Muenster captures 6th Governor's Community Achievement Award

The City of Muenster has once again earned the Governor's Community Achievement Award (GCAA) for the "Up to 3000" population category. This honor includes a \$90,000 prize to use toward landscaping and beautification in Muenster.

This is the 6th time that Muenster claimed the GCAA prize. The very first time was in 1985 under the leadership of Gary Fisher. That is when Muenster got its decorative street lights. Later, MaryLee Alford helped form Keep Muenster Beautiful (KMB) and that has been the organization spearheading the activities to win the GCAA prize.

KMB Board member Gary Fisher remarked on this year's win, "The overwhelming cleanup response after the Father's Day weekend storm probably swayed the judges to award Muenster the GCAA. There are so many communities now competing for the GCAA. They all follow the Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB) guidelines, accumulate points in every required area, so the scoring is in the high 90th percentile for most entrants. As a result, it takes a large compelling event or project to grab attention of the judges. Our event was the storm.

"The entire community can be proud, but especially

those volunteers who spent countless hours, donated equipment, and did quick thinking in the storm cleanup. KMB nominated the City of Muenster for a leadership award, as well as *The Muenster Enterprise* for best media publicity, both for the cleanup effort and coverage. Winners in those categories have not yet been announced by KTB."

According to TxDOT representative Ben Coker, the award will be presented June 27 at the Keep Texas Beautiful Conference at the Westin Riverwalk in San Antonio.

A TxDOT press release noted, "The Governor's Com-

munity Achievement Awards are presented each year to an array of Texas communities with the best grassroots environmental programs in the state. Communities are judged based on their population size, which is derived from population estimates from the 2010 Census. The efforts of these communities to involve citizens, businesses, schools, local government, and youth to keep their city, county, or region beautiful will earn 10 of them a share of \$2 million in landscaping monies from Texas Department of Transportation. These prizes are designated for landscaping

City agrees on contracts; pool excavation to begin

If all goes as planned, Muenster should have a new swimming pool to enjoy this summer. At Monday night's regular meeting, the City Council voted to authorize the mayor to sign the pool contract as soon as possible. They gave the go ahead to Community Lumber to begin remodeling the swimming pool's restroom area.

City Administrator Stan Endres reported that pool contractor Darrell Charles had received the report on soil samples for the pool site and the engineer has not been able to do a full

report yet. His quick study indicates that the condition of the soil is excellent for a pool and should not require any additional peering underneath it.

The cost of the pool should remain at \$180,000 unless additional changes are made or added. Charles plans to have the contract ready this week and would like to start excavating next Tuesday.

Endres updated the donations. With another \$15,000 received, the donation total is now \$116,000. Expenses anticipated are \$180,000 for the pool and \$20,000 to remodel the restrooms.

John Pagel of Community Lumber submitted a list of expenses for remodeling the restroom area. They discussed putting a textured paint on the restroom floor to match the pool area to keep them from being slick.

Steve Gilland reviewed the City's audit report for 2010-11. "In our opinion, your financial statements are fairly present," said the auditor. "There's no reservation, qualifications regarding those financial statements. It's what we call an unqualified opinion because there's no qualifications, reserva-

Muenster ISD buzzes with many construction projects

Discussion of construction projects and facility updates took a good chunk of time at the Feb. 15 meeting of the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees. The School District is moving forward with many of the projects that have been topics of discussion in recent months.

Construction Management Agent Charlie Price reported that they were ready to pour the slab for the practice gym and the final plumbing is ready for inspection. If Muenster ISD should qualify for the Cool School Grant, the money could be used to replace air conditioners. Repair work is slated to begin

the first week of March on the track.

Price reviewed the plans for the concession stand. It would have a white metal roof with red trim. It includes storage in the back of the building. The projected cost is \$182,000. If work begins on the concession stand by April 1, it should be completed by Aug. 1.

Architect W.C. Ferrell presented drawings for the Ag building, elementary school, and junior high building. Preliminary costs of the buildings were discussed at a special called meeting on Monday, March 5.

G & H Backhoe submitted a bid of \$3,983.31 for the

waterline from the football field to the new practice field provided they don't hit rock. The Board accepted the bid for the 2" poly pipeline and agreed to pay extra for rock on an hourly basis.

The Board agreed unanimously to take action to adopt an energy savings plan for the District after learning from Mark Johnson of NextEra Energy that they could save a tremendous amount of money over the years. Total cost of the plan is \$294,763, which would be reduced to \$227,704 after a discount of \$67,059 that Muenster ISD is eligible to receive.

Margaret Sterle, DVM opens Muenster veterinary service

Muenster Arena Animal Hospital received its first patients last week. Margaret Sterle, DVM purchased property just northwest of Muenster several years ago with the intention of building a veterinary clinic there. Now the time was right and Dr. Sterle built a clinic and remodeled the arena already on the property to make it more functional and repaired what had fallen into disrepair.

The facility is equipped with lab, portable x-ray, surgery room, exam rooms, an isolation room, individual kennels for small animals, a treatment area for horses, a treatment area for cattle, and more. They also have a groomer come in twice a month and they offer boarding services for horses.

Dr. Sterle said that doctoring animals is something she knew she wanted to do since she was a little girl. She earned her medical degree

at Texas A&M University in 1990 and has been in practice 20 years. She is joined at her Muenster practice with Dr. Larry Tisdale who has served as Muenster's veterinarian for many years. He closed his practice at the old Muenster Livestock facility and now works part-time with Dr. Sterle. She is in Muenster on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, and at her practice in Decatur, Pet Health Center, on Tuesday and Thursday. Dr. Tisdale is at the Muenster Arena Animal Hospital on Tuesday and Thursday.

"My philosophy is to get a quick and accurate diagnosis. Even though that may mean doing more tests to start with, if you can get the answer without having to guess, it saves you money and saves you grief in the long run. Let's get it right the first time."

Services offered at Muenster Arena Animal Hospital range for small animals from

routine health care and surgery to orthopedic surgery, ultrasound, echocardiography, and almost any type care a dog or cat requires. The in-house blood lab usually provides a diagnosis within an hour. In treating horses, Dr. Sterle does everything except the major surgeries. She does dentistry, reproduction, lameness care, general medicine, and radiology. Cattle care includes herd health, reproduction, etc.

"I hope that I can be of some service. I'm a small town person and Muenster is a nice small town. I feel more comfortable raising my kids in this size town. That's a big reason."

Assisting the two veterinarians are receptionist Carol Lynch and Teo who helps with the cattle and horses.

Margaret is married to Leroy Ashcroft. He trains and competes on cutting horses. They have been married 17 years and have two children.

Entities reveal lists of candidates

Muenster will have some entities taking part in the Saturday, May 12 election. Although the City of Muenster will not have to hold an election for City Council, it will hold a local option liquor election. This will determine whether alcohol can be sold in areas annexed into the City limits. If approved, the City will still have to approve zones in which it may be sold.

There are three seats up for election on the Muenster City Council. They are Place 1 held by Pat Stelzer, Place 2 held by Greg Bohl, and Place 4 held by Jewel Otto. All three incumbents have filed for another term and there are no opposing candidates.

The Board of Trustees of Muenster ISD has three Board positions with expiring terms. They are Place 5 held by Richard Dangelmayr, Place 6 held by Kimberly Walterscheid, and Place 7 held by Steve Trubenbach. All three incumbents seek another term and there is no opposition.

There will be an election

for the school district. The Board called for a Maintenance Tax Election which is needed to get Muenster ISD under current law. The law was changed in 1968, which allowed school districts to have a maximum maintenance tax rate of \$1.50. It requires voter approval.

Muenster Hospital Board has a lively field of candidates. For the first time in quite a few years, they have a contested election. Board members with their three-year terms expiring are Aaron Hess, Kenny Klement, and Ronnie Weinzapfel. All three incumbents have filed for another term. Also seeking a Hospital Board seat are Bob Ambrose, Yvonne Ambrose, Mary Del Olmo, and Steven Fisher. This is an at-large election. The three candidates receiving the most votes are elected.

Lindsay ISD also has seven candidates running for two at-large positions. Current LISD Board President Bruce Bezner and Lloyd Reiter, whose positions are up, have chosen not to run for

re-election. Those seeking a position are Herbie Price, Marilyn Sebade, Chris Hundt, Phil Metzler, Andy Popp, Regi Klement, and Jenny Corcoran.

The Lindsay School District will also have a \$7.7 million bond election for facilities improvement and construction.

There are three positions up for election on the Lindsay City Council - the mayor and two alderman seats. Those positions are currently held by Mayor Donald Metzler, Mayor Pro tem Danny Nortman, and Alderman Glenn "Tic" Block. All three filed seeking another term. There is no opposition.

Saint Jo ISD will hold a joint election with the City of Saint Jo on May 12. There are three candidates running for two at-large positions on the Saint Jo ISD Board of Trustees. They are Leeton Phillips and Dee Weger, incumbents, and Ira Schoppa.

The City of Saint Jo City Council has incumbent Tom Weger challenged by Dustin Anderson.

projects along local state rights-of-way." Fisher recalls, "I think back to 1985 when gutters were filled with trash, run-down buildings were common, and grass grew in every parkway on both Main and Division. It was this way because no one had expectations of anything better." "The grade school children were asked what they didn't like about Muenster and they listed all of those things. Adults were in control, but not acting like adults." "It has been 27 years. KMB is still trying to raise expectations within the community. But as a generation has grown up, they do have higher expectations. Of that I am proud." "Being so active has not made a lot of friends with some property owners, but my choice has always been to continue to do the right thing for the community, in hopes others will follow. While some individuals will always have bad habits, poor practices, and low expectations, I feel the majority appreciates the work done over the last 27 years."

SCHOOL

It was noted that if air conditioning units are maintained properly they should remain as efficient as when installed, light bulbs should not have to be replaced for five years, and ballasts should last about seven years. There is a one year warranty for anything installed, five years for light bulbs, and seven years for ballasts. Rebates will be paid directly to the District from OnCor. The new part of the school is in compliance with the Texas Education Code. More than 90% of the fixtures need to be changed in the field house, gym, and old part of the high school.

A Maintenance Tax Election was ordered for May 12. This is a preventative action to allow the District to continue with construction and not be penalized. This would allow the District to raise the tax rate to \$1.50 if needed.

Superintendent Clay Richerson explained, "The Maintenance Tax Election is needed to get Muenster ISD under current law. The law was changed in 1968, which allowed school districts to have a maximum maintenance tax rate of \$1.50, but required voter approval. Muenster ISD has never called an election for such approval. Without voter approval, Muenster ISD could lose local revenue under the old law we are currently under. This is basically house cleaning Muenster ISD needs to do."

Following an executive session, the Board reconvened to vote on contracts for the two principals and athletic director. They renewed a two year term contract with Elementary Principal Lou Heers plus a \$2,250 increase to raise her salary to \$78,000 per year for the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years to begin July 1, 2012 and end June 30, 2014. The Board voted to renew the contract with Junior High/High School Principal Sharon Browning for the same time period with a \$2,250 salary increase that raises her salary to \$75,690.

Athletic Director/Teacher Brady Carney's contract was renewed for two years with a raise that increased his salary to \$68,000 per year for the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years to begin July 1,

2012 and end June 30, 2014. A Board of Trustee Election was called for May 12 for Places 5, 6, and 7 on the Board. Carol Klement will serve as early voting judge and Jeanette Reiter as early voting clerk with Celine Dittfurth serving as Election Day judge and Phyllis Dittfurth and Betty Felderhoff as clerks. Board members currently holding those places are Place 5 Richard Dangelmayr, Place 6 Kimberly Walterscheid, and Place 7 Steve Trubenbach.

Superintendent Clay Richerson reported that \$22,805.74 in delinquent taxes were paid to the School District in January.

The Board approved an amendment that provided line item changes to the budget accounts for the transfer of funds to balance some of the line item expenditures. The amendment will reflect no addition to the budget on both the revenue and expenditure side.

1934 - 2012**

or exceptions. This is the type of audit report you want because generally when you're looking to issue any kind of debt, the people that are looking at debt look at your financial statements. If you have any kind of qualifications, generally it indicates more risk, so you wind up paying a higher interest rate and different things like that."

Gilland had praise for property owners in Muenster. "Muenster is very fortunate in the fact that your tax collection rate is historically very high," he noted. "When we look at your tax collection rate, we use your tax levy as your benchmark. That's actually what's billed to all the citizens. In that benchmark, you compare your collection to your total of the levies." The collection rate for Muenster is 98% of the taxes levied. He said anything above 94% is good. With the delinquent taxes collected, the collection rate goes up to 99.8%.

This is a plus when setting the City's budget because money does not have to be added for people who don't pay their taxes. "When you are historically hitting 100%, you don't have to add anything extra to your tax rate to compensate for that."

The Council was told that they are doing a good job keeping control over the budget and expenditures.

Gilland told of the City of Fort Worth's predicament with their retirement fund. They are underfunded by about \$400 million. He noted that Muenster is overfunded. The amount needed is calculated for the people who are expected to retire. Muenster had more money in the pot than what is calculated that will be required to fund employee retirement. In 2010, the City retirement

fund was over by \$210,000. The City Council voted 5-0 to accept the audit report.

Mayor Joey Anderson remarked, "This is a reflection on the work that our City management does. Stan (Endres) and Brenda (Simpson) do a lot of work to keep us out of trouble. We've seen these for several years continue in this theme."

It was voted to ratify the calling of a local option liquor election. Mayor Anderson explained that to have the same status at the rest of the City to sell alcoholic beverages, annexed property must hold an election.

Endres commented, "Texas still has some of the oldest liquor laws there are of any other state. Even though the entire City of Muenster is wet now, an area that has been annexed is not considered wet because it was dry before it was annexed. That's why you have to have an election to vote it wet. Once it's wet, the City can determine where it's legally zoned to sell alcohol."

Alderman Jack Flusche inquired about who was paying for the election. Since there is not a contested election for City Council, this will be an extra expense. Endres said he will look into seeing whether the City or Germanfest, Inc., who requested the election, should pay the expense.

Endres said that the new storage tank, pump house, pumps, and SCADA system have been ordered for the water system project. City Engineer John Beznier expects to have the final plans designed and place them out for bids by March 15.

The City Council agreed to purchase a computer for use by the Municipal Court and police department only. Currently, the Municipal Court uses the City secretary's computer. In 2010, an ordinance was passed estab-

lishing a Municipal Court Technology Fund. It allows the City to collect \$4 on each ticket that is paid. The funds can only be used to purchase computers, software, and other technology items to be used by the City Court. The fund now has between \$500 and \$600 in it.

The VHS camera in one of the police cars quit working and is beyond repair. The camera from the chief of police's vehicle was moved to the deputy's car. All police vehicles are now required with Federal Racial Profiling. Cost of a camera is about \$4,000. A portable one

might be less expensive. The purchase was approved up to \$4,000.

Muenster received notification that it is for the 10th consecutive year a Tree City USA community. There are new signs posted on the east and west sides of town.

Anyone still wishing to get free mulch from trees shredded after the June storm should do so soon. It is piled in an area on the west side of the City Park. Much has been taken, but piles still remain. It must be cleared off or spread out before Germanfest. The City will do this after March 31.

Bills totaling \$109,329.14 were approved.

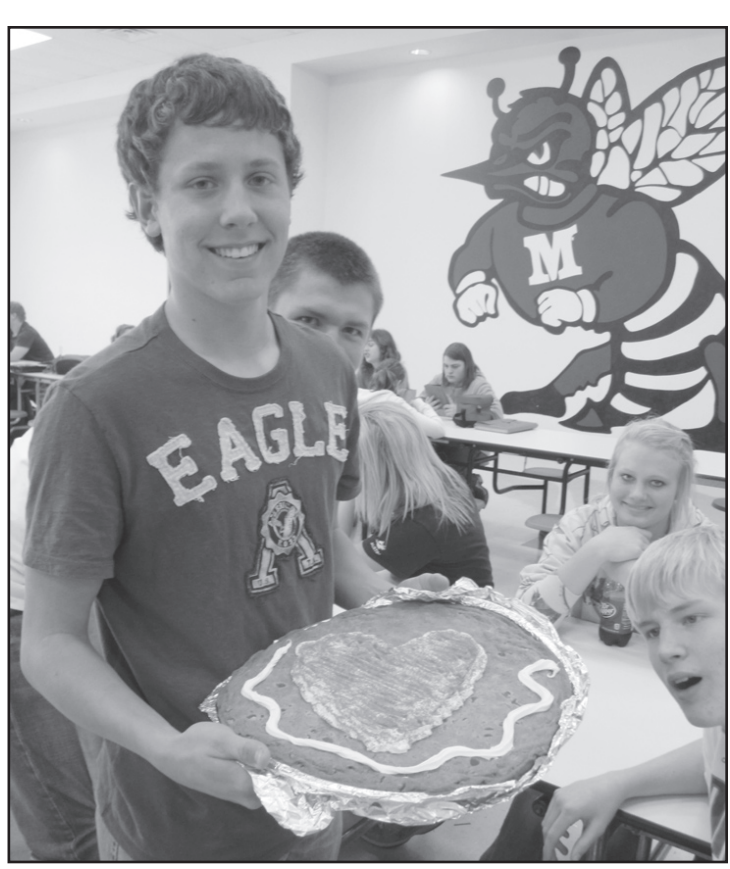

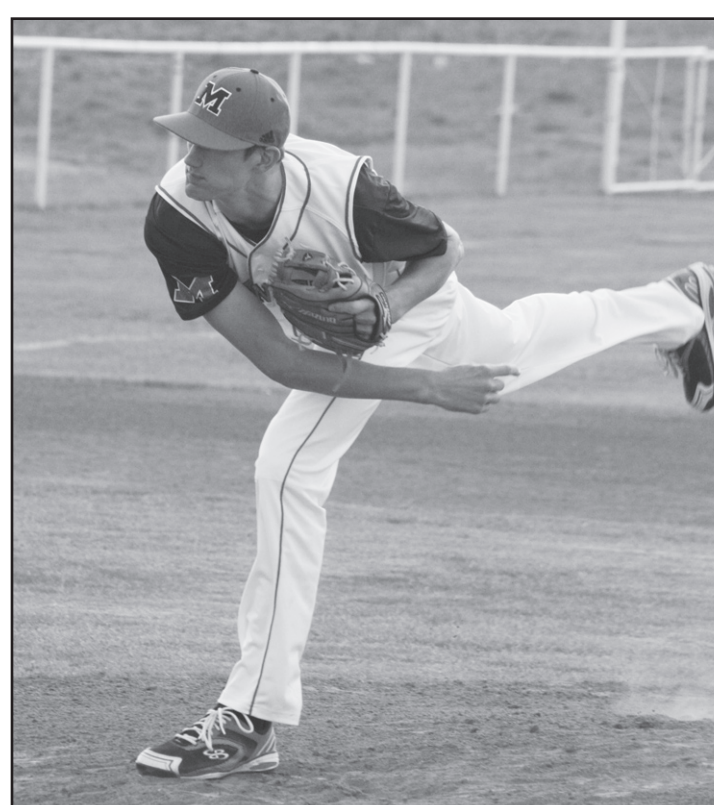

Long-term plans for landscape water conservation

Water use increases anywhere from 30 to 60% during the summer. It is important for homeowners to plan long term to conserve water. Doing so can reduce water expenses, decrease labor, and improve the appearance of your landscape. Properly designed water efficient landscapes need one inch of water per week. Many homeowners water their landscape two or more times a week which can actually damage the landscape by supporting a shallow root system. Frequent watering produces shallow roots whereas infrequent deep watering will produce deeper roots. Deep roots have water available for an extended period of time.

Change Nozzles - Change sprinkler head spray nozzles to water conserving multi-stream nozzles which apply water in heavier droplets, so less water is lost due to displacement by wind and evaporation.

Replace Controller - Replace an older irrigation controller with new models with water conserving settings (soak and cycle; sea-

sonal adjustment) or with a smart controller which uses evapotranspiration or moisture sensors to determine runtime.

Install a Rain and Freeze Sensor - This sensor prevents an automatic system from applying water while raining or during freezing conditions to avoid loss of water and prevent hazardous ice conditions.

Drip Irrigation - Install drip irrigation (many existing irrigation systems can be converted to drip irrigation). Drip irrigation is 90% efficient compared to spray irrigation which is about 65% efficient if designed, installed, and maintained properly. There is now sub-surface drip tubing available for lawn areas. Drip irrigation tubing is available for you to do it yourself or hire a licensed irrigator. In some case drip irrigation is exempt from drought restrictions.

Plant Drought Tolerant Plants - Utilizing native and adaptive drought tolerant plants reduces the amount of landscape water needed. However, changes should not be made to your landscape during a drought. Wait until drought conditions and wa-

tering restrictions have lifted before making any changes. The best time to plant is during the fall, winter, or early spring. Texas A&M University also has an Earth Kind website full of information and a plant search database at <http://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/earthkind/>.

Plant Trees - Shade trees cool the landscape, therefore lower the evapotranspiration rate. Evapotranspiration is the loss of water from the soil due to evaporation and from plants due to transpiration. Plant trees on the western side of your landscape to receive the most benefit from shading (this will also save electricity). Select trees from your city's recommended plants list or go to <http://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/earthkind/>.

Aerate Lawn Area - Clay soil becomes compacted over time from activities, rain, and irrigation. To increase the soil's ability to absorb water, aerate the lawn area in the spring and apply about ¼ inch of compost. Do not however, aerate your lawn during a drought as it will cause undue stress to the root zone.

Cattle producers advised to use caution as prices march higher

Cattle producers should be mindful of not getting too caught up in reacting to high market prices, according to a Texas AgriLife Extension Service economist.

When Dr. Jason Johnson, showed a slide to cattle producers at the Blackland Income Growth Conference in Waco, it caused many to gasp and begin conversations about profit potential.

"I put this (slide) up there not to make you salivate, but to put things into perspective," Johnson said. "You can get into a bind making certain decisions during pros-

perous times."

He advised producers not to overstock due to the potential for continued drought conditions in Texas.

But if the dry weather patterns tend to alter from last year's devastating drought, "if we get some rain, you've got a real good shot at making some good money here. The price outlook is really looking good," Johnson said.

To play it safe, Johnson said producers might want to consider stocking at 75% of normal capacity.

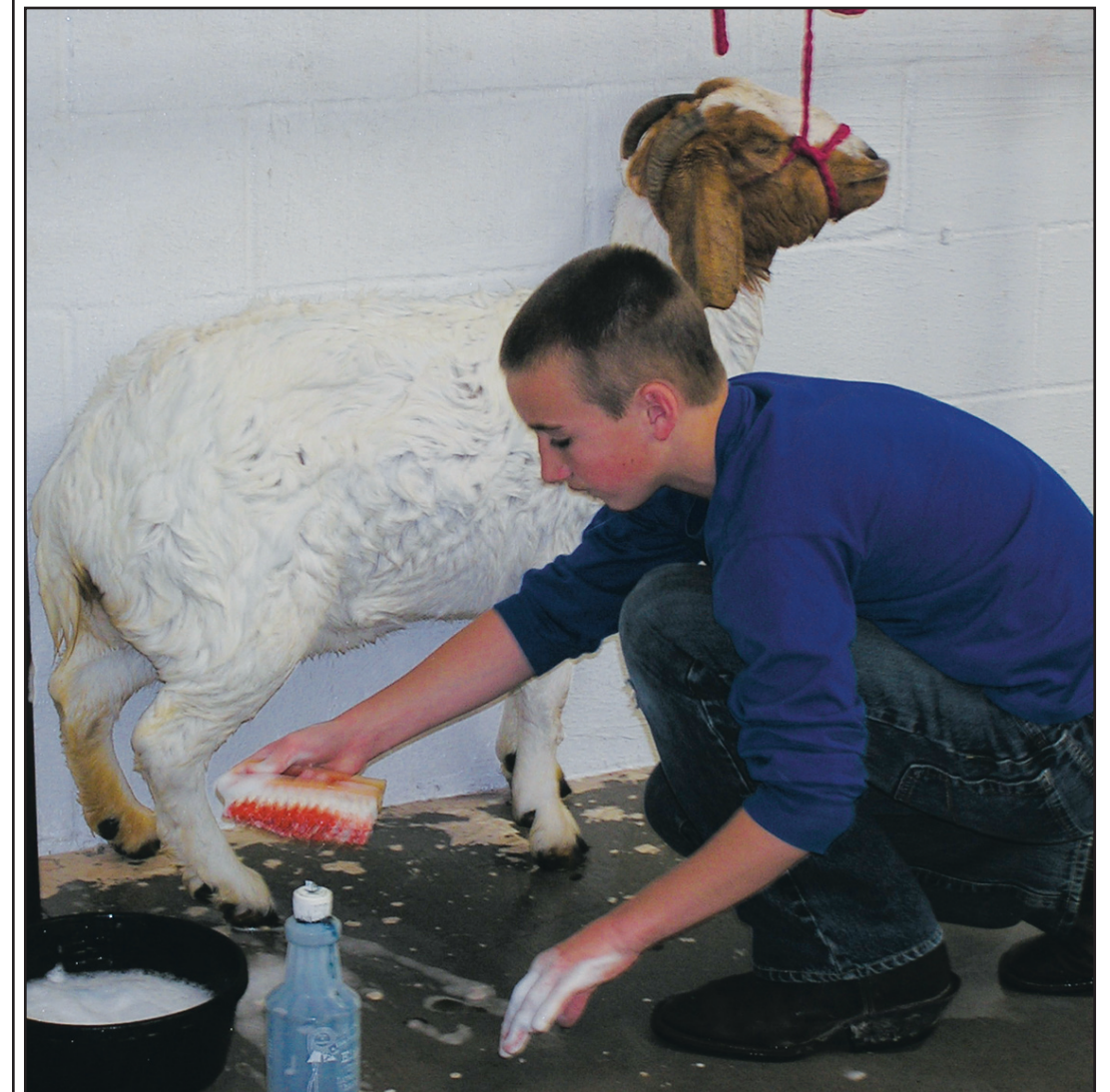
"That way if we get 80 to 90% normal rainfall, you

won't have to cut into the bone of the herd to destock," he said. "If we get normal rainfall or better, there are many alternatives available to harvesting excess forage."

Target prices for the first quarter of 2012 for 500-600 pound calves are \$1.45 to \$1.50, which has already been exceeded this year, Johnson said. That trend is likely to continue with a historic shortage of beef cows not seen in the U.S. since 1952.

Profitability for Texas ranchers relies on using the availability of forage and reducing the amount of pur-

County Agent's Report

Blackleg

Blackleg is a cattle disease that can rob profits from cattlemen if vaccination recommendations are ignored. Blackleg refers to one of several clostridial bacteria diseases. This disease is typically noticed in young cattle (less than two years) but can affect older cattle also. An excerpt from a newsletter prepared by Van Zandt County Extension Agent Tommy Phillips tells us more about the disease.

When blackleg is confirmed on a premise, it will always be a concern. Blackleg spores remain in the soil indefinitely. A calf becomes infected when the calf ingests the spores. Usually this is a result of rain concentrating as surface water but either drought or rain could cause the spores to surface.

After being ingested, the spores go to the muscles and remain dormant. A "trigger" breaks them out of dormancy, sometimes months or years later. The bacteria multiply rapidly and produce toxins, which kill the muscles, ultimately causing sudden death. The "trigger" can be one of several things. Often, it is fast growth. Another trigger could be muscle exertion brought on by physical exertion or weaning and hauling.

The most common observation of the disease is sudden death and rapid gaseous decomposition. The death is so rapid, a treatment is normally ineffective. All dead calves should be burned with untreated wood products to keep from contaminating the ground. Because other calves can have the bacteria in dormancy, guard against triggers such as stress or rapid growth. Vaccination will prevent the disease if administered prior to infection. If a calf dies of blackleg after vaccination, the calf was exposed prior to the vaccination.

Positively identifying cause of death as blackleg can only be done by necropsy and lab test. Several other clostridial diseases will have the same symptoms. Thus it is wise to use a seven and eight way clostridial disease vaccine for prevention. A vaccination program should include annual vaccination of the entire herd, not just calves. Grown cattle are susceptible to several of the clostridial diseases. Take care not to vaccinate pregnant cows in the last three months of pregnancy.
