

Muenster captures 6th Governor's **Community Achievement Award**

The City of Muenster has ernor's Community Achievement Award (GCAA) for the "Up to 3000" population category. This honor includes a \$90,000 prize to use toward landscaping and beautification in Muenster.

This is the 6th time that Muenster claimed the GCAA prize. The very first time was in 1985 under the leadership of Gary Fisher. That is when Muenster got its decorative street lights. Later, MaryLee Alford helped form Keep Muenster Beautiful (KMB) and that has been the organization spearheading the activities to win the

KMB Board member Gary once again earned the Gov- Fisher remarked on this year's win, "The overwhelming cleanup response after the Father's Day weekend storm probably swayed the judges to award Muenster the GCAA. There are so many communities now competing for the GCAA. They all follow the Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB) guidelines, accumulate points in every required area, so the scoring is in the high 90th percentile for most entrants. As a result, it takes a large compelling event or project to grab attention of the judges. Our event was the storm.

Margaret Sterle, DVM opens Muenster veterinary service

Muenster Arena Animal Hospital received its first patients last week. Margaret Sterle, DVM purchased property just northwest of Muenster several years ago with the intention of building a veterinary clinic there. Now the time was right and Dr. Sterle built a clinic and remodeled the arena already on the property to make it more functional and repaired what had fallen into disrepair.

The facility is equipped with lab, portable x-ray, surgery room, exam rooms, an isolation room, individual kennels for small animals, a treatment area for horses, treatment area for cattle, and more. They also have a groomer come in twice a month and they offer board-

ing services for horses. Dr. Sterle said that doctoring animals is something she knew she wanted to do since earned her medical degree range for small animals from

at Texas A&M University in 1990 and has been in practice 20 years. She is joined at her Muenster practice with Dr. Larry Tisdale who has served as Muenster's veterinarian for many years. He closed his practice at the old Muenster Livestock facility and now works part-time with Dr. Sterle. She is in Muenster on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, and at her practice in Decatur, Pet Health Center, on Tuesday and Thursday. Dr. Tisdale is at the Muenster Arena Animal Hospital on Tuesday and Thursday.

The in-house blood lab usually provides a diagnosis within an hour. In treating horses, Dr. Sterle does everything except the major surgeries. She does dentistry, reproduction, lameness care, general medicine, and radiology. Cattle care includes herd health, reproduction, etc.

"I hope that I can be of some service. I'm a small town person and Muenster is a nice small town. I feel more comfortable raising my kids in this size town. That's a big reason."

Assisting the two veterinarians are receptionist Carol Lynch and Teo who helps with the cattle and horses. Margaret is married to Le-

Karlyn died at 3:17 p.m., Tuesday, Feb. 28 at her



is the type of audit report you want because generally when you're looking to issue any kind of debt, the people that are looking at debt look at your financial statements. If you have any kind of qualifications, generally it indicates more risk, so you wind up paying a higher interest rate and different things like

Gilland had praise for property owners in Muenster. "Muenster is very fortunate in the fact that your tax collection rate is historically very high," he noted. "When we look at your tax collection rate, we use your tax levy as your benchmark. That's actually what's billed to all the citizens. In that benchmark, you compare your collections to your total of the levy." The collection rate for Muenster is 98% of the taxes levied. He said anything above 94% is good. With the delinquent taxes collected, the collection rate goes up to 99.8%.

This is a plus when setting the City's budget because money does not have to be added for people who don't pay their taxes. "When you are historically hitting 100%, you don't have to add anything extra to your tax rate to compensate for that.'

The Council was told that they are doing a good job keeping control over the budget and expenditures.

Gilland told of the City of Fort Worth's predicament with their retirement fund. They are underfunded by about \$400 million. He noted that Muenster is over funded. The amount needed is calculated for the people who are expected to retire. Muenster had more money in the pot than what is calculated that will be required to fund employee retirement. In 2010, the City retirement

to accept the audit report. Mayor Joey Anderson remarked, "This is a refection on the work that our City management does. Stan (Endres) and Brenda (Simpson) do a lot of work to keep us out of trouble. We've seen these for several years continue in this theme."

It was voted to ratify the calling of a local option liquor election. Mayor Anderson explained that to have the same status at the rest of the City to sell alcoholic beverages, annexed property must hold an election.

Endres commented. "Texas still has some of the oldest liquor laws there are of any other state. Even though the entire City of Muenster is wet now, an area that has been annexed is not considered wet because it was dry before it was annexed. That's why you have to have an election to vote it wet. Once it's wet, the City can determine where it's legally zoned to sell alcohol. Alderman Jack Flusche

inquired about who was paying for the election. Since there is not a contested election for City Council, this will be an extra expense. Endres said he will look into seeing whether the City or Germanfest, Inc., who requested the election, should pay the expense. Endres said that the new

Long-term plans for landscape water conservation

Water use increases anywhere from 30 to 60% during the summer. It is important for homeowners to plan long term to conserve water. Doing so can reduce water expenses, decrease labor, and improve the appearance of your land-Properly designed water efficient landscapes need one inch of water per week. Many homeowners water their landscape two or more times a week which can actually damage the landscape by supporting a shallow root system. Frequent watering produces shallow roots whereas infrequent deep watering will produce deeper roots. Deep roots have water available for an extended period of time.

Change Nozzles - Change sprinkler head spray nozzles to water conserving multistream nozzles which apply water in heavier droplets, so less water is lost due to displacement by wind and

Replace Controller - Replace an older irrigation controller with new models with water conserving settings (soak and cycle; seasonal adjustment) or with a tering restrictions have lifted smart controller which uses evapotranspiration or mois-

Drip Irrigation - Install drip irrigation (many existing irrigation systems can be converted to drip irrigation). Drip irrigation is 90% efficient which is about 65% efficient if designed, installed, and maintained properly. There is now sub-surface drip tubing available for lawn areas. Drip irrigation tubing is available for you to do it yourself or hire a licensed irrigator. In some case drip irrigation is exempt from drought restrictions.



Cattle producers advised to use caution as prices march higher

Cattle producers should be mindful to not get too caught up in reacting to high market prices, according to a Texas AgriLife Extension Service

When Dr. Jason Johnson, showed a slide to cattle producers at the Blackland Income Growth Conference in Waco, it caused many to gasp and begin conversations about profit potential.

"I put this (slide) up there not to make you salivate, but to put things into perspective," Johnson said. "You can get into a bind making

perous times."

He advised producers not to overstock due to the potential for continued drought rainfall or better, there are conditions in Texas.

But if the dry weather patterns tend to alter from last year's devastating drought, "if we get some rain, you've got a real good shot at making some good money here. The price outlook is really looking good," Johnson said.

To play it safe, Johnson said producers might want to consider stocking at 75% of normal capacity.

The outlook for corn prices continues to be on the upswing due to declining carryover stocks from last year. He expects feed prices to remain level or increase a bit "due to these supplies and the renewable fuel standard tapping into corn to make ethanol.'

Texas hay prices continue to be a threat to profit margins as well for ranchers. "You can spend a lot of money raising that \$1.50-per-pound calf on hay," he said. "Cattle producers might want to consider storing hay supplies for up to two years if ample rainfall is received this spring and summer, and if enough hay is harvested.

"Saving two years worth of hay supplies allows you to sidestep a year like 2011 when hay prices were out of

Ranchers can also consider the many weather-related insurance products as a hedge against drought conditions, Johnson said.

County Agent's Report

Blackleg is a cattle disease that can rob profits from cattlemen if vaccination recommendations are ignored. Blackleg refers to one of several clostridial bacteria diseases. This disease is typically noticed in young cattle (less than two years) but can affect older cattle also. An excerpt from a newsletter prepared by Van Zandt County Extension Agent Tommy Phillips tells us more about the disease.

When blackleg is confirmed on a premise, it will always be a concern. Blackleg spores remain in the soil indefinitely. A calf becomes infected when the calf ingests the spores. Usually this is a result of rain concentrating as surface water but either drought or rain could cause the spores to surface.

After being ingested, the spores go to the muscles and remain dormant. A "trigger" breaks them out of dormancy, sometimes months or years later. The bacteria multiply rapidly and produce toxins, which kill the muscles, ultimately causing sudden death. The "trigger" can be one of several things. Often, it is fast growth. Another trigger could be muscle exertion brought on by physical exertion or weaning

The most common observation of the disease is sudden death and rapid gaseous decomposition. The death is so rapid, a treatment is normally ineffective. All dead calves should be burned with untreated wood products to keep from contaminating the ground. Because other calves can have the bacteria in dormancy, guard against triggers such as stress or rapid growth. Vaccination will prevent the disease if administered prior to infection. If a calf dies of blackleg after vaccination, he calf was exposed prior to the vaccination.

Positively identifying cause of death as blackleg can only be done by necropsy and lab test. Several other clostridial diseases will have the same symptoms. Thus it is wise to use a seven and eight way clostridial disease vaccine for prevention. A vaccination program should include annual vaccination of the entire herd, not just calves. Grown cattle are susceptible to several of the clostridial diseases. Take care not to vaccinate pregnant cows in the last three months of pregnancy.
