MOODY VETOES BILL FOR 115TH DISTRICT COURT AUSTIN, April 10.—(P)—Governor Moody today had cleared his desk of bills left by the fifth called session of the 41st legislature. YOUTH HANGED AT MAIDSTONE

MAIDSTONE, Eng., April 8.—(AP)—Within less than three weeks after his conviction of the murder of his mother, Sidney Fox was hanged in jail here today. A crowd dispersed quickly when a notice was posted that the youth had paid the penalty for his crime.

Fox strangled his mother, a charming woman of 63, as she lay in bed at their hotel at Margate last autumn, and then set the room afire. The son previously had insured her life for considerable sums.

LARGE MERGER IS FORESEEN

YOUNGSTOWN, O., April 8.—(AP)—One of the most spectacular battles of modern big business reached its decisive point today as Youngstown Sheet and Tube stock holders were planned to vote on the consolidation proposal of Bethlehem Steel.

The shareholders meeting came as a climax to three weeks of intense fighting for proxies in which the resources of millions of dollars were thrown into public and personal appeals for support and finally into last-minute legal stratagems.

There still was the possibility of eleven-hour court moves by the opposition to forestall the vote even up to the hour of the meeting.

The lid seems to have blown clear off the marriage of Gloria Swanson and her marquis. The explosion happened, according to Photoplay Magazine, when Constance Bennett reached New York after her stay abroad, where she divorced her millionaire husband, Philip Plant. Within a week it was reported, Connie spent \$800 phoning Henri, the marquis in Paris, that she had arrived safely and so on. The long separation of Gloria and the marquis adds weight to the story that all is over but the decree.

LOWER LUMBER PRICES COMING

DALLAS, Tex., April 8.—(AP)—A gradual recession of prices and an imminent and comprehensive forward movement in all phases of business were forecast by John E. Owens of Dallas in an address of welcome at the annual convention of the Texas Lumbermen's Association here today.

Pessimism existent in business circles since the stock market crash last fall was unfounded and is but a passing phase of the cycle of events, Owens declared. He pointed to the fact that all money had been returned to normalcy and that the Federal Reserve System was deflated rather than expanded.

Annual reports of officers were on the afternoon program. J. A. Kirkpatrick of Waco, president, N. C. Hoyt, treasurer, R. G. Hyett, secretary and traffic manager, and J. M. Rockwell of the lumbermen's underwriters, were included on this program.

Payment Cemetery Association Dues Now Being Made

Collection of dues to the Greenleaf Cemetery Association is now under way and membership in the association is being finished. E. T. Perkinson, secretary of the organization, said Tuesday that the members were paying their dues of \$6 for the coming year.

Many new members have been added to the association for the coming year and these with the members listed for last year will make the membership much larger than in several years. In speaking of the work, Mr. Perkinson said that the association was doing all possible to keep all lots clean and that in order to do this it would take a large amount of cash to pay the five regular employees of the cemetery. No person can keep a single lot clean for the year and keep it watered for the small sum of \$6 he said, and by joining the association it helps in the work and in the financing of the association.

COLEMAN, Texas, April 8.—(Sp.)—New city officials took charge of Coleman affairs last night at a meeting that did not adjourn until after midnight. The new officers are Mayor R. H. Alexander, Commissioners J. S. Rogers and Harry Thomson.

Chief of Police Frank Rucker, under indictment for murder, did not seek re-appointment and W. D. Combs was selected by the new government as temporary chief. J. A. Lewis, a former manager of the municipal light and power plant, was chosen to succeed Sam Hale.

City Secretary H. M. Collins was retained, but his assistant, E. D. Hubert, was replaced with Miss Curtis Purcell. At a meeting this morning the new commission employed the firm of Rodgers, Smith & Company to make a complete audit of the city books. Tonight at the new Moore Hotel, the new officers will be given a banquet by the Chamber of Commerce.

BOSTON, April 8.—(AP)—The balance sheet of the Ford Motor Company filed with the Massachusetts commissioner of corporation today indicated profit for 1929 of \$81,797,861, as contrasted with an indicated loss of \$72,221,498 in 1928.

REMODELING BUILDING FOR McCLELLAND STORE IS ESTIMATED AT \$8000

Remodeling work on the building to be occupied by the McClelland store here started yesterday with a large crew of carpenters working on the repair work. New flooring, plaster, paint, roof, wiring, plumbing and a new front are included in the work. The building permit issued the store is for repair work amounting to \$8,000, exclusive of fixtures and furniture and will be completed in six or seven weeks.

J. H. Johnson, construction manager for the McClelland interests said today that it would be about two months before the work was finished and the store opened for business.

A space twenty feet wide and eighty feet long is being divided, which will be rented by the company. The store itself will have a fifty foot front with three large entrances and will be the regular McClelland front as in their stores in the large cities of the country. There will be nine counters in the center of the building and counters along all three walls. A partition is being built across the back of the building and this room will be used for storage space. The store is to occupy the building formerly occupied by the Gilliam Dry Goods store on Center Avenue.

The manager for the new store has not been chosen yet it was said today, but it is thought that he will come from some other store in this section of the state so he will be familiar with the conditions and the necessities of this area of Texas.

GOOD PROGRESS IS REPORTED BY CENSUS TAKERS

W. L. Turner, census supervisor of this district, said this morning that the enumerators reports showed that they were about half through with the work at the end of the first week. The enumerators in Brownwood have progressed rapidly with their work, and one has finished all but a few houses and some who were not at home at the time of the call.

Enumerators have been very prompt in their work, many having gotten more than half through before the end of the first week. The farm enumerators are getting their schedules filled rapidly and indications are that the advance information sent by the supervisors of the schedules has been very helpful with the work.

Mr. Turner said that at the completion of the work the results would be announced as they were tabulated. All population figures in the district will be released by his office before being sent to Washington. When the work is completed figures as of 1920 will be given with figures for 1930 to show the comparison. All the enumerators concerning the 1920 census is in his hands and will be given with the present results.

The Advance Reports
One reason for the advance giving of the information is to be sure that all people have been counted and that all have been properly placed. If the enumeration shows smaller figures than contemplated, the results can be checked here before being sent to Washington. When they reach the general office in Washington the multitude of reports from the whole country will make it impossible to get figures for many months.

The Lions Club here is planning a check of the census before it is sent to Washington, Mr. Turner said. They will have about thirty people working on the checking and will get the number of people living at each house in Brownwood and these will be tabulated with the reports of the enumerators. Mr. Turner said that he was glad to see this being done as it would assure Brownwood of a correct check and with two lists a more accurate number would be gotten.

Members of his office are going to other parts of the district daily to aid some enumerators who are having trouble. W. L. Turner, Jr., is in Lampasas today inspecting reports and schedules there and also giving some of the enumerators instructions concerning the filling of the reports.

It is thought here that this district will easily be finished by the end of the allotted time for the enumeration.

C. OF C. OFFERS HELP TAKING CENSUS HERE

Brownwood Chamber of Commerce pledged wholehearted support to W. L. Turner in taking the census of the city of Brownwood at Wednesday's luncheon of the board of directors held at the Southern Hotel. Mr. Turner stated that he has charge of this entire district and that he has 117 enumerators working day and night at counting noses for Uncle Sam and urged the Chamber of Commerce and all other civic organizations to help his enumerators count every man, woman and child that should be included in the census of this city. The enumerators are practically half through with their work, Mr. Turner stated and will complete this work in the city April 15.

Mr. Turner said before the three luncheon clubs, Kiwanis, Rotary and Lions, at the next meeting of these clubs. A meeting with various Parent Teachers associations will also be arranged, it was announced. Mr. Turner and the Chamber of Commerce urges that any person who is missed by the enumerator, call the Chamber of Commerce and give his name and address, this will be forwarded to Mr. Turner's office.

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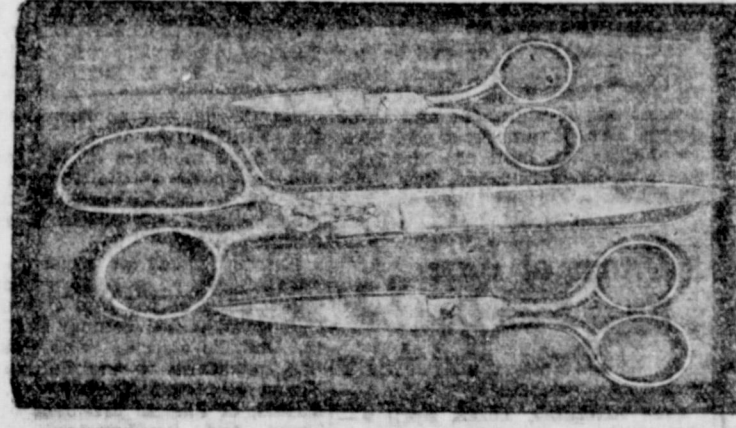
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
