Weekend services to honor deceased veterans

Muenster Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 6205 and its Ladies Auxiliary are inviting the community to join them in giving honor to the veterans who have so courageously given their lives in service to their country and their community.

The memorial begins with the 8 a.m. Mass on Sunday, May 30 in Sacred Heart Church, which will be followed by a procession to Sacred Heart Cemetery where fallen members of the VFW will be honored. Post Rifle Squad and Color Guard, Auxiliary officers, and First Communicants (who have been contacted) will gather at the south entrance of church after Mass and process to the cemetery. There, Auxiliary officers will place flowers in memory of all departed parishioners. They will then process to the soldiers' plot where flowers, prayers, and songs will be offered to memorialize our veterans.

Also this weekend, the VFW 6205 and Auxiliary will be

County recognizes Lundberg, retiring Texas game warden

Cooke County Commissioners Court took time at their regular meeting on Monday, May 24 to recognize the contributions of retiring Texas Parks and Wildlife Game Warden 6 Jim Lundberg. He served as game warden in Cooke County for the past 12 years, and has been a game warden in the State of Texas for the last 28 years. He began his career in 1982.

The proclamation honoring Lundberg noted that he has served the community and state with honor, dignity, and dedication. He is respected by his peers and stands out as a shining example to new game warden recruits. More than 300 kids have been served by the Cooke County Annual Youth Hunt created by Lundberg.

Lundberg was unable to accept his award in person since he was out of town at a family reunion and was delayed in getting back to Cooke County. Accepting on his behalf was Darla Hargeshiener Barr. A former Cooke County resident, she replaces Lundberg as Cooke County's game warden.

Commissioners declared June 2010 as "Arms of Action" month for Abigail's Arms - Cooke County Family Crisis Center. The Proclamation said in part, "domestic violence and sexual assault are serious crimes that affect people from all walks of life and cause victims to suffer grievous and often irreparable physical and emotional trauma and is the single leading cause of injury to women in the United States..."

"Abigail's Arms is dedicated to helping victims rebuild their lives and providing education and primary prevention programs for families and the community..."

"Victims of domestic violence and sexual assault need and appreciate the supportive embrace of family, friends, neighbors, employers, educators, civic leaders, and spiritual communities."

The Court encouraged everyone in the County to join in advancing the efforts of Abigail's Arms to build an emergency shelter for abused women and children in the County.

Abigail's Arms Director Aaron Davis said that the

organization serves between 400 and 500 clients every year. "We are expanding our services to offer some other things in the area of perpetrators with our batterer prevention program, as well as trying to establish a better protocol for sexual assault response within the County," reported Davis. "We are doing some things to hopefully curb some of the domestic violence by talking to the perpetrators about a better way to handle their anger. Also, with our sexual assault response, we can educate through our primary prevention programs about the issue of sexual violence and try to talk to children, teenagers, and college age students about what they can do to keep themselves safe."

Davis feels that per capita, Cooke County has a larger rate of domestic violence and sexual assault than the cities.

Cooke County Precinct #4 gained the Court's approval to apply for financial assistance through the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB)

Golda Pirkey 1927 - 2010

Golda Pirkey, age 83 of Gainesville, died at the Gainesville Health & Rehab Center on Thursday, May 20, 2010. A celebration of her life was held on Saturday, May 22, at 10 a.m. in the First United Methodist Church. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery. Services were directed by Geo. J. Carroll & Son Funeral Home.

Golda Elaine Smith was born April 23, 1927 in Avery, Red River County, Texas to Herman and Christine Smith. She graduated as Valedictorian from Avery High School and attended Draughtons Business College in Dallas. On July 11, 1946, Golda married her high school boyfriend James Earl Pirkey while he was on leave from the service. After the war, Golda and James Earl moved to Sulphur Springs for James Earl to attend Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. Golda substituted at the Sulphur Springs schools and they celebrated the birth of their son Gary.

In 1952, the family moved to Littlefield where James taught Vocational Ag, and later became high school principal. They celebrated the birth of their daughter, Kathy. When both kids were in school, Golda went to work in the school cafeteria so she could be off with her

children during the summers. She was affectionately known as the "Lunchroom Lady" by all the students because she made sure every student got a meal, even if they forgot their money.

In 1967, the family moved to Gainesville, and Golda was again a "stay-at-home" Mom until 1972 when she went to work for Gainesville ISD as a high-school secretary to maintain the attendance records. She retired in 1996 at the age of 70. She continued to serve her church and community as a volunteer for CHEW, RSVP, and the Stanford House, and she was the "official greeter" at First United Methodist Church and also served on numerous committees.

Golda was diagnosed with a raw muscle disease in 2000, but that didn't stop her from living life to the fullest. She moved to the Wheeler House in 2003 and became their biggest cheerleader. She even led the residence exercise class from her wheelchair. Golda moved to the Gainesville Health & Rehab in September 2009. Golda had a strong faith in God and loved her family and friends, the students and faculty she met at GHS, and her church family.

and enthusiasm than ever," he recalled. "His level of dedication was so great that not even cancer could slow him down. He showed us that when times are hard, we must not become focused on our own problems, but continue to teach and help others, making their future brighter."

Teacher Ruth Felderhoff was another inspiration of service and dedication. She dedicated her life to the school and church as a teacher and musician, he noted. She volunteered as church pianist for more than 40 years, giving generously of her time and talents serving God and her community.

Isaac said that cancer again took another mentor and role model from their lives as Mrs. Felderhoff, a cancer survivor had cancer return and spread rapidly. "Yet, this did not stop her dedicated and selfless spirit," Isaac continued. "Even when her body seemed unable to play, her spirit was willing." She continued to play up until her last school Mass before going into the hospital, never to leave. "This is dedication, and this is the kind of dedication that all of us are called to possess and live," said Isaac.

Isaac added, "Trusting in the Lord, we move forward knowing that no matter what He calls us to do, we must trust in His will and remain faithful and dedicated to the task. We must be humble and acknowledge that we can do nothing without God's grace and seek His help and strength in all we do. It is my hope that we long to not only be successful in the eyes of the world, but most importantly in the eyes of God."

Bishop Vann, Father Ken, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools Don Miller, Principal Rafael Rondon, Ph.D., and Counselor Chellie Mollenkopf awarded diplomas. Traditional turning of the rings was performed by Senior Class Sponsor Katherine Putnam, and Elementary Teacher Annette Bayer performed moving of the tassels.

Superintendent Miller spoke about Pope Benedict and hope. "He's made sure that we understand that hope is more than just wish-

ful thinking," noted Miller. "Pope Benedict has made it very clear and led us to understand that hope is more than just believing in what God can do. It is actually having confidence and faith in what God will be." This powerful hope comes from the very simple daily encounter with the living person of Jesus Christ, he said.

All during your formative years, that encounter has come from your pastor, parents and teachers, he said. He encouraged the graduates to look back on what those people have taught and use that as a foundation as they go forward in life.

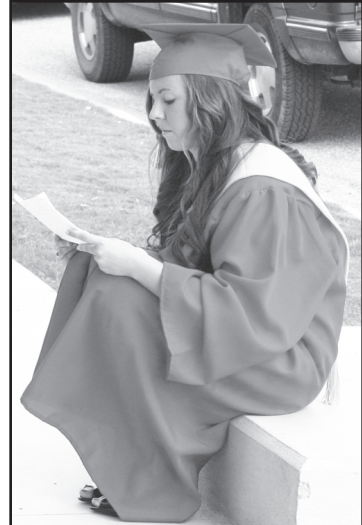

Kids' swimming - lessons or learning on their own

Have you ever questioned how a person learns to swim? It can be done several ways: a child could be placed in the water to observe another swimmer and eventually "teach" himself to swim; the child could be thrown in the water to figure it out for himself (which actually is how some learned to swim); or he could be enrolled in swimming lessons.

Teaching himself or herself how to swim can be a successful way to learn swimming skills - but swimming lessons are a much more effective way for him or her to learn.

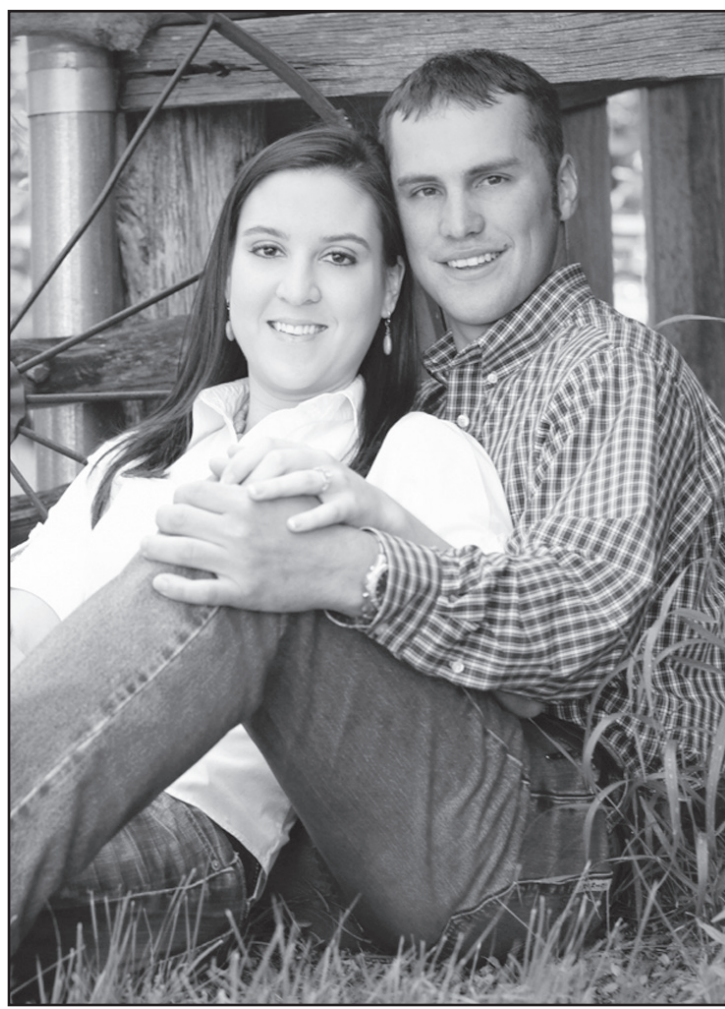
Any child who takes swim lessons will learn the proper way to do each stroke and kick. This will include learning better propulsion, better form for streamlining the

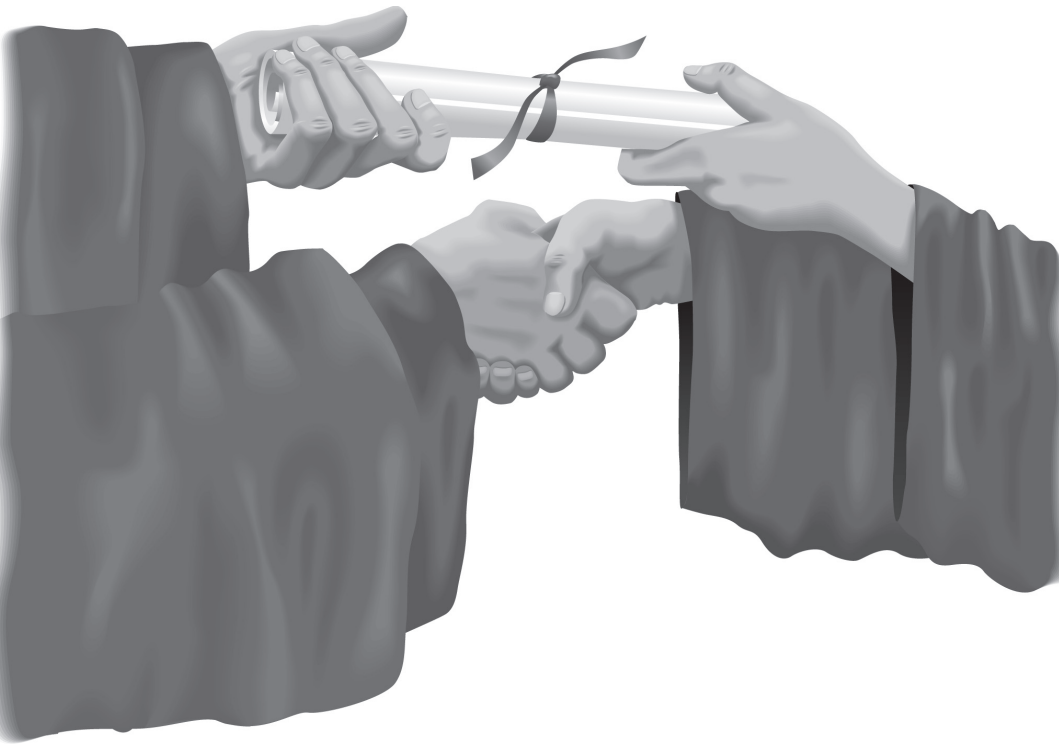

NCTC announces summer horsemanship camps, programs for every age

The Equine Science Department at North Central Texas College has issued the call for horse lovers of all ages to saddle up for a full slate of summer activities.

Four three-day sessions of the college's popular Youth Summer Riding Camps are scheduled and are open to youngsters of all experience levels from ages eight to 14. The first session is set for June 8-10.

"And adults need not feel left out of the fun of learning to ride," said Bill Kaven, NCTC equine program coordinator. "For the first time, we will be offering a summer horsemanship class in which participants can enroll on either a credit or non-credit basis."

Space is limited in all these programs, and Kaven urged interested persons to contact him at 940-668-7731, ext. 4318, as soon as possible about signing up to assure a spot.

Kaven said each of the Youth Summer Riding Camp sessions includes "three consecutive days of riding, activities, and fun. We'll be providing informative instruction for first-time riders, as well as challenging the skills of more advanced riders."

Other session dates are: Session II - June 15-17; Session III - June 22-24; Session IV - June 29-July 1.

"Our summer riding camps for youth have proven to be extremely popular for many years," Kaven said, "giving participants the opportunity to learn the fundamentals of riding and horse behavior and to become familiar with basic tack and related equipment."

"They also learn how to care for horses and, most importantly, how to be safe around them."

Cost of the camp is \$150/session. Refreshments and snacks will also be provided. All proceeds go to support the NCTC Horse Judging and Intercollegiate Horse Show Association Equestrian teams.

A parent or guardian must accompany each youth participant the first day to fill out paperwork, and there will be an informational meeting after the paperwork is completed.

"We will supply nice gentle horses for the camps, as well as saddles, helmets, and all the rest of the tack and equipment needed," Kaven said. "Participants may use

their own horses with instructor approval."

For adults interested in the summer Horsemanship I offering, Kaven said the non-credit option is available to those who just want to experience the fun of learning to ride without being concerned about earning a letter grade.

Riders, whether enrolled for credit or non-credit, will learn basic horsemanship skills including handling, saddling, and proper riding techniques. Emphasis will be given to the use of aids and cues and proper leg, seat, and hand position. Basic health care also will be covered.

The NCTC Summer I session, during which the course will be offered, begins June 7 and ends July 8. Classes meet Monday through Thursday from 12:30 to 2:50 p.m.

In addition to normal tuition, there will be a \$24 horse and equipment usage fee for those enrolling in the class, whether on a credit or non-credit basis.

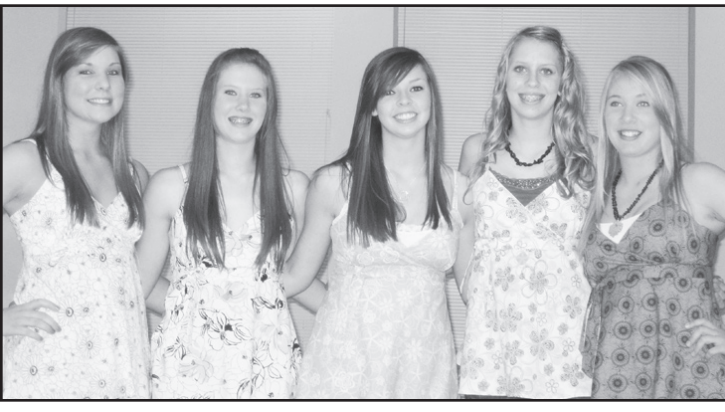

Lindsay FCCLA receives recognition at the TDS Day at the Capitol

On May 6, the Teens in the Driver Seat (TDS) organization, along with the Texas Transportation Institute, held a news conference at the State Capitol in Austin where they released the latest data concerning the risks involved with nighttime driving. TDS Director Russell Henk, State Representative Larry Phillips (vice chairman of the House Transportation Committee), and TDS Teen Advisory Board members Ashley Thompson and Fernando Sosa shared the latest findings concerning teenagers and driving statistics.

Some of their findings included data which indicates that the increased use of cell phones is increasing the proportion of fatal nighttime crashes for teen drivers. The increase in nighttime fatal crashes contrasts with a decrease in overall crash fatalities nationwide during the same time period. Mr. Henk noted that nighttime driving is the most common documented factor associated with crashes involv-

ing young drivers. Primary causes for nighttime crashes are a combination of the visibility challenges caused by dark conditions, slower response time brought about by fatigue, and lack of experience driving under such conditions.

In addition, young drivers use cell phones behind the wheel (primarily for texting) at a rate much greater than non-teenage drivers. "Being on a cell phone behind the wheel impairs our driving ability," Henk said. "When you add the nighttime danger, you create the perfect storm, and that storm is much more severe for young drivers, largely because of their lack of driving experience."

Among the honorees attending the press conference and a later reception given by Secretary of State Hope Andrade, her staff, and the TDS staff were Amy McCleskey, FCCLA representative, and Loretta DeBorde, her advisor. State Secretary Andrade introduced the new and current members of the

TDS Advisory Board. She also recognized and thanked all the schools and individuals for their involvement in the Teens in the Driver Seat Program.

Boating deaths decline in Texas

Deaths from boating accidents on Texas public waters decreased last year compared with the year before and Texas game wardens, boater education proponents, and others hope to keep the numbers trending downward. The decrease in 2009 came after an unprecedented spike in boating accident deaths in 2008, the highest in more than 10 years. Statistics compiled by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department show that 207 boating accidents on Texas

public waters in 2009 led to 139 injuries and 38 deaths, compared with 272 accidents, 175 injuries, and 62 deaths in 2008. Of the fatalities last year, 25 of the deaths occurred in open motorboats. Only one death was attributed to a personal watercraft. Last year, in the course of 192,882 boating compliance vessel checks, game wardens issued 9,705 citations and 9,928 warnings. The most common violation was not having a sufficient number of life vests available. Wardens issued 2,488 citations for that offense. Additionally, they arrested 220 persons for boating while intoxicated.

One trend that continues to worry those in marine law enforcement is that most water deaths are connected to one-boat accidents - capsizing, running aground, collisions with fixed or floating objects, or falls overboard. Staying safe while boating is simple as one, two, three. Wear a personal flotation device. The new inflatable jackets are lightweight and comfortable, and they save lives. Second, don't drink and boat. Third, take a boater education course."

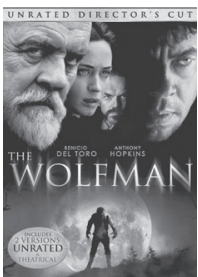

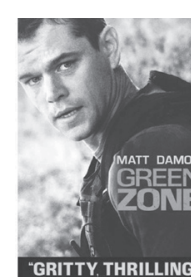

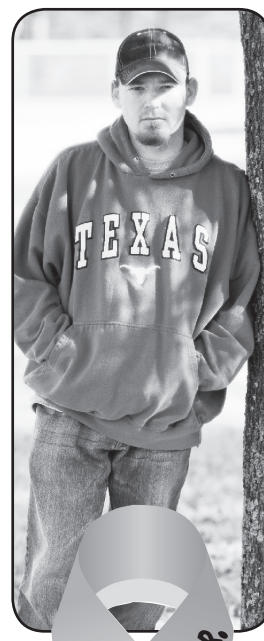

TDA private applicator training scheduled in Sherman July 16

Agricultural product producers or homeowners who wish to acquire a Private Applicators License through the Texas Department of Agriculture should plan to attend a training and testing program scheduled for Friday, July 16 in the 2nd Floor Assembly Room of the

Grayson County Courthouse in Sherman. Registration is \$5 per person and begins at 7:30 a.m. The training and testing will begin at 8 a.m. sharp and last until about 12:30 p.m. At 1:30 p.m., a Texas Department of Agriculture representative will administer

the test. Study manuals are available for \$35 for the set in the Grayson County Extension Office. It is suggested that you pick up these study manuals and review the material and questions prior to the training and testing date.

Please bring a pencil and a calculator to the class. Upon passing the Private Applicator test, there are forms and a license fee that will need to be sent to TDA in Austin. Persons wishing to become licensed in order to buy and use "Restricted Use" chemicals on their own private property, need to take this training and testing.

Call the Extension Office at (903) 813-4206 to reserve a space for the class. Seating is limited. If you need further information, contact Chuck Jones, County Extension Agent - Agriculture and Natural Resources at (903) 813-4202.

County Agent's Report

Watch out for hot hay
Making quality hay early in the spring of the year is a difficult task.

Many factors affect the quality of hay: soil fertility, the stage of forage maturity when harvested, the moisture available during the growing season, harvesting conditions, and storage. Rain can leach out nutrients and increase dry matter loss. It is not uncommon for rained-on hay to lose 5 percentage points of Total Digestible Nutrient (TDN) and/or 3.5% biomass, just from one rain event.

Much hay was baled wetter than what would be desirable this spring (greater than 20% moisture). This causes another set of problems, the most serious being the threat of moist hay becoming hot hay that can ignite through spontaneous combustion. If you have hay that was baled wetter than it should have been, it is good to take extra precautions to keep your hay storage facilities safe.

Information from Marvin Hall, a Penn State forage specialists suggests that farmers need to be diligent in checking their hay. Smoldering hay gives off a strong, pungent odor. This odor is an indication that a fire is occurring. If even the slightest smell is present, farmers should take temperature readings of the stack. When an odor is detected, temperature readings are recommended. However, just reaching inside the hay to feel how hot it is can also be useful.

Penn State guidelines suggest the following actions:
125° F. - No action needed.

150° F. - Entering the danger zone. Temps should be checked twice daily. If possible, disassemble stacked hay to allow more air to move around heated bales for cooling.

160° F. - Reaching the danger zone. Check temp every two hours. If possible, disassemble stacked hay to allow more air to move around heated bales for cooling.

175° F. - Hot spots or fire pockets are likely. If possible, stop all air movement around hay. Alert fire service of a possible hay fire incident.

190° F. - Remove hot hay. This should be done with the assistance of the fire service, which should be prepared for hay to burst into flames as it contacts fresh air.

Often homeowners are tempted to purchase plants that are offered at the local nursery or superstore based simply on the limited information on the label provided with the plant, or even worse based simply on the way the plant looks in the store. Instead, it is suggested that doing a little homework will help you choose plants that are beautiful, hardy and suited for your space.

One of the keys to the success of the Texas Superstar® program is the quality and reliability of the plant material that is highlighted in educational and marketing campaigns. Every effort is made to ensure that highlighted plants will perform well for Texas consumers.

To be selected as a Superstar®, a plant must: be attractive and useful for diverse gardeners and landscapes across the state; perform well for the majority of growers without requiring extensive care or expertise; can be propagated in sufficient numbers to meet the expected need; possess attractive, unique, and desirable characteristics; and be fairly pest and disease resistant.

It is not easy to become a Texas Superstar®. In addition to the above selection criteria, the plants during their trial phase receive minimal soil preparation, little supplemental water, and no pesticides.

Wild weed invasion hits area



Thistles are popping up all over Cooke County and surrounding areas. Chopping or pulling out thistles is futile. A tiny bit of root left behind will re-sprout. To keep them from spreading, cut off the flower and seed heads, but leave the stems and leaves standing. Bag heads and destroy. Spray, brush, or sponge Round-Up on green growing leaves. It takes about two weeks to work. If still green, apply again. Thistles are hard to kill. Be a good neighbor. Thistles are not a pretty wildflower, but an invasive weed. Keep your weeds from spreading.

Red meat production below last year

Commercial red meat production for the United States totaled 4.01 billion pounds in April, down 2% from the 4.09 billion pounds produced in April 2009.

Beef production, at 2.14

billion pounds, was slightly above the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.85 million head, up 3% from April 2009. The average live weight was down 23 pounds from the previous year, at 1,253 pounds.

Veal production totaled 11.1 million pounds, 1% below April a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 68,500 head, up 1% from April 2009. The average live weight was down 6 pounds from last

year, at 275 pounds.

Pork production totaled 1.85 billion pounds, down 4% from the previous year. Hog kill totaled 9.05 million head, down 4% from April 2009. The average live weight was up 1 pound from the previous year, at 273 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 13.0 million pounds, was down 16% from April 2009. Sheep slaughter totaled 190,700 head, 17% below last year. The average live weight was 136 pounds, up 1 pound from April a year ago.

January to April 2010 commercial red meat production was 15.9 billion pounds, down 2% from 2009. Accumulated beef production was up slightly from last year, down 4% from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 3%.

TDA market recap

For the week ending May 22, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$5 lower per hundredweight with a few to \$5 higher compared to a week ago. Fed cattle prices were \$2.70 lower per hundredweight. Cattle prices normally decline in the late spring and early summer. Lower wholesale beef prices and concerns that a slower economic recovery may reduce future beef demand were also factors in the decline.

Better than expected export demand boosted grain prices.

As for futures markets, cotton, wheat, and corn were higher while feeder cattle, fed cattle, and lumber were lower.

Many areas of the state received rainfall last week with amounts ranging from a trace to as much as five inches. Topsoil moisture was reported in mostly adequate to short supply with much of East Texas short to very short.

The state's wheat crop is 95% headed and 2% of the acreage has been harvested. Cotton is 48% planted, slightly behind the normal pace, and 7% of the acreage is squaring. Rice planting is nearing completion. Corn was 96% planted and 15% of the crop is silking, both slightly behind average. Grain sorghum, peanut, and soybean planting were also active and ahead of the normal pace. Most crops and pastures were reported in good to fair condition, while rice was good to excellent.

This year, Kristin was selected as a Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC) 1st Team All-State Basketball Player. She was

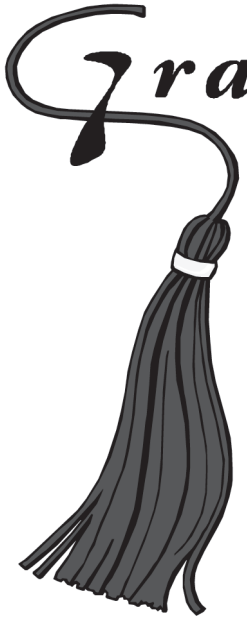
