Funeral Home of Muen-ster. Boobie died at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, July 3, 2009 at St. Richards Villa in Muenster. Born Dec. 1, 1917 in Muen-ster, Carl was the youngest of eight children of John and Rosina Klement Schilling. His mother died when he was only six years of age. His sister Angela cared for him in Pilot Point during sum-mer and he returned home in the fall to attend school at Sacred Heart. After the 8th grade, Boobie began work-ing for local farmers John and Martin Bayer and Al-bert Henscheid. In 1936, he became an oil field worker at the salary of \$2.50 per day. Carl was drafted into the U.S. Army on Feb. 19, 1942. He served in the Chemical Warfare Division at Scof-field Barracks on the island of Oahu, Hawaii. After 19 months of overseas duty, he was discharged on Sept. 1, 1945. He resumed working in the oil field and began dating Rosalie Henscheid. They married Oct. 22, 1946 in Sacred Heart Church. They had two daughters and four sons.

Five years later, Carl married Cecilia Gieb Trubenbach. 

Pic-nics and parties during the summertime can provide the ideal climate for growth of this bacteria, which can lead to food poisoning, says Dr. Kurt Kleinschmidt, profes-sor of emergency medicine and toxicologist at UT South-western Medical Center. Dr. Kleinschmidt offers a few tips to outsmart this germ:

germ: Refrigerate or freeze per-ishables immediately, and cook food to recommended temperatures in order to kill bacteria.

temperatures in order to Kill bacteria.
Wash hands in hot, soapy water for at least 20 seconds before preparing, serving, or eating fod.
Thoroughly wash plates, utensils, cutting boards, and countertops after contact with raw meat.
Avoid leaving food stand-ing for long periods of time.
Just be smart about how you buy, store, prepare, and serve food, and you'll reduce the risk of food-borne illness-es," said Dr. Kleinschmidt.


